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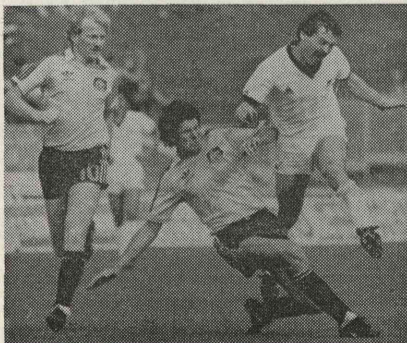
The fine performances of the Socceroos in their World Cup eliminator matches against Scotland last year have reaped rewards for Australian soccer as a whole.

Although the Socceroos failed to reach Mexico where they would have been on the world stage, their gutsy showing against the Scots drew considerable attention to our code. And it was their fine performances which have helped clinch a rich sponsorship from Rothmans of Pall Mall, through the Winfield Company.

The two epic matches against the Scots were proudly supported by the Winfield Company, and now six months later, that Company is delighted to announce its four year development programme of international soccer. The programme is the most extensive ever undertaken by the Australian Soccer Federation and is indicative of the ASF's commitment to obtain international credibility and subsequent recognition by the Australian public of our national soccer team, to be now known officially as the "Winfield Socceroos". It also involves the sponsorship of all international matches contested in Australia by the Winfield Socceroos, commencing with the Winfield Czechoslovakian challenge to be played in Melbourne, Adelaide and Sydney next month.

ASF president Sir Arthur George announced the sponsorship in Sydney this week.

Although the Winfield Socceroos did not qualify for the 1986 World Cup, the results of the games played against Scotland in December 1985

have given a great deal of credibility to Australian Soccer. In the past Australia has had to go cap in hand to countries of the top echelon of World Soccer to request international fixtures. This no longer happens, the ASF Executive have now a fine selection of teams who wish to play in Australia against the Winfield Socceroos" Sir Arthur said.

"It is most appropriate that the partnership between the ASF and Winfield has been reached for the next four years because it was Winfield who assisted with the sponsorship of the Australia-Scotland games. A programme has been laid down for the preparation of the Winfield Socceroos to reach Italy in 1990. One of the stepping stones in this preparation is the participation in the 1988 Olympics.

"On behalf of the Executive of the Australian Soccer Federation the players and the many supporters of our International game I thank Winfield for their involvement with our team and I am sure with their assistance the Winfield Socceroos will be the best ever prepared national team, for the next Olympics and the next World Cup."

NO-ONE WANTS AMPOL CUP FAVOURITISM

North Star will meet Coalstars in the final of this year's \$16,000 Ampol Cup statewide knockout competition at Perry Park on August 17.

North Star will be attempting to win its third consecutive Cup final while Coalstars will be aiming for their first success in 21 years. Both clubs this week denied they would start the final as favourites.

But both have claims to start as No. 1 fancy. North Star are the most successful knockout football side since the great Hellenic which won five consecutive Cup finals in the early 1960's.

"Knockout football suits our style," says North Star player-coach Iain Fagan.

Still, North Star have never beaten Coalstars since the two clubs joined the premier competition three years ago. On that form the Bundamba side must be favourites.

"We're taking it one game at a time. We will worry about the Cup final when it comes," Coalstars coach Brian Styles said.

Whatever, it's certain to be a classic final. For the record, the semi-final results were: Coalstars 4 (Wheeler 2, Brusasco, Kearton) d. Lions 1 (Mulvey); North Star 1 (own goal Dale Dawes) d. Taringa 0.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

The news that our leading Amateur clubs are gearing for promotion to the semi-professional ranks is a good sign for Queensland soccer.

Clubs which put something into the game and work hard to develop themselves on and off the field deserve their rewards. Similarly, any club which does nothing to improve and blunders along in the belief that a place in the higher divisions is their divine right, deserves no sympathy or re-consideration when it eventually falls into relegation.

But the QSF management committee must take a tough line when considering candidates for the XXXX and Intermediate Leagues. A lot of blood was spilt during the restructuring three years ago. But in general, the decisions and re-arrangements have been for the better. We must then be very wary of slowly returning to what was.

It was the restructuring committee's aim that ultimately strong clubs would develop in regions around Brisbane and would settle into a stable basis on which we could build our future.

We must now ask ourselves do we need another western suburbs semi-professional club? Should teams from well outside Brisbane be prominent

in our upper leagues? Or on the other side of the coin, will there be an opportunity to weed out some inner city clubs or those which offer largely only ethnic appeal?

With the ever-increasing likelihood that Brisbane City and Lions NSL teams will return to our local competition next year, it seems a major reshuffle is inevitable. But the work of the re-structuring committee should not be wasted.

The QSF management committee should take its time before deciding on a course of action. All alternatives should be examined, and more importantly, the management committee should not deviate from the criteria of each league and the overall objectives and aims of the restructuring.

The likely events at the end of the season should not be dramatic enough to suggest we are at a cross-roads, but we definitely have plateaued in the past 12 months. We can now either continue our climb by taking a well thought out path, or, make rash and easy decisions and ultimately go tumbling to oblivion.

Queensland will host an international match between the Australian and Czechoslovakian Youth teams at Perry Park on Wednesday, August 6 and it is vital we have a good turnout.

This will be the first time that our state has hosted the Australian Youth team, which will include Queenslanders Jason Polak and John Koch who are currently at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra.

The importance and significance of this match should not be underestimated. It was the Czechoslovakians who requested the Youth series to be held in conjunction with their three full international matches against the Socceroos. That surely is an indication of the respect Australia now commands around the world at under 20 level.

But the fact that Adelaide was

preferred ahead of Brisbane to host one of the full internationals is a point we should all take to task. I am told that statistics indicate a more positive response to internationals in Adelaide than Brisbane. This is not only our opportunity to support the Australian Youth team but the chance to prove to the ASF that full internationals should come to Brisbane.

Clubs were circularised advising of the match and asking that training commitments be altered if necessary to allow everyone to attend. This is a chance for seniors and juniors to rally and show their support.

SPOT-ON STATS

This week we complete our comparison of the record of XXXX League teams over the past 10 years.

As the tables below show, some clubs have achieved considerable success — but at different levels. For instance, Mount Gravatt have four premierships, all in the top division, while North Star's rapid rise to the top can be plotted.

For purposes of comparison, the top division each year is numbered 1, the next 2 and so on. The constantly changing names and formats of the QSF divisions would otherwise make comparisons too cumbersome.

The South East Queensland League which operated from 1979-81 has not been included. Consisting mainly of State League and National League reserve teams, it cannot realistically be ranked as a true "division".

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK 16: MOTIVATION

At this stage of season it is perhaps an opportune time to talk about motivation within soccer.

In the big game atmosphere the coach is often seen as the one who should 'motivate' the players before the match. The good coach will know that is just part of the story.

The motivation of players extends to all aspects of the game. The player who is motivated at training will be motivated on match day. He will not need a rousing team-talk or have to partake in pre-match hype.

The good coach will know that motivation is something that is learned. It is his job to know how to turn players into becoming better players.

There is a level of arousal suited for each individual and the idea that the whole team must be treated in the same way is not favoured. A quiet manner and voice will help some, while a more positive yet non-threatening attitude will help others.

Beware that motivation does not be-

come anxiety or emotional arousal and as such a player's performance in a match or training can suffer.

Provoking fear and anxiety by using threats, ridicule or demands can arouse players to extremely high levels of motivation yet can leave them unsuitable for cool, calm and composed thinking and action in a game.

The best advice is that at all times, the good coach should try to be calm and reassuring to all his players.

A player's strengths should be highlighted rather than his weaknesses outlined.

But the best motivation is that derived from the knowledge that the preparation has been done correctly and thoroughly. The player who has worked hard on his game, has the confidence of his coach and his team-mates and has approached the match in a professional manner, should have no fears for the opposition.

to play six games in about 21 days, but, in the five weeks between June 22 and July 27, get only two games. This can only disrupt team preparations at a very vital time of the season in a competition which is proving to be closer than would have been expected.

September 15 sees the QSF Golf Day at Keperra. Easts hope to field a top notch side and are open to challenges for the "Duffers and Hackers" Trophy. 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THE XXXX REPORT

A BRITISH ROUND-UP

A penalty shoot-out could decide the status of a First Division club next season. The ultimate in sudden-death finishes became a possibility when the League unveiled details of the new end-of-season play-offs.

The knock-out matches, part of soccer's revolutionary new package, will help slim the First Division to 20 clubs over the next two years.

Three First Division teams will still be relegated but only the top two in the Second Division automatically promoted. The third, fourth and fifth teams and the 19th team in the First Division play off for another place among the elite.

The need to get the issue settled quickly has forced the League to resort to shoot-outs if the issue is unresolved.

Sunderland paid new manager Lawrie McMenemy £166,000 in his first season at Roker Park, despite finishing in the worst ever position of their 108-year history and plunging deep into the red.

Sunderland, who escaped relegation to the Third Division for the first time by beating Stoke on the last day of the season, lost £479,000 in the year ending May 31 and are now £691,000 in debt.

The previous season their run to the Milk Cup Final helped them make a £581,000 profit.

McMenemy's massive pay packet of almost £4,000 a week probably makes him the League's highest paid manager and pushed up the club's wage bill by more than £90,000 to £875,000. His transfer deals produced a net loss of £177,440.

The club's annual report summed up: "It was the worst season in the club's history. We finished in 18th position in Division Two and the previous worst was 16th in 1959-60".

But there is a vote of confidence for McMenemy who is currently on holiday in Florida. The report adds: "Under Lawrie McMenemy we are confident of a significantly better season in 1986-87."

Liverpool are almost certain that Ian Rush will be in their line-up next season. Their hopes of retaining his services for one more League campaign have been boosted by a call from Giampiero Boniperti, president of Juventus who agreed a £3.2 million deal for the prolific Wales striker last month.

Liverpool chief executive Peter Robinson revealed: "He said it was nine to one against Rush being able to play for them next season and he expected him to be playing for us. But it could be the end of the month before a decision is taken."

Italian football is in a state of chaos after a bribes scandal and other problems brought mass resignations from their F.A. Former F.A. chairman Franco Carraro, president of the country's Olympic committee, has been appointed 'commissioner extraordinary' to oversee the attempts to re-establish order.

Gary Lineker's first taste of European football will be in mysterious Albania with his new club Barcelona.

The World Cup's leading scorer, who gave the prospect of European competition as one of his reasons for his recent £2.5m. move from Everton could line up against Flamurtari Vlora after the UEFA Cup draw in Switzerland.

Last season's beaten European Cup finalists, who have also recruited Mark Hughes from Manchester United, play the first leg in Albania on September 17.

With English clubs still banned, interest lay with the Scots challenge where David Hay's Celtic landed an intriguing European Cup clash with Ireland's double winners Shamrock Rovers. They are already scheduled to meet in a friendly in Dublin on July 27.

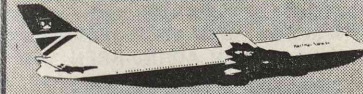
