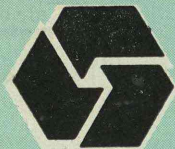

# GO SOCCER

The annual interstate clash with New South Wales at Perry Park on Monday, June 13, will be Queensland's only chance to see in action some of the players who will wear the green and gold for Australia at the Seoul Olympics soccer tournament.

Blues coach Alan Vest is expected to name his squad later this week for the annual clash and it is certain to contain many of the Sydney-based Socceros who earlier this year won the Oceania Olympic qualifying series.

Those players include former Queenslanders Frank Farina, fellow striker Graham Arnold, defenders Wally Savor and Graham Jennings and former Socceroo captain John Kosmina. They are set to become the best known Australian soccer stars since the 1974 Socceros who went to the World Cup in West Germany.

With next month's Gold Cup being the Socceros official warm-up for the Olympics, and no matches scheduled for Brisbane, this will be the only opportunity to see Australian soccer's first Olympians since 1956.

Socceroo coach Frank Arok also has indicated he will attend the interstate game, and although he appears settled on his squad for Seoul, it will be a chance for Queensland players to push their claims for selection in the squad which will play the first World Cup qualifying games against Fiji in November and December.

Queensland coach Bruce Stowell was expected to announce his 14-man squad this week, but will have only limited preparation before the June 13 clash. The Maroons will train once this week and then finally next Tuesday a full week before the game.

"It is just impossible to fit in any other training sessions with Lions playing on the Saturday and the XXXX League teams having matches," Stowell said.

## DON'T BE LEFT OUT AT PERRY PARK

The Queensland Soccer Club, which offers the club facilities at Perry Park, is conducting a membership drive and wishes to advise soccer supporters of its latest policy which will apply on the interstate match day, June 13.

In accordance with Licensing Commission rules, only members and their guests are permitted unrestricted access to the club facilities, which includes the bar, on match days.

But QSF officials have introduced a new membership rate which makes it easier for soccer followers to become QSC members. Associate club membership can be obtained through all QSF clubs at just \$15, if 10 people join at once. Full club membership costs \$25.

The offer is great value considering the improvements made at Perry Park recently, including air conditioning, painting, new cei-

ling tiles and the refurbishing of the club bar.

Those who are not members and wish to use the club bar on match days will be asked to pay a \$2 viewing fee. Those who chose to pay the viewing fee will be working towards paying their membership as a record of all payments will be kept and will accumulate towards the membership fee.

QSC treasurer Roger Marshall told Go Soccer that his committee regretted any inconvenience the new policy may cause Perry Park patrons on the day of the interstate match, but action had to be taken.

## WEST MORETON ARE CHAMPS!

West Moreton gained three players in the Queensland squad to attend the nationals in Darwin after winning the State Secondary Schools soccer championship at Dittmer Park last week.

West Moreton, under the guidance of coach Wayne Warren, beat Darling Downs 3-0 in the final — after Downs missed two penalties. The region then had Craig Thompson, Michael Tankosic and Troy Cranney named in the state squad.

Thompson, who plays in QSF football with Coalstars, was named player of the carnival.

West Moreton's scorers in the final were Alexia Cortereal, Anthony Tangkatania and Robert Hansberry. West reached the final only after a dramatic and exciting semi-final against Peninsula. The scores were 1-1 after 90 minutes and 2-2 after extra-time. The first five penalties in the shootout ended 4-4 after the Peninsula keeper saved West Moreton's fifth attempt, which could have been a winner. West then won 7-6 on penalties when the shootout went to sudden-death.

Peninsula beat Wide Bay 2-1 in the play-off for third. In the girls' tournament held at Runaway Bay, Brisbane North defeated Central Queensland 3-2 in the final.

## EDITORIAL

**Speculation on the possible imminent departure of Queensland soccer's two most prominent administrators hopefully will prompt others to consider what they can offer the sport.**

QSF executive director Alan Vessey is widely tipped to take over from Brian Emery in the ASF office while QSF president Ian Brusasco is among the leading candidates for the new ASF chairmanship or presidency. While any moves are at this stage no more than speculation, Queensland soccer as a whole must start considering whether there are others who can eventually take over, either in the immediate future or even quite a few more years down the line.

Between them, Brusasco and Vessey have become synonymous with Queensland soccer in the eyes of those in the corporate and media world — naturally enough in the positions they hold.

But it is all too easy for others in the code to sit back and enjoy the ride. Perhaps the time is fast approaching when someone else will have to do the fine work done by the pair over the past decade and more.

Brusasco, along with those on his management committee, has taken a lot of criticism over the years but their efforts have given Queensland soccer the greatest stability and

growth of any state.

Similarly, Vessey with the assistance of his fellow Perry Park workers and in particular in recent times, Jim Gilbert, has given Queensland soccer the reputation of one of the best-run and most organised sports in Australia.

No-one is irreplaceable, but to remove two vital cogs from the intricate network of administration could see the wheels fly off Queensland soccer. Brusasco and Vessey cannot be denied the opportunities of advancing to ASF level if the door opens and that direction is their wish.

What Queensland soccer must do is use its greatest resource, and that is the number of people involved, to unearth persons of adequate ability and drive to fill any QSF vacancies which may arise, in the next month or the next decade.

A continual flow of quality administrators can only work in the code's favour, whether they are thrust sooner rather than later into the QSF or bide their time gaining experience on the management committee or at club level.

## ACROSS MY DESK

But the family tickets are available only on a pre-sale basis and **WILL NOT BE AVAILABLE** at Perry Park

on the day of the match. Normal full admission prices will be charged on Monday, June 13.

Anyone wanting a family ticket can purchase them through their club or at the QSF office at Perry Park prior to match day.

The annual interstate clash is one of the biggest games on the Queensland soccer calendar and is a game not to be missed. With the soccer Olympians in action, a family ticket makes it a great value day as well.

## TALKING

**The promotion-relegation play-offs have added new interest to the end of the English season and perhaps it is something the QSF should consider.**

It seems a little unfair that in every division from second down it is two up, two down. I can understand that for reasons of stability and fairness to those clubs that have outlaid money on facilities rather than players, that there is only one team relegated from the XXXX League.

But there are clubs developing at the moment and the one-team relegation policy is only proving to keep some teams in the XXXX League when they don't deserve to be there. And there are more than a handful of clubs in division two ready and able to take their place.

Some teams in the XXXX League have been given their place without earning it, while others have made only token attempts to meet the criteria set down for XXXX League clubs.

They are playing an unentertaining, desperate brand of football aimed solely at finishing that one place above the relegation spot. A number of clubs in this year's XXXX League will consider their season to have been successful if they come 11th instead of 12th.

And that's killing the competition.

Ideally I believe two up two down should be introduced, but as a compromise I think the division two champions should be promoted automatically, the 12th XXXX League team relegated automatically and a home and away play-off be introduced for the division two runners-up and the 11th team in the XXXX League.

At the very least it will keep one more team in the XXXX League honest and at best give one of the budding clubs in division two, which for interest and entertainment is a far better league this year than the top division, a crack at XXXX League.

**Someone's not telling the truth somewhere . . .**

The Australian Soccer Federation is unable to attract Diego Maradona here for the Gold Cup despite reportedly offering him a lucrative cash bonus and a Barrier Reef holiday.

Yet the Fiji Football Association claims to have Maradona lined up for a four-day stay at \$4500 a day.

I hope for the ASF's sake that Maradona doesn't turn up in Suva. It would make us look real amateurs and nobodies in world soccer.

**Teams might buzz up and down the middle rungs of the table fairly regularly under the three-points for a win scheme, but at the top and bottom of the division where it really matters, I don't think it makes a shred of difference.**

But a points system introduced by the Turkish Federation has proved a great success in prompting attacking football. Teams which play a scoreless draw get no points. Rewards only go to those that score goals.

I think that's a great idea!

**The Queensland Secondary Schools soccer should re-think its selection policies.**

To exclude players from the school-boy state team because they did not attend the state titles is stone-age mentality.

A number of top class schoolboys, who have played for their schools and in regional trials, were in action at Perry Park on Saturday night and could easily have been watched with a view to the state team before it was announced on Sunday.

What if player of the carnival Craig Thompson had been injured in the first minute of his first game at the titles? Would he have been ruled out of the nationals in Darwin in August!

This week's guest tipster is Brisbane Lions and Queensland goalkeeper, Jason Kearton. Last week's guest, Rochedale's Steve Donald, scored a success rate of 38%. The success rate, including that in the guests' column, is a progressive average.

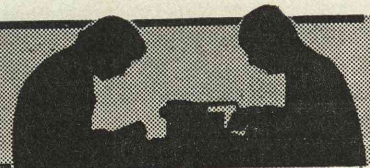
in the NSW and Victoria sides.

## FACE TO FACE.



WITH IPSWICH UNITED COACH, FRED ROBINS

**GO SOCCER:** You have been out of top men's senior soccer for several years. What prompted your return and has much changed?

**FRED ROBINS:** I don't think the standard is quite as high (as before). I have always been trying to get back, even though I was with the women's side. I answered advertisements two or three times, but had no success.

**GS:** The Ipswich rep. team was soundly beaten by Brisbane last week. Is Ipswich soccer that far behind Brisbane at the moment, and what needs to be done at Ipswich United and Coalstars to restore Ipswich soccer to its former greatness?

**FR:** When I was at Ipswich before they had a glut of youngsters, quality youngsters that I don't see there this time. While I believe Coalstars have a lot of youngsters, it is not to the depth of before. The Coalstars youngsters come from far and wide and not from Ipswich. What's happened to the youngsters, I don't really know, but I intend to find out.

**GS:** In the years that you were not involved in top men's soccer, what were your impressions of the local and national competitions from the sidelines and do you think both leagues have developed in the right direction?

**FR:** The NSL has not developed as much as I thought it would. Some of the teams have improved, players individually have improved but there are a lot of teams in the NSL that are not much better than the local competitions in Sydney and Melbourne. The XXXX League is a lot slower than it used to be in playing the ball around. Individually, the players are moving faster, but the ball is not going faster. The players should be slow and the ball faster. That is the problem but I don't know the reason. I do not think the individual skills are there,

teams are much more organised at the back which makes it more difficult and the attacking from midfield doesn't seem to be as predominant as when I was with Mt. Gravatt.

**GS:** The Australian women's team this week plays in the world invitation tournament under the guidance of John Doyle. Are you disappointed you were replaced as Australian women's coach and how do you think the women will go?

**FR:** I am bitterly disappointed. I put three years into it and I felt I was just beginning to mould a team that now has been decimated. I didn't have the best players, the NSW players were not available to me. John Doyle comes in and he has nine NSW players, six from one club. I think the Australian team is in for a bit of a shock because the girls that are there, apart from three or four who went to Taiwan are all new. In the three years that I was involved the gap between us and overseas has broadened. We are now back to the same level we were three years ago whereas overseas the standard has increased in leaps and bounds.

**GS:** The standard of the Brisbane-Ipswich women's match last week was not as impressive as the same game last year. Is Queensland women's soccer developing and what steps should be taken in local women's soccer to ensure continued growth on and off the field?

**FR:** It's not developing because they insist on putting any team that has two players with first grade experience in the First Division. That drags the standard down. Players also chop and change clubs too much. Easts have maintained a steady carry on of players and are the only steady team, the others have come and gone. Coalstars were a tremendous team last year that has now disintegrated. That's the problem in women's soccer. They must stabilise and if you are in First Division you must stay there until you get relegated.

There is much truth in the old saying "It's goals that count", as Toowong found to their cost against Brothers last week.

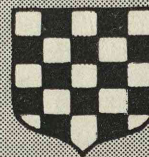

But the most crucial moment might well have been as early as the 10th minute when a good run by left-winger Trevor Bray set up Toowong's clearest chance of the game, which was missed.

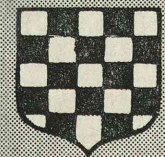

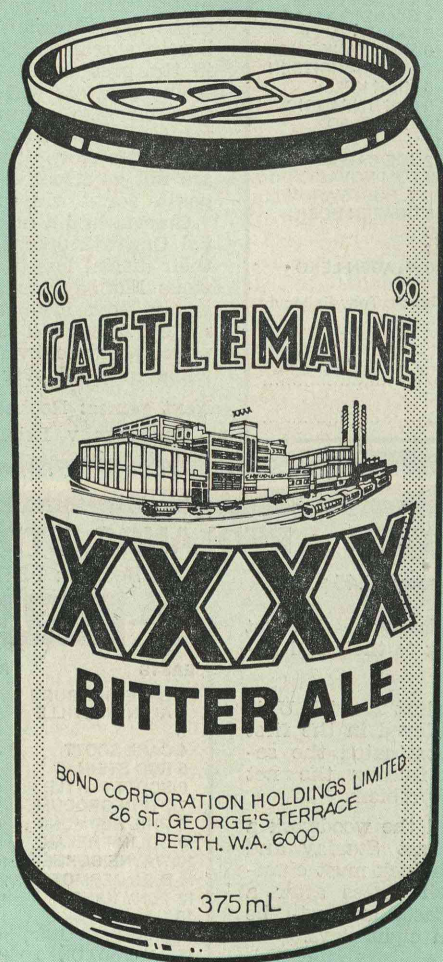
