

n an attempt to gain some insight as to where the code is heading, it is necessary to retrace a little of our history.

It is necessary to do this, because many people need to be reminded of just exactly how much ground soccer has lost in the past two decades. Two decades ago enthusiasts could openly boast that the round ball code was the no. 2 football code here in Brisbane. Two decades ago soccer enjoyed wide support from strong ethnic communities, including the Dutch (Hollandia), the Italians (Azzuri), the Greeks (Hellenic), the Polish (Polonia) and many other ethnic groups on a smaller scale. Collectively they provided a strong foundation for the code and the customs and the culture of their home nations added an increased dimension to the entertainment value of the many local derbies.

However, soccer administrators successfully removed ethnic names from the code and over a period of years. the accumulative effect was to increasingly diminish ethnic support. It also helped to alienate thousands of soccer enthusiasts for, as their ethnic ties diminished, so did their sense of identity.

We were successful in alienating thousands of loyal soccer supporters.

It did not appear to matter that the foundations of Australia as a nation were built on the accumulative efforts of migrants representing al-

JUST WHERE **IS OUR GAME HEADING?** A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

most every country on the globe. Two decades ago it was not uncommon to have great teams visiting this state to play matches against local teams at either the Gabba or the Exhibition Grounds. Teams like Blackpool with Sir Stanley Matthews and Everton etc. It was not uncommon to see people queue at the Gabba at 8 a.m. to obtain a good seat to see the local boys do battle with the greats of the game. The Australian side featured a predominance of Brisbane and Ipswich players and the parochial local crowd loved every minute of the game.

Two decades ago the local First Division competition featured several Australian players and the representatives of the state were widely spread about Brisbane and Ipswich teams. Crowds were good and it was not uncommon to have 2000 and more people watch a game on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon. I can recall one club game at Heath Park where gate receipts were 700 pounds and the admission price was three shillings.

Where has it all gone wrong?

Most importantly, we have never considered what the patron has wanted or expected from the game. If we were in private enterprise and relying upon marketing a product for sale at a profit, we would have been out of business years ago. Our national league clubs only exist on the

support of raffles and bingo and I would be most surprised if admission receipts represented 10 percent of their total budgets. Their crowd support is poor and on a recent visit to the Lions stadium for a national league game, a head count of spectators could not get the number above 500.

What are we trying to preserve and for what reasons are we trying to preserve it? Things that are good are worth saving.

The questions we must now ask ourselves are: Does it receive public support? Does it contribute to the development of the code? Does it provide a gateway for young players to state and international competition? What contribution does it make to the promotion of the code? Has it increased the number of representatives in national sides? Has soccer enjoyed increased support from the general community in the form of public recognition? Had it generated increased exposure in the print and electronic media?

The answer in almost every case is "no".

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GO soccer Editorial

Ross Melville's article in this week's edition has both hit and missed the problems which appear to be confronting our game at present.

To dwell in the past is one of the biggest mistakes so many of our administrators have made in recent years. Sadly, some still live on in the belief that changing the name of a team can dramatically affect crowd support. Those days are gone! The sporting public of today is a completely different animal to that which existed when crowds flocked to all sports, not just soccer. The ethnic community is becoming assimilated and later generations are discovering other activities at weekends.

To think we would have been better off without the national league also is a misguided belief. Ten years ago would we have beaten NSW in an interstate clash? Hardly. Nor would we have supplied players to national youth squads. Simply, it can not be doubted that overall, the standard of Queensland soccer has increased as a result of a decade of weekly interstate competition.

But on the other side of the coin, Mr. Melville makes some valid points. Despite the influx of good imports like Jim Hermiston and Frank Liddell to name but a few, and the development of talent like Danny Wright and Russell Stewart, the NSL has not been a success for Queensland. Our two teams have become minnows, tossed around at will by southern forces. Mr. Melville is right in suggesting it is time we began deciding our own destiny and marketing our game towards the needs of the spectator. He is right in saying too many clubs have made decisions in the past solely on selfish grounds.

The current taskforce report being considered by the QSF think-tank contains answers to many of the posers Mr. Melville has highlighted. There are some radical proposals, but many with much merit. Anyone with a real interest in the code, and not just their club, should familiarise themselves with the report and offer input to the think-tank.

To dismiss the ideas within the taskforce report, would be to turn a blind-eye once again to the problems, which as Mr. Melville has pointed out, have haunted us since those long lost glory days.

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

During the season clubs and their officials come up with many ideas for change within our game. The time to act on those ideas is fast approaching.

Changes can be brought into being through notices of motion to alter the constitution. The ideal time to do this is at the annual general meetting which this year will be held at Soccer Headquarters, Perry Park, on Sunday, November 30.

Any notices of motion to be considered at the AGM must be lodged at the Perry Park office no later than 23 days before the meeting that is, this year, no later than November 2. (As that is a Sunday, ideally all correspondence should be lodged by the Friday, October 31). Details of any notices of motion should be typed on a club letterhead. All clubs have copies of the QSF constitution and therefore can relate to the wording required and any deletions to the current wording of the clause in question and any other related clauses.

Clubs should be as precise as possible in their changes. The clubs are the ones that can implement change, and the AGM is their forum, if any clubs have ideas for the future, then to quote an old cliche, "Now is the time to act".

As with any argument there are two sides of any story. I would be prepared to concede that some minor benefits have been enjoyed by a few, but sadly they have been outweighed by the host of disadvantages. The big loser has been soccer in this state. Even the national coach believes that for a player from Queensland to be included in the national side, he must not only be as good, he must also be better for him to delete from his predominantly Sydney-based Australian squad.

We must stop and take a good look at ourselves and honestly ask ourselves where are we going and for what reasons? It is time that we had a good rethink. The most positive step to come forward in recent years was the "white report". However clubs in their wisdom had to tear it apart to satisfy the narrow views of their own clubs instead of considering the long term good of the code.

Soccer can come back and it will not be through the promotion of Brisbanebased club teams in the national league. A strong local competition will be one step in the right direction if it could be accompanied with a true nationwide home and away state competition with national sides being selected from the competition. However to do this you could certainly not give the power of selection to any one person. Selectors would have to come from each state to maintain the level of participation. What we must always remember is that we must provide our patrons with something to identify by. In its present form, our code lacks an identity and has no long term plan for future development. True participation in all facets of the game will help bridge some of the gaps.

What do you think? Should we go back to ethnic names? Has the National League been a total failure? Where should Queensland soccer go from here? Has Ross Melville missed the point? IT'S A "MINI" PLATINI




For the next 78 minutes, Roche was in a class of his own as England's second-year students from the F.A.'s national school took a caning.

Juventus-bound Liverpool striker Ian Rush was sent off in a scoreless draw with Manchester City this week, apparently for a remark he made to the referee.

In the match itself, City defended magnificently after missing a pair of early chances and perhaps it was Liverpool's frustration that caused Rush's untimely remark to the referee. The striker is valued at \$7 million.

Led by two goals from Scottish striker McAvennie, West Ham heaped more disappointment on Manchester United when it became the only club to have won its first two matches in English soccer's first division.

West Ham's 3-2 triumph at United's Old Trafford home after they had squandered a two-goal lead put them on top of the division, though only 10 of 22 clubs have played twice.

It was the second loss for United, who took a record 10 successive victories at the start of last season. They were beaten 1-0 by Arsenal as the new season began on Saturday.

Everton had to come from behind twice to scramble a point in a 2-2 stalemate at Sheffield Wednesday.

Tottenham got a fourth goal in two games from Clive Allen and looked set to join West Ham on top of the table until England striker Peter Beardley earned Newcastle a 1-1 draw with three minutes remaining.

In the other game on the Monday Bank Holiday, Chelsea had to settle for their second draw when they were held 1-1 away to Oxford United.

McAvennie shut out in his club's 1-0 win over Coventry on Saturday, scored the fastest goal of the new season by connecting after 36 seconds in the match against United.

Alan Devonshire made it 2-0 after 28 minutes, but Frank Stapleton cut the deficit with a 39th minute header and Paul McGrath drew the home club level just after the interval by touching in Gordon Strachan's corner.

United forced West Ham to defend desperately and Clayton Blackmore had a shot hit the top of the bar. Then in the 82nd minute, against the run of play, Mark Ward outpaced United's defence and his cross was superbly headed in by McAvennie.

Carl Shutt gave Wednesday a 12thminute lead against Everton, and it took until the 57th minute before Graham Sharp equalised.

Substitute David Hirst, a close season signing from Barnsley, shot Wednesday in front again after being on the field for only one minute with 28 minutes left.

But a deflected shot by Kevin Langley seven minutes later ensured Everton's point.

Sammmy Lee was signed for Queen's Park Rangers in a \$A494,420 deal subject to a medical. The 27-year-old Liverpool midfield player had been unable to win a permanent place in the Anfield line-up during the last two vears.

The stocky midfielder joined Liverpool as an apprentice and has been with the club 10 years. He played 197 league games, scoring 13 goals, and was capped by England 14 times at full international level.

Rangers manager Jim Smith wants Lee to bolster the midfield and give them valuable experience. He is likely to make his debut at Loftus Road against Aston Villa on Saturdav.

Former England striker Mick Channon could be in big trouble after admitting selling FA cup final tickets on the black market ten years ago.

Channon's admission that he sold the tickets, an old controversy in England, comes in his autobiography, due to be published soon.

Both Channon and his former Southampton and England colleague Peter Osgood, now Portsmouth's youth team manager, could both face possible charges of bringing the game into disrepute as a result of the 1976 Cup Final between Southampton and Manchester United.

The Football Association are to investigate the revelations in which Channon, who claims selling the tickets is a justifiable bonus, says he sold half his allocation to touts, with Osgood alleged to have acted as middle man.

Channon is looking for his seventh league club, two months short of his 38th birthday.

Released by second division Portsmouth at the end of last season, he says he is ready to carry on. "I may end up coaching but I feel I have a year or two left in me vet," he said.

Eastern Suburbs are the women's First Division grand final winners, beating Coalstars 3-0 at Atlanta Field, Geebung, recently.


