Queensland soccer should know within three weeks whether executive director Alan Vessey will join new Australian Soccer Federation chairman Ian Brusasco at the ASF office.

Brusasco's first decision after his election in Sydney last week was to call an executive meeting on Sunday, August 21. The agenda for the meeting is expected to include a report on the executive director position and possibly an appointment.

Vessey is among 46 applicants for the job, which became vacant following the resignation of Brian Emery last Friday after seven years at the ASF office. Brusasco this week began reading all applications for the ASF executive director position, which was advertised nationally and told Go Soccer it would be unfair for him to comment in any way until the review was completed.

But even before Brusasco's 9-8 chairmanship vote win over Victoria's Jack Reilly, Vessey was considered a hot favourite to make the step up to the national position. "I have applied just the same as all the other applicants. I am sure the ASF will select the person they think best for the job," Vessey said.

While providing a new chairman, and possibly an executive director to the ASF, is a proud honour for Queensland soccer, any thoughts that Queensland will gain preferential treatment from the national body is well off the mark.

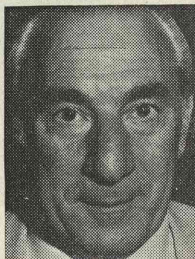
"I would hope that I am completely unbiased and I would hope that all states would get a fair deal under my chairmanship," Brusasco said.

"It's going to be sad for me to resign from the Queensland job because you have always got one maroon eye when you come from Queensland and you always order a XXXX. But this is a new challenge and anything I decide to go into, I go in to do well.

"I think we have got to look at the smaller states and listen to their problems because they are a part of Australian soccer just as much as say Sydney or Melbourne."

Retiring Brisbane Lions President John Morcus has predicted Brisbane City will need a budget of at least \$200,000 "and a lot of aspirin" if they hope to make a successful return to

the National League.

"We spent \$150,000 and had a lot of headaches to finish last," Morcus said. "It was nowhere near enough. It takes an enormous amount of money to be competitive in the National League and to be honest, I don't think clubs like Brisbane City or Lions can afford that."

Morcus, who has been with Lions for 27 years, and 22 of them as president, said he intended to step down from the club presidency. Although the Lions annual general meeting is not until next January, Morcus said he felt it more appropriate if he handed over the reins as soon as possible.

"Once the season is over, there will have to be a lot of decisions made about next season. I think it would be better if those who will be involved in the club in the future make those decisions," Morcus said.

Morcus has retired to the Gold Coast and said travelling had played a large part in his decision to step down from Lions. He also said living on the Gold Coast ruled him out of contention for the QSF presidency.

"Being president of organisations like the QSF and a big club like Lions takes an enormous amount of time and I believe you really have to be on hand at all times. Living on the Gold Coast I can't do that," Morcus said. "If I was still living in Brisbane then I might be interested in standing for the QSF job."

NEWS REPORT

DON'T BE CAUGHT PLAYING UP!

This weekend's round of fixtures begins the official qualifying period for eligibility to play in the finals series.

Club officials and in particular coaches should be well aware of the rules. The QSF Constitution states: "Players eligible to play in the Grand Final series in any division must be correctly registered in accordance with the provisions of the constitution and must not have played more than three out of the last five premiership fixtures in a higher division in that season".

The term "having played" means

taking the park. Non-playing substitutes are not deemed to have played. Similarly, playing in a higher division team in a Cup match, for instance, the Qantas Cup, does not count towards finals eligibility.

The QSF office last week sent a memo to all clubs outlining the policy. Ignorance will be no excuse and no exceptions will be made.

POINTS TO PONDER

The few spectators who turned out at Lions last weekend were entertained by the antics of one far from happy couple in the grandstand. Their bickering climaxed with him throwing her handbag across the grandstand and storming away to scowl at her from a distant position. Still, by the end of the game, they seemed to have made up and left together.

When Ian Brusasco was dumped from the ASF Vice-Presidency last year he told the Queensland Soccer Press Association function that "the pendulum will swing back". Now that it has for Ian, can it do the same for unfairly dumped former National under 16 coach, Bruce Stowell?

With a big game approaching at the weekend, the coach of one pacesetter Reserves side was quite specific to his players. "Look after your bodies and don't do anything stupid on Friday or Saturday night," he said. That Friday night, one player can't remember how he got home, another crawled in at 9.15 the next morning, went to work for an hour before sneaking out and going home while a third spent the night in the lock-up. The team drew nil-all.

EDITORIAL

The election of Ian Brusasco as Chairman of the Australian Soccer Federation comes as both a proud honour and a worrying turn of events for Queensland soccer.

No-one could deny Brusasco the opportunity to head an organisation in which he has been involved for 27 years. Australian Soccer is undergoing a transition from its cumbersome past background of growth based on ethnic strongholds to a modern day organisation competing for the interest of a vastly changed Australian sporting fan.

Brusasco is one person who is able to bridge the gap between the two eras and the ideal administrator to steer the code into the 90's. With the ASF finances reported to be in a far from happy state, Brusasco's past reputation in saving failing companies and indeed putting our own QSF back on a firm financial footing underlines he is exactly the man needed by Australian soccer at the moment.

His legacy to the code, at a national level, will undoubtedly be financial and organisational stability.

Brusasco has already done the same for Queensland soccer and his departure, brought on by the constitutional requirement to step down from the QSF presidency, has brought

on our own transitional crisis.

There is no QSF vice-president. There is yet no-one to seriously put themselves forward as the reason to fill the gaping void.

As the No. 1 administrator of the code in Queensland, Brusasco has been an easy target for the disgruntled. But few realise the behind the scenes work he has undertaken is in a totally honorary capacity. The securing of our major sponsorships and the impeccable reputation enjoyed by Queensland soccer in the business community is largely thanks to Brusasco and his ability to mix in the highest of circles and present our game in a positive and growing manner.

Can anyone else offer the same, or be prepared to put in the many, many hours solely for the love of the game? We can only hope such a person emerges, and emerges quickly.

No doubt all those critics who have attacked Brusasco in the past will skulk into hiding now that the chance to act and the need for someone new is more real than ever before.

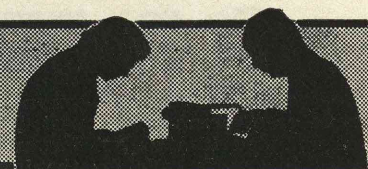
At that time, a replacement will have to be found. The position of QSF president is extremely impor-

WITH NEWLY-ELECTED AUSTRALIAN SOCCER FEDERATION CHAIRMAN IAN BRUSASCO

GO SOCCER: After losing a vice-presidency ballot at last year's ASF annual general meeting and having a traumatic year which was outlined in a previous Face to Face interview, why would you take on such an enormous task at the chairmanship of the ASF?

IAN BRUSASCO: The only reason I would take on a task such as this is that I believe at the moment I am the best person to do the job and I don't want that to sound egotistical. Any of the three people who contested the ballot, John Constantine, Jack Reilly and myself all could have done a job for the ASF. But if one looks at it, with my experience there over the last 25 years, with the loss of the president who has been there 18 years, the departure of the executive director who has been with the organisation since 1979, the thing the organisation needs is stability. I think I can offer them that. And contrary to what a lot of people think, I also have a lot of progressive views that I would like to put into operation at the ASF. I am not the dinosaur that somebody said I was.

GS: Taking over from someone who has headed Australian soccer for so long as did Sir Arthur George, what difficulties and benefits are there in being the new chairman and can you see parallels likely to be experienced in Queensland soccer when you stand down?

IB: The benefits are that I worked all those years with Sir Arthur George and I know the strengths and weaknesses of the organisation. I think it could have been time for a change and I think Arthur's timing was right. The benefits, I am yet to find them although very fortunately at the AGM we were able to restructure the organisation and that can be put into being straight away. And when we set up these committees and make them responsible and answerable, I think it will be quite a different era than when Sir Arthur was there. In Queensland soccer, I will let the new people to come in and the clubs to be the judges and decide what is going to happen. I would hope over the years I have given the organisation some guidance and I think the QSF is probably in a much healthier position than the ASF which I will inherit.

GS: What are your most pressing concerns within the ASF and what are your longer term aims and objectives for Australian soccer, particularly in relation to the Socceroos and the National League.

IB: The most pressing concern is to get an executive director. The second thing is to examine the finances and I already have asked for an up-to-date position. The third thing is that we have two marketable products, our sheer size — we have 500,000 registered players, and the Socceroos. The Socceroos have proved they are a marketable product in the Bicentennial Gold Cup. We have to take it from there. We have to make people realise that our code of football is the international code of football. If you play our code you can represent your country at world championships at under 16 and youth level, you can become an Olympian and you can play in a World Cup. Nobody else can offer that. I think the other big job is an examination of the NSL and the way its going. If the NSL is to be successful, it will be successful under the formula Queensland suggested. Under any restructuring it should be truly national with its clubs franchised so that the corporate sector if it invested its money would have some sort of guarantees. That destroys a lot of the principles under which soccer has always operated, particularly with promotion and relegation. Unless we have franchised clubs and a change of season that will make players into watchers, there is always going to be problems.

GS: The initial reaction to your election to the ASF chairmanship among some in this state was that Queensland would get a better deal nationally. Obviously in your new position you cannot show any state bias, but what does your appointment mean for Queensland?

IB: I think it's got to be an honour for Queensland that an administrator from the state was seen fit to be made chairman of the Australian Soccer Federation. I don't think it has ever happened before. I would hope that all states get a fair deal under my chairmanship. I have told the states I am prepared to go to anything they have at any time, for example, I would like to know how long it is since somebody went to Western Australia. I think a lot of states feel they are hard done by and I think we have got to have a look at that. For example, the Gold Cup. I tried to convince people down there that they should be playing a game in Queensland. With Expo on, it had to be a natural place to lay. I think we have got to try and promote away from Sydney and Melbourne at some times because some things would be better accepted in other places. Having said all that I would hope that I am completely unbiased.

'END THE ETHNIC DOMINANCE'

Roddy MacKenzie has been a thought-provoking correspondent to Go Soccer a number of times in the past. The recent debate on the Brisbane United issue has prompted him to put forward his views. In the first of a two-part letter, Roddy this week calls for the introduction of a 16-team National League with club teams from Melbourne and Sydney and federation sides from other centres.

For the first time since 1961 I find myself free from any obligation to soccer, probably the only benefit of retirement! I still love the game, undoubtedly the greatest game in the world, but unfortunately not in Australia. The recent success by the national team in the Bicentennial Gold Cup once again raised the hopes that at last soccer had arrived. But realistically (not negatively), even if we experience Olympic success and find that the national team becomes a marketable commodity, it would be remiss of us to think all our problems would be solved.

We still need a strong national competition. Currently, we have a strong Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide competition. All of this year's 14 teams either is, or started out as, an ethnic team. Australian soccer cannot survive on ethnic support alone, nor can it be governed in a way that only suits ethnic-backed clubs. Ethnic clubs have been the backbone of Australian soccer for years and must continue to be so. What needs to be added to the backbone is some flesh.

This flesh has to be regional or federation teams. Cities like Brisbane, Canberra and Newcastle must be included as perennial starters. In these cities

a single club team can no longer afford the rigorous demands of competing in the national competition on a long term basis. The federations centred in these cities must pool their resources to become a national force.

It is imperative that the base of the national competition is spread sensibly, geographically, to encourage it to take root and then develop. With Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Wollongong already established, the A.S.F. should give Brisbane, Canberra and Newcastle one year to consolidate and then be given immediate entry into the league at the expense of this year's Brisbane Lions team. This would give NSW seven representatives (including five from Sydney), Victoria would have six from Melbourne, South Australia one from Adelaide, A.C.T. one from Canberra and of course one from Brisbane.

This should be the format to take us into the 21st century, otherwise we will finish up with an inter-club championship between Sydney and Melbourne as our national competition. If the 16 club format proposed above is rejected we should seriously consider returning to an interstate competition with invited Pacific participants like the North and South Islands of New Zealand, Fiji, P.N.G. and possibly New Caledonia. We cannot afford to stand still, the other codes are leaving us behind.

If the 16 team competition was a goer, how could we organise Queensland soccer to enter a Brisbane team? There are a number of ways that this can be done but my preferred way is to have the State Director of Coaching (Bruce Stowell at the moment) select 16 players from member clubs as his squad for the season. These players would be replaced if necessary at his discretion! The Brisbane team would be located at Perry Park, and play all its home fixtures on a Saturday night with no senior fixtures allowed to be played in Brisbane on that evening.

Next week Go Soccer will publish the second part of Roddy MacKenzie's letter in which he calls for the reformation of the Ipswich and Districts Soccer Association and outlines how Queensland soccer should be restructured to allow a federation team to be formed.

Too many times at club level, people want to air their views behind officials' backs or when the coach has left. I believe it is better for all concerned if everything comes out in the open.

FACE TO FACE ...

GS: What type of person would you like to see take over the QSF presidency and what lies ahead for your local successor?

IB: I am not going to comment on who should be the next president or what type of person he should be. I saw someone suggest it should be a young, energetic person. We seem to characterise people and it is very easy to put into writing the type of person we should find. I hope the person who comes along loves soccer and is there to work for the game and to see if they can improve the lot of the clubs. My ambition in Queensland soccer was to eventually get to a stage where clubs were virtually paying no affiliation fees. We started our marketing and things like that so we could bring in an income so that it was reducing burdens on clubs. Clubs have a difficult job. Whoever my successor is, whether he is young and energetic, middle age or older, that's what I would want to see go on. There are still changes to be made in Queensland soccer and the restructuring has to go on. You can't attract good people onto the management committee and then have them sit there listening to all the rubbish stuff. But I have no doubts that there is a very bright future for the code here.

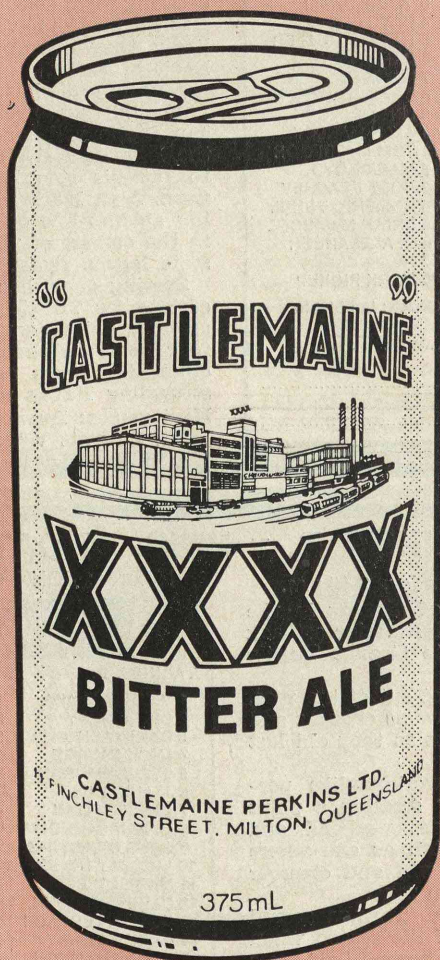
