

H ormer Socceroo assistant coach Eddie Thomson, who will lead NSW into action against Queensland at Perry Park next Tuesday, wants to coach a Brisbane United team in the National League.

Thomson, who has long wanted to be based in Queensland, said he would jump at the chance to lead a combined Queensland entry. And he believes it could be successful in Australian soccer's premier competition.

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"The potential in Queensland is enormous and much of it untapped," Thomson said. "I would love to come up there to do that type of job because I think a combined team from Queensland would be very competitive in the NSL.

"There is no doubt that you have produced good players in the past who never got recognition until they moved to Sydney and Melbourne. I have no doubt that through all your country areas and in Brisbane too that there are other players with the same potential.

"I love it in Queensland and I certainly could think of nothing better than living and coaching up there. Whoever is organising this Brisbane United thing, then let them know to contact me before they make a decision on their coach."

Thomson is one of the most respected and successful coaches in Australia and could be the aggressive frontman many consider is needed for a new Brisbane United soccer team.

The Scotsman enjoyed unrivalled success with Sydney City in the earlier years of the Philips

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EDITORIAL

The strength of soccer has always been its numbers and for many people around the blobe, the game is not just part of their lives - it is their world.

Tragedies like that at Hillsborough last weekend will unfortunately occur in a game which spans so many people. What happened at Sheffield was an accident of life. To hold soccer responsible is a grave injustice.

Yet the smarties of Australian sport scarcely wasted a breath before jumping on the hooliganism bandwagon, using the heart-wrenching disaster as yet another opportunity to take a swipe at a game whose enormity they fail to comprehend.

So quickly forgotten among the horror of Hillsborough was the presence of 43,000 Australian soccer fans at the Sydney Football Stadium last Sunday.

In the wake of the English disaster, it was not a time for Australian soccer officials to crow about one of their strongest ever shows of support. The failure of the Socceroos to advance to the next stage of World Cup qualification added to the emptiness felt by many within the code last Sunday evening.

Time will condemn all the events of last weekend to history, some slower than others. Undoubtedly, if Australian soccer's critics are involved, the first thing to be forgotten will be last Sunday's unrivalled Football Stadium attendance.

In attracting such a crowd, Australian soccer reached new heights. We may have failed on the field, but as a sport, we stood proudly alongside the so-called national games.

Yet many will not accept that. With that in mind, Australian soccer must use its huge participant numbers to support our case. We must voice our disgust and disapproval to those media outlets who choose to condemn soccer because of human accident.

For too long, Australian soccer followers have been a silent mass. We must use the tragedy of Hillsborough to strengthen our resolve and speak out.

If they are told enough, the ill-informed and the plain ignorant might just start to realise and treat soccer with the respect and standing it deserves.

Last Sunday was a great day for Australian soccer, yet sadly it will be remembered for all the wrong reasons unless those who love the game do something about it.

Write to your local media outlets and remind them of all the positive things in soccer. Remind them, that is why the game is the world's No. 1.

NAME DROPPING IS NOT THE UNITED ANSWERS

The second part of a proposal by Griffith University secretary, MICK KUGELMAN, on the Brisbane United issue.

The selection of a name for a combined Queensland National League entry is the aspect which triggers the interest of the masses, but in the formation of the team it is just one small aspect.

While I have no doubts the selection of a popular name will have a major bearing on the team's initial acceptance, particularly in the media and among other sporting followers, I believe at this early stage of planning, we should address the issue of the mechanics of a so-called Brisbane United.

Questions that must be answered include:

- Will officials be invited from major clubs to fil important positions in the new 'club'?
- · Will other clubs still be eligible to join the NSL?
- Will Brisbane United players be allowed to play for XXXX League teams in their offseason?
- Will the general public be able to buy shares in the new club or will its destiny be totally controlled by the QSF and its affiliates?
- Will the new team have a reserve team and where will they play? In a reserve league maybe?
- Will the XXXX League be trimmed to account for the reduction in the number of quality players available?
- · Has XXXX been approached with a view to sponsoring such a team or will the securing of a sponsor only occur after the 'club' has been formed?

An invitation to join the NSL is the only way that Brisbane will get into the NSL unless another club surrenders their right to the position. I say that to qualify for an invitation we must present a marketable product which has a good sponsor and the majority support of Queensland soccer. We musn't expect quick recognition but should map out a two to three year plan to become a major NSL club.

It will be worth the wait but talk of putting off the decision until we have a state league established is unnecessary. Our XXXX League could be brushed up, but it will never get things turning like NSL representation will. Why not talk about getting more Queensland teams into the NSL? e.g. Brisbane, Cairns, The Gold Coast, Ipswich and maybe Mackay or Rockhampton?

A few thousand people turning up regularly to see the states best players will do wonders for the determination of players who are playing in the XXXX League and on the brink of selection. Just look at how the Broncos have stepped up the production of quality local talent in Queensland. Imagine if we Brisbane United had existed for the last five years, we may have been able to boast having a number of exciting socceroos including Jason Polak and Frank Farina. Who knows how many more players we could have encouraged to develop their skills to top representative level.

The Kiwis' demolition of our hopes of qualifying for the World Cup have further highlighted the need for input from the whole of Australia to supply Frank Arok with the players he needs to get us true recognition. We hear of plans for the Socceroos to come to Brisbane to help the code in our state almost as if we are owed a favour by the ASF. I think we also owe it to the rest of Australia to get our act together and start churning out a few more players in the same class as Farina and Polak. To me Brisbane United is the only way to do that.

SOCCER LOSES A GREAT HERO

Ipswich soccer lost one of its finest stalwarts last week with the death of former Australian captain Bob Lawrie.

Lawrie, 69, passed away while on a holiday bus trip to Adelaide.

The rugged midfielder typified the style of Ipswich soccer in the 1930's and 40's and later became a staunch advocator of sportsmanship in soccer through the many school teams he overseered.

As a schoolboy, Lawrie made his senior debut with the famous but now defunct Blackstone. In 1937, in his debut senior year he achieved the probably never repeated feat of representing his city, his state and Australia in a match against Palestine.

Lawrie went on to win 24 caps and led Australia 12 times. He was captain of the side which toured South Africa in 1950. While in England serving with the RAAF he guested with Brentford. In Australia, he also had stints with Sturt (SA) and Leichhardt.

Lawrie is survived by his wife Joyce and sons Glen and Ian, the former Lions, Ipswich United and Coalstars player who was capped by Australia at under 23 level.

Lawrie's death came just a week after another Ipswich soccer stalwart, Bill Dann Snr, Passed away.

THE BALL BOUNCES RIGHT FOR BAYSIDE-CHANDLER

Bayside-Chandler has emerged as a new force in Queensland indoor soccer and is looking to cater for players from National League standard to social.

The club are the newly-crowned Queensland indoor champions and are now readying themselves for an inaugural James Hardie National Indoor League bid.

But at the same time, the club also hopes to expand its local base with the expansion of its local competitions and ladies leagues.

The recent international truce between FIFA and FIFUSA, the outdoor and indoor world soccer organisations, now ensures there is no conflict between playing the two variations of the code. The Bayside-Chandler National League squad is now training on Monday and Wednesdays. The National League games, which run from August to January, are played on weekends. The club does not pay its National League players but covers the costs of travelling and equipment.

Team manager Keith Belcher said that while teams in the south were professionals, Bayside-Chandler intended to walk before it ran.

"In many sports, and particularly in soccer, too many clubs have over-committed themselves in paying players too soon in their development and failed as a result," he said.

"We intend to get our structure well established and then when our budget can afford paying players we will look at that aspect. At this stage, if players come to the club only looking for money, then we are not really interested."

Belcher said Bayside Chandler had mapped out a \$45,000 budget for its first year in the National League. They are hoping to attract either a major sponsor or a group of smaller sponsors to help cover the costs.

The club recently staged a successful river cruise to outline its plans. It circulated an impressive sponsorship brochure which highlighted 15 areas in which support was needed. They ranged from the team's licence fee,

to uniforms, travel costs and first aid. In return for financial support the club will offer in return a wide range of benefits including television exposure and team naming rights.

On the local scene, the club also is keen to attract players into its weekly competitions. Weekly leagues are held on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

New teams can start the Tuesday competition within a fortnight while the Thursday League will begin in about a month. The cost is \$5 per person and \$30 a team, usually of six players. Players of all ages, men and women, are welcomed.

A lot of thoughts go through your mind in 60 seconds - and I certainly found that out during a minute's silence for the victims of the Hills borough tragedy at Redlands last weekend.

The fact that a club 12,000 miles away should be moved enough to show a mark of respect underlines that soccer is an unrivalled international family.

That it happened on a day when Australian soccer drew its biggest crowd this decade underlined that we are a sport of the greatest highs and the lowest lows.

Soccer is the football of the people and I have no doubts those in the game love it more than most in other codes could ever imagine.

The hurt and repercussions of the Sheffield disaster will vibrate through soccer around the world, making our game an easy target for those who don't have the same commitment - and probably nowhere moreso than in Australia.

Nothing can change what happened in England, but here in Australia we should not let it cloak our progress, development or standing.

As Australian soccer followers we must protect our game. We must stand up to those ill-informed television commentators and smart-alec reporters who want to bundle Hillsborough, the Bradford fire, Australian soccer and anything else negative about the game-they can find under the general heading of hooliganism. I don't care whether you are of British,

European, Asian, South American or Australian origin. We are all Australian soccer lovers and we have got to protect the Australian game.

To some it may seem cold that I am trying to distance Australian soccer from what happened in England. That is not the case because our hearts go out to those fellow soccer lovers who may have lost family or friends last weekend.

But they, more than onyone else, would understand that the people are the game and the game is about people. Both must always strive to rise above adversity and soldier on.

The FA Cup semi-final replay and final must go ahead — if anything, purely out of respect for those who

died at Hillsborough. There is yet to be born a true Liverpool supporter who would have even considered denying his team a chance to play at Wembley when just one step away.

Those who were killed last weekend were there to see their team win through to the FA Cup final.

They are gone, but their dream can still live on.

I would like to see the semi-final between Liverpool and Nottingham Forest replayed with one condition all fans must mix.

Hooliganism was a reflection of society that appeared in football the same way it that appeared in lootball the same way it appeared in the arts. Just like violent movies like A Clockwork Orange have now given way to gently films like Rainman, so too has there been a transition in violence in football. The advent of inflatables, the likelihood

of one of the best championship finishes in years and rising attendances around the country show English football is on the way back.

We may never get all the way back to the old "cloth cap and a program" days, but we can edge close. Let the fans mix in the replay and watch their love of the sport unite them as a crowd, not force them apart as rivals.

In the same manner, the Queensland Soccer Federation should throw the gates open for the interstate match at Perry Park next Tuesday.

Australian soccer is a family game with more households in Australia having a junior soccer player than any other sport. Perry Park with its grassed terraces is

ideal for families on match day.

It is in testing times like these that Australian soccer administrators must take initiatives and not get caught in the tide of misunderstanding.

If 43,000 people can turn out in support of the Socceroos, we should be able to get 10,000 for an interstate clash. If you really love football, and you want to show that to those in other codes who

continually thrive on our international

continually thrive on our international games lows and ignore the highs — then get out to Perry Park next Tuesday. The record books will show that the end result of Australia's four-year effort to qualify for the World Cup was failure.

But the real measure of what our code has achieved since we crashed out to Scotland in front of 20,000 fans at Olympic Park in 1986 was the attendance at the Sydney Football Stadium last Sunday.

There were 43,000 people in that stadium. I am told unofficially there were more, but Sunday was not the time to boast about over-capacities.

That turnout, which was bigger than last year's rugby league grand final, is the measure of soccer's progress. Sure, losing last weekend was a tough

setback. But Australian sport is all about underdogs and battlers.

The Socceroos have captured that image and with a little thought and clever promotion, being the national underdogs might just work in our favor.


The second team were unfortunate to lose 3-1 while the third grade played consistently and were able to secure a 5-0 win.

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
