

T aringa coach Iain Kesson has fired a broadside at his former club, Brisbane Lions, pointing out that the XXXX League leading scoress list shows where the NSL club made its mistake.

"The best three target men in Queensland are in the XXXX League and scoring goals," Kesson said, pointing out the efforts this year of his own Calvin Daunt and Easts' Phil Redmond and Jim McDonagh.

"I don't care how good Danny Wright is, he can't do it on his own. He needs a big man to work off and Lions have let them all go. They are now using players who have been tried before and not made the grade then."

Between them, Daunt, Redmond and McDonagh have netted 28 goals and have dominated the XXXX League this season.

Lions and fellow-threatened NSL club City, meet in what probably will be their last NSL derby at Spencer Park this weekend. While their return to the XXXX League next year appears a foregone conclusion, both clubs are looking to bounce back immediately to the national competition in 1988.

Officials at the two clubs soon will begin a major review of their play-

ing staff but are predicting there will not be the massive losses many have suggested.

"We will be looking at the players we believe we should retain and will be making them offers that others will find hard to match," one NSL official said.

Indeed, with the two NSL clubs set to save \$25,000 alone on affiliation fees by returning to the local competition, the final incentives they will be able to offer their players will be hard to match.

One of the NSL clubs also is considering sending an official overseas to scout for possible recruits. And in a new twist the official may approach young English apprentices rather than seasoned pros.

"There are a lot of good young players who for one reason or another just miss out on contracts with the Manchester Uniteds and Liverpools. We will be offering them a stint in Australia before they try their luck at another club. It will be an opportunity some will find hard to refuse and we could unearth a real star," the official said.


Coalstars will stage a major promotion at Bundamba this weekend for their XXXX League clash against Easts.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Comments last week from Socceroo squad member Russell Stewart in relation to next season are indeed alarming.

Stewart was quoted as saying he already had been approached by three local clubs to sign for next season and said, in some cases, the money being offered was better than current NSL wages. While the prospect of signing players with National League experience may be an enticing one, clubs should seriously examine their current positions before over-committing themselves. Some may risk financial suicide by rushing headlong into the transfer market in an attempt to compete with two clubs, whose professional structure has been honed by a decade in the national competition.

This is not to say that negotiating with NSL players should be taboo. Nor is it to say that all NSL players are money-hungry. Some do, surprisingly, play largely for the love of the game and will serve a club well for a modest outlay.

But the key to signing that works for both parties is a transfer that is within a club's budget. Clubs with any intentions of chasing the higher league players should establish now exactly what they can afford to outlay and should stick rigidly to those figures. They should not be lured

This is definitely a trend our clubs

should examine closely. Clubs can

no longer expect fans to turn out and

stand on windswept sidelines with

into playing the dangerous game of attempting to outbid rival suitors.

And before rushing to the doors of Spencer Park and Richlands, clubs should look at the long term as well as the immediate consequences of any signings. Too many times in the past, clubs have bought sides for immediate success, only to find insurmountable problems several seasons further down the road.

Before being caught in the transfer merry-go-round, clubs should astutely assess their current playing staff and decide whether that which is on offer is any better than what they currently have. And more importantly, they should weigh up the benefits of buying a player who may have already given his best years, at the expense of denying a younger player already at the club his deserved chance.

Undoubtedly this coming off-season will be one of the most hectic and-interesting in years. A spread of talent can only help to strengthen the competition and ensure an exciting XXXX League next season

But any benefits that may be gained will be quickly lost if our clubs become financially embarrassed.

> Rather than commit all their funds to team-building and trophy hunting, clubs should now start looking at their facilities. A handful of clubs already are heading in this direction and if after-match stayers are an indication, they are obviously reaping the rewards.

No-one needs to build a Taj Mahal. A modest clubhouse, which caters for the family, and sideline facilities which allow fans to watch in comfort — in conjunction with a professional and informative match presentation is all that is needed.

WHO ARE SOCCER'S **GOLF CHAMPIONS?**

After a challenge by Eastern Suburbs to other clubs, an interclub champions trophy will be added to the list of prizes for the Inaugural QSF Golf Day at Keperra on Monday, September 15.

Easts, in their weekly Go Soccer column, claimed they would field a "Top Notch side and were open to challenges". The QSF has heeded the call and the trophy will be put up if a minimum of twelve club teams enter.

The best three scores from each club will count in determining the winning club. Players need not play with their fellow club members, but just nominate their club on the entry form.

Any club can enter as many players as it wishes. It will just be the best three scores at the end of the day that will count.

Already tee-off times are filling fast for the golf day, which is open to anyone, 18 years and older, who are directly or indirectly associated with soccer in Queensland or its sponsors and the media.

The main event will be an 18-hole stableford with winner and runner-up trophies. There also will be prizes for the best first nine, the best second nine, nearest the pin on all par 3's and a nearest approach prize on one hole.

There is a limit of 160 players and a maximum handicap of 27 will apply.

An entry fee of \$15 will be charged (non returnable) and will include green fees, entry to all competitions and a meal voucher.

Other sports have held similar golf days which have been a huge success and QSF officials are looking for soccer to turn on a similar top day.

"While the starting date still seems a way off, we have let everyone know early so they can organise their R.D.O.'s or whatever to be there. But there is a limit on the number of entries and

those entries first received will be those accepted," a tournament organiser said.

TOOWONG



Dear Sir,

After reading your Editorial recently (Go Soccer, July 17) regarding the number of suspensions and players out of the game, I would like to air a few points that I feel strongly about. Also I would like to see if anyone thinks as I do.

To be totally honest, I am annoyed at the refereeing in Brisbane. I feel it has a big part to play in the increase of suspensions. Firstly, I am mad that week after week players can go out and hurt people and get away with it. I have noticed it more so in the past six weeks. Players have continually been able to commit foul tackles, getting the odd yellow card, of which they think nothing of. Sometimes they only get a strong word from the referee.

But if a player uses a four-letter word or similar, he gets the red card without a second wasted. I don't know how words can break legs!

Last week just five minutes into the game, our centre half got a face full of studs after heading the ball in a standing position. The defending player got a yellow card. Two minutes later the same player tackled another of our players, again showing his studs with a lot of malice. In fact our player had his shin pads broken with the tackle. The tackling player just got a word from the referee. The same player was again involved in another incident shortly after, but when my team's player swore in the heat of the moment, he was instantly red-carded. The player who stayed on the park continued to foul players and was penalised three or four times for bad tackles, but received no further punishment other than further chats from the referee. And this is not an isolated incident. The same thing happened to our team the previous week. A player who had ben repeatedly fouled, swore in desperation and was sent-off while the bad-tackling player stayed on the park.

Soccer is a man's sport where contact has to come into it. We are trying to make the game better to play in, to watch and to enjoy. We are not trying to turn people away. The point I am mad about is that language doesn't do anything other then to let players let off some steam, rather than retaliating. We don't want more of the incidents like the one at Taringa earlier this year.

Four letter words don't hurt people, can't put them in hospital or break legs. Where as bad tackles can, and do. The referees are in my mind cleaning up the game the wrong way, allowing these players to get away week after week with foul play, yet outing those who swear. It's not only a game for Christians, it's for men and remember colourful language is part and parcel of the Australian way of life and vocabulary.

The other point I wish to make is that players, if booked, are immediately guilty and then must prove their innocence. It seems referees are beyond mistakes, infallible — some even think they are God.

That's my opinion, what do others think?


