

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SINGER NEWS REPORT

A Perry Park-based Brisbane team should be Queensland's National League side next year if the State is left with just one representative in the national soccer competition.

That's the opinion of Brisbane Lions secretary Mr. Lawrence Oudendyk, who is presently attempting to formulate a plan to enable Queensland to stay one step ahead of our southern rivals.

'There will be major upheaval at the end of this season and I see it as a perfect time for us to re-examine our involvement and attitude towards the national competition. If Queensland is left with just one team in the NSL, then I think it could be suicidal to continue on as a lone Club representative. We must generate across the board appeal and the only way to do that is for the side to be seen as one representative of Brisbane," he said.

Mr. Oudendyk cites the success being enjoyed by the Brisbane Bullets Basketball team, both on and off the court, and says soccer could learn some lessons from Brian Kerle and Co.

We could actively promote a Brisbane soccer team in the national competition. It could be called the

Bombers for instance, therefore removing the reluctance by some soccer followers to suport another Brisbane club. It would have to be based at Perry Park and be subject to professional promotion. The team would be run as a company by a board of directors. Ideally, no games would be played in opposition to home NSL matches, Mr. Oudendyk said. Mr. Oudendyk admits there could be problems in assembling the player pool and perhaps dual registrations would have to be introduced.

Whether the new company would buy players outright or loan them would have to be decided by those concerned. To be honest, there are some things I haven't thought through yet and I am open to suggestions, criticism or ideas. It's just a personal idea and certainly not Lions policy. I haven't even mentioned it to my board. But I think we have got to start looking at alternatives now to be prepared for whatever happens in October. A headstart now could be the secret to success next year.

The idea of a 'united" Brisbane certainly is not new and in fact the proposal is as old as the national league itself. Plans were afoot to enter a Brisbane united team in the inaugural league but the plan fell by the wayside at the last minute. In the decade of NSL Football which has followed, the idea has been raised many times as a solution to dwindling crowds and lack of interest. But, wary of the problems that had to be overcome, to bring the proposal to fruition, there has never been any serious attempt to pursue the alternative.

WEEK 11: PRINCIPLES OF DEFENCE

It is a simple fact that every team starts a game with one point. Those that defend poorly generally lose that point.

Sound principles of defence will enable a team to keep that starting margin and then at the other end of the park build a victory.

The principles of defence are delay, depth, balance and concentration and involve first second and third defenders.

It is the job of the first defender to delay the attack. To do this successfully he must delay, jockey, pressurise and be patient until he sees an opportunity to win the ball. The first defender must apply the principle of restriction. This means getting as close to the player with the ball as he can without 'selling' himself.

He should adjust his body position so that the centre of gravity is lowered and he should be evenly balanced. He then should move his body in an attempt to play the attacker in a position favoured by the defender. He should not tackle unless absolutely certain of getting the ball or has the support of the second defender.

The second defender's job is to cover and support the first defender. He is the one who must supply depth in defence to avoid 'A square defence'. Attacking players confronted by a first and second defender are likely to pass. Therefore the defence has achieved delay. The distance and angle of support is important. The closer to goal the shallower the depth, although distance and angle can depend on the speed of the opposition.

Basically he must strike a distance that the attacker cannot push the ball past both defenders and beat them in a race for the ball, nor be so far away that he can beat the first defender then compose himself for the second. Generally, the second defender should be angled on the goalside of the first defender, but also in a position where he can see the ball.

The job of the third defender is to cover the dangerous space away from the ball and be prepared to give concentration in defence by grouping around the ball in vital areas to deny space. All defenders should look to funnel back in a wedge radiating out from the goalpost to the halfway flags.

A defender beaten in his half of the field should make a recovery run on a line heading back to the near post. The defenders should endeavour to form an inpenetrable barrier in front of the goal that calls on some individual brilliance from an attacker to break through.

But above all, defenders need constant discipline, concentration and application.

Exercise: 2 v 2 in two adjoining grids each 15m square. Team in possession knocks the ball into the other grid to opposing pair then run into grid to defend. The attacking pair must carry the ball to the backline of the defenders' grid to score. The object is for the defenders to delay, contain and cover each other in an alternating first and second defender situation.

Valley Trident emerged 1-0 victors from a tough encounter with local rivals Newmarket at McCook Park last Saturday.

The uneven ground surface and gusty wind ensured that the game would not be one for finesse or faint-hearts and that is how it eventuated. There was predictably plenty of end-to-end stuff, much enthusiastic running and many determined tackles. Brett Beves in goal gave a masterful display in thwarting the Newmarket strikers and eventually Valleys went ahead with what turned out to be the only goal of the game, when Peter Carey put away a penalty.

The game was far from over in the second half and as time ran out, Newmarket stormed the Valleys defence in which Shane Rideout was particularly resolute. Valleys held out to the end however, and coach John Lavelle was

very relieved to take both points from a game that could have gone either way. During the game Peter Tyson had to leave the field owing to a recurrence of a back injury and his absence will be severely felt by the team — although in part mitigated by a return to training of sturdy midfielder Carl Musumeci.

The Reserves team players were again disappointed for the second week running when they lost 1-2. Leading for most of the game and having the best part of it territorially, a 10-minute lapse in concentration by the Valleys defence allowed Newmarket to score the goals that gave them victory.


