Queensland Soccer Federation officials this week began investigating the factors involved in hosting the second South Pacific soccer tournament at Perry Park next year.

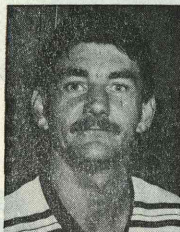
Flushed by the bold showing of the Maroons in the inaugural event in Auckland last week, QSF President Ald. Ian Brusasco and Secretary Alan Vessey have wasted no time in taking the initial steps towards staging the tournament in Brisbane next year. But many factors need to be considered before official invitations are assured to Auckland, New Caledonia and Tahiti.

The QSF hopes to tie the tournament in with the Expo promotion from April to October, but that in itself poses accommodation problems for the visiting teams. The QSF is also investigating the costs involved in staging the event and the availability of sponsors.

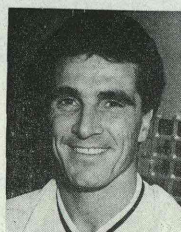
"I have no doubts from the feelings expressed by everyone involved in the tournament in Auckland last week that they all want it to be staged again. Brisbane has been put forward as the venue and we will be looking at all the alternatives," said Brusasco.

After emerging undefeated from last week's tournament, but not winning the trophy, Queensland would have to start favourites to take the honours at home next season. The Maroons showed great professionalism and spirit in finishing the tournament with a win and two losses. In the final match against Auckland, which finished in a 1-1 draw, Bruce Stowell's side showed that they undoubtedly were the best team of the tournament. And hopefully their performances silenced some of the critics back home.

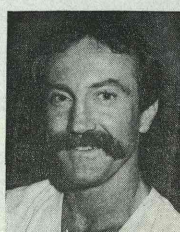
It was the older brigade that led the

way and Steve Perry, Alan Niven and Frank Liddell gave Man of the Match performances in the three games. The midfield combination of Marty Kirsopp and Russell Stewart came of age and earned special mention from Auckland coach John Adshead after the final game.

Up front Dave Wheeler and Mark Brusasco reproduced the form they had shown so many times at Coast-stars while Dave Gallagher proved a more than capable replacement in goals for the luckless Rob Farrow, who finished the tournament with a clean sheet, but unfortunately, also a broken leg. The other squad members like Frank Mengotti, John Ogden, Jim Morton, Brett Druery, Mark Gilbert and Richard Bassingthwaighte also proved to be valuable players in giving Queensland an overall strength unmatched by the other teams.

"They did themselves and Queensland proud. We were the best team but a lack of concentration for just two minutes (which allowed Auckland to score from a freekick) cost us the tournament," Stowell said.

JOEY'S OPPONENTS DECIDED NEXT WEEK

Australia's European opponents in the Under 16 World Cup in Canada in July will be decided next week.

Bruce Stowell's team has been drawn into group C in Montreal with Brazil, Saudi Arabia and Europe No. 2. That will be the team which finishes runner-up in the European Under 16 championship final in the Parc Des Princes Stadium in Paris on June 3. The tourna-

ment starts on Monday and will feature the best of European youngsters.

Europe will provide three teams to the Under 16 finals to complete the 16-team format. The other groups are: group A (Toronto) — Europe 3, Canada, Qatar, Egypt; group B (Saint John) — Ivory Coast, South Korea, U.S.A., Ecuador; group D (St. John's): Europe 1, Nigeria, Mexico, Bolivia.

The tournament starts on July 12 with the final in Toronto on July 15. Australia must finish first or second in the first round robin competition to advance to the second stage sudden death section of the tournament.

Stowell, and fellow under 16 coach Vic Dalglish, selected their final 18-man squad after a recent training camp at Parklea in Sydney. The squad includes Coalstars defender Darren Freiberg.

The Australian team will have a short camp in Australia before leaving for Sittard in the south of Holland, where it will play three games before flying to Canada.

IT'S THOMMO TALKING

The way I feel after all the allegations against Mount Gravatt over the past week, the heading on this week's column should be Thommo shouting.

But in the interests of the game, I am going to take Ronie's advice and put my boot in my mouth — and keep it firmly shut. Anyone who was there would know the facts on our match cancellation and a few people should be a little more careful about what they say in the media.

All I'll say is that it is in the hands of our board.

But I do think people should get off Gordon Nicholson's back.

Gordon had the match down at Redlands the night before he cancelled our match and saw first hand the dangers of playing on an unsafe surface. Young Redlands fullback Ross McGravie had his leg broken and I am sure that was on Gordon's mind when he came to Dittmer Park and declared the pitch unplayable.

Gordon's decision was one made in the interests of the game. It's a pity a few others failed to act the same way after the postponement has been made.

I genuinely feel sorry for young McGravie and I know having watched Noel Davis battle back that it is a long road back to fitness. But if Ross lives in the bayside area, I would like to offer my support in helping him to train — running, swimming or whatever — once he is ready to get back into it.

I watched the FA Cup with my neighbours, who have never been soccer followers, and their comments were as interesting as the brilliant game itself.

What impressed them most was the sportsmanship of both teams. I didn't have the heart to tell them it often wasn't that way.

But the lesson to be learned was that type of football and sportsmanship is what impresses the non-con-

verted. The unprecedented demand to the back for a replay underlines that as well.

We should use the Cup final as an example for everyone to follow and we can use it as a springboard to promote the pending arrival of Bryan Robson.

The Queensland team obviously played well in Auckland but as I mentioned last week it is now vitally important that we keep the momentum going.

We have three weeks to the interstate game and the arrival of Robson. I would like to see our own players used to promote the NSW match so they are just as well known by the time Robson arrives.

Mark Gardener should take the Maroons stars to shopping centres and the Mall and "sell" them to the sporting public.

Everyone should do their part to help Bruce Stowell prepare his squad for the NSW match. I am quite willing to let Marty Kirsopp go for one night of training with Bruce and I think other clubs should release their state team players as well.

Success at Queensland level can only help everyone.

Why doesn't the QSF push the NSW Federation into approaching APIA Leichhardt's guest player Francesco Graziani into playing for the Blues against the Maroons? With Robson and Graziani on show in the one match, Perry Park would be packed to the rafters.

What ever happened to Rod MacKenzie and his thoughtful letters published in Go Soccer in past years?

Hopefully Rod hasn't tired of banging his head against a brick wall. His letters showed a great deal of thought and often contained some clever ideas. I hope we haven't heard the last of him.

JUVENTUS TRIDENT SNIPPETS

CROATIA v JUVENTUS TRIDENT:

This was the match of the round to show the superiority in the Second Division premiership race. And the Juventus team, despite being depleted by suspensions and injuries, showed it was still a candidate for the number one position.

SECOND DIVISION:

The game opened with attack from both sides and some crnching tackles. In the ninth minute Clark Anderson made a crude, but not vicious, tackle on Dando Ivica for which he received a yellow card. That turned out to be the best thing as it settled Anderson and he played his best football for Juventus this season. Peter Carey muffed a chance in the 25th minute then Brett Beves, Croatia's keeper, kept them in the game when he saved Enzo Cupo's shot and the rebound by John Schiavo. In the 33rd minute Croatia missed a good chance when Ivica dispossessed Schiavo, made a good pass to Dino, but his shot sailed over the bar. In the 37th minute, Anderson's shot hit the post while in the 44th minute only a great tackle by John Hickman prevented Croatia from scoring. Immediately after from a freekick, Peter Carey headed the ball over Beves and Anderson had no problem scoring. Just before halftime John Gorza made a superb last ditch save outside the area. From the freekick, Dando shot past the post.

In the second half Croatia looked for an equaliser but were repeatedly denied by Gorza and good tackles by the defence. In the 59th minute, Sam Dean took a freekick from the halfway and found Carey who put Anderson through and he beat Beves for the second time. Croatia put their two subs on, Joe Cairney and Steve Perkovic, which strengthened their side and but for being offside on many times, Croatia could have scored much earlier. They eventually scored when Perkovic found the net.

Croatia's Third Grade won 3-0 while the Reserves also was won by Croatia 4-1.

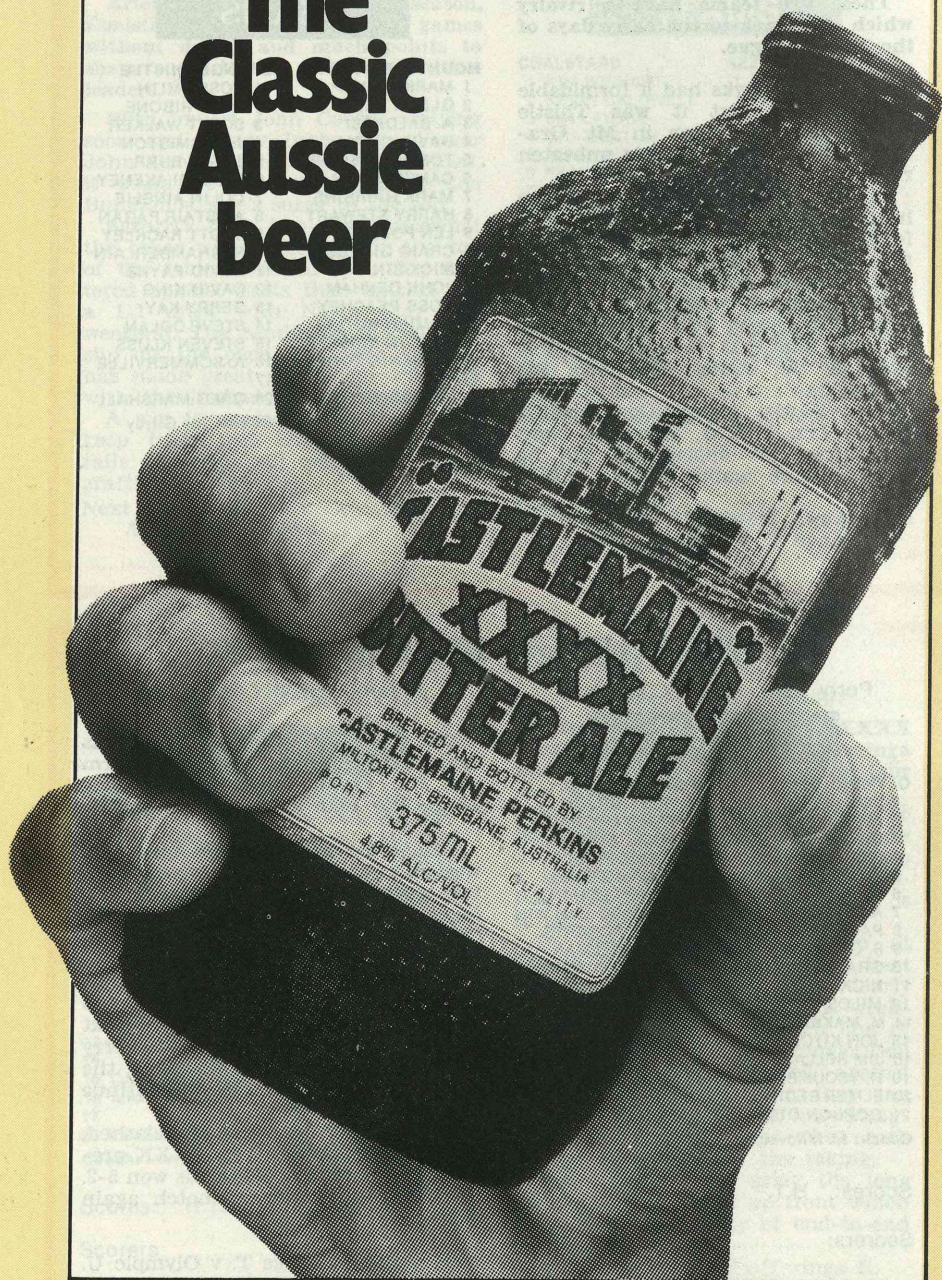
