

C oalstars striker Mark Brusasco is on line to win his second Rothman's medal if the Go Soccer XXXX Report ratings are a guide.

The 1981, medal winner, who starred in the Bundamba team's Ampol Cup victory last weekend, has the highest average rating for the 14 rounds of the XXXX League played so far. Brusasco, an ever-present in the Coalstars side, has returned an average of 7.93 points — an amazing consistency over the season. But hot on his heels is Mount Gravatt midfielder Martin Kirsopp, who has been among the leading placegetters in the Rothman's count for the past three years. Kirsopp's XXXX Report average rating is 7.86 points.

Eut what could go against the pair winning the prized gold medal is that several other players in their sides have also maintained a high level of performance this season — as indicated in our ratings averages. — And under the referees' voting system in the Rothman's, they could take valuable points off each other.

In our review of the XXXX Report ratings, League leaders Coalstars had five players who averaged 7.27 or better. In addition to Brusasco, the Mr. Consistency's in the Bundamba side have been Kevin Caldwell (7.50), Dave Wheeler (7.38), Bruce Penman (7.36) and Brent Diflo (7.27). Those who have matched Kirsopp's sustained form in the Hawks side have included

Domenic Tonel (7.38) and Craig Dickson (7.36).

Competition darkhorses Olympic United could also prove to be a surprise packet in the Rothman's count, and supply the winner for the second consecutive year. Craig Low, now at Lions, was last season's Rothman's medał winner. In the XXXX Report ratings averages Olympic's Mick Cernaka (7.64), Mike Milovanovic (7.64) and Paul Barry (7.50) have all maintained a high level of consistency this season.

Easts and North Star were the early competition leaders and their players could be expected to poll well on Rothman's night, this season to be held for the first time at the Mayfair Crest Hotel. North Star's Billy Williamson has averaged 7.50 points in the XXXX report to marginally lead a host of consistent team-mates. The Tigers' best in our weekly ratings have been Phil Redmond (7.62) and Jim McDonagh (7.21).

Some say it is easier to win the prized best and fairest medal from a mid-table or lower placed team and if that's the case, "bolters" could include Taringa's Andrew Lapa, who has averaged 7.50 points, while Thistle's best has been Jason Burr (7.43), Lions most consistent is Richard Van Win (7.36) while Wynnum's Pat Leathan has returned 7.12 in his limited appearances.

Although our ratings are an indication of consistency rather than the best and fairest, and are affected by the number of games played, they undoubtedly prove a handy indicator to the Rothman's count.

In fact, using our ratings average as a guide, the Rothman's leader board could read . . .

Brusasco, Kirsopp, Milovanovic, Penman, Redmond, Cernaka, Williamson, Lapa, Tonel, Wheeler. But then again, there have been surprises in the past.

Looking further at the ratings, it is interesting to note the number of players used by each League club.

As expected Lions, due to the club's NSL needs, heads the list with 30 players so far making XXXX League appearances. But not far behind are Wynnum and Grange Thistle, which have used 23 players each and Taringa who have fielded 25 different faces.

As may have been expected, Coalstars have had the most settled squad with coach Brian Styles calling on only 17 players in 14 rounds. North Star have used on 18 while Easts, Ipswich United and Mt. Gravatt have restricted themselves to 19 players.

In the Man of the Match awards, Kirsopp has been the best afield on an amazing six times in 14 rounds. The next best efforts are those of Brusasco, Wheeler, Redmond and Peter Vogler who have been named Man of the Match on three occasions.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

Queensland Soccer Federation president, Ald. Ian Brusasco, is to be commended for his action this week in reassuring local soccer officials that our game has not become football's poor relation.

Although on the surface it seems strange that Queensland soccer is becoming divorced from the national competition when local rugby league and Australian Rules are trying every means to be part of national league, Brusasco has high confidence for the future. He has long campaigned for a Lions and Brisbane City to return to the XXXX League and now it seems that will be the case next sea-

For the first time in a decade, Brusasco will be able to implement all his plans to build a strong soccer following in Queensland. This week's meeting was the first step. By streamlining administration, Brusasco believes that our game can quickly go from strength to strength while the other codes fast experience the lessons we have already learned from 10 years in a national league.

But confidence and positive action are the keys to Queensland soccer making the most from the latest changes. Our competition and our cowill be seen by others as being succesful if our clubs begin to draw back lost supporters and start to develop their facilities to cater for the new spectators.

As painful as our NSL axing may

be at the moment, it could prove to be a blessing in disguise. To be realistic, Queensland soccer has plateaued in recent seasons. We now have the opportunity to clamber back to a high standard or plummet to new

Brusasco's enthusiasm and ideas for the future is the way to go. If we consider ourselves inferior to the other codes then there is only one way we will be headed. If we convince ourselves that we are doing the right thing, and attempt to make it work, then the battle will be half won.

The two clubs staged an entertaining presentation that climaxed with a thrilling match. In one day, they probably ensured Ampol's continued backing for many years to come.

And the efforts of the two clubs should be an inspiration to all. There is no reason why similar types of promotions should not be carried out at suburban grounds every weekend. Entertainment is the key to getting spectators to return, and last weekend Coalstars and North Star gave more than value for money.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

The questions which are most frequently asked of QSF officials at this time of the season are those which pertain to the eligibility of players for the finals.

The rules are quite clear and have remained unchanged for several seasons now. Quite simply, for a player to be eligible to play in the finals series for a particular team, he must not have played more than, and I repeat more than, three out of the last five fixtures in a higher division than that in which his team partici-

The emphasis is on fixtures matches. Ampol or Qantas Cup games are not taken into consideration when considering the eligibility or otherwise of a player for the finals.

It should also be pointed out that a player is regarded as "having played" if he is deemed by the referee as having taken the park at some stage of the match. A player listed on the team-sheet but not taking the park is considered not to have played in that match.

Clubs should determine the eligibility of all their players before the finals series begins. The QSF conducts regular spotchecks and acts on any complaints and it would be a foolhardy side that risked fielding an ineligible player in a finals match.

SPOT-ON STATS

In today's jet-setting world of National League football, it is hard to imagine an era when players were strictly amateurs, Sunday soccer was unheard of and floodlit matches were reserved for big occasions.

In Queensland, the South Africans also beat Brisbane 9-1, Ipswich 5-0 and Australia 4-2, this match drawing 14,106 spectators who paid £2,445 at the Brisbane Cricket Ground turnstiles.

The NSW dominance of Australian soccer was reflected in the five internationals against South Africa. Queensland's Lex Gibb, who played in all five, was the only player from outside NSW to gain selection.

Queensland's coach in 1947 was Jock Cumberford, a former Thistle forward who was chosen with his brother Dave in the first Australian team to tour New Zealand in 1922.

But even if the year was a disappointment at State level, 1947 provided plenty of goal action in club matches. The 90 premiership games produced 444 goals at an average of almost five a match.

Yet that was the Queensland scene only 40 years ago as the code began the struggle to regroup after World War

Premiers that year were YMCA, later to become one of the first casualties of the modern move towards semi-professionalism.

In an exciting premiership race, they beat off the strong Ipswich challenge from Blackstone Rovers on goal average, with St. Helens one point behind this pair.

But Ipswich supremacy was emphasised in what was then the State's top knockout competition, the Tristram Shield. In the final, Bundamba Rangers hammered Latrobe 6-0.

Interstate football also resumed in 1946 with a visit by NSW which showed how far Queensland soccer had to go in rebuilding.

The Blues won both matches, 3-0 at Langlands Park and 10-0 at Bundamba. The match programme for the first game listed the home side as: A. Wiseman; A. Duncan and R. Hill; H. Bool, L. Gibb and P. Regan; H. Ridler, R. Hudson, G. Nunn, W. Nelson and A. Woolley.

The premiership top four (finals playoff were not introduced until 1959) was:

Ipswich clubs ruled the roost even more firmly the following year. Not only did St. Helens take the premiership, but two Ipswich clubs fought out the Shield final, with Saints completing a double by beating Bundamba Rangers 4-3.

International tours resumed in 1947 for the first time since a visit by a Chinese team in 1941—and again underlined the State's slip in playing standards.

In 1937 Queensland had lost only 2-1 to England Amateurs, but 10 years later South Africa handed out a 10-1 hiding at the Brisbane Cricket Ground.

It was 21 years since the Bundamba club last won the statewide knockout trophy. Coalstar's win thwarted North Star's hopes of a third consecutive cup victory. Despite the wet weather, a huge crowd turned out for the match which turned into a classic final.

North Star lead 1-0 at halftime after a good goal from Billy Williamson, but a Mark Brusasco chip five minutes after the break levelled terms. Another chip, this time from Murray Kitching put Coalstars ahead but North Star showed their character to comeback through a well worked goal involving Alan Marley and finally Ross Swan.

The winner came when Dave Wheeler played a fine ball for Andy Ogden to fire a low shot under North Star keeper Noel Lord.

In the earlier Ampol challenge match, Taringa Rovers beat Lions 2-1. Rovers' goalscorers were Marty Ratcliffe and Rob Kirby while Jarrod Austin netted Lions' effort.





of football, they could well have witnessed the last international here for some time. Despite the face-saving comments from several officials afterwards, the simple truth of the matter was that the match was attended by little more than 500 paying customers. That is nothing more than a disgrace!

Hobart and Newcastle, both with smaller populations than Brisbane, more than doubled our pitiful attendance. Queensland soccer should be in shame. And on this occasion the finger in no way can be pointed at our administrators. They did their job in getting a match here, and considerable money was spent on advertising. The blame rests squarely on the shoulders of those within the code who stayed away. It should be a long, long time before they should dare stand up and complain about anything.

And those who take a flippant attitude that too much is being made from one game or offer token excuses

Not only did they see a fine game that the weather was too cold are completely missing the point. Queensland's image at a national level already is suffering from the disappointing form of our NSL sides. At ASF level, our standing as a strong soccer state probably has hit rock

What chance has Ian Brusasco got of going south and demanding a fair deal for Queensland when Queenslanders cannot even support the game at home?

THE WORLD REPORT

Going to the football in Britain is not like I remember, and things could be on the change for the better if this latest report is an indication . . .

Having a police escort into an English first division match is a vastly different kettle of fish than being escorted out of the ground by the boys in blue.

So too is being dropped off at a private entrance rather than elbowing through a seething gate crowd. A leisurely champagne reception and a threecourse sit-down lunch before settling into a VIP seat beats a quick bag of chips and a hamburger while standing throughout the match and drinking nothing harder than tea.

It is the latest tourist's way to indulge in a live English football match.

Thoughts of football thuggery and the televised scenes of bottle-hurling, brawling hooligans have ensured the attendance figures for most major clubs are declining - even for those with a peaceful record. Compared with the hairraising run of riots and violence dogging the game last year, this season the clubs and police are going to work in unison to begin rebuilding the tarnished image.

Many overseas and local tourists ask to see a first division match, but up until now have had to go through the same crowd-battling system as the general public. That is until hotels and football clubs hit on the idea of doing each a favour — the club gets a guaranteed block booking and the hotel draws clientele through a top sporting package.

However, the VIP way of going to the

footy is proving so popular with the locals, that the organisers haven't even thought of selling it overseas. Manchester United is one club involved in the scheme and for most Saturday games this new season, the package could be sold three times over.

Organised by that city's Portland Hotel, it has become the in-way for businesses to entertain clients staying for a weekend, on the 'must' list for visiting soccer-mad Europeans or a comfortable and hassle-free way for English fans to indulge their passion.

But it is not for the cost-conscious. For those not staying at the hotel, the cost of the day package is £109 (\$A230).

That provides coffee and cake before boarding a luxury bus to the Old Trafford ground and a mounted police escort for the vehicle through the crowd to the VIP entrance.

Guests are taken on a tour of the players' tunnel and the ground before a champagne reception and three-course lunch.

A star host, usually an ex-Manchester United player, hosts the gathering and answers any questions. There is also a guest speaker. After lunch, guests have immediate access from the VIP lounge to their reserved VIP stand seats for the match.

Following the match, they can relax in the lounge over coffee and view videos of the finer points replayed while the rest of the crowd fights for the exits.

The man of the match receives his award in the lounge and other players mingle and talk to the guests. They are then taken back to the hotel.

Manchester United Commercial Manager Danny McGregor says it is a way for outsiders to effectively become executive members of the club for the day. Such a privilege would normally cost £500 (A\$1056) for a season and the club currently has a long waiting list.

Organiser Jill Kimber said the concept of a top level sports package for tourists and locals had long applied to tennis and cricket clubs, but was just beginning to catch on with football clubs.

"Some games are absolute sell-outs and we are inundated with requests, but when matches are rescheduled or played through the week there are generally places available," she said.




intermediate champions, they cannot afford many such games as coach John Lavelle was quick to point out.
