
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GO SOCCER

The Queensland squad faces a rigorous series of training sessions next week before leaving on the eight-day tour of Fiji, starting on April 30.

And State coach Bruce Stowell has warned that every member of his 15-strong squad will be playing for a place in the starting XI for the opening match against the Fiji team during the training sessions.

"Because many of the players are new to me and to the State team, I will be looking closely at everyone during training and particularly in the training game I hope to organise. Those players who can play to instructions and do the job required in the specific areas I point out will be the ones most likely to be picked for the first game," Stowell said.

And to make the team for the

And to make the team for the opening game could prove vital for any player's chances of a good tour.

"I will not make changes for the sake of making changes. I never have and I don't intend to on this tour," Stowell said in reply to a question on whether the starting XI, barring injuries, could be the same XI for all three matches against Fiji.

Th State squad came in for its first assembly and training session at Perry Park this week, but the tempo will be increased next week. The squad will train on Tuesday night, play a game on Wednesday night, train on Friday and again on Saturday morning.

Stowell has called the Saturday morning session for two reasons. He always likes to put his team through a good session two days before a

match — and Queensland plays Fiji the following Monday, and Fijian law prohibits any sporting activity, including training, on Sundays. Queensland arrives in Fiji on Sunday, April 30.

Although conceding he had spent many hours deliberating over the final make-up of his squad, Stowell said he was happy with the final composition and believes he has the players with the ability to perform well against the Fijians.

"Some people may not agree with some of my selections but I picked players on what I thought I could get them to do for me," he said. Stowell also hinted that while on tour, Queensland would play a completely different formation to that used in the past and suggested the emphasis could be using a number of players in deeper than normal roles, but with instructions to break quickly and directly.


In defence, Queensland may also use a zonal system with players defending in areas where they were required rather than playing traditional defensive roles.

"This is our third series against Fiji and we have learned in the past that they cannot be allowed to run with the ball. Shutting the ball carrier down very quickly will be so important." Stowell said.

With much speculation abound as to who will lead the Maroons on tour, Stowell declined to offer a name and said his captain will be probably appointed at next Tuesday night's training session.

"If I can organise a game next Wednesday, I would like the captain to go into the match as the captain." he said.

Queensland soccer physiotherapist, Michael Dalgleish, has been chosen to join the Australian Under 16 team in its bid to qualify for the next world championships in Scotland next year.

Dalgleish, who has proved a huge hit with Queensland senior and youth teams, also is touring with the Queensland team to Fiji later this month.

The Australian under 16's, who have been quarter-finalists at the past two Junior World Cups, will bid to qualify for Scotland at Parklea in Sydney next January. Their opponents will include our Oceania opponents, although there are moves for Israel to be included into a European group. FIFA will discuss the issue at its next meeting on July 1.

Former Socceroo Jim Rooney has been named as assistant coach for the Joeys, a role admirably filled in the past by Queensland's Bruce Stowell, who understandably did not seek the position again after he was surprisingly overlooked for the head coach job.

EDITORIAL

The 15 players chosen to tour Fiji as the Queensland soccer team have been handed an envious opportunity — and an enormous responsibility.

Queensland Soccer Federation officials have worked hard this year to ensure the representative matches maintain a high profile in soccer and Queensland sport in the face of pressures and opposition within and outside of the code.

To conduct an overseas tour without some of the State's best players is a risky proposition. But that is what makes the 15 chosen by Bruce Stowell last week as so lucky. The 15 have been given the chance to wear the Maroon first this season. And if they are serious and committed about making it at the top level possible, they will ensure by playing to their very best in Fiji, that it will be difficult for Stowell to take the jersey away from them when he comes to finalise his team for the annual interstate clash with New South Wales on June 13.

The 15 players who step onto the plane for Fiji in a week will know they also have a foot in the door to stepping on the park against NSW. a fixture which has taken on its rightful importance following ASF backing last weekend.

While some may be envious of those making the trip to Fiji, anyone who has made a serious sporting tour, will know it is never a holiday. The Queensland team is going to Fiji to do a job. They will be attempting to beat the Fiji national team in three matches, they will be upholding the fine record of Queensland soccer throughout the South Pacific. The tour will not be one of lazing under palm trees and sunning on tropical beaches. Each day will be a wellplanned schedule of training, eating and resting.

The eves of many back home, and not just those within soccer, will take a very interested look at the reports of the Queensland soccer team's progress while on tour. Being one of the first sporting tours to Fiji since the political upheavals of last year, makes the tour even more important.

Queensland will host leading English first division clubs Arsenal, Nottingham Forest and Manchester City when the inaugural XXXX Super 6 Soccer tournament kicks off at Boondall next month

The three visiting English teams will be pitted against sides representing the home state, New South Wales and Victoria in the first tournament of its kind ever held in Australia. Prizemoney totalling \$56,000 will be offered for the tournament, which is expected to become an annual

XXXX Super 6 Soccer comprises the best aspects of the outdoor game with the thrills, speed and atmosphere which are so often associated with sport in compact indoor arenas. Each team in the tournament will operate with squads of 11, but are permitted to have only six players on the "field" at the one time. The perimeter side and back boards keep the ball in play almost constantly.

Offside, does not apply in XXXX Super 6 Soccer. But each team, when at full strength, must have one player in the opposition's half within five seconds of the game starting or being restarted. Should all six players from one side be caught in their own half, the last player who crossed the half way line back into the defensive half is sent to the "sin-bin".

The field is divided into thirds by the red lines either side of the half way line. Goals can be scored only in the area between the goal line and the red line in that half. The ball cannot be kicked from one end of the field to the other. Clearances out of defence must touch the floor or be touched by another player in the zone between the two red lines.

There are no goalkicks, and goalkeepers put the ball back into play by throwing it from

their penalty areas, which like the indoor game, is the only section of the field in which they are able to handle the ball. Other players, defensive and attacking, are not permitted in the keeper's zone immediately in front of the goal.

A "sin-bin" is used in XXXX Super 6 Soccer. Players are sent to the sin-bin if they are guilty of committing a cautionable offence, or deliberately delay the game. The usual sin-bin penalty is two minutes. If a player is sent to the sin-bin a team cannot compensate by bringing on a substitute to cover his absen-



The XXXX Super 6 Soccer Indoor tournament will be a selection trial for the Australian team to play in the inaugural FIFA world indoor championships to be staged in the Netherlands next year.

Australia is among 16 nations invited by FIFA to take part in the tournament. Australian Soccer Federation executive director, Brian Emery, said the performances of players in the XXXX Super 6 tournament, will be used as a guide to the final make-up of the Australian team to play in Holland.

The clash between the Queensland and New South Wales teams will be as much a feature of the tournament as the games involving the visiting English first division sides. The two State teams played a thrilling 1-1 draw in the annual interstate clash at Perry Park last year and are set to meet each other again at Soccer Headquarters on Monday, June 13.

Both the Maroons and Blues line-ups look similar to sides which could be put onto the park for this year's interstate clash and a convincing win in the XXXX Super 6 Soccer tournament will give either side a psychological advantage for the forthcoming outdoor clash.

Bob White, the man behind this week's launch of the XXXX Super 6 Soccer tournament, has a happy knack of creating success.

He proved that as an administrator with Newmarket and I am sure he will prove it again with the XXXX Super 6. That made it even more interesting to learn that at the end of last year, Bob made a personal decision which affected the whole of soccer. He opted to coach the Newmarket Division Two side this year rather than seek a prominent position on the QSF management committee. I am certainly not critical of his choice, and to date, he is getting good results with Newmarket.

But his decision has left me wondering, was Bob White ever a player?

The point I am wanting to make is using Bob White as an example is that players seem much more comfortable in making the transition to coach than they do to an administrator.

In Bob White, we had potentially our heir to Ian Brusasco's presidency. Yet like so many players, the attraction of being a coach apparently was stronger for Bob than that of being an administrator. Just look at the current XXXX League coaching line-up. Without exception, all are former players — although Brian Styles raises my doubts after his attempts to play Mark Brusasco as a midfielder.

I believe players have a responsibility to give something back to the game, and if they see coaching as that avenue, then that is fine. As former player, new coach, I can fully understand the reasons. But what I am asking is — are there any players out there, potential Bob White's — who could best serve the game by taking a step into administration and helping to run the code?

Two of the most impressive administrators I have met are Stefan

Kamasz, who until last month was with the NSL, and Victorian Soccer Federation chairman, Jack Reilly.

TALKING

Both spoke at the Level Four coaching course in Canberra last year, and both made a lot of sense. And the reason that they were doing their jobs well was that both understood their role in soccer was to administer. Other areas of jurisdiction were for other people.

It comes as no surprise to point out that Reilly is Australia's most capped goalkeeper and Kamasz played the game for many years in the Newcastle area.

Refereeing is the other area to which players must turn their attentions when they decide to hang up their boots.

The best referee in Brisbane at the moment is Tony Slater. And again, it is no surprise to learn that Tony was a keen player before taking up the whistle. How many other top referees are out there in the playing ranks?

The QSF through its marketing company endorses a range of footballs which gives clubs a choice when making their purchases each year.

In buying the endorsed balls, soccer earns money. That is a great marketing exercise. But from a playing point of view, the QSF must go one step further and insist on a particular type of ball, not just a brand, as the official and only match ball. The recent wet weather, and subsequent longgrassed pitches, has highlighted the inadequacies of some footballs to be quality match balls.

A good match ball is as important as wearing good boots, having nets or even having the field marked. It is part of the game.

TROY IS OUR SUCCESS AT YOUTH NATIONALS

Coalstars striker Troy Cranney has been rated by Queensland coach Bruce Stowell as "one of the success stories" of the Young Maroons bold showing at the Australian Youth championships last week.

Stowell said Cranney, who was used in short bursts in the Queensland team's path to the semi-finals, had shown enormous potential.

"He was one of the youngest players at the titles yet showed ability beyond his age and a greater willingness to attack than any other player at the titles," Stowell said.

"Troy is a player of enormous potential and ability and if continues to progress in the same manner he did in the championships, he will be some player."

And the great thing for Queensland is that Cranney, along with his Queensland and Coalstars club-mate Craig Thompson, are eligible to attend the next youth championships and will be still within the age cut-off for the 1991 world youth championships.

Two Queenslanders, Mark Geritz (Easts) and Shane Haddow (North Star, AIS) gained selection in the Australian Youth squad to begin preparing for the qualifying rounds of the next world youth championships, to be held in Saudi Arabia in February. Haddow last season was named soccer's first ANZ Colt of

Five other Queensland players have been put on standby and could be added to the squad depending on their progress over the coming months.

Queensland beat eventual tournament winners, Victoria, 2-1 and were desperately unlucky to lose the play-off for third against NSW on an own goal.

"We gave Victoria a soccer lesson and we played just as well against NSW. Only four brilliant saves by their keeper, Mark Besnich stopped us from getting third place," Stowell said.

While rating NSW as the best team at the tournament in terms of the individual talent within the Blues side, Stowell said he was disappointed more Queenslanders were not named in the national squad.

"Getting just two was a litle disappointing and possibly another two would not have been asking too much. But there are five players on standby and I will be reporting regularly to Les (Scheinflug) over the coming months on their performances," Stowell said.

Stowell was reluctant to single out players from his squad, but pointed out that team captain Damien Butler was among those who had an excellent tournament.

The tournament also highlighted the difference between players who were playing regularly and those who were in lower grades at their clubs.

FACE FACE

WITH FORMER QUEENSLAND AND LIONS DEFENDER STEVE JACKSON

GO SOCCER: It has been more than a year since you transferred from Lions to Preston. Why did you head south and have you achieved your aims?

STEVE JACKSON: The first reason I left to go south was that Lions were relegated and I wanted to keep on playing in the highest standard possible. I had the opportunity to go to Preston Makedonia, so I decided to go there. It's been very prosperous for me, I've enjoyed it. I went to the club last year and we had a good season, runners-up. This year we have got off to a poor start, but I think things are on the change now. I haven't achieved all my aims just vet. I've still got Australian selection. which is on every player's mind. But I just have to bide my time.

GS: When you were a Queenslander. we always felt you were discriminated against when it came to the selection of national teams. Now you are in Melbourne, do you think you have been given a fair consideration by Frank Arok, or do you think you will have to go to Sydney to gain a Socceroo shirt?

SJ: I don't think I would have to go to Sydney to achieve that aim and I don't think I have been discriminated against. I just have to keep playing consistent and hopefully I will get recognised by Frank Arok as a player who can play in the sweeper's role. There already is a player in the Australian team doing the job at sweeper (Charlie Yankos) and you can't expect Frank Arok to go around changing the situ-

GS: Having experienced National League soccer with another club, and one which challenged for honours last season, what do Lions need to do to become a force in the competition?

SJ: I think Lions need to buy more players, they have got to get quality players, players that are match winners. Lions have got a very good side, they are all very good players who try hard, but they need that bit more star quality in the side to make it a very good side. Off the park, the administration is very good, one of the best in the country. It's just a matter of them buying good players.

GS: What advice would you give to any young Queensland-based players who maybe uncertain about which path to take to further their soccer careers?

SJ: If a player wants to play at the highest standard possible, he had to move to wherever that standad is, whether it be interstate or even overseas. They have to put the dedication and time into it and they will achieve their aims. If the chance is there to go south, go south. It is obvious southern clubs get more recognition than say clubs in Brisbane and Adelaide.

GS: Do you intend to return to Queensland, and in the meantime, would you be in favour of playing for the Maroons in a State of Origin soccer set-up, or do you now consider yourself a Victorian?

SJ: I consider myself a Queenslander deep down. I do intend to move back to Queensland, it could be in two years, it could be in 10 years. I am quite happy now where I am. A State of Origin concept sounds very good. If that came along I certainly would be interested in playing for Queensland again. But to be honest, my true State of Origin is New South Wales!

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

The circumstances in which the Division 4 and Reserve grade fixtures between Brothers & Toowong were called off at Raymond Park last Sunday call for comment. Shortly before kick-off time in the early match, the official referee cancelled the game on the grounds that the field was in dangerous condition.

Officials and players from both clubs expressed surprise at his decision and tried without success to persuade him to change his mind. The ground at the time was virtually devoid of surface water except for one or two very small puddles and it was not raining.

The relatively long grass, although it would have hampered players, certainly did not represent a safety threat. There was also a muddy, scuffed-up area in the centre of the ground where I understand fill had been used after removal of a cricket pitch.

A different referee subsequently, after discussions with the first official, called off the later game as well. It is difficult to see how he could have done anything else without appearing to call his colleague's judgement into question. The second referee also made reference to bits of glass and wood in the scuffed-up area. These were not readily discernible to other observers and were not regarded by players of either side as a significant problem.

A particularly important point is this: both clubs had been required to play matches the previous weekend on grounds far more severely affected by wet wea-

Players and officials from both clubs were unanimous that the conditions last Sunday were vastly superior to those regarded by other referees as perfectly safe and acceptable only a week earlier. There is room for legitimate differences of opinion on whether ground conditions are playable. However, it does seem that the Referees Association needs to ensure far greater consistency in decisions made by its members.

One must also ask whether it defies common sense for a referee to refuse to allow a match to go ahead when players and officials from both clubs agree that conditions are safe. Quite apart from the safety aspect, it has to be said that the condition of the playing surface at Raymond Park is deplorable.

Unless urgent action is taken to improve the scuffed-up area referred to, for example, one would have to assume that the QSEF has simply abandoned all minimum ground standards for lower division clubs.


