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GO SOCCER

The proposed merger agreement between Brisbane City and Easts will be put on hold when the two clubs launch into the XXXX League finals series in a fortnight.

Brisbane City secretary John Ponturo said although an amicable relationship now existed between the two clubs as a result of the secret talks to formulate the merger, they would still be the most competitive of rivals if they meet in the top five playoffs.

"They want the \$10,000 for winning the grand final as much as we do," Ponturo said. "It won't benefit anyone to roll over and play dead. If we meet Easts in the play-offs, we will be expecting just as hard a game as if we play North Star, Coalstars or Olympic."

The historic merger will only take place if Brisbane City are successful in winning the National League promotion play-offs against the Victorian and South Australian champions. In Adelaide, with one round remaining, Adelaide Croatia look certain to win the title while in Victoria, Italian-backed Thomastown have taken a narrow lead from former NSL club Heidelberg with five rounds remaining.

Under the agreement with Easts, which is still subject to a review by the QSF management committee, Brisbane City will not field teams in the QSF Leagues it it gains NSL representation. City will be solely an NSL outfit.

Through a system of primary and secondary registrations, which is permitted under QSF rules, City players not involved in the NSL on any particular weekend will be available for

selection in the Easts XXXX League and lower grade sides. Similarly, any Easts player showing form beyond XXXX League standard will be able to turn out for City in the NSL.

Ponturo said Easts had been chosen for a number of reasons.

"Easts have an image of being a totally Australian-based club which would compliment City's traditional Italian background, we felt combining two ethnic-orientated clubs might cause problems," Ponturo said.

"We also looked for a southside club so we had both sides of the river united. Finally, the aims and objectives of both clubs complemented each other. Our members have shown an overwhelming desire for us to play in the NSL, while Easts seem to be content at the moment in remaining a force in the XXXX League and have no immediate NSL desires of their own."

Officials of both clubs said they expected some initial rejection to the idea from supporters who may not fully understand the proposal. Both clubs intend calling meetings of members to explain the merger.

Under the agreement there also will be standardisation of contracts between the two clubs ,pooling of training equipment, transfer split arrangements and the ability to have access to six visa players.

Brisbane City are to throw their doors open to fellow QSF clubs in a bid to resolve the contentious \$5000 maximum transfer proposal.

City have invited all 65 members clubs to an informal meeting at Spencer Park on Thursday, September 15, starting at 7 p.m. After some initial hospitality, City intend to make the meeting an open forum for all clubs to air their views on the idea.

City want a maximum \$5000 limit on local transfers invoked. They claim its introduction is in the interests of Queensland soccer as well as helping any Queensland club to be successful in an NSL push.

"Obviously there are some people with clearcut ideas on the transfer system. City believes the system needs review but does not intend to attempt to steamroll something through the annual general meeting," said City secretary John Ponturo.

"If everyone can contribute their thoughts and a plan can be devised that best suits everyone, then the correct notice of motion can be written well in advance of December's AGM.

The proposed merger between Brisbane City and Eastern Suburbs needs close scrutineering by the QSF management committee.

While the agreement proposed by the two clubs appears to be within current QSF rules and is a positive step by Brisbane City and Easts to make the system work in their favour, is it a good move for Queensland soccer as a whole?

Idealistically, if the proposal works as well as the two clubs hope, there is the potential for the pair to become Queensland super clubs. All quality players would gravitate towards them leaving the remainder of the XXXX League raped and insignificant.

At the other end of the scale, the agreement also has the potential to blow apart midway through next season which could lumber Queensland soccer with a wrangle it could well do without. Similarly, what happens if either team is relegated?

They are the extremes and outcomes which possibly will never occur if the agreement proceeds under the spirit of negotiations which already have taken place. But it is the responsibility of the QSF management committee to investigate the propo-

sal and ensure all factors involved are for the betterment of Queensland soccer

Last year when Lions made a push for the National League, deep rifts opened between the club and the QSF. It wasn't the sole reason for the club's dismal failing this year, but it didn't help.

If Brisbane City are to make a success of NSL and succeed where Lions failed, then it must be with the backing of the QSF, which is all the clubs.

City have taken the right approach in inviting all clubs to Spencer Park to discuss their proposal for a \$5000 transfer limit. All details regarding the merger also be tabled and subject to change if they are not in the best interests of the development of the code.

Combining forces is undoubtedly the right approach in Queensland soccer as one of the major points highlighted in the recent workshop was that there are too many clubs. The Brisbane City-Easts merger is very much a test case, which other clubs will watch with great interest.

ACROSS MY DESK

Over the next two weekends, promotion and relegation will become a reality for many clubs.

While the final make-up for the 1989 divisions will not be declared until after all clubs submit their nominations, those clubs which finish in the designated promotion positions can expect to go up and those in the bottom places probably will go down.

Now is the time for officials at those clubs to prepare for the 1989 season. Stepping up a division can prove more difficult than some clubs expect if proper preparation is not under-taken. And the beginning of next season is too late.

Similarly, clubs which take a step down must re-asses their aims and objectives and plan accordingly.

At both ends of the table, it always proves to be a long hard season and many officials look forward to the last game for a well-earned rest. But by putting in a little thought now, and bit of pre-planning, they can make the workload next year somewhat easier.

WITH BRISBANE CITY SECRETARY JOHN PONTURO WHO PROPOSED THE MERGER WITH EASTERN SUBURBS

GO SOCCER: Some may consider the merger proposal as going halfway towards a Brisbane United. Why form a connection between just two clubs and not go the whole way and make NSL available to all players?

JOHN PONTURO: Under the dual registration system, if you don't have an association with just one club, it is very difficult to distribute all of your playing staff all over Quensland. You couldn't guarantee any club that they would be able to use your playing staff at any time throughout the year. By being associated with just one club, they have a guarantee of being able to use say six players or our first team squad, who are not required for NSL on any weekend.

GS: The two clubs between them currently have eight XXXX grade teams. Under the merger, the combined clubs will field only five team (one NSL—four XXXX). What becomes of the other 35 or so players and do you expect any resistance in the lower grades to take in players who may cost long-standing team-mates positions?

JP: I don't expect too much resistance from the lower grades. But it is quite obvious we are going to have a surplus of playing staff between us. But the intention is that the better players in all grades will be the ones selected. That obviously makes all grades much stronger. The surplus of players obviously will have to go somewhere. I expect the players to perculate through the system to other XXXX League clubs. They can transfer either by way of loan arrangement or straight transfer. What we intend is that all grades are as strong as they can possibly be, so the quality players can progress upwards. Unfortunately the weaker players will find that they are the ones being dropped out and they will just have to move on and find their futures at other clubs.

GS: When dual registration was tried in country areas during the State League, conflicts arose when players lost interest in playing for an unsuccessful city team and were more committed to their successful local clubs. How do you intend to stop a repeat of split loyalties?

IP: Under the system that we have with Easts, we have an arrangment wherby the NSL coach will select his squad one training night prior to the wekend. Any player who refuses to play for either the NSL or any NSL players who refuses to go back to the XXXX League will not be eligible to play for either. Any player who wants to be part of the system has to adhere to what the two coaches say. What we must point out is we don't want fulltime XXXX League players, we want players committed to play

in the highest level of football available. GS: As a team which is secondary in

importance to the National League side, is there a danger that Easts will just become the reserve grade arm of Brisbane City and what steps will be taken to avoid that happening?

JP: I wouldn't think anyone should consider Easts as the reserve grade. Firstly, they will be playing at Heath Park and will not be losing their identity. Any squad made up of top XXXX League players and very good NSL players will not be a squad to be taken lightly or as reserve graders. The identity of both clubs will remain. Easts are a XXXX League club, Brisbane City is an NSL club. What we are endeavouring to do here is to share playing staff, playing at the highest possible level. I don't think anyone will consider Easts reserve graders, particularly when they play against them.

GS: Under the team selection system outlined in the merger proposal, to be a successful set-up both coaches at the two clubs will have to work together. Does either club see this as a problem and could it prompt any changes in coaching staff?

JP: Under the system, both the XXXX League and National League teams will train at the one venue on the same nights. It is intended that they become virtually one squad under two coaches, th NSL coach and the XXXX League coach. We believe that will overcome a lot of the problems. As far as prompting changes of coaching staff, I don't really know what Easts intend to do and we certainly will not be influencing them on who they should have as coach. We will be making our decision as coach as we normally do and the Brisbane City coaching policy always has ben that the head coach's position is reviewed annually.

GS: Can the merger agreement cope with the mooted change of NSL seasons to summer and the growing likelihood that franchising will be introduced within three years.

JP: I think the merger will in fact assist both clubs should the seasons not clash. It will keep both squads in peak fitness for more of the year. With regard to franchising, that is something we will have to look at when the time comes. I believe Brisbane City has gone a long way towards franchising through the introduction of a system to be put to members later this year which is almost a shareholding situation through the sale of memberships at a much higher value. The word franchising has been bandied around and I don't think a lot of people really know what it means and how it would be applied to Queensland soccer. We would just have to wait and see on that issue.

But I think in the long run, they would have done a whole lot better to change the rules to provide for a Brisbane United. They then would have been drawing from the entire XXXX League.

To John Ponturo's credit, he obviously has put in a great deal of thought in proposing the merger and I cannot criticise him for having a go.

John's plan may work administratively because that is the area in which he specialises. Where it will fail is on the training park.

An NSL side and a XXXX League team cannot prepare together. When

City and Easts bundle their players together they will find the quantity of players will make quality training very hard to achieve.


