



Former Redlands Colts keeper Alf Lasen has used the annual Thiess-Lufthansa West German soccer tour as a springboard to a budding career with VFB Stuttgart.

Lasen was signed by the club after he was spotted during last year's clinic at the Hennef Sports School near Cologne. Last month the 16-year-old kept a clean sheet for his team in a European Under 16 club competition and was a ball boy at the European Cup final.

This year's tour will again be staged in October with another planned for March next year. Those players on the tour will also participate in a tournament against West German teams at Hoechst.

Full details on this year's tour, the tournament — which is open to all teams, and a coupon to complete for more details will be published in next week's edition of Go Soccer.

The workshop has been organised by marketing and management consultants, Touche Ross, who have been engaged by the Queensland Soccer Federation to do a study on the code in this state.

Workshop co-ordinator, Mr. Ian Cooke, hopes representatives from every facet of the code will attend the day-long activity from which Touche Ross will compile a report highlight the code's strengths and weaknesses.

It is from that plan that the QSF is likely to formulate future policies. "The ball is really in the court of everyone in soccer. I would like to think we could get maybe 50 to 70 people there," Cooke said.

Cooke is looking for representatives from areas within the code including administration, at club, regional and federation level, coaching, referees, women's soccer, junior players, the media and supporters.

"Anyone who doesn't send a representative along to the workshop obviously is not interested in the future direction of the code and as such perhaps should not be involved in the policy-making decisions," Cooke said.

Cooke said the workshop would be held in a relaxed, informal manner. Those attending would be divided into discussion groups.

"The principle function will be to find out what the representatives from each area within soccer see as their main problems and what they consider are the overall faults of the code," Cooke said.

QSF president Ian Brusasco has urged all sections of the code to support the workshop. "This is a chance for those within the code to come forward and say their piece," Brusasco said

Those wishing to attend the workshop are urged to contact the QSF Office at Perry Park and register their name. The workshop, which will include lunch, starts at 8.30 a.m.

DANNY GIVES A WARNING

South Melbourne captain, Danny Wright has warned any Queensland-based players thinking of heading south to be wary before they make the move.

"Obviously a move south can be a big boost for a player's career, but not all southern clubs are as rosy as they appear." Wright said.

"My advice would be to any player considering about a move south now to forget it — until the end of the season. Any club genuinely keen to sign a player and do the right thing by him will be just as interested than as what they appear now."

Wright said he already had heard a number of Melbourne and Sydney clubs had their eyes on one or two Lions players, but he urged the Queenslanders to put the approaches out of their minds.

"The Lions players have got to try and win as many of their remaining games as possible. As a team they may or may not escape relegation, as individuals they certainly have their reputations on the line," he said.

"Any player seen to be playing well in the last weeks of the season will have a better chance of getting a top contract than one who just goes through the motions because all hope is lost."

Wright said he was enjoying his football as much as ever and has set himself personal targets as much as

Results in three major competitions this season should prompt some of the state's leading clubs to take a long, hard look at themselves.

In the National League, Brisbane Lions' plight has highlighted how far our top club has slipped behind others in the south. Results in the XXXX League and Ampol Cup suggest the leading local clubs also may be kidding themselves.

It is a sad reflection on the standard of the QSF's flag-bearer competition that, two games into the second round, the premiership is a two horse race, and more alarmingly, no less than seven teams are still playing under the threat of relegation.

Furthermore, how much progress have we made in Brisbane when two of our top sides travel to Townsville for Cup matches and are outplayed by North Queensland — a region quickly dismissed when the state's top club go looking for players. Similarly, the efforts of teams like Gold Coast, Toowoomba and Nerang in the Ampol Cup, and the exit of half the XXXX League clubs in the first round, indicate that four years after the restructuring, the much hoped for development has not taken place.

After a bumper season in 1987, the code has stagnated in 1988.

The reasons are probably as involved as the problems. Perhaps we all got carried away with last season and believed that in arresting the previous halt that progress would naturally follow. But in the code's present climate, the development curve which appeared to have bottomed and was finally on the rise, could head downwards once again.

That frightening possibility makes the Touche Ross workshop at Perry Park on Saturday, August 13, the most critical meeting called by the QSF in years. The consultancy company has been employed to take an outsider's view of Queensland soccer. By al sections of the code airing their thoughts, the company will be able to pinpoint our strengths and weaknesses. A viable and exciting plan for the future should result.

A cold, hard opinion from the outside appears what is needed to awaken some sections of our game from the present state of dreaming and inactivity.

FACETO

WITH NEW BRISBANE LIONS NATIONAL LEAGUE COACH FRANK LIDDELL

GO SOCCER: How difficult was it to take over as coach under the current circumstances and what do you hope to achieve for the remainder of the

FRANK LIDDELL: Obviously it was very difficult to take over under the circumstances. My first aim was to beat South Melbourne to begin our escape from relegation. But getting beaten makes that a whole lot harder. I guess now my aim has to be to get things organised for next season.

GS: How did you see your first game as the Lions coach and was it a frust-

rating experience?

FL: It was frustrating only in that could see us repeatedly making basic mis-takes in the first half but could not get the message across. I had a go at them at halftime and we played a lot better after the break. I thought we could have buried them in the second half. It was definitely a game of two halves and possibly I gave the wrong instructions when I sent them out first, Frank Cole for instance was ending up almost playing at leftback because he was following his man back rather than the defence shuffling across to pick up the runner. I had a bit of a go at them at halftime and changed the instructions and we went well. But until we stop making simple errors, we will make it very difficult for ourselves to win, let alone what the opposition does.

GS: You have indicated you intend to make a playing comeback and as such will be a player-coach. What do you say to the critics who say player-coaches never work and why do you think you can succeed?

FL: I think in the position I play at the back, I can see the whole game. It's okay critics saving a player-coach is no good, but I think if a player's is in a position to see the whole game then he is in a position to coach. He can see what's happening around him. As I found out from Bill Monteverde last Sunday, you're not allowed to coach from the bench anyway, so maybe

it's better I coach from the park. GS: Why hasn't the club been competitive this year and what needs to be done at Lions to make them a successful NSL outfit?

FL: At the start of the season, money was a big problem. We had to buy players, but even so, now we find ourselves in the situation where we only have 13 players. It's obvious we didn't have a strong enough pool of players from the word go. To be successful if we get the chance again we will have to build a strong squad of players. And to do that in the NSL you have got to compete with money. We didn't do it and we've ended up in the position we're in.

GS: A number of your players are certain to be approached by other NSL and XXXX League clubs at the end of the season. What policy will you advise the club to adopt?

FL: We've got the best players in Queensland and the wise thing would be for other clubs in Queensland to approach our players because we've got better players than what they've got. But no-one did us too many favours when we went looking for players this year and I can't see us forgetting that for a while. As far as the NSL is concerned, If I am coach next year, if players don't want to stay with this club and want to go south, then I would be asking big transfer fees for them to get some money in and build a strong squad that could win the XXXX League and get back into the NSL.

GS: If you return to the XXXX League, how important will the representative games be in retaining players and maintaining a high standard at the club, and to what extent would you like to see the QSF arrange games for the Queensland team?

FL: Participating in representative foot-ball was difficult for us this year being in the national league. But if we are in the XXXX League next year it will be a lot easier to play representative games because the league will be structured around those games. This year we played representative matches and league games within a few days of each other which may have taken a little of the gloss off it. If the QSF can organise an appealing representative calendar next season, then I think it will help Lions keep some of the club's better players in Queensland. And that will help the state as a whole, not just Lions.


