

Queensland's Socceroo training squad members have returned from last weeks camp in Melbourne confident that they have the ability to force their way into the Australian squad proper for the forthcoming series against Czechoslovakia.


Brisbane Lions players John and Russell Stewart and Danny Wright, along with former Queenslander Alan Hunter, now with Heidelberg United, were invited to the two-day camp.

"From what we saw down there, we certainly felt that we had as much chance as anyone else of making the squad," state captain John Stewart said. "We certainly weren't lacking anything compared to the others and if the selection process is fair, then I would like to think we all have a good chance of getting a go in the green and gold."

Danny Wright, who missed the first day of the camp because of injury sustained in the previous weekend's NSL match, said Socceroo coach Frank Arok put the squad through a lot of pressure training. "He put us in tight situations where you had to use your skills and your brain. And from what I saw all the Queenslanders did everything they were asked," he said.

According to the Brisbane-based trio, several southern players didn't endear themselves to Arok when they pulled out of the second day of training complaining of injuries. "One player said he couldn't train because he had a chill. I don't think Arok likes that sort of thing, but certainly none of the Queenslanders ccmplained", Stewart said.

And although the Lions three were pleased with their performances, two slightly disturbing facts emerged from the camp. The first was the almost ludicrous situation of Frank Arok still confusing John and Russell Stewart. According to others at the camp, he repeatedly called John Russell and

vice versa. And the other thing was that Arok gave none of the three any indication of how they went or the likelyhood of them being recalled. But Hunter, in Erisbane last weekend with Heidelberg, had high praise

for his fellow Queenslanders. "They certainly didn't look out of

place," Hunter said. "And if I had to single anyone out I think John looked particularly good. He just played it simple and rarely put a foot wrong. I really hope they get their chance like everybody else."

While the Brisbane-based trio's invitation to the training camp was a breakthrough for Queensland soccer, the revelation prior to the camp that asistant Socceroo coach Eddie Thomson had still not reported to Arok about the recent interstate match was disappointing. And Queensland coach Bruce Stowell was furious.

"The whole significance of the win will be lost by the time Frank Arok hears about it. It is obvious quite a few Queensland players really did lose out by Frank not being here for the game. The story is never the same second hand.

A MATCH FOR THE MAROONS?

One of the disappointments this season for XXXX League players was the late cancellation of the proposed tour of Papua New Guinea.

Circumstances beyond the control of the Queensland Soccer Federation forced the cancellation of the tour, which was the season aim for many players. In an exercise to promote discussion and comment, Go Soccer this week asked resident columnist Eric Thompson to pick his mid-season XXXX League team.

"In picking this team I brooded for many nights. In selecting the side, I did not pick it with a tour in mind. I preferred to go for a team to take on the victorious Queensland side as it is a game, which if the QSF wanted to promote, could be arranged some time in the future. I do ask one consolation though, that Bruce Stowell releases the XXXX League players in his squad and in fact takes the park with his all-NSL run-on XI used against NSW.

My side is in a 4-2-4 formation: Stu Woodruffe (Mt Gravatt), Cameron Pearse (Nth Star), Mick Cernaka (Olympic), Mark McNaughton (Loaistars), Gordon Buchanan (Nth Star), Martin Kirsopp (Mt Gravatt), Gerry Lindsay (Nth Star), Peter Vogler (Ipswich U.), Calvin Daunt (Taringa), Phil Redmond (Easts), Tom McGregor (Lions). Reserves Ken Swan (Mt Gravatt), Damien Butler (Ipswich U.), Geoff Maltby (Wynnum), Jason Kearton (Lions).

Why 4-2-4? Because to try and match the Queensland side at their own game would be suicidal. The key to a XXXX League Select victory would be to attack the Maroons, to force them back and make them play in their own half. NSW erred in allowing Queensland to contain them in their defensive third.

Here's why I picked the players . . .

Woodruffe: He's one of the toughest keepers in Brisbane and really needs a game like this to get back to his best.

Pearse: Has the ability to go forward which we need in this attacking side.

Cernaka: Can do a job at the back, no fuss, no mistakes.

McNaughton: The captain. His attitude on the park is unrivalled and I

believe he is one of the reasons behind Coalstars success this season. Buchanan: Deserved his state selec-

tion, and deserves to be in this team.

Kirsopp: Can help organise the midfield, if he plays for the team, not himself.

Lindsay: I have watched Gerry in a lot of games. He is the ball winner I réquire and has outstanding positional sense.

Vogler: He has speed and is always a threat on the right.

Daunt: He's big and he'll win the ball in the air. He has knuckled down this season and deserves to play with players who will compliment him.

Redmond: Chosen for his leftfoot ability. You don't find too many players who can take up a left-sided position and do things with the ball.

McGregor: At times he would drop in behind the front three, he would be my grafter. He has a will to win and can score from anywhere.

Reserves: Swan, is a whole hearted player; Butler, only his lack of pace cost him a spot; Maltby, an interesting prospect; Kearton, a keeper for the future.

Well how about it Mr. Brusasco? Can your Maroons give us a game?

competition next year - if circumstances permit.

Go Soccer has editorialised before that the current national league setup is awkward and does little for Queensland soccer. We have in the past urged Lions and City to return to our local competition. We still stand by those thoughts. But we also support the counter proposal of scooping the cream from both clubs and the best from any others to form a true Brisbane side in the national competition. But only if it has 100 percent local support.

The example of the Brisbane Bullets is a fine one to follow. Five years ago Queensland had no representation in the Australian basketball team. Today we have two players and a coach. There is no reason why, with the resources of Queensland soccer, that we cannot match the success of our basketballers. But we must work together. The hurdles that have thwarted a United Brisbane side in the past, and would be likely to again. must be removed.

If Queensland can manage to salvage one place in the national competition after this year, then it will be the first time in a decade that we will have had the opportunity to start afresh. A united approach could not only save face for Queensland soccer but prove to be the key to success.

But as also has been outlined, the idea is not new. It has not come to being in the past because massive hurdles existed which prevented the proposal getting off the ground. Despite the desperate situation in which our two NSL clubs currently find themselves, those hurdles still exist for a "Brisbane United" side. For the plan to have any chance of success this time, it must have the total backing of all sections of Queensland soccer. In the past, some have been against Queensland involvement in the national competition. But how much of that anti-NSL feeling has been plain jealousy? Would the same jealousy exist if the side was representative of the Federation rather than a club?

The point is, a lot of people within Queensland soccer - and not NSL clubs — must start asking themselves several pertinent questions. And they must be asked now. We must consider what Queensland soccer would be like without the week to week contact of national league soccer? We must attempt to predict the consequences of a return to City and Lions to the local competition and the extreme likelihood of a mass involvement in the Premier soccer competition in the nation.

should be read by all parties with an interest in the future development of Queensland soccer. Later problems can be overcome now by maximising input in the planning stages and I urge anyone with an interest in the code to consider the alternatives available.

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK 12: TACKLING

The majority of major injuries occur during tackling, and many are because of poor technique or lack of commitment.

The good coach must ensure his players are confident and courageous when tackling and impart maximum force throughout.

The skill of a good tackler is in making the correct decision of when and when not to tackle, where and where not to tackle. Jockeying may be better than fully committing in a tackle. Those decisions were covered in more detail in week 10 on defensive principles.

Successful tackling is a question of technique and timing. Poor timing leads to infringements and this to freekicks and cautions.

But the main task of the tackler is to prevent the forward movement of the ball and win it if possible. The tackler may not always win the ball cleanly, but if he is able to knock it away from the attacker he has achieved his purpose of slowing the attack.

Types of tackling include the front-on block tackle. The side-block tackle and the sliding technique all require the player to put his weight behind his body while maintaining an overall balance. The player who pulls out of a tackle will be the one who will be hurt.

The good coach, who has the principles of football at heart, will not condone ruthless, illegal tackling. The toughman can be appreciated if he operates within the rules. Players should be urged to tackle with commitment rather than malice.

Exercise: 1 v 2 in grid 10m x 30m. One of the two defenders plays the ball down the grid to an attacker who then advances hoping to pass the two defenders and 'score' by reaching the far baseline. The defenders must adopt the principles of first and second defender. deciding when and if to tackle.

The attacker should display the dribbling skills of feints, screening and changes of pace. The objectives here are timing and technique and the good coach will pit players of equal abilities and size against each other to avoid any unnecessary injuries during the training session.



While the home crowd was found short of superlatives in celebrating Redcliffe Reserve Teams 4-1 victory against a side depleted by one due to the dubious decision of a referee to send off an injured Kingsridge player, sidelined to receive treatment after writhing in agony on the pitch for some five minutes, the most entertaining display of refereeing "skills" came in the main match.

After a first half during which play fluctuated in mid-pitch, the main aspects worthy of mention were the replacement of King's striker, Steve Scerri by Tony Mraz, and the referee's decision, after the ball had been very accurately netted by Michael Rooney, to declare that the place kick which he had ordered should be indirect. At the break the teams were level 0-0.

The initial incident worthy of comment in the second half was a solid defensive effort by keeper, Ian Morris, in thwarting the efforts of a Redcliffe player, who managed to elude King's defenders in his own half. However, the referee decided to display his skills later in the match by awarding Redcliffe a penalty. His gesticulations as to the reason for this action, although luxurious, remained extremely dubious. The penalty was duly converted. Reddiffe 1 Kingsridge 0.

Late in the second half, play again reverted to within the Kingsridge penalty area, and, again, after an intricate pattern of hand and arm movement, the referee saw fit to award a second Redcliffe penalty. Ian Morris successfully saved this kick, only to see the referee again pointing to the penalty spot. The official, through a remarkable instance of rear-vision, confronted Paul McHiggins and issued a "yellow card" warning to him for encroaching some five or six inches into the area prior to the penalty kick.

Despite the influences of both the Redcliffe strikers and the referee, Ian Morris again saved the kick and, in accordance with World Cup Quarter-Final regulations, Redcliffe won the match 1 penalty to nil



THE KNOCKOUT QUARTER-FINALS

After the round-robin matches of the City and Coast qualifying rounds, the \$16,000 Ampol Cup switches to a knockout competition from the quarter-finals onwards.

The pairings for the quarter-finals were made through a random draw of the qualified teams. Similarly, the semi-finals will be drawn "out of the hat". This format was adopted several years ago and has been largely responsible for the growing success of the Ampol Cup.

The Ampol Cup was first staged in 1959 and won by Oxley United. It has grown since to be the richest of its kind and the most extensive and encompassing state-run knockout competition in Australia.

Teams from as far north Queensland to the NSW border have participated in the competition to produce the eight teams which go into the quarter-final. The Ampol Cup final, which carried \$6000 and the prized trophy, is scheduled for the weekend, August 16-17.



Violence. What is it? The Oxford Dictionary defines it as . "acting with physical force" or "the unlawful exercise of force" All body contact sports would then have as an element the first category. It is the second category, "the unlawful exercise of force" which is of constant concern to us, both on and off the playing fields. It can't be condoned.

However, since we accept that acting with physical force is part and parcel of body contact sports, and, can cause injury, it is then the "unlawful" part which comes into issue. As we appoint policemen to portect us in the streets, so we appoint match officials to protect our players on the field, and interpret the laws of the game, to determine what is, or, is not, unlawful. In the main they do a pretty fair job, but, are not given the credit they deserve. How often are they proven right by instant slow motion replays on T.V.? More often than they are proven wrong I would suggest. Yet we, or at least some of us, aren't prepared to accept their decisions. We get reports, such as appeared in "Thommo Talking" (12/6/86) and the "Telegraph" (Monday 16/6/86) both of which indicate that the writer in one case and the coach quoted in the other, are not willing to accept the referee's decision. In both incidents referred to the referee had not even cautioned the players involved. There will always be instances where players

are injured by accident in hard tackles, that's why referees are there, to define the difference. Let them get on with their job and accept their decisions like men. I have not yet seen a referee who would deliberately allow serious violent conduct to go unpunished.

How often do we see those who would complain about referees not affording players sufficient protection appearing before the Disputes Committee defending players against whom those very referees have taken action?

While on the Disputes Committee, I will say this, there will be a time, in the not too distant future, when they will be confronted with a situation with which they cannot deal adequately. In my opinion the recent Taringa incident, based on information I have been given, was one such case. If, as I have been informed, young Dawes was unconscious for some hours after the incident, then the punishment given does not fit the crime.

They stormed Valleys' goal and were


