

GO SOCCER

The Queensland squad to tour Fiji appears certain to play a game in Brisbane in the week prior to its departure for the three-match Test series.

State coach Bruce Stowell is yet to finalise the opponents for the trial game but wants to play "the strongest opposition possible". He declined to comment on whether that would be the Lions NSL team which contains nine players who were members of the Queensland team which toured New Zealand last season. The other option open to Stowell is to play one of the intercity teams or perhaps a combination of players from two or all of the representative sides.

"I will be finalising the match on my return from the national youth championships next week," Stowell said. Although originally believing a trial game would not be possible before the tour, Stowell now believes it is vital to Queensland's chances of success in Fiji and has stressed to the QSF that all efforts must be made to organise a match for the touring squad.

"There is going to be a lot of new faces in the squad who may have not done before what I am going to ask them to do. For those players to fully understand what is required, they have got to be put into a match situation." Stowell said.

After watching the intercity matches between Brisbane, Gold Coast and Ipswich over the past week, Stowell admits he still has some tough decisions to make. And he revealed the midfield was causing him most concern.

"I have settled in my mind the strikers I will select and the back four players I want to take away. I was hoping some midfielders would stand out in the intercity games, but I am afraid I saw no-one who demanded selection. I will now have to go back and reconsider what I have seen in the XXXX League games I have watched," he said.

Stowell conceded that some midfield players may miss selection because he believes that strength as much as skill will be required in the three-match series against the robust Fijians.

"There are one or two ball players around who I am not totally convinced are strong enough at the moment for what I think will be required. Because of that, I may have to change my mind on the way to play while we are on tour," Stowell said. "It may have to be quite a bit different from the way we played in New Zealand last year when we had midfielders like Russell Stewart and Martin Kirsopp."

Stowell said he would select 15 touring players within the next week. He said they would be the only players brought into the training sessions.

"I toyed with the idea of naming a bigger squad and then trimming it, but I don't think that would have been fair. There will be some standby players, but they will only be involved if it becomes necessary.

DAMIEN IS OUR CAPTAIN

Brisbane and Mount Gravatt defender Damien Butler will captain the Queensland under 19 team at the Australian Youth championships which start in Sydney next week.

Six players who played their soccer in country areas last season are in the final 16, which has been in camp this week and played two trial games — including one in front of national Youth coach Les Scheinflug.

The Qld Under 19 squad is: Domenic Potter (Ips U), Andrew Hobbs (G T), Mark Geritz, Darren Freiberg (E), Butler (Mt G), Andrew Stillman, Clayton Koch (Pine R), Guy Rigby (R'pton), Craig Thompson, Chris Slater, Troy Cranney (C'stars), Glenn Sheppard (Acacia R), Shane Haddow (Nth St-AIS), Michael Clarkson (R'dale), Greg Bell (Mackay), Martin Perrett (Cairns).

Queensland is grouped with defending champions Victoria, Northern NSW and Australian Capital Territory. The Young Maroons finished fifth last year and Stowell believes it will be "a success story" if his team can finish third or better.

He points out the NSW and Victorian teams have been training together since before Christmas and are expected to dominate the titles. South Australia, which now has a state soccer institute, also is expected to be tough.

EDITORIAL

The importance of Queensland winning the interstate match on June 13 took on a new significance after the debacle at Lions last Saturday night.

There could have been no worse a time for the Lions players to fall in a heap than on Frank Arok's first visit to Queensland in three years. Everything he has said about Queensland soccer and its players was highlighted in the 5-1 thumping by St. George.

And that is sad for Lions and for Queensland soccer.

We all know that the Lions players are better than that result. We all know there are players in our state, who if given the chance, could serve their country well. We know we have been given a raw deal in seeing the national coach just once in three years.

The only way we can gain the upperhand in the argument again is to thrash New South Wales. Only a convincing win and a stylish performance can hope to restore the credibility of Queensland soccer in the eyes of Frank Arok.

But the debacle and backlash of last Saturday's NSL result highlighted

a point which our administrators have known but until now have refused to address. Queensland soccer is judged, both inside and apart.from the code, by the performance of our National League team. Last Saturday night's loss was a defeat for Queensland as much as a routing of Lions.

We cannot solely rely on Bruce Stowell to perform yet another miracle on June 13. Those at Richlands and Perry Park must bury the hatchet and begin working together to get Lions winning. And they must start this week.

Queensland can win all it likes in Fiji, it won't count a razoo if back at home Lions are getting thumped in the National League. While we are part of the competition, we are a chance of getting players in the Socceroos side. To be relegated out of it again ends any hope.

> Are we playing soccer or are we attempting to revive the ancient sport of fighting each other to the death?

Two incidents I saw over the past fortnight have left me wondering. And I am still disgusted that the proper action has yet to be taken against the offenders in both cases.

Soccer is such a beautiful game and as such will attract spectators if it is played properly. But if we allow sheer thuggery into the game, and allow the perpetrators to escape virtually unscathed, then we are putting soccer on a knife's edge. On one side is sport and on the other a debacle.

I don't have to mention names because anyone who has an interest in the game will know the two incidents I am talking about. One took place in an Olympic Games qualifying match and the other in a XXXX League game.

Both players, and I use that term loosely as both are no more than hitmen, should be ashamed of their behaviour.

I am enjoying being a XXXX League spectator this season and gladly pay my \$3 at the gate to be entertained.

And in the last round of fixtures I saw a ballplayer demonstrating the skills that will bring me and others back every time. But I was sickened to see the player, the entertainer, the man who is earning money for his club, cruelly taken out of the match.

These type of tactics reduce the game to nothing and spectators will leave our grounds in droves if they are allowed to continue.

There are three areas of responsibility in stamping out undesirable roughhouse tactics.

The Coach is the one who sends his players out with certain instructions or tactics. Are our offenders having their behaviour initiated at this level?

TALKING

The Player is the next to go under the microscope. Is he ignoring the footballing tactics of his coach or can he simply not discipline himself?

The Referee is the final link, and the last hope, in the chain of responsibility. If a referee gives a freekick then he must have seen the offending incident. Why then can he not take the action available to him and the only protection on the park for those players wanting to play football? — Send the offender off.

If the referee lives up to his responsibility then the administrators can play their part and rid the game of the thugs.

The triangular intercity series is proving a huge success and perhaps its extension could be the re-birth of the State League.

The reason behind the success is that with State team berths on offer, there is much to play for. I have already suggested one curtainraiser for the interstate match, and under 21 interstate game, which I believe Bruce Stowell is keen to see take place.

But if finances don't cover such a game, why not play a South-east Queensland team against Bundaberg. The SEQ team could be selected from those players involved in the triangular series who miss State team inclusion. It would be a deserved reward for their efforts and I am sure Bundaberg would love to be involved in such a prestigious match.

And perhaps in future years a North Queensland versus South Queensland game could be initiated.

WITH SOCCEROO COACH, FRANK AROK

to Queensland since April 25, 1985. Do you think your absence has given Queensland-based players a fair opportunity to push for national team inclusion?

FRANK AROK: In a time when the Brisbane teams were still playing in a first division and before that in the National League they had a disastrous season, the selection method we have been using is that someone is consistent, playing in a high standard and in a winning team. That wasn't the case in Brisbane. But I still had one of your players in the squad for the tour of China. He played well but when his team was relegated, I couldn't maintain his position. With the two teams playing in the local competition and not the National League, it was not the best starting position for anyone to make the national team.

GS: The last time you were in Brisbane you said Alan Hunter was too overweight to play in the national team. Given that Hunter is now only fractionally lighter than he was then, what has

changed?

FA: Hunter lost in our camp eight and half kilos and still wasn't really in line to be included and he is still in a broad squad of 32 players. He was lucky only because of the injury to Robbie Dunn. It is not to do with coming from Melbourne or Brisbane or anywhere. If you are a good player only a fool would really be stubborn enough not to use him. I tend to think I am not a fool.

GS: Reaching the Olympic finals is a tremendous achievement for the Socceroos. But the Australian sporting mentality will be for them to compete for a medal in Seoul. What can we expect from your team at the Games?

FA: I am not worried about the Australian mentality because we are always competing in World Cups where six to eight teams compete — I am talking about rugby league, rugby union, cricket. But really Australia hasn't got a chance to compete with distinction for a gold medal in any sport. This time everyone will be there and I don't think Australian sport will be proud of its achievements at the 1988 Olympic Games. Our achievements are already bigger than the other sports because we are there in the final 16 out of 122 starters, so we have done something already. Luck will be very important, and the groupings will have a big bearing on what we are going to achieve over there.

GS: Had you failed to qualify for the Olympics, your national team job could have been in jeopardy. How can you continue when you know there are people involved who a month ago were

GO SOCCER: This is your first visit waiting to sack you, and why did you turn down the reported rich offer from Israel?

> FA: People are not aware that we are a big family, the national team. The rapport between the players and the coaches is very important. I was never worried about my job and I am not worried now. I was always absolutely certain we would go to the Olympic Games and as a competitive person, I am always competing for everything in life. Regardless of what you are trying to achieve in life with details put on paper or some kind of signed agreement or contract, if you are not producing the goods, you will be sacked. I wasn't worrying about another three years or whatever. I think everywhere in the world if you are producing results and new players and that's what we have done, and that's just not myself. It is a good trademark of the coaches. I am a very relaxed person and if they can get someone better good luck to them. The Israel offer is better than what they are reporting. But we decided to go to the Olympic Games and I will be over there. I also have decided to lead the team against Brazil, Argentina and Saudi Arabia and that is a big thrill in my life. I have targets and I am working towards them. At the moment I am not interested in anything else.

GS: The ASF promised you will be in Brisbane for the Queensland-NSW game on June 13. Will you come to Perry Park, and is it an opportunity for any players involved in the match to force their way into the squad, or do you intend to stick with the same players for Seoul?

FA: One game, or two games, or five games or even 10 games would not change my mind about a player. The players in any team should be able to produce one or two good years. Look for example, nine players in my starting line-up never missed a game because of injury or suspension or anything. I am not looking at a player to produce a brilliant performance in one game then nothing for six or seven weeks. The likes of Olver, Savor, Jennings, Yankos, McDowall, Grino, Wade, Farina, Arnold, they are ready every time. They never have a bad game, they give everything, that is the type of player I want. If someone plays well in one game it doesn't mean anything. It is a winning team, a winning player who is always setting a high standard. Unfortunately, what has happened with soccer in Queensland, its ups and downs all the time, no real stability in the whole thing. It is hard, hard on players. If I have a club game there is no chance in the world I will come to Brisbane for the interstate match. But if we have no game on that day, I will be
