

Brisbane City will be making their 12th Grand Final appearance since the Champions Cup was first contested in 1959. City, who played in last year's Grand Final, have been successful 7 times.

North Star are playing in only their second top division Grand Final. The club played its first XXXX League Grand Final in 1986, losing 2-1 to Coalstars.

Division Two grand finalists, Acacia Ridge and Nerang, shared the honors in their fixture clashes. Ridge won the first round 2-0 while Nerang won the second round 1-0. Ridge beat Nerang 5-1 in the semi-finals. In Division Three, Kingsridge beat Goodna 5-0 in the first round and 4-1 in the second. The structure within the Queensland Soccer Federation is in place for the code to continue to develop throughout the state. But for that growth to take place, the code must work as one. Winning the XXXX League Grand Final has become the most envied victory in Queensland Soccer, and little wonder thanks to the backing of Bond Brewing's Castlemaine Perkins Brewery.

The XXXX sponsorship of Queensland soccer provides \$10,000 to the winner of the grand final. The winner-take-all incentive is the richest single prize in Queensland soccer and is an unrivalled reward to add to the prestige and satisfaction of winning the season climax.

The earlier matches on grand final day also carry rich cash prizes. The winner of division two grand final will get \$2000 while the victor in the division three clash will receive \$1000. Medallions have been struck for players participating in grand finals. Winning clubs receive grand final shields while the XXXX League victors will be presented with the Brusasco Champion's Cup at the end of the match.

The Pat Goddard award, which has become a tradition on grand final day, will be presented to the player judged by the media as man of the match in the XXXX League grand final.

Today's XXXX League grand final will be broadcast live on 4EB (1053 on the AM dial), sponsored by Pin Constructions and the Queensland Soccer Federation.

This season's representative program again provided many of the highlights of the year. Queensland toured Fiji for a three-match series in May and played New South Wales in the annual interstate clash in June. The intercity series between Ipswich & Brisbane was extended to include the Gold Coast, although poor weather thwarted the completion of the entire series.

The Maroons tour of Fiji comprised of players selected from the XXXX League and intercity matches. The two opening scoreless draws in the series stretched Queensland's undefeated run to 11 games. The run was finally broken in the final game of the series under extremely controversial refereeing. A full-strength Queensland team was put on

A full-strength Queensland team was put on the park against New South Wales, which contained nine players with international experience and five Socceroos who later went to the Olympics. The 1-0 win, a shot from Nick Meredith deflected in off Charlie Yankos was a tribute to the Queensland players and the tactical mastery of coach Bruce Stowell.

Goalkeeper Jason Kearton won the George Roberts Memorial Award as the best Queenslander in the interstate clash.

Brisbane won the intercity series after a hardfought win over Gold Coast and a comfortable victory over Ipswich.




