

Eastern Suburbs president Ross Melville has called for major changes to the Queensland soccer transfer appeals system in the wake of last week's \$12,500 collective valuation of Wynnum trio Billy McDermott, Geoff Maltby and Dave Mewburn.

Melville believes the current system of appeal is prejudice against players who may not be qualified or confident enough to present a strong argument for the reduction of the fee being asked by their club.

The Tigers president also wants the appeals decision-making process taken away from the QSF management and an idependent appeals tribunal formed. Under his proposal Melville believes a player's worth should be decided by those who are best qualified to know — coaches.

"I believe the management committee's role is management, not to judge the value of players," Melville said. "I would like to see a four-man independent tribunal that consisted of the Queensland director of coaching (Bruce Stowell) as the chairman and coaches or representatives from three other clubs which are in no way involved, or have been involved in the past, with the player appealling against his transfer fee."

After playing the three Wynnum players in the XXXX pre-season competition, Easts baulked at buying the trio after their fees were set by appeal. The management committee ruled there should be no change to

the \$5000 Wynnum was asking for McDermott and Maltby but reduced Mewburn's fee from \$5000 to \$2500. Easts went ahead and bought only McDermott after club supporters contributed \$2000 towards the transaction.

Melville believes the time has come for players to organise themselves to ensure they are given a fair deal in transfers.

"There are a number of players around who have legal backgrounds or are very well educated who I am sure would assist players as a representative in an appeal. There has to be some balance as often the person representing the selling club is a businessman or a person of considerable standing in the community who can put forward a very strong argument. If a player goes in himself and is a little naive, he doesn't stand a chance," Melville said.

Melville added he believed there was no place in the appeal hearing for the buying club to put forward its point of view.

"That's not on. But changes have to be made to make the whole system fairer," he said.

QSF executive director Alan Vessey told Go Soccer he believed the current system was the fairest available. "A player is the only person who can appeal because the grounds of an appeal are that, in his opinion, the transfer fee asked is excessive," Vessey said.

"The player is the only one directly affected and should know why he had that view, irrespective of his

education. It's certainly not necessary to have someone there holding his hand."

Vessey also believes eliminating the management committee from appeals was tempting controversy. "The management committee offers the impartiality which is needed in this kind of matter. To have other clubs involved at some stage will put someone in a very difficult position," he said.

"The management committee's role is to manage and transfer fees is part of management."

EDITORIAL

The most amazing remark of last weekend's fixtures came from a coach at a Division Two club who advised his players to ignore the new throw-in rule because "the refs will soon get sick of enforcing it".

The remark, which was heard clearly by the referee and many others along the sideline, was a blatant direction by the coach for his players to ignore the rules of the game and abandon any respect for the match officials. What hope have referees got of controlling players when the people in charge on the sidelines are promoting insolence?

For the coach and his players—and any others who may have protested about the new rule last weekend—they should note that 12 months after its introduction overseas the rule is being halled as a major step in speeding up the game. Very mindful that any attempt to encroach down the line will cost possession, players are now throwing the ball in within a fair distance to where they considered it went out and are getting on with the game.

It is only those smarties, who in the past have made a habit of illegally stealing metres, who are being penalised. And no doubt they are the same people who whinged the loudest last weekend.

Obviously when something new is introduced there will be confusion. The referees find it as difficult as players to condition themselves to something new. Undoubtedly there would have been occasions last weekend when referees did not clearly indicate the position of the throw-in or were a little too strict in their interpretation of the new law.

But in the majority of cases those seen to be genuinely getting on with the game would not have been penalised. For a coach to snub the rule is to consider himself and his players bigger than the game.

The disrespect towards referees last season was the biggest problem facing Queensland soccer. The problem will not be solved overnight but major progress can be made if people are prepared to get on with the game. Nothing is more frustrating for a player, or his coach, if a decision is wrongly awarded against his team.

This is often said — "You just never know who could be watching" — and every club should consider that cliche when presenting themselves to the public,

Each time a team takes the park it is on public display. And the spectators could include any of soccer's current corporate backers or perhaps others who are interested in becoming involved. What they see could well decide their future policy.

An incident at last week's XXXX pre-season final highlighted my point. A clash of jerseys resulted in one team having to take the park in an old Queensland strip. It was embarassing for soccer and a missed opportunity for exposure for the club's own sponsor.

But the club should have known as the second team on the match draw, it was the away team and therefore required to have an alternative strip on hand if needed.

Remembering that the match referee is the only one who can rule on a clash of colours, clubs should come prepared if there's the slightest doubt.

Presentation is vitally important, particularly in the higher divisions which command the media spotlight. If a team looks professional, then you just don't know who might be impressed.

FACE FACE

WITH BRISBANE LIONS N.S.L. COACH, JUAN CUTILLAS

GO SOCCER: Brisbane Lions have spent in excess of \$40,000 on new players this season with the majority of that used to buy locals. Given that some approaches were made before your appointment as NSL team coach, do you consider it has been money well spent, or should the club have tapped other markets?

JUAN CUTILLAS: When I arrived I told the club it was a priority that we signed two or three top players from higher up. I know the club tried its best. It offered (Steve) Jackson a very good deal, much better than he is receiving in Melbourne. The club also approached Jason Polak and John Koch and was in the process of signing Graeme Fletcher when he pulled out at the last minute. They tried their hardest to bring players to Brisbane but they would not come. We then had to look at the local market. And it is wrong to say whether the money was well spent or not because \$40,000 is not the issue. You have to take into account what you can get in Queeensland. The figure is not their real value, for instance Frank Mengotti is not worth \$20,000. But the club was given no choice. It had to sign players and that was the price put on them by others.
GS: When you were at City last year

GS: When you were at City last year you were quoted as wanting to sign Mark Brusasco. When you moved to Lions you said he was not in your plans for the NSL. Yet, just one month ago the club approached the player. What is your assessment of Mark Brusasco and have any other factors influenced the club's stance regarding the player?

J.C. I wanted Mark Brusasco to play at Brisbane City because he is a very good player for the XXXX League. But I don't think he is up to the demands of the National League - it is different competition totally. That is my own opinion - I may be wrong. I believed he did not have the mobility and at the beginning I felt very sorry for the player because I have been a player and know how he felt. But on the other hand I believe a player should always take things positively. When the club approached him for the second time it was not because we were losing. We approached him because I considered him the best Queensland forward left, and we needed a player because Grant Lightbown was injured. If I had been Brusasco I would have taken the second chance and proved to me and the critics that he was good enough for the National League. I think he is a good player, I respect him and I am very sorry for what has happened.

GS: What is your reply to criticism in various quarters that Lions are no better than they were last season and

have shown a lack of organisation in some NSL matches this season?

JC: I think talk is very cheap. And I think that the criticism is coming from other coaches, and that is very unethical. I have never talked behind the back of any coach from Queensland, the XXXX League or the National League as I have a very high opinion of them. These critics don't take into account we are playing in a much higher competition, that we are competing against the strongest teams in the land who have national players, that we are using a lot of youngsters and we couldn't reinforce the team properly. We are not organised yet. It takes time. But we have been competitive. We have won two games out of five and those we have lost, we have lost graciously. The team is on the right track. These people who have been criticising the team, I would like to see their records at club level. We would see how far they can go.
GS: Brisbane Lions reportedly have

GS: Brisbane Lions reportedly have one of the smallest and least paid squad in the NSL. Is it possible to compete in the League under those circumstances and what changes would you like to see at the club to bridge the gap between here and the south?

JC: It is very difficult to compete under these circumstances. Some players in the south are getting \$600 to \$700 a week. Our players have been offered incentives but I think their main goal was to compete in the National League and not to make money out of the game. That is the way things are in Queensland and it is very difficult to change. But at the moment I can see no problem with the players. Their mentality and attitude to training and playing is very good. Financial matters are not a big consideration.

GS: Since you arived in Brisbane you have had successful seasons at Olympic United and Brisbane City. You are now at the most prominent and wealthiest club in Queensland — is your next step to a club in the south?

JC: I don't know what my future will be but at the moment I am not looking forward. I am looking to the present. I am trying to do my job as best as I can at Lions. My life has been a challenge and my coaching has been a challenge. But I believe you must take your opportunities because they only come once. I am on a two-year contract with Lions and I intend to be here next year if the club wants me. But if sometime in the future a better offer comes along, then I will take it because I am a professional. But first I have to do my job with Lions, because if I don't, these offers will not come my way. I am now just very concerned and committed to putting Lions in their rightful position as a strong National League club.

DIVISION TWO:

Was every player given his best chance possible of being selected in the Brisbane team for the intercity series?

That certainly is not meant as a criticism of any of Mal Bland's selections. But I feel I have to qualify a suggestion made last week which seemingly has ruffled a few feathers.

I proposed a training camp for Queensland possibles and probables during Easter. I was also critical of the pre-season being the sole selection period for the Brisbane team, as I believe Mal should also have called in a squad for at least a session before finalising his final 14. I believe it is the only fair way for the players.

For example, if the Brisbane team is picked on the pre-season tournament alone, how can Mal Bland compere a player who appeared in the opening game, was rested in the next, and his team was then knocked out — with a player whose side went all the way to the final?

Eastern Suburbs youngster Mark Geritz played a total of two and a half minutes through the tournament thanks to John Sime's ridiculous final minute substitutions. But is he any better or worse a player than Olympic's Mick Cernaka who appeared in the final?

If Mal was interested in both, or even uncertain, then he could find out by watching them in a session. And before the critics start saying the numbers would be unworkable, I would challenge any leading local coach to pick 22 players from the XXXX tournament and I bet he would get the majority of Mal's final 14.

I know the rep. coaches have asked club coaches to play certain players in particular positions during the pre-season tournament.

Whether they agreed or not is not the issue. The coaches should not have been put in that position. They are only doing their job by using the pre-season to experiment. Eight teams went into this season's tournament with new coaches. They all had to use the pre-season to assess the potential of every one of their players.

They are only doing their job. To ask them to play certain players is asking them to compromise their position to ensure the tournament satisfies the needs of the rep. coaches.

I am not against the pre-season tournament and can understand the QSF's arguments and position regarding the sponsor. What I am suggesting is that the tournament not be the sole selection period. It can be a great indicator for Mal Bland but to be fair to him, and more importandly, to be fair to every player there must be other opportunities to impress. And the same goes for the Queensland team. That's why I suggested an Easter camp. Logistically it may not work this year, but it's a suggestion I believe deserves consideration. If it unearths just one previously overlooked player — then it would have been a success.

I was horrified to read a quote attributed to a coach stating he was using the same fitness training methods he had used for the past 20 years.

Football aside, there have been massive changes to the recognised methods of preparing athletes over the past decade — let alone since 1968. Just consider the swimming times and track and field records of 20 years ago to those of today.

So much more must be considered by the 1988 coach. Psychology and nutrition are among a whole host of fitness aspects which must feature just as much as simple running in a fitness programme. The old methods may produce results, but can they produce the best possible performance?

EMERY GETS TOP JOB AT SEOUL OLYMPICS

Australian Soccer Federation executive director Brian Emery has gained an Australian first with his appointment to the Olympic Games soccer finals at Seoul in September.

Emery has been appointed by the world body FIFA as general co-ordinator of one of the soccer groups to be determined after the finalists arrive in Seoul.

His role will be similar to the duties he carried out in his first FIFA appointment at the 1986 World Cup finals in Mexico.

"I believe it is the first time an Australian has been selected to represent FIFA at the Olympic Games," he said.

"The position entails the organisation of matches, security and involvement with the committees responsible for medical, technical, media and the conducting of events."

But the Olympics post has resulted in one major disappointment for Emery. He had also been requested by FIFA to conduct an administration course in Auckland for New Zealand and other oficials but returns to Sydney one day before the meting is scheduled to start.

"It is a three day course and I will probably have to decline because of the conflict of time. I had been looking forward to the New Zealand visit," he

"FIFA is sending a coach and a referee to cover other aspects of the code and may send someone from Zurich as a replacement.

"But there is some compensation in the fact that I've had requests to conduct FIFA administration courses in Fiji and Papua New Guinea some time this year.

"I will try and fit it in with the time available as the Olympic Games will take first priority."

Emery said the ASF was still working on arrangements for Australia's international programme for the remainder of the year.

This includes a planned tour of South America for the national team, the 1900 World Cup home and away series against Fiji, and the Oceania World Youth championship qualifying rounds.

The winner between Australia and Fiji and the winner of New Zealand and Chinese Taipei links with Israel in a second round clash from which the top





team will challenge a South American finalist on a home and away basis for a place in the Italy World Cup finals.

The result left Brunswick one point behind Lions on the NSL table. And the pressure is on both teams to string together a few wins to climb away from the relegation zone.




