

With the likely return of the two National League sides to the state's top league the repercussions are certain to be felt right down the line. If the QSF management committee opts for two 12-team semi-professional leagues, extra teams will have to be promoted from the Amateur Divisions. And will mean teams from further down will also be boosted up.

But that provision aside, certain constitutional rules could mean teams which didn't expect to get promoted could suddenly find themselves up a division. The prime example is in Division Three. The constitution provides that any XXXX or Intermediate League cannot have a side in any higher lower division than Division Three. The constitution also provided that clubs cannot have teams in consecutive divisions.

Therefore Annerley, who are currently in second place in Division Three with 24 points and Grange Thistle who are fifth with 19 points cannot go up. Similarly, there are clubs in Division Five, including Thistle, Greenbank and South Star who cannot gain promotion to Division Four, although their present positions suggest the problems won't arise.

As far as the premiership races are concerned, Inala City Division One Reserves and North Star Division Five teams are way out in front. Both have a nine point lead in their championship races and if they win

their next two games they will clinch their titles.

Other sides looking good bets for their premiership and, or promotion, include The Gap and Beenleigh Division Two, Willowburn Division Three, Inala City and Lions Division Five and Coalstars Division Six. Those sides facing relegation include RAAF Division Two, Logan City Division Three and Centenary Division Four.

The side, coached by Mick Collins, the lowest ranked team remaining in the final 16. The Ridge beat Division Three sides Fairfield and Annerley to reach the fourth round.

RUSSELL GOES FOR HIS CAP

Brisbane Lions midfielder Russell Stewart could become the first Queenslander-based player to win a full Australian cap for more than three years when the Winfield Socceroos play Czechoslovakia in Melbourne on Sunday.

Stewart, 22, is in the 22-man squad which has spent the past month preparing for the three-match series against the Europeans. Other matches will be played in Sydney and Adelaide.



The last Queensland-based player to turn out for Australia was Alan Niven, who was in the team which played New Zealand in 1983. There are two other Queenslanders in the current national squad. They are former Mareeba striker Frank Farina, now with Sydney City, and former Lions defender Alan Hunter, now with Heidelberg United.

A Youth International series will be held in conjunction with the three full matches. Brisbane will host the first of the games, at Perry Park, on August 6. Queensland players Jason

The National League season is over for Queensland's two clubs, Brisbane City and Lions.

The two clubs appear destined to finish with a lowly placing which almost certainly will mean they will miss the cut for the re-vamped national competition next year. But it is not the end of the road.

There are avenues for a return. The winner of the XXXX League next year will go into a play-off with the Victorian and South Australian champions for a place in the 1988 National League. And that must be the target for our beleagured sides.

It is no use wasting energies and finances attempting to fight the system this year. The criteria was set down at the start of the year. We, like every other team in the League, knew what we had to do. If either club was in a position now to qualify under the rules, we would have no complaints about the selection process.

The National League, presumably, has investigated the matter and decided a 14-team league is in the best interests of Australian soccer and the future of the national competition. The ASF has backed the idea. Who

are we to offer alternatives and different permutations all motivated by self survival?

Simply, at the moment, we are not good enough — for one reason or another.

Brisbane City and Lions should use the remaining seven weeks to take stock, assess their situation and plan for 1988. Any other course of action could well prove to be a complete waste of time.

Our thoughts and hopes will be with Russell Stewart when, hopefully, he makes his full Socceroo debut against Czechoslovakia this weekend.

While Stewart's selection in the squad is a personal achievement, it also is a major breakthrough for Queensland soccer and further proof that players can make national teams from Brisbane.

Of course, whether he can keep his place in the squad by staying here next year remains to be seen. Hopefully his performances in the green and gold will ensure, no matter where he plays, he must be selected.

THE GOOD COACH

WEEK 17: THE COACH AND THE MEDIA

All too often a coach will complain about the lack of coverage the game, or even his team, is gaining in the media, but how many are prepared to do anything about it?

While the activities of his team are the focal point for the coach's attention, he must realise that in a country like Australia where so many sports are played, and where soccer is not the national game, the media often is less enthusiastic.

The game therefore must be 'sold' to the media.

The good coach will determine very soon after his appointment where his responsibilities lie in relation to dealing with the media. Is he permitted to deal directly with the media or does the club have a media relations person? If it is the coach's job then he should set about 'making' contacts within the different media.

In doing this, the good coach should make some simple preparations, as he would in planning a session. He should familiarise himself with the various people within the media organisations and understand the market to which they aim. He should know what is a story, and whether it would be better suited for a daily newspaper, a television report or a suburban weekly. Generally, the bigger organisations have only time for hardcore news. Signon days and the like are the area of the suburbans.

Initially, until the journalist knows whom to ring, when and where, it is up to the coach to make the first move in contacting. In giving a story, ensure that all facts are correct and that answers can be provided for all questions. If not, ring back with the missing information.

The good coach will not supply wrong, exaggerated or misleading information or attempt to blatantly use the media. He will be patient because not all scribes understand the game as well.

Remember to take the good with the bad and realise that one heat of the moment outburst could ruin all the work in establishing the contact.

But above all, the good coach will be persistent in dealing with the media. The person who contacts the news outlet with a story every week, will eventually get one in. The coach who supplies nothing, will generally get nothing. SERIES CONCLUDED


counts of themselves on their debuts. The reserve team match was a
