

GO SOCCER

The QSF Council of Clubs, in making on Tuesday night what was labelled a "suicide vote", have assured the future progress of Queensland soccer.


That's the opinion of QSF president Ian Brusasco who was "pleasantly surprised" by the overwhelming support for the mid-season notice of motion put to the special general meeting at Perry Park.

The constitutional change will result in two teams being relegated from the XXXX League at the end of the season if Lions come back from the NSL and another Queensland team does not gain National League promotion.

A 75 percent majority was required for the notice of motion to become constitutional. Despite weeks of speculation the "yes" voters clearer outnumbered the five "no" voters, which included four XXXX League clubs.

Brusasco believes the decision, which effectively adverts yet another format change to the state's top division, has assured the code stability at a time when other footballs are struggling to maintain viable local competitions.

"Other codes are not faring as well as we are. The involvement in national competitions is killing their local set-ups," Brusasco said. "We have plotted our survival and this vote will

ensure that we are a solid unit with continuity."

Surprisingly, the special general meeting took just 36 minutes. After the motion was put, only scant debate followed. Valley Trident's Nick Hrechka claimed the notice of motion was asking clubs "to cut their own throats". Grange Thistle delegate Wallace Dann questioned the wording of the latter part of the notice of motion, but after obtaining a commitment of intent from the chair, spoke in favour of the motion. Beenleigh's Eileen Green questioned whether the change would in any way flow on to the lower divisions and appeared satisfied to learn that the withdrawal of Lions' team in Division Two would prevent any dominoeffect down the divisions.

Brusasco could well have won the vote with a final plea to the clubs to "think of football' before casting their vote. "We should have gone straight to the clubs when this matter was foreshadowed in December last year. But some people felt it would have been unfair for Lions to start talking about their relegation and coming back when they were about to embark on a new National League season," Brusasco said.

"It's an emotive issue and we realise we are asking some clubs to vote for suicide. But I want you tonight to think of football before you vote".

THOSE NORTHERN BOYS ARE BACK HUNTING THE CUP

Memories of the powerful Townsville Kern United State League of the early 80's have been revived by North Queensland's game run in the Ampol Cup this season.

Townsville Kern swept all before them in 1982 to win the League-Cup double and were Queensland soccer's boom team of the decade. Now a tough and exciting North Queensland Federation team is flying the northern flag.

The Northerners take on another classy regional side in Gold Coast in the 1 p.m. game of a Cup semifinal double-header at Perry Park on Saturday afternoon. The other semi-final sees a clash between XXXX League sides North Star and Mount Gravatt at 3 p.m.

Full team details for both games are on Pages 17-19. While the players in the two XXXX League side are well-known to Brisbane soccer fans, Go Soccer this week has published pen pictures of the visiting regional players on pages 18 and 19.

These efforts of the Socceroos in the opening matches of the Gold Cup should prompt all Queenslanders to swallow their parochial pride and say: "Well done, Frank Arok".

Few have been more critical of the national coach than this column. Yet the attacking displays of the Socceroos against Brazil and Saudi Arabia and the competent allround showing of Arok's squad members indicate that many of the things he has said in the past have been correct. Indeed, there are no Queensland-based players currently playing consistently well enough to be considered for a place in the current national side.

But in congratulating Arok and his team, the principle of past criticisms should not be lost. If given the same chances offered to those southern-based players over the past two years, perhaps some Queenslanders may have developed into more than capable Socceroo players.

Just because Arok has achieved success with his current team, which includes no Queensland-based players, he should not continue to ignore the state as a breeding ground for potential national team members.

As national coach, Arok should attend the annual interstate game. He should also maintain a regular contact with State coach Bruce Stowell, in addition to his own Queensland-based scouts. Australia is a vast country, which makes scouting an enormous task. But the competition for footballing talent is far more intense than in many other countries where soccer is often their only code played. If Australian soccer hopes to build on the success of this week, Arok can leave no stone unturned when looking to develop his team beyond the Olympics.

In building an entertaining and success national soccer team, Arok has won back many lost fans in Queensland soccer. Throughout the State, support for the Soccero's Olympic bid is growing as the Games approach. Queenslanders recognise Arok and his team as winners.

Hopefully in the future, Arok will recognise Queensland.

In a statewide competition such as the Ampol Cup, and given that neither Queensland nor Australian soccer enjoys the financial drawing power of the game in some other countries, it is just not economically viable to extend the competition beyond the current format.

I am sure few clubs would support any moves to reduce prizemoney so as to finance extra matches on the way to the final.

The Ampol Cup under its current format is a successful competition. The sudden death nature of the

semi-finals at Perry Park on Saturday will be part of what is certain to be an exciting Cup atmosphere.

The Saturday afternoon doubleheader, scheduled to avoid a direct clash with the live telecast of the Gold Cup final on Sunday, also should prove to be an interesting experiment into whether it is a viable future match timeslot.

But I am sure the public response would be less if this weekend's matches were only the first of a twolegged series.

FACE FACE

WITH QSF PRESIDENT, IAN BRUSASCO

GO SOCCER: Following the acceptance of the notice of motion at the special general meeting, Queensland soccer can now return to the same successful set-up of last season. What needs to be done at Federation and club level to ensure we regain the momentum we seemed to have lost this season?

IAN BRUSASCO: I don't think we have completely lost the momentum this season. I think soccer in Queensland of all the codes has survived best against national competitions. Our XXXX League means more than the B.R.L. or the Q.A.F.L. competitions. To talk about returning to a successful format, we should not forget that one of our teams may successfully seek promotion to the NSL. I have always been very conscious that we must protect our top competition here in Queensland for the good of football. If there is a successful National competition then I think we must subjugate our local competition. Until I can see that happening I think it is very important that we keep going the way we are going. I am so delighted that the clubs (in supporting the notice of motion) have decided on sanity. It showed the clubs really love football. Some of them voted suicide and I admire them for it.

GS: The selection criteria which was such a critical part of the restructuring of five years ago appears to have slipped into the background. How much longer will the management committee give the leading clubs to meet all sections of that criteria or is it no longer possible to enforce the high standard originally desired?

IB: Our level of expectation and the level of expectation of the clubs was quite different when we did the re-structuring. Some of us were dreaming that our expectation was their expectation and they wanted to achieve these heights. When we start talking about clubs putting thousands and tens of thousands of dollars into structures and grounds, I think they need some security. We can ask clubs to spend too much money and then they find themselves out of the competition. I have always said that in Australia to have promotion and relegation is to slavishly follow overseas methods. It coesn't necessarily work here. If we are going to expect very high standards at clubs grounds, then we have got to give them some sort of guarantee. In the restructuring, we tried to restrict the number of semi-professional teams. We will accept minimal standards because I think our level of expectation may have been a little high.

GS: How important to Queensland soccer's future is the August 13 workshop and to what extent will it influence future QSF policy?

IB: I believe over the past 28 years since the federation was formed through a revolution, we have been trying in our own way to fix things up. Now I believe we are going into the 90's and we have to be progressive. We have got to have a direction. Having tried restructuring and using internal people, with the clubs a little fearful of what we were doing, let's now bring in a top company like Touch Ross to say "These are problems, this is what soccer stands for, these are the set of criteria". I would be idealistic if I thought they could come up with all the answers and we could set our course on that and stay there. I think they will identify all our problems because they are an independent body who are not emotionally involved like some of us. I am hoping a very wide cross section of people come along and try to identify where soccer is today, where it wants to go in the future and what is the best path. I am hoping the professionals with their computers will set a better path

GS: What has the QSF learned from Lions' involvement in the NSL this year and what policy would the Federation adopt if another Queensland team gains a place in the National League?

IB: The Queensland Soccer Federation has put forward a policy in which we believed for a National League to be successful in Australia, it has to be made up of teams that are franchised, who have some stability and are able to stay there. I am not wanting to be unkind to teams in our XXXX League which have ambitions, but any other team that goes in the same way Lions went in has got to have problems. It has got to be a Queensland-based team that the public will recognise as a Queensland team.

Any success of the Broncos is because it is a Queensland or Brisbane team, completely independent. I guess it can be said now that I had preliminary talks with Lions and if they had survived this year, we would have completely restructured their NSL bid. You need a leader and someone who will do a lot of hard work. I don't believe the Federation can do it. I don't think the Federation can take money from the clubs to do it either. It has got to be completely independent and company-structured body, saying we are going to be in this National League and we are going to be fair dinkum. It needs directors with money. National League involvement can be a marketable product if we market it correctly.

TOP marks all round — that was the verdict on Toowong after an impressive 3-1 win over Pine Hills that was much more emphatic than the scoreline suggests.

Revolting Napoli Players Fined!

Sixteen Napoli players, including Brazilian striker Careca, have been fined by Italian authorities for staging a revolt against Manager Ottavio Bianchi last season.

Napoli's captain, Argentina's World Cup skipper Diego Maradona, was not among the 16 as he stayed out of the dispute.

The revolt against Bianchi, who led the club to its first league title in 1987, climaxed a disastrous season for Napoli, which ended runner-up to Ruud Gullit's AC Milan after frittering away a commanding lead in the final stages.

The players showed their feelings against Bianchi before the penultimate match of the season with a statement disowning the manager and blaming him for the team's poor performance. Goalkeeper Claudio Garella, widely seen as a ringlader, was handed the stiffest fine of 12 million Lire (\$A10,544) while Careca was fined eight million (\$A7,029)

Italian internationals Fernando De Napolí, Ciro Ferrara, Giovanni Francini, Fancesco Romano and Salvatore Bagni were fined between two and 10 million Lire (\$A1,757 to \$A8,787).

TO HOST A CUP, YOU NEED A TEAM

Now the United States has won the right to host the 1994 World Cup soccer finals, its top priority is to build a competitive national team.

"What has to be done is one project and one project only, and that is the development of the American National team," said Werner Fricker, the president of the US Soccer Federation.

Last week the International Football Federation (FIFA) awarded the right to stage the 1994 World Cup to the United States, which as host nation automatically qualifies for the competition. The United States has only qualified for three of 14 previous World Cups, the last time in 1950.

Fricker said it was now important to build a competitive US team for 1994 and the first step would be to qualify for the 1990 World Cup in Italy.

"It is absolutely essential to do

what is necessary for the US team to qualify for the 1990 World Cup," Fricker said. "That is step one of the development of a national team".

The United States begins qualifying competition for 1990 later this month against Jamaica in a group that also includes Canada, Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Trinidad, Costa Rica, Panama and the Netherlands Antilles.

Fricker said a professional soccer system throughout the country is in the planning stages as part of US efforts to become more competitive in the world's most popular sport. The leagues would provide a training ground for American players, Fricker said, adding that the goal is to have the system operational by the early 1990's

GS: You have been involved in soccer administration for more than 25 years, is your enthusiasm still strong and what targets remain in the game for you?

IB: I have had a lot of disappointments this season, maybe I am getting older and a bit thin-skinned or maybe I have been around too long. I would be less than honest if I didn't say I got very hurt at a couple of games when people tried to involve my family because of some of the decisions I made. My decisions I think have always been for soccer. I was involved in soccer a long time before I had family. What happens at club level I expect, but at Queensland level I found it very hurtful and particularly hurtful for my wife, who dearly loves to share soccer with me. I have got decisions to make at a national level as well as at a Queensland level. I want to see a successor come along at Queensland level. Nobody owns the Federation, it must have continuity, it must have people willing to put in the work. I know there are opportunities at the top level of the ASF. But I am a torn because of the position with Alan Vessey, who everyone knows has applied for the ASF Executive Director position. Maybe soccer could do without Alan and I. If he gets that job, I may take one course of action, if he doesn't, I may take another. Unfortunately, timing is not there for me to be making decisions. I sometimes feel in meeting every Tuesday night and discussing aftermatch incidents, I could be better serving soccer in other ways. I think my years of experience should be used in policy-making decisions, in financial matters. The Federation is financially sound, not many sports can say that. We have a structure that is a good structure. be it our office staff, our directors of coaching, our recognition of junior talent throughout the state. The structure has now brought us a lot of identification. Sometimes I still have that burning desire to achieve, and sometimes I just want to go and play


Reaching the Ampol Cup Final could be Mount Gravatt's last chance of salvaging a disappointing season.


