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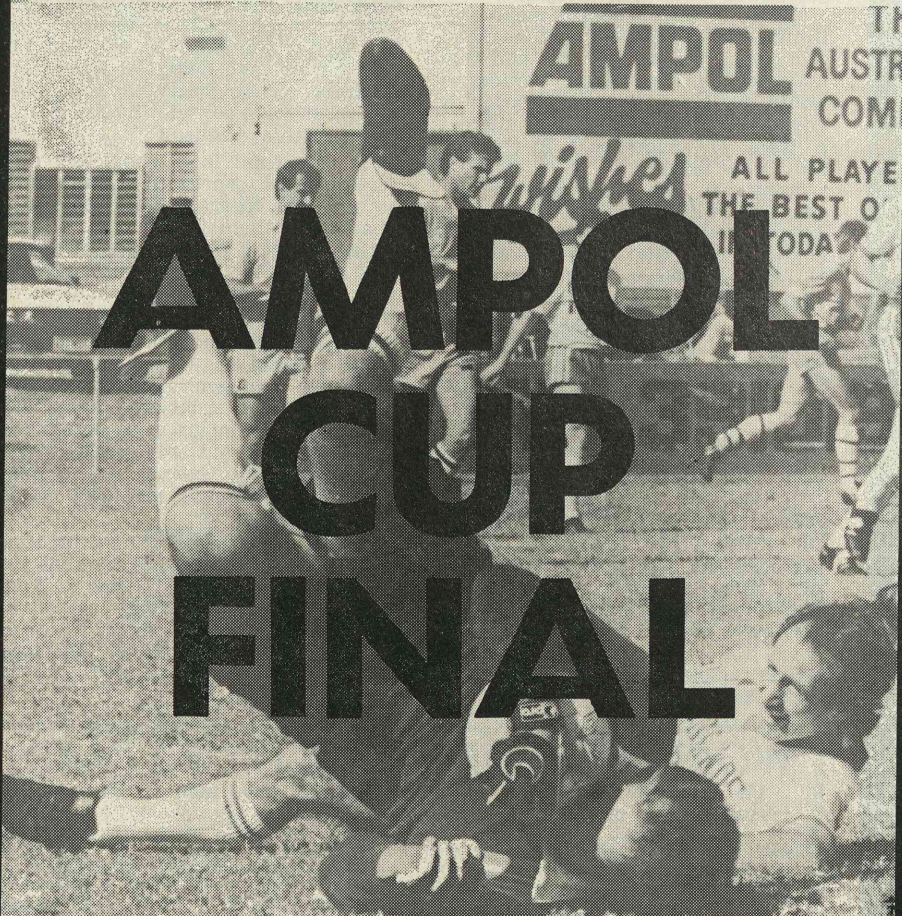

Gold Coast will abandon the region's traditional colour to wear a lucky blue strip in the Ampol Cup Final against North Star at Ashmore this Sunday.

The Gamblers wore their all gold strip in the intercity match against Brisbane early this year, but wore the all blue outfit when they began their Ampol Cup campaign against Grange Thistle three months ago.

"To be honest, it doesn't mean anything to me, but I think it might be significant for the players," said Gold Coast coach Jim Selby. "Besides, it would be silly to change now," he added, hinting that perhaps there is a trace of superstition in the ice-cool Selby mould.

Selby has put enormous preparation in winning the Gold Coast's first Ampol Cup. Since the two teams qualified for the final by beating North Queensland and Mount Gravatt respectively, Selby has watched North

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Star in three XXXX League matches. He walked away smiling from two and with a frown from the other.

"I was very impressed with North Star in their match with Easts, even though they lost," Selby said. "It was probably the best XXXX League game I have seen in a long while. The match was played at an extremely fast pace, yet the level of skill stayed quite high."

Selby chose not to watch North Star last weekend when they suf-

fered their worst defeat this season, losing 4-1 to Olympic United. The defeat was the third on the trot for North Star, but Selby is completely ignoring North Star's current League form when considering his team's chances this weekend.

"A Cup final is a completely different match. North Star know how to play the big games and this is a chance for them to get back on the rails," he said. "We have to just go out and play to our plan. I know we can play good football. It's a matter of the players believing in themselves."

The Gamblers advance to the Ampol Cup Final has been a great boost for their sponsors, Jupiters Casino. The Conral International has given the team a room to meet before the game. Selby said his team would assemble at the Casino, have a relaxing pre-match talk and then go to the game together.

This weekend is only the third time in the Cup's 30-year history that the final has been played outside of Brisbane. The match will be played at the Southport Soccer Club, which is located in Mualla Drive, Ashmore. The game kicks-off at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday.

WORKSHOP OFF TO FLYING START

The soccer workshop has got off to a flying start with an enormous response from all sections of the code.

Socceroo Frank Farina, who starred in the recent Gold Cup and is heading for the Seoul Olympics, will sign autographs during his special guest appearance at this weekend's Ampol Cup Final.

The former Queenslander is returning home to help promote the Cup, in which he played when he was a State League player with Mareeba.

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"The great thing about the Ampol Cup is that it gives country players the chance to go all the way and pit themselves against some of the best-known names in the state," Farina said. "I think it is great for Queensland soccer and Ampol that a regional team like the Gold Coast and a top XXXX League side should reach the final.

Farina, who starred for the Socceroos in the Gold Cup and has scored 23 goals in 58 Australian appearances, urged youngsters to attend the match.

Farina will make special appearances on the Gold Coast on Saturday and will sign autographs at the game on Sunday. As one of soccer's first Olympians in more than 30 years, his signature is one to be prized.

Sporting bodies which put their hands out for sponsorship monies should realise their obligations once a cash backer is secured.

Gone are the days when sport sponsorships were little more than donations. Companies backing sport are involved as a business interest aimed at increasing their sales.

To be associated with Ampol Petroleum through the statewide Ampol Cup for 30 years is a proud achievement for Queensland soccer. But it is one, despite its extraordinary duration, that can never be taken lightly. Every section of Queensland soccer should do its part to support a valuable sponsor like Ampol.

The commitment to a sponsor must go further than just the major backers of the code. At association and club level, organisations of differing sizes have shown faith in soccer and put money into the game. We should not just take that money and run.

All the ideas will be compiled by independent consultants, Touche Ross. Their final analysis is certain to make interesting reading.

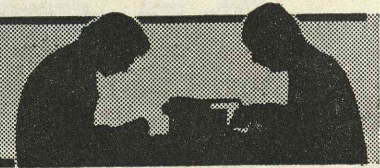

WITH GOLD COAST GAMBLERS COACH, JIM SELBY

GO SOCCER: What has been the secret behind the Gold Coast Gamblers success in the Ampol Cup this year and why do you think you can win the final?

JIM SELBY: The reason for the success of the representative team is that we have got a bunch of players that want to work hard for each other and are prepared to understand the system we play, believe in the system, believe in themselves and play for the team. Whenever we train and work at the game, they put 100 percent effort in. They believe that what we are doing is the right thing to suit the amount of players we have got and the type of players we have got in the team. If you have got team members that believe in that, then you tend to get success.

GS: You have watched North Star play three times over the past month. What do you consider their strengths and weaknesses?

JS: I think you have got to rate North Star as the most consistent club side in the last five years. They have been in the Ampol Cup Final four out of five times, they have figured in premierships and finals. I think their strength is they play for 90 minutes, they never give up. I have seen them down a number of times in the Ampol Cup and come back time after time, purely because they put pressure on teams for the whole 90 minutes and never give up. That's probably their strength. Weaknesses? They tend to throw a lot of people forward and might be a little vulnerable if they throw too many forward.

GS: As an outsider who has watched XXXX League games this year, what is your opinion of the competition and what areas need to be looked at?

JS: To be quite honest, the XXXX League has a top five, and then there is the bottom. I have watched a number of sides play at the top level and at times I get pretty disappointed at the quality of the games and the players in that game. I am not really sure what to do about it. Maybe it is that way because there are so many teams, you have to have four teams to be in the premier league. Maybe clubs are spreading their resources over a lot of teams rather than concentrating on quality of their number one side. There needs to be consistency in the XXXX League so there is say eight or 10 top teams, rather than the five that we've currently got.

GS: Is the time right for a Gold Coast team to play in the XXXX League and

what would be the problems and repercussions of such a move?

JS: I think over the last couple of years we have had the players down here to produce a fairly competitive XXXX League team. The main problem we have got is that you have to have teams in four XXXX grades. Taking four teams out of the local competition would devastate it. The other problem is who would want to travel to Brisbane every second week to play in the third and fourth teams? I don't know if we could field enough players to be part of the XXXX League.

GS: Did the selection of Paul Cockbain in the Queensland team which toured Fiji provide any sort of boost for Gold Coast soccer and are there other players on the coast with higher representative potential?

JS: I think looking over this year, we have had a number of state players in the juniors. The only area we didn't have state representation was in the seniors. Now the QSF has given us the opportunity to push for state selection through the intercity series, everyone on the coast realises they can play in the competition down here and still get state team selection, which I think is marvellous.

GS: Has being involved with coaching women's soccer helped or hindered your career and what are your future plans in this area?

JS: I don't think it has hindered it at all. As director of coaching my job comes into seniors, juniors, women, coaching coaches. It's just another avenue of the work that I have to do. I found it enjoyable in respect that the women work very hard to achieve results. I think I would like to continue that role because we have some quality women's players and Australia is going to go a long way.

GS: Are you content with being a regional director of coaching or do you have plans to move into other areas of soccer?

JS: I think everyone should look to progress. Sometimes after coming back from overseas, I look at Australian soccer and think if I am really fair dinkum about soccer, should I stay here because of the amount of assistance overseas and the people who help you overseas entices you to go somewhere else. But being an Australian, I would like to see the game continue to develop here, I would like to get to the top. I don't know whether being an Australian will hinder or help me in the future. But obviously I would like to advance myself.

The Gold Coast Gamblers progress to the Ampol Cup Final has been tremendous for Queensland soccer, but North Star will win at Ashmore on Sunday.

Gamblers coach Jim Selby could not have hoped for a worse result last weekend than Olympic thumping North Star 4-1. It was North Star's third defeat in a row. They won't lose four on the trot.

But more than that, there is far too much experience in the North Star side. The Gold Coast team is not all that strong and to get to the final, they have played no-one higher placed in the XXXX League than Grange Thistle, who are sixth.

The home ground and the likely strong local turnout should give the Gamblers a boost. But North Star have played and won the big matches before.

Winning the XXXX League premiership with four rounds to spare could be a blessing or a danger for Brisbane City.

If City are to make the most of it, then some tough decisions must be made by coach Matt Carson. And one of them might be to completely play down the importance of the grand final.

City's season aim has been to get back into the NSL. Winning the League is the first priority, winning the play-offs is the second. The grand final can only be another match on the way.

But getting the players to accept that and not mentally letting themselves down after October 9 could be the biggest challenge this season for Carson.

Once the XXXX League premiership is in the bag, a whole new mentality must be adopted by City.

They must immediately assume they are kicking off the 1989 National League season in January and plan accordingly.

On the park, Carson must remind the players they are not at the end of a season, they are starting a new phase that will peak at the end of October for the play-offs and will continue on to a higher

plateau if the club is successful in gaining NSL entry.

Any players at the club who do not have the commitment and professionalism to train on for the rest of the year, as City will have to, should be weeded out now.

Off the park, John Ponturo must swing into action all the plans about which he has spoken in recent months. The club also must start recruiting.

Between relegated Lions and Brunswick, there are more than 40 players with NSL experience who will not play in the League again if they stay where they are.

City will never know if those players would have liked to come to Spencer Park if they don't ask. It will be no use bemoaning in December that it would have been good to get Mike Petersen, Charlie Egan, Joe Palatsides or Nick Meredith.

City must move as early as they can. To bathe in the glory of an early premiership win or to see the grand final as the climax of the season would be to take the same unsuccessful road travelled by Lions over the past 12 months.

Those attending the soccer workshop at Perry Park on Saturday must go with the attitude of looking to improve the code and not to enhance their own standing in the game.

Too many times in the past people have made decisions based on club interests.

If positive ideas are put forward then the workshop will be a success. My only hope is that whatever comes out of the workshop becomes a concrete plan of action.

The whole exercise will be a waste of time if any suggestions are greeted by a wave of euphoria but then quickly fall by the wayside because of a lack of commitment to make changes which may hurt.

With the Soccer Workshop at Perry Park on Saturday, a lot of ideas are expected to be aired. To promote discussion, Go Soccer this week publishes the second part of RODDY MacKENZIE's restructuring suggestions and another view by Mr. R. H. IKSENS, of Ferny Grove.

How could Queensland soccer be structured to accommodate a representative National League team?

If it were up to me, it would be re-structured completely. I would like to see a South-East Queensland semi-professional league consisting of 10 teams; a federation team from the Gold Coast, a federation team from the Sunshine Coast, a federation team from Toowoomba, a federation team from Bundaberg, a federation team from Ipswich and five federation teams from Brisbane.

I'm sure the federation teams from Ipswich and Brisbane will have some people confused but it's the only way I can see us competing locally with the other football codes. We need to reduce our local soccer into a compact showcase. How do we do this? We set up an Ipswich and District Soccer Federation that competes internally up to under 15's. At under 16, teams enter into a Brisbane competition as at present. The current Ipswich senior teams would then play in the existing Brisbane divisions but as amateur teams, also their colts teams would play in a separate Brisbane youth competition. The Ipswich rep. team would be expected to play at the best venue available, not necessarily at either Coalstars or St. Helens but at the Showgrounds, Bundamba Racecourse or even the Ipswich Jets Rugby League ground.

How would Brisbane be divided into five federations? Simply, in North, South, East, West and Central Brisbane using the same set-up as described for Ipswich.

A REGIONAL SUPER LEAGUE IS THE WAY

For example, Brisbane West would be situated at Lions Stadium with member teams like Lions, Croatia, Acacia Ridge, Inala City, Darra and Oxley. Brisbane South would be situated at the QE II Stadium preferably, with Rochedale as the next choice of venue and have teams like Rochedale, Mt. Gravatt, Kingsridge, Slacks Creek, Souths and Beenleigh. Brisbane East would be situated at Perry Park and have teams like Eastern Suburbs, Redlands, Wynnum, Capalaba. Brisbane North would operate from Grange Thistle's Lanham Park and consist of teams like Grange Thistle, North Star, Pine Rivers, Redcliffe, Virginia, Albany Creek. Finally, Brisbane Central would operate from Spencer Park with teams like Azzurri, Taringa, Olympic, Newmarket, Bardon, Valley Trident, Mitchelton and The Gap.

I'm sure geographic divisions could be drawn up by the QSF. This would regionalise Junior soccer more sensibly and if the senior teams could stop bickering for a minute I'm sure a "Super League" consisting of federation teams would be a marketable product that would compete favourably against the other codes locally. How do we stop clubs bickering amongst themselves? Maybe we'll have to wait until they eventually close down soccer and then we can start all over again.

One last thought. Once our "regionalised SEQ "Super League" is established maybe then the northern regional centres like Townsville, Rockhampton, Mackay and Cairns can be introduced to form a "Queensland Super State League". Sounds familiar, doesn't it?



BRISBANE NORTH SHOULD BE NSL TEAM

A Brisbane United coached by Bruce Stowell playing at Perry Park would appear to be a "QUEENSLAND" side thinly disguised.

What support would the QSF give to the team considering the financial disincentives that forced Lions and City to develop their own grounds: paying rent; loss of canteen and bar revenue; loss of advertising revenue; and loss of revenue from club members?

The Brisbane Region can support two or three teams in the NSL. Traditionally the top clubs have come from three areas — North, South-East, South-West and Ipswich. Recently there have been developments in Pine Shire and Redcliffe, Wynnum and Redlands, and Logan and Beenleigh. An amalgamation of clubs representing a traditional area and a developing area would best be placed to succeed in the NSL. If either Brisbane City Azzurri or North Star qualify for the NSL then all BRISBANE NORTH and DISTRICTS CLUBS should amalgamate to promote a team in the NSL. Brisbane City North and District Football Club would consist of 22 players with a maximum of three VISA players registered with the QSF and NSL drawn from players who have played northside junior soccer and/or are currently playing with a northside senior club.

All northside clubs would retain their existing position in the QSF and pay a levy based on the senior team's position and the number of junior players. Voting rights would be in proportion to the levy. Sponsors voting rights would be in proportion to sponsorship paid. Club members would also have voting rights. An elected committee would run the club as is common with all clubs.

The initial transfer fee for a former northside junior registered with the QSF would be a \$5000 maximum with a further \$5000 maximum per year payable over the next two years based on the number of matches played in the NSL. A further \$5000 maximum bonus is payable based on Australian representation making a \$20000 maximum transfer fee. A player's original club would get 25% of any transfer obtained by Brisbane North in excess to the fee paid for the player.

Brisbane North would employ development officers to promote soccer in schools and junior clubs. The northside QSF clubs would be allocated a curtain

raiser to the NSL match which would be promoted in the local district. The QSF club would sell tickets (hopefully discount family tickets) on a commission basis and also obtain a small percentage of the gate. Only members of a Brisbane North and Districts Club would be able to purchase season tickets, become Brisbane City North members, NSL sponsors would have to give a percentage to a local club of their choice.

Initially, the NSL club would have to play at Spencer Park which has the best facilities. Perry Park with better public transport, car parking, and room for expansion could be developed in the future. The QSF would have to agree to transfer 50% equity to Brisbane North at an independently-assessed value. The money would have to be channelled into building a grandstand. Hence the profits and expenses of the ground would be equally shared.

With the support of all northside soccer supporters we could build a great club and support structure that does not only need the NSL and championships to survive. Ultimately Brisbane South East and Brisbane South West and Ipswich will also be in the NSL. Competition amongst the REGIONS would also see the rise of North and Pine Shire, South and Logan Shire, and Bayside and Redlands etc. Let's form a CLUB that is supported by all and whose traditions will last forever and not just a club which depends on the whim of a few rich owners and trophies for survival.

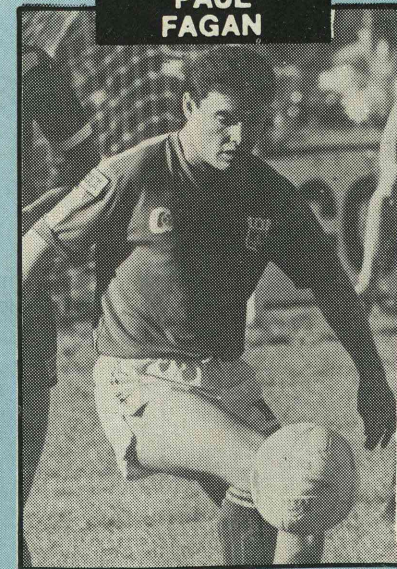

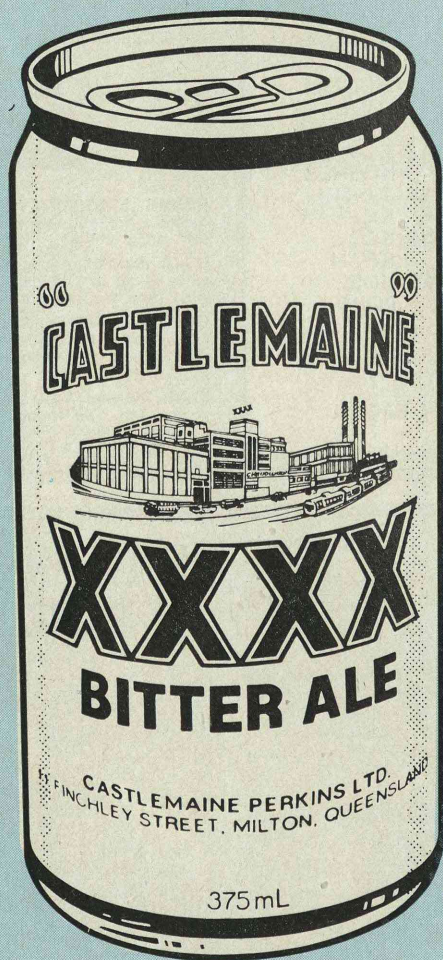
