Brisbane City are Queensland soccer's club champions for 1988 with a round to spare.

The club's convincing performance against Redlands in all four XXXX grades last weekend clinched the title which City has never won. With one round remaining, City has 174 points across the four XXXX grades from 53 wins and 15 draws.

The only real challenger to City in the final stages of the season for the club title was Grange Thistle. whose strong performances in the lower XXXX grades kept them in touch. Thistle in 84 XXXX grade rounds to date have amassed 157 points from 46 wins and 19 draws. More impressive in Thistle's club championship record is their goal against column. In four grades, the club has conceded only 82 goals and looks set to be the only XXXX League outfit which could finish the fixture season conceding less than 100 goals.

For winning the club championship, Brisbane City will receive a set of strips from Attack and the highlyvalued \$1000 insurance voucher for next season from Bain Clarkson Pty. Ltd.

City already has clinched the premiership in XXXX League and Colts, while Thistle has wrapped up the title in XXXX Thirds, but this weekend when the two clubs meet at Lanham Park, the most interest could centre on the Reserve grade. Thistle

The club's four teams, the three Division Two grades and Division Seven, have so far amassed 184 points with, unlike City, all teams now set to figure in the finals.

Division Four club Darra also have had a strong season across the board. Although the club fielded only three teams this year compared to City and Ridge's four, they have finished with two premierships and a runnersup title.

Other clubs which have performed consistently over a number of grades include North Star and Coalstars in XXXX League and Inala City in Division Two and Seven.

TRAPS FOR TIGERS

Three areas of concern have been highlighted by some Eastern Suburbs supporters in the draft merger agreement now being discussed between the club and Brisbane City.

A copy of the draft was "leaked" to Go Soccer this week with the contentious points clearly marked.

It is pointed out that under the agreement, City must supply 20 players of NSL standard. Yet the fineprint reveals that the NSL pool will contain players from both clubs. The objectors point out, rather than City putting in 20 quality players to start with which would ensure there was a surplus of top players flowing back to Easts, City will take the best from the Tigers, combine them with their best for the NSL pool squad and leave Easts with the rest.

While only 14 players can be used on any one weekend by the NSL, the objectors point out, those players ranked 15-20 obviously will not be world beaters.

"It's quite obvious we will be handing over a Stein Grodum to get a Phil Kerr back," an unhappy supporter said.

There also is concern over transfer splits. Under the agreement, if



any City player is sold outside of Queensland, City gets the fee. If any Easts player who has appeared in NSL is sold outside of Queensland, the fee is split equally. "They' re really kidding on that one," the supporter said.

The other point which irks some Easts supporters is the draft stipulates that the NSL and XXXX squads train at one ground, which almost certainly would be Spencer Park, while all other teams train "at the other venue". "All that means is the best is at Spencer Park and the rest can please themselves," the supporter said. "It would mean some Easts players would have no reason to come to Heath Park all season.

"The whole document is a joke and if Easts sign it they are signing a death warrant for the club."

As the curtain comes down on the 1988 season, Queensland soccer finds itself at yet another cross-

This season has in many ways proved to be a disappointment following a bumper 1987. While the State team again gave an admirable showing, Lions' NSL season was a tragedy, the standard of the XXXX League plummetted and the contribution offered by many lower division clubs bordered on dis-interest.

And the prospects for 1989 are con-

Definitely, we will be without the two leading administrators that have guided the code for more than a decade. We may or may not, have National League representation.

Filling the executive director's position should not prove difficult. Indications are that a number of qualified people will apply for the job which should ensure the eventual appointee is of the highest standard. But whoever he may be, his job will be infinitely more difficult unless the Council of Clubs selects the right QSF president.

Queensland soccer has had, and continues to need a president of strong personality, innovative ideas and foresight and high community standing who can ensure our code is heard and recognised among the sporting community. The attitude of too many clubs this season has been such that they are likely to jump at the first candidate because that is the easiest solution.

Clubs should realise that the selection of a new president could prove their most crucial decision. It could make or break the code.

Responsibility is what is needed now and is what will be needed in 1989 to cope with a season of uncertainty. The time has come for a few others to put something into the code rather than continually taking.

This is the final edition of Go Soccer for this season, although a Grand Final souvenir program will be on sale at Perry Park on Sunday, October 9.

As this will be my final column in Go Soccer, I would like to take the opportunity to thank all those who have helped and worked with me during my 13 years at Perry Park.

It has been an enjoyable time and I leave with very fond and everlasting memories of Queensland soccer and its many characters.

Soccer in Queensland has much to be proud of and I believe through the work of the management committee and the commitment of many at club and affiliate level, the structure is in place for the code to continue growing.

Through this column, I have aired and highlighted those points I believed were relevant although sometimes overshadowed by more glamorous issues within the game. I would

hope that the columns have at least made those within the code, at all levels ,more aware of how the QSF works.

After this month, I will no longer be at Perry Park, but in my new role as ASF secretary-general I will still very much be a part of Queensland soccer as the Australian Soccer Federation is the states.

Similarly, and the final point I would wish to make, the QSF is the clubs and the affiliates, and it is they who ultimately decide the policies and direction of soccer in Queensland.

WITH BOBBY HAMILTON, COACH OF PINE RIVERS WHO HAVE WON PROMOTION TO THE XXXX LEAGUE

GO SOCCER: What will be your aim in the club's initial XXXX League season?

BOBBY HAMILTON: My aim wouldn't vary any from the first year I went to the club. And that is to maintain and improve on the standards that have been set at the club. Of course the main thing for us to do is to maintain some kind of stability in the XXXX League and make sure we stay there in the first season anyway.

GS: What kind of team-strengthening will you have to do in the off-season and which current Pine Rivers players do you expect to go well in XXXX League?

BH: I feel I am quite well off in the forward-line department, but I believe I will still need three or four players in the first team squad who are experienced at XXXX League level. Those players I expect to go well include four or five young players who have come up through the club. Players like John Preston, Clayton Koch, Noel Carroll and Steven Kluss, who are all only around 18 years old. And there are quite a few others like John Cartwright who are not old players either. I have built the team around them and I don't think it will take too much more for us to be competitive. If we keep our current squad and add three or four more, then I will be pretty confident of consolidating in XXXX League.

GS: A lot of Division Two clubs have been critical of the offside trap employed by Pine Rivers teams, yet it has won you promotion. Why do you use the tactic and do you think it will work in XXXX League?

BH: That makes me laugh actually and the answer to that is to look at our goals for column. We scored more goals than any other teams in our division so I don't think we can be accused of concentrating on offside. I have never at anytime even mentioned anything about offside. The boys have never been coached on that factor. The only thing that has been said to them is quite simple. If you are playing against a forward line or a team who are prepared to make runs without thinking about the offside, let's not run back and chase back into defensive situations when it is not needed when we can just hold our ground and let them play themselves offside. But even on that point, we have never been through it in training runs. Basically, that's as far as the issue has been discussed.

GS: Pine Rivers have produced some fine young players in Jason Polak, John Koch, Lindsay Dines and Jarrod Austin to mention a few other than those still at the club. Why then has it taken Rivers so long to get into the top Queensland division?

BH: I can't really answer that. Obviously steps have had to be taken to get us playing at the highest level possible simply to encourage players like that and in that mould not to leave but to have the desire to stay at Pine Rivers now that they can be given the highest grade of football in the state. Things probably happened at the club quicker than they expected with top juniors coming through like they did. The club probably only needed a little direction to capitalise on that.

GS: What advice could you give to those clubs which just missed promotion this year in Division Two?

BH: My advice to two or three clubs in the division, would be to try and maintain what they have done this season and try and take it one step further next season. From what I have seen I am pretty sure that the top three or four teams in the Second Division could compete quite favourably in the XXXX League.

GS: After a distinguished career overseas and in the National League with Brisbane City, what motivates you to keep playing and how much longer will you continue in a player-coach capacity?

BH: The simple motivation for me is I love the game. I love being in the game and I love being involved in the game. As far as how long I am going to play, I don't know. But depending on how the squad shapes up next season, I might start filtering myself out then, playing only if or when I am needed.

GS: As a former Brisbane City NSL player, do you think the club can return to the competition next year on their own or do you support that Queensland's only chance is a united front in the NSL?

BH: Although I think a united team in the NSL would be good for Queensland, I can't see it happening in the near-future. I think it is something that is probably needed but with the ethnic bases still at some clubs I don't think it would be possible to amalgamate or join forces. I think if City can get the financial backing they could compete on their own. They have the facilities comparable to anyone's and that is an important factor in my mind as a player. Once they get in they will have to add to the squad they have got and having been there they know the standard required. But I think the hardest thing will be to win the promotion play-offs.

Without a doubt, the efforts of the Socceroos in the Gold Cup and qualifying for the Olympics were magnificent, but with not one resident Queenslander in the team, it left me feeling as if we were getting left behind as renewed enthusiasm in soccer was sweeping the southern capitals.

A 17,000 crowd in Sydney for the NSL further enhanced that feeling. Up here, we couldn't wait for the National League season to finish to end our embarrassment.

This is the third season I have written this column in Go Soccer, and vet in that time, where have we gone? If anything, after losing our two top administrators, we now probably find ourselves in a more worrying position than we did in

The Queensland team and the XXXX Super 6 stand out as the major highlights of this season.

When Bruce Stowell finally got to put out his best state team ,they beat NSW. In Queensland sport, that's what counts and given the Blues had several Olympians in their side, the win was a tactical brilliance from Stowell and sheer commitment from his players.

The Super 6 was a type of soccer which finally caught the imagination of the Australian public. The performance of the overseas teams was superb ,but the final night clashes between the Australian state sides remain firm in my memory.

It was classic Australian sporting rivalry and showed that given the right circumstances, even exists in soccer.

Need I call yet again for a Sheffield-Shield type soccer competition?

The demise of Ipswich United continues a peculiar record for Matt Carson.

United join Merton-East and Southside Eagles as clubs that have fallen on hard times once Carson has left the scene.

And there are two ways to look at it. Either the man is a brilliant coach whose work could not be matched once he left and the team suffered accordingly.

Or, he is a coach that works purely for the moment ,ignoring any kind of long term team building or junior policy.

I believe he is the latter and in terms of trophies won, it is hard to criticise his methods.

But the warnings are there. Anything built from the top without a sound base will topple. In attempting to turn themselves into Queensland's "Super Club", Brisbane City should remember that.

The finals series in the top divisions should be played at Lions' Richlands stadium. The surface at soccer headquarters is a disgrace.

Lions is the best surface in Brisbane and if we want the best football played in our showpiece matches, then the players have got to be given a chance to play.

I realise logistically and as a matter of principle, the finals have to be at Perry Park. But what is wrong there? For so long people have been complaining about the ground, money has been spent on it, yet come every September it is a cow paddock.

People have been slow to nominate for the three courses being run next month by Bruce Stowell and that's hard to understand.

The Level Two coaching course is a must for anyone with a serious involvement in the game. Whether you pass or not is irrelevant, but you surely will learn.

The fitness for Soccer and Injury Prevention courses should be a must for every player, coach and team manager. Both courses are a chance to get expert tuition at a minimum cost


