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As speculation grows over the likely make-up of the semi-professional leagues in the increasingly likely event of at least one, if not both, National League teams — our leading amateur clubs are mobilising.

Those sides currently struggling at the foot of the Intermediate League are in for a rude shock if they believe re-admission to the semi-professional ranks will be a matter of course if they happen to be one of the two clubs relegated. In fact, a major reshuffle of the XXXX and Intermediate League could be the only saving grace for clubs like Pine Rivers, Annerley and Newmarket which face a tense battle among themselves to avoid the drop.

A Go Soccer investigation this week revealed that three of the four leading Amateur Division One clubs are ready to go semi-professional and will have the facilities to meet most selection criteria. Nerang and Inala City are current joint leaders of the amateurs on points, with Bardon and Brighton in close attendance.

Nerang president Brian Falkiner this week left no doubts that his club was on the move, promotion or not. The Velodrome-based club will move to new premises at the end of the season at Glennon Park. They will boast two full size fields and two half size pitches. An amenities building will go up later this year.

"We believe we copped a raw deal in the restructuring but we were

prepared to accept it and prove a point by coming back. We have fought hard to stay in the Brisbane competition and if our team finishes in the top two we will deserve promotion and we will take it," Falkiner said. "Even though we are in the Amateur Divisions, we pay 10 of our first team players. We are geared for the semi-professional divisions."

Inala City also have plans to bring their ground up to Intermediate League standard in the event that their team finishes 1 or 2.

"It is club policy that if the players earn the right to go up then it is up to the club to find the money to provide what is necessary for them to go up," Inala City secretary Brian Portsmouth said. We hope to start our clubhouse on the 25th and then we will upgrade the ground. The fence will come after that. We have improved every year for the past three years and we will continue doing so this season. How many Intermediate League clubs can seat their spectators under cover."

Bardon are a little less prepared for promotion this year but according to secretary Dean Biron the club would seriously consider going up if the opportunity arose.

"We are currently looking at a new ground and if we win promotion it may be a matter of making temporary arrangements elsewhere to meet the criteria until we can establish our own facilities," Biron said. The club hasn't really discussed it yet, but it would be a hard decision to turn down the opportunity to go up."

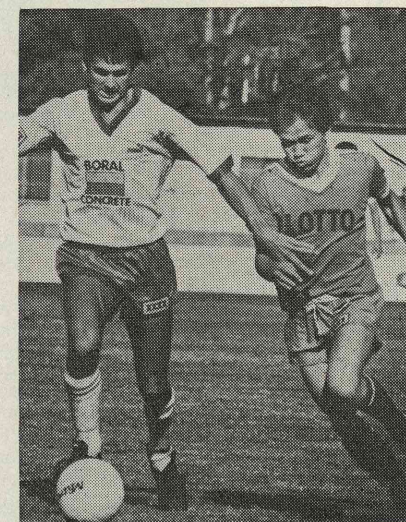
Brighton is the one leading club which would be unlikely to make the step into the semi-professional leagues. Club president Allan Lanham says the Bulldogs are "strictly amateur. I don't think we could afford to go up and we won't have the club structure at present to cope. I think we have found our niche and would be looking to consolidate our status as a top amateur club rather than become a struggling semi-professional side," he said

QSF secretary Alan Vessey this week outlined to Go Soccer the constitutional rules for movement between the Intermediate League and the Amateurs, but pointed out many variables could occur depending on the NSL situation.

The consequences of a return of any of the NSL teams is likely to flow down all the divisions. But once a format has been established then I would expect the selection of any new teams would be in line with each division's respective criteria," Vessey said. "The two promoted amateur clubs would be assessed first and if suitable invited into the semi-professional leagues. If one of those two decline the invitation then the relegated clubs and the third and fourth-placed Division One sides may apply. But any club seeking to retain its present standing or degrees promotion when not filling an automatic promotion place must apply in writing before November 30 to be considered."

A CUP FULL OF CASH

With the Ampol Cup carrying \$16,000 prizemoney this season, two months ago teams throughout the state began their Cup runs with stars in their eyes. And now there are just four.

Coalstars, Brisbane Lions, Taringa Rovers and North Star, the Cup holders, are now just one step away from a crack at the \$6,000 winner's cheque and the prized Cup. To falter at the semi-finals is the most agonising way to go out — so close yet so far. In Sunday's semi-finals Coalstars play Lions (1 p.m.) and Taringa meet Nth. Star (3 p.m.).

Each match must produce a result. In the event of a draw after 90 minutes, 30 minutes (2x15) extra time will be played followed by penalties if the score is still deadlocked. For the semi-final teams, plus program details including the under 8 mini-carnival to be held in conjunction, turn to pages 8 and 9.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

This weeks Disciplinary Committee minutes reveal an alarming statistic which is a disappointing reflection on our game.

The minutes show that on the weekend of July 5-6, a staggering total of 18 players were sent-off. The figure is only five short of a record 23 send-off in one weekend in 1984 which prompted a management committee inquiry and a major crack-down on on-field offences. On the same night that the disciplinary heard the 18 send-off incidents, a further 13 players were outed for maximum penalty points. Admittedly this time of the season most players begin to accumulate more than 12 points. But that can be given as only a token excuse. Some players can go their entire career without attracting a single yellow card. Why then in one week do we have our disciplinary dealing with 31 red or yellow card offences?

A closer examination of the statistics show that of the 18 send-offs, eight were for foul and abusive language. It was almost twice the number for any other offence. There can be no excuse for this type of behaviour on the sporting field and referees cannot be blamed for taking their obvious current harline. Many use the excuse that we are adults playing an adult game. But as adults we

should also be able to control our outbursts. Furthermore many outbursts are directed at the referee in a blatant attempt to belittle his authority. We certainly don't need that in our game.

Therefore 31 cases before the disciplinary is not an indictment of the referees or an indication of any over-reaction. It is in fact an embarrassing statistic highlighting player irresponsibility. And it is high time clubs brought their members into line. One club recently advocated club suspensions in addition to those handed out by the disciplinary. Yet one of its players were among the "infamous 18" and appealed, despite, as the evidence showed, was given ample pre-warning by the referee.

The time has passed for a blase approach. The disciplinary could not be blamed if from now on it took a heavy-handed approach to red card offenders and put them out of the game for considerably longer periods than the present standard suspensions. Indeed, it would save everyone a lot of wasted time, and none so more than those committee-members forced to hear 31 cases of irresponsibility.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

Over the past week I have repeatedly been asked why the QSF does not enter a team in the National League.

While Federation policy is formulated by the management committee, if I was asked to give a recommendation in relation to the National League, it would be that the QSF should NOT enter a team in the NSL.

It is my view that it is a club completion. To promote a federation team in the NSL would be to diminish the Queensland team and severely restrict the promotable ability of the Maroons. We would be putting all our eggs in one basket because if a so-called Brisbane United was seen to be doing poorly in the national

competition, then Queensland soccer as a whole would be seen to be doing poorly.

The Queensland team representative "carrot" should be available and visible to all players and this perhaps would not be the case if a sole NSL team became our flagbearer.

Furthermore, to run an NSL team costs in excess of \$200,000. Quite simply, the QSF does not have a surplus of funds to that amount to run a football team. Sometimes when a new idea begins snowballing the benefits are highlighted before the basics are established.

SPOT-ON STATS

Comparing the records of current XXXX League teams over the past 10 years produces several surprises.

Wynnum, for instance, share with Mount Gravatt the distinction of having won four premierships. But there is a vital difference — the Hawks' were all in the top division and Wynnum's all in the second.

Other facts which emerge are that:

- Ipswich United are the only club to have retained top division status throughout the 10 years (as St. Helens in 1976 and 1977).
- Only Grange-Thistle have completed a premiership program unbeaten — in Division 2 in 1977.
- North Star rose within three seasons from fourth division status to Premier League.

For purposes of comparison, the top division each year is numbered 1, the next 2 and so on. The constantly changing names and formats of the QSF divisions would otherwise make comparisons too cumbersome.

The South East Queensland League which operated from 1979-81 has not been included. Consisting mainly of State League and National League reserve teams, it cannot realistically be ranked as a true "division".

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK 15: HEADING

It is quite surprising to watch the number of players at the top level who have managed to hide their general inability to head.

In coaching heading there are three simple procedures — keep the eyes open, the mouth shut and strike the ball with the head. Youngsters should be taught properly from the beginning so it does not become a painful experience and therefore avoided.

With the basics mastered, and this should be achieved at junior level, a player can be coached on power and direction.

The best policy is to advise players to head the ball and not let it head you. The ball should be attacked with the forehead, legs apart for balance.

The neck should always emerge from the shoulders, not sunk in. If heading off the ground the trunk should be arched. Players should time their leap to meet the ball without the neck being strained to its utmost.

Heading in attack should be concentrated low and towards the goal. Defensive heading should be high and as far away from the penalty area as possible.

Defenders must look for heading power, attackers for accuracy.

Heading can also be used as a pass, to set-up a team-mate. The ball then should be headed down to feet.

When challenging in the air, players should make use of their body, spread their arms wide for balance, without appearing to foul the opposition. More height can be achieved by jumping off one leg.

Exercise: 1 v 1 in half pitch grid. Defender and attacker in penalty box. Passes knocked from centre circle alternately to the corner flags for other players to knock high crosses into the area where the attacker tries to score a header under pressure from the defender. Keeper optional but should not contest the cross. The wingers should be encouraged to vary the crosses to give the attacker near and far post headers. The attacker should not be static and should make runs to the ball rather than jump up at it.

In conditions which favored the more physical style of the visitors, it came down to a question of effort and determination, which Valleys displayed in abundance — especially after skipper Peter Tyson was sent-off late in the game. Tyson's dismissal followed an earlier yellow card for which nothing more than the look on the player's face seemed responsible. The game however was a tough bruising encounter with very little flowing football on display.

Rochedale scored first on a breakaway against the run of play and then from a seemingly harmless situation, Carey received a throw in, turned in control and chipped immaculately into the far corner of the net. One-all at halftime and with the wind in their backs, Rochedale pressured the Valleys goal where solid performances, especially from Shane Rideout and Brett Beves, kept them at bay. Rochedale went into the lead

for the second time with a header from the right and the game finished with a stirring flourish from Valleys. The penalty was awarded when Tom Kenny was flattened in the box. Enzo Cupo deserves mention for his never-say-die attitude which inspired Valley's fightback.

The reserve team notched its third win in a row when they disposed of Rochedale with a last-minute penalty. One down with just over 10 minutes to play, Paul Thomson was on hand to make amends for an earlier mistake by spotting Rocky Agerholm's cross home. Then a determined finish by Valleys gave them a well deserved winner when a fullback was forced to tip over Waldek Kolkowski's diving header. Outstanding in a team of triers were Agerholm and Giacomo Micalizzi.

His goal for Ipswich United put Iain Fagan (also a former Lions player) and his team out of the top four series. And there are other inter-relations between players among these four teams vying for the chance to get into the Cup final, to be played on August 17.

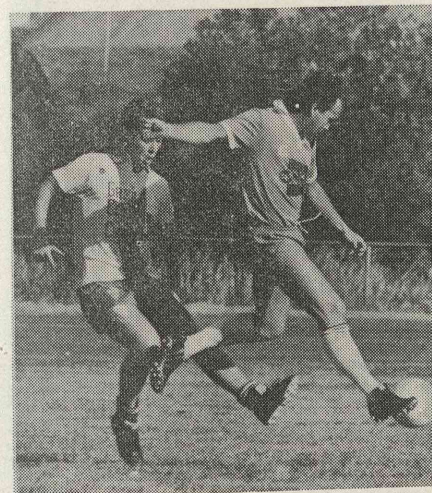

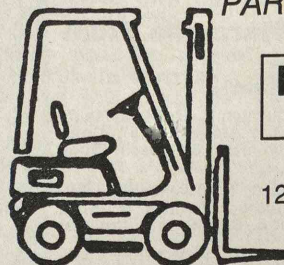

A conference in association with the XXIII F.I.M.S. World Congress of Sports Medicine will be held on the weekend of September 20-21.

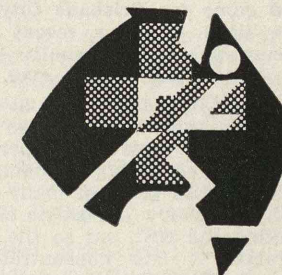
The conference is to be held at the University of Queensland and the theme of this associated programme is Sports Coaching and the Promotion of Health.
