

NEWS REPORT

A Tantalising \$250 a minute — that's the cash rate on offer for the winners of the \$56,000 XXXX Super 6 international indoor tournament which will be held for three nights at the Brisbane Entertainment Centre this week.

Out of the total prizemoney purse, \$23,000 will go to the winning team after the round robin and play-off series. Each match lasts 15 minutes, in two seven and half minute halves.

While the cash return to the winners sounds attractive, the 10 players in each squad will more than have earned their prizemoney by Saturday night. XXXX Super 6 is fast, energy-sapping soccer. The ball is rarely out of play and by the time the final whistle goes, both squads know they have had a match.

But the real winners from the tournament will be the spectators. For one of the most exciting indoor spectacles yet to be held in Brisbane, those who attend the XXXX Super 6 will pay less than 16 cents a minu-

te to see live in action players who previously have just been names in magazines or images on television.

This week's tournament is the culmination of a dream for longtime Newmarket identity, now soccer promoter, Bob White. After seeing the Guinness Soccer 6 in England, White knew straight away it was the type of entertainment which would be an instant hit with the Australian sporting public.

Massive behind the scenes work, stretching back more than 12 months and much of it under great secrecy has led to this week's tournament which will feature teams from English clubs Arsenal, Nottingham Forest and Manchester City and State sides Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria.

Tickets for all three nights are still available with every seat in the Boondall stadium considered a good vantage point. Concessions are available for patrons buying tickets for all three nights or making group bookings for 20 or more people.

The XXXX Super 6 indoor tournament is certain to be one of the most exciting soccer events ever staged in Australia. It's three nights not to be missed.

REDLANDS CELEBRATE 70 YEARS

The annual Brisbane-Ipswich intercity challenge will be played at Perry Park next Wednesday — but the Ipswich-Gold Coast game is still yet to be rescheduled.

The squads for the Brisbane-Ipswich clash were to be named this week with Brisbane's Mal Bland and Ipswich's Gary Wilkins both expected to make changes to their original teams. Brisbane battled to beat the Gold Coast 3-2 while Ipswich twice had their game against Gold Coast washed out.

Brisbane beat Ipswich 3-2 in a thrilling match at Ebbw Vale last year, but Ipswich are at their most dangerous when they are the underdogs. Coach Gary Wilkins admits he would have preferred to have had the game against Gold Coast under his team's belt before the Brisbane clash, but is still confident his side will rise to the occasion.

QSF executive director Alan Vessey said it was still undecided as to when the Gold Coast-Ipswich game would be played. The QSF originally intended to play the match before the Brisbane-Ipswich game, but Gold Coast and Coalstars' advance to the next round of the Ampol Cup and this week's XXXX Super 6 indoor tournament left very few available dates.

It is coincidental, but significant, that the XXXX Super 6 indoor tournament should launch an exciting, new style of soccer in Australia in the same week

in which major decisions about the code's future must be made.

In Sydney this weekend, the Australian Soccer Federation executive will consider all submissions for the restructuring of the ASF and the National League. Some of the submissions call for far-reaching and substantial change. Whether those submissions are the right way to go or can prompt a new direction are a matter for the meeting to decide.

But changes must be made because the present structure of the ASF, and in turn the NSL, is a significant drawback for the code in an age of fast-changing and high pro-

file sports.

Many scoffed when it was suggested a six-team indoor soccer tournament could be staged in Brisbane, featuring some of the best-known teams from Britain, But Southern Cross promotions, breathing a pleasant new enthusiasm into soccer, ignored the critics and went ahead and organised what certainly will be a successful tournament. They showed that, with the right approach and proper research, that soccer can compete with the other "big name" sports in Aus-

Those at the ASF meeting this weekend must adopt some of the attitudes and new thinking shown by those at Southern Cross promotions. Soccer needs to take steps now to take the sport into the 1990's as a successful and positive Australian footballing code.

The delegates attending the meeting in Sydney would do well to look at the example set by the Queensland Soccer Federation when it restructured several years ago. Some tough decisions were made, but a sound new base was built that enabled the XXXX League and the divisions below it, to stand on their own merits. Few other codes in Queensland could boast a local competition that at only a few months notice could take back its National League team and produce a very successful season.

As those who restructured the QSF discovered, and no doubt too Southern Cross will discover at Boondall this week, you only ever get one real chance to make a bold change. If it is not done right from the outset it will only prove to be a complete

waste of time.

ACROSS MY DESK

Queensland soccer fans have complained in recent times about never seeing some of the international teams which come to Australia.

The XXXX Super 6 indoor tournament at Boondall this week will give those fans the opportunity to voice their protests in the loudest possible manner.

The ASF has scheduled matches in Brisbane in the past only to be disappointed by the lack of crowds. At Boondall this week Queensland takes on Arsenal, Nottingham Forest and Manchester City as well as the state teams from NSW and Victoria.

The indoor concept is new and exciting and deserves packed houses. And while big crowds will prove to the ASF that Brisbane can successfully host big soccer events, it also will demonstrate the support for soccer in Queensland to the corporate sector and the television networks.

Soccer fans can ask for no more entertainment than what they will get for three nights at Boondall this week. They owe it to themselves and the code to turn out in force.

WITH QUEENSLAND AND EASTS DEFENDER, STEIN GRODUM

GO SOCCER: Although you are wellknown at Easts, you have really only come to notice in Brisbane soccer in the past two years. What is your footballing background and do you consider yourself a late bloomer?

STEIN GRODUM: I started at Easts as a Junior at nine and went through and at 16 I was playing in the South-East Queensland League. But at that time my marks were suffering in the first year of senior so I gave soccer away to concentrate on my studies. I then went to Q.I.T. and was studying three nights a week for a Social Diploma of Civil Engineering and couldn't train. In the final year of the course I had spare nights my priority to study first and I think it worked out for me. I've got a good secure job and I suppose as a soccer player I am blooming late. I have lost a little experience but I am trying to pick that up quickly

GS: At the beginning of the year quite a few people tipped Easts to win the XXXX League, but they are yet to hit the front. Do you think Easts can take the title and why do you think the side's form has been up and down of late?

SG: In the pre-season we had the players that we wanted for our title challenger. We had a trio up front, Geoff Maltby, Wayne Corbett and Billy McDermott that already had an understanding from Wynnum. You just can't get that by putting new players in together. We also were able to inject Phil Redmond who is a class player in the front-line. They went well and so did Easts. At the back Rod Stein and myself were going well - he's a bit of a hard man and I try to do the quiet work. Everyone was enthusiastic and confident because we had a really good combination. But then we lost some of those players because of transfer fees, I think the confidence went out of the team because the line-up wasn't like it was when we started the year. That confidence and cohesion is only starting to come back now. I think we can win the title if we can get the understanding going again. We'll work on it and I think we can take the title because man for man we have the best team in the

GS: Your two appearances for Queensland in Fiji were your first in the Maroon. How important was it to you to represent your state and how did you find the step-up in the level of football?

SG: Until the Fiji tour I had never made a representative side. As a junior, I often couldn't get to training because mum didn't have a car. People used to ask why I wasn't at titles and that type of thing, but I just couldn't make it. Financially as well it was difficult because mum was on a pension.

To be picked for Queensland was a real bonus, the highlight of my career. I always wanted to make a representative team and to make it at the top level was extra special. Playing for Queensland in Fiji was not representing the State at Under 19 or Under 16, it was the top team in Queensland. I found it a real buzz going away on tour because it was a real taste of professionalism. As far as the step-up in standard I had to concentrate for 90 minutes, you can't afford any lapses, you have to keep your mind on the job, on what's happening. I found it a valuable experience, particularly with Steve Perry there talking. I think I learned quite a bit about positional play and I feel more confident about my game now.

GS: What were your impressions of the tour to Fiji with regard to the State side, your own performance, the opposition and the manner in which the tour

was conducted?

SG: I think the squad was a good one for the style of team we had to play. think there were more skilful players left behind in Brisbane, but Bruce Stowell had to make his choices on strength because it was no good having flarey players kicked off the ball. We needed strength and the games proved that. I was disappointed that I didn't get selected for the first game but in the second and third matches I thought I went well. I made mistakes but I hope I have learned from them. I have got to have more concentration and know when to get rid of the ball but overall I was happy with my performance. As far as Fiji was concerned, they had a few skilful players but mostly it was kick and rush. They had a lot of strength and speed and we always had to have cover. Defensively I thought we did quite well until the last game when we made a few mistakes and weer penalised for it. The tour was conducted very well, both the administration and the coaching side. It was very professional, but I guess it had to be. They took great care of us, given good food and made sure we were as best prepared as possible for each

GS: Now that you have made a Queensland team, do you think you need to play National League to maintain that place and why, when approaches were made by Lions earlier this year, did

you opt to stay at Easts?

SG: Now that I have made the State team believe the next step is to go National League. It's no use staying in the XXXX League forever because the only way I can keep improving is to go forward. I can't stay static while the interest is there. I've got to keep moving and that means giving National League a go next year. I will have

Brisbane Lions coach Juan Cutillas has set his side a target of 22 points to avoid relegation from the National League.




