

# GO SOCCER

It will be a month before a report is finalised after last weekend's soccer workshop at Perry Park.

Mr. Ian Cooke from Touche Ross, who conducted the day-long work-shop, said considerable work still remained before the "highlighting studry" would be completed.

The workshop gleaned ideas from 61 people from all facets of the code. Cooke said those ideas, as well as the information submitted in questionaires completed by those who attended the exercise, would be collated and analysed before the final report was compiled.

And contrary to popular hope, Cooke said the workshop would not produce a complete blueprint for the future of soccer.

"To produce that type of document we would have to do a study which would cost up to \$40,000," Cooke said. "What we are doing at the moment is producing a highlighting study which will identify areas of concern and strength and point out what possible action should be taken in those areas.

I am sure as a result of the workshop soccer will make steps forward,

but whether it will be the giant steps for which a lot of people were hoping for I can't say."

Representatives came from all parts of the state to attend the workshop. They included Mareeba's Alf Moriconi, Noel Ash from Rockhampton, Mackay director of coaching Peter Kelly and soccer officials from many nearby Brisbane areas. The juniors were represented strongly while there were also delegates from church soccer, the Commercial League and school soccer.

The 61 who attended including three XXXX League coaches, Matt Carson (Brisbane City), Steve Dolan (Grange Thistle) and John Reid (Rochedale). Other XXXX League clubs represented included Easts, Coalstars and Mount Gravatt while former NSL club Brisbane Lions also attended.

Other coaches who attended included state director of coaching Bruce Stowell, state youth assistant coach Tony Buesnel and Ampol Cup-winning Gold Coast coach Jim Selby.

Five XXXX League clubs were not represented in any way. There were no current top division players among the 61 at the workshop.

The workshop started at 9 a.m. and concluded at 4.35 p.m. The 61 who attended were divided into small groups. In the pre-lunch session, the groups were asked to discuss and list "the problems facing soccer". Their discussions, which lasted for nearly 90 minutes unearthed 58 "problem areas" which were divided into four categories: promotion, administration, finance and structure.

After lunch the groups were asked to devise the ideal situation in each category. The workshop finished with a group discussion during which many aired their grievances.

# FRANK WANTS TO COME BACK

Socceroo Frank Farina (pictured below) is hoping to do more guest appearances in Queensland.

attack in the Olympic games. The Socceroos are in a first round group with Brazil, Nigeria and Yugoslavia.

Grave concerns for the future of Queensland soccer must be expressed following the workshop at Perry Park last Saturday.

The idea was one of the most positive steps taken by the code in a long time. While the execution of the exercise suffered because of the enormity of the task, enough positive thinking was aired and constructive suggestions put forward to ensure some kind of workable recommendations will result.

What is of a far more worrving concern is who will implement those changes?

Last Saturday was an ideal opportunity for any person interested in taking over the running of the code to be involved in what was the most open soccer policy talk-fest ever staged. It was the chance to become involved in the grass roots of soccer, a chance to gain a very real feel for the game, its problems, its strengths and where the code was heading.

Where were all the people who have so readily criticised Ian Brusasco and his management committee? Where were all the people who have always had a better way to do it than our current administrators?

There were sections of the code that supported the workshop solidly and if anything positive comes out of the exercise it will be largely thanks to them. Strong support came from the country regions, the juniors, the director of coaching network. church soccer and a handful of local clubs - Grange Thistle probably being the most active of them with their first team coach and three officials attending.

For five XXXX League clubs to miss the workshop is a disgrace.

No-one will help Queensland soccer, unless it helps itself. The depth of Ian Brusasco's commitment and contribution to Queensland soccer is now being highlighted more than ever before.

That not one person attended the workshop with the active intention of letting it be known he wanted to become QSF president must deeply concern Brusasco. It certainly is a sad reflection of the commitment of others.

The successful promotion of the Ampol Cup final at Ashmore last weekend hopefully will be a springboard to a well-supported final series at Perry Park next month.

TALKING with ERIC THOMPSON

Touche Ross need to look no further than the soccer workshop attendance book to discover the problem with Queensland soccer.

The 61 people who turned up at Perry Park was a good response. But after closer examination of the areas of the game they represented, some hard-hitting questions must be asked.

It was no coincidence that those with the most representatives at the workshop were the sections of the game which currently are our most successful anyway.

The country areas, which in the past five years have outstripped Brisbane in the development of quality young players were represented by several people who travelled hours to be at Perry Park.

The Queensland Junior Soccer Council, which was another section of the code well represented, has successfully administered our thousands of juniors. Also attending in numbers were our directors of coaching, who have done invaluable work in tapping our talent throughout the state.

Totally unsighted were representatives from many of the big clubs which in recent years have complained and whinged over so many decisions within the game.

Apathy is what is retarding Queensland soccer.

I just hope that the enthusiasm and ideas offered by those who attended the workshop was enough to help Touche Ross come up with a plan that can snap Brisbane soccer, moreso than Queensland soccer, out of that apathy.

The Ampol Cup is on the Gold Coast — despite my prediction to the contrary last week - and that probably highlights that Brisbane is not the be all and end all of Queensland soccer, at least at the moment.

Like many, I never expected North Star to lose their fifth match in a row and go down in the Cup final. But I am told they looked a tired side that seemed to have lost the spark which made them a very formidable outfit.

But anyone would be foolish to write off North Star for the remainder of the season.

I have a lot of respect for some of the quality players in the North Star team. There is still a grand final and \$10,000 to be won this season and North Star has the staff to figure very prominently in what should be an unpredictable finals

But it will depend on what questions those at North Star ask themselves this week. Do thy want the grand final or are they content to just slide out of contention?

If they want that \$10,000 to salvage some pride, they must start winning and hold onto second spot.

Players at some of the struggling clubs in the XXXX League must be starting to get excited.

Statistics show that it will be one of the players in the weaker sides of the League who will win the Rothman's best and fairest gold medal.

Unfortunately, players in those teams that have really tried to play some football like Brisbane City. North Star and Coalstars will have to be content in just knowing they are better players.

Every year it sickens me to see the recognition given to the medal winner when often his season hasn't warranted it. Give the Rothman's medal judging to coaches or independent observers or anyone other than referees.

I think their track record already in the Rothman's medal shows the current system is not the best one.

### A Letter to the Editor . .

Dear Sir,

I want to thank the QSF for arranging for our three teams to play at Perry Park. This is the second year that we have been allowed to pay for the privilege of moving our home game to Perry Park, and been allowed to sit on their haemorhoid-inducing seats. Mind you we could have paid a second entry fee and sat in the bar where we would see little of the games through all the heads and posts. What is the point if we draw smaller crowds than we do at home?

And thanks to the Referees Association whom I presume were responsible for sending along the officials. Officials who lacked the intestinal fortitude to keep the teams on the park playing soccer. During the Reserve game, the first goal went to Mitchelton even though one of their players had the Inala goalie pinned to the ground. Later in the game, a Mitchelton player kicked an Inala player after he no longer had the ball, and the linesman who was no more than five feet away did not see it. The Inala player was out of the game.

The Division Two game was much the same with an Inala player being taken out of the game, very early, by a deliberate foul from a Mitchelton player. That player had to be taken to hospital. Officials made only a whimpish attempt to control the game even though at least 50 percent of Mitchelton's tackles were directed at Inala players legs. The man with the whistle was more interes-

ted in shutting up the coach who was showing concern for his players' safety. A lot of normally quiet spectators became very angry about what was happening.

What we saw was not good soccer, it was not good for soccer. It was not good because the boys from the Mitchelton stables insist on playing like a herd of donkeys, and because officials care more about verbal abuse than physical abuse. Verbal abuse might offend some people, BUT physical abuse can put a player out for the rest of the game; the rest of the season: even for life, and it can prevent them from going to work on a Monday morning. How long is a good soccer player going to stay in the game if he has to contend with this? I think it is high time that officials got their priorities right.

Inala City supporters are very proud of their Reserve and Division Two teams for playing soccer when all the opposition wanted to do was annihilate anyone that got between them and the goal. Mitchelton do not play good soccer and that's why they will never draw crowds of 500 plus as Acacia Ridge and Inala City have proven they can. Supporters go to watch good soccer and its about time the governing bodies took note of this fact.

# HAVELANGE HITS OUT AT BRAZIL

Joao Havelange has blasted soccer authorities in his native Brazil for making a "very disappointing" bid to host the 1994 World Cup soccer finals.

Havelange, the FIFA president, said Brazil's poor presentation had made it impossible for FIFA to consider the country as a serious contender for the Cup. FIFA's executive committee last month chose the United States to host the tournament.

"When the US showed us a credible presentation on its facilities for holding the Cup, Brazil came up with a video on Carnival," Havelange said.

Brazil finished last in the executive committee's voting with two votes. Morocco received seven votes and the United States 10.

"It was very disappointing for all of us. It pained me greatly," said Havelange, who arrived home in Rio from Europe.



### WITH SOCCER WORKSHOP CO-ORDINATOR, IAN COOKE

GO SOCCER: Were you happy with the response to the soccer workshop and the way the day proceeded?

IAN COOKE: I was extremely happy with the response, certainly in getting people from all over the state. Probably in retrospect I might have changed some of the things I did, even though overall I was happy with what we got, given the amount of time involved. One of the problems, was in fact a lack of time. But what I perceived was that people had not been given the opportunity before to say what they wanted to say. I think that was probably the biggest value of it and a lot of those who filled out our questionnaire at the end of the day agreed this type of workshop should be held more in the future.

# GS: What were you looking for from the workshop and did you get it?

IC: What I really wanted from the workshop was information. I didn't genuinely expect to get a plan in any of the areas we looked at. Mainly, because I don't think that is feasible in one day. What I hoped to get was information which could become a very strong and viable input into a plan. I think I certainly have got the basis of that. A lot of the issues raised need to be gone into in a lot more detail. At least a lot of things were brought out and a lot of people felt they had the opportunity to say what they thought without any fear of prejudice and that was what really came through in the responses in the questionnaire.

# GS: Were there any aspects of the soccer workshop which disappointed you or in retrospect you may have done differently?

IC: It probably disappointed me in that I didn't get anywhere near as clear to a detailed plan as I would have liked. In retrospect, I am not sure I would have changed that either, given that it came through loud and clear that people hadn't been given the opportunity to speak in the past. I think it would have been wrong for me to go in there and say "these are the problems, these are the issues, this is what we will focus on". This was exactly the teeling about which people seemed to be anti. Perhaps I let the first session go on too long. I suspect I should have given them only a half an hour instead of an hour and a quarter. Perhaps I should have asked them to just list five or so problems and then we could have looked at them. As it turned out we got both problems and potential solutions all mixed up. But I wasn't prepared to come down on people for that

because it would have made it like I was telling them what was going on. I wanted them to tell us.

#### GS: From the input provided, are there any areas of concern in soccer which became immediately evident?

IC: There are certain areas which have almost universal support as being recognised as problem areas. It would seem nearly everyone thinks there are too many clubs and therefore there is a lack of a focus in terms of promotion, in terms of funding and I guess in terms of general support for the game. To me that was probably the biggest issue to come out. It was also apparent that there was little that was identifiably soccer, as opposed to Aussie rules, league or basketball or whatever. That was also a strong issue and that involves so many other areas.

# GS: What can Queensland soccer expect in the report resulting from the workshop?

IC: What I will do is to go through all the information and see what has come up consistently. Then I have to sit down and decide what is viable, what can be implemented. A lot of the things that came up are almost utopian. I didn't want to stop people saying those things, but I have to look at all the information with a sense of realism and decide which things can be done now, which one may be able to be done in the future given change in other areas like administration, finance or whatever.

# GS: Once your report has been tabled, what are the next steps for Queensland soccer?

IC: In all honesty, that's up to them, I can't make them do anything. My own reaction would be that there is going to be a very changed face of Queensland soccer given the recent move of lan Brusasco to the ASF and the very potential move of Alan Vessey. Whatever the changed face is, I would hope they would be very aggressive in relation to the findings of the report. Soccer has got an opportunity and it should be used. What comes out of this report should be seriously considered because believe what we have unearthed is what some of the best soccer brains in the state have suggested. It would be very presumptious of me to say I know all the ills of Queensland soccer. What we will present is the ideas of some of the most committed soccer people in the game. What is done with those ideas is really up to the code.


