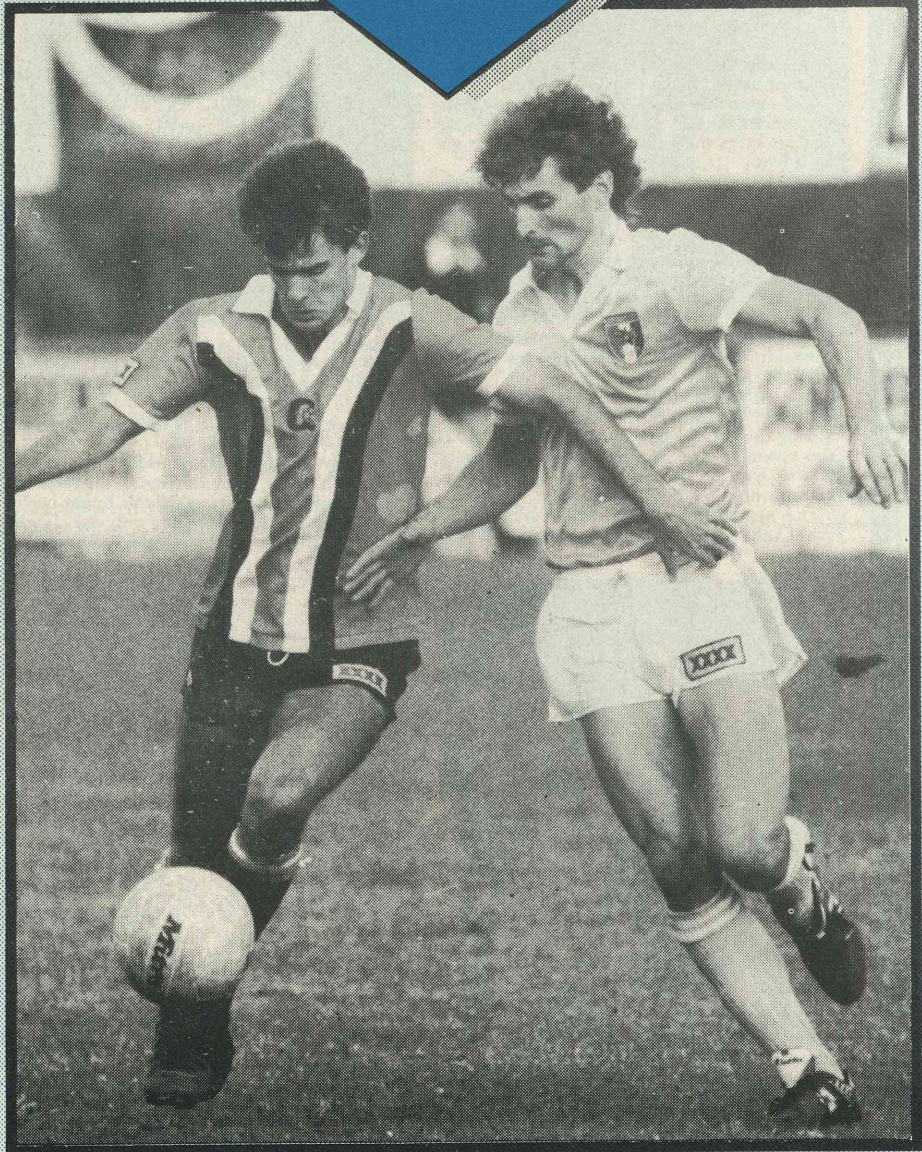

A rich winner-take-all purse is likely to be put on the State of Origin clash with New South Wales to be played at Perry Park on Saturday evening, August 19.

The announcement comes on top of the news this week that the Queensland Soccer Federation is chasing former Mareeba player Frank Farina in a bid to lure him back from overseas to play in the inaugural State of Origin clash. Farina currently plays with Belgian first division club FC Brugge.

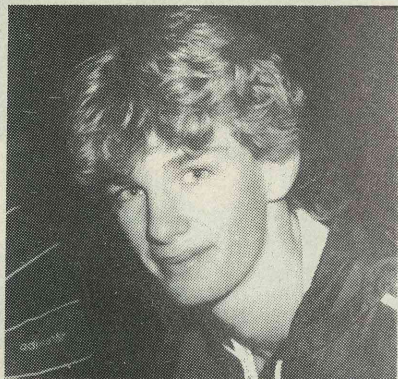
QSF executive director Dennis Murray said the winner-take-all purse would ensure there was an extra incentive for both teams to go for a win.

"In some past interstate matches there have been suggestions that NSW were up here just for a day out," he said. "I am sure the State of Origin concept will spark everyone's enthusiasm and the prizemoney will be the reward for the players' efforts."

Murray said the amount of prizemoney would be announced once negotiations with interested sponsors were completed. The purse will replace the appearance fee paid to NSW in the past.

The QSF management committee is expected to decide the prizemoney split among the players once the negotiations with the sponsors are finalised. "I would expect there would be some kind of share arrangement," Murray said.

The negotiations with Farina are now in the hands of his agent and hinge on the

Socceroos' early season commitments with Brugge.

"It may be too much to ask for him to sacrifice his first team position at the start of the season as often it is difficult to get back in," Murray said. "But we can only ask. If we could get him it would be ideal. Farina is news."

Murray said the QSF also would make enquiries as to the availability and interest of Queensland's other overseas-based players, Everton goalkeeper Jason Kearton and Rangers defender Scott Playle.

"There are only 11 places in the team so we can't go overboard, but we want to ensure the first Origin team is the best one we can put on the park under the existing circumstances."

Under the selection criteria accepted by the QSF and NSW Federation, players' State of Origin will be determined on two counts. Their home State shall be deemed the one in which they first registered as a senior in Australia, providing they have not played State representative football for any other State after the age of 15. In such cases, that State shall be deemed their home State.

The rules give Queensland coach Bruce Stowell selection access to 11 interstate-based players including Socceroos Jason Polak and Alan Hunter, Australian indoor representative Steve Jackson and Young Socceroos John Koch and Danny Wright. But the selection criteria rules out Lions defender Arno Bertogna and Gold Coast Gamblers stopper Raf. Underwood, who were members of the Queensland Residents team which had its April 25 match against NSW washed-out.

EDITORIAL

The State of Origin clash with New South Wales at Perry Park on Saturday, August 19, is the chance for Queensland soccer to show its strength on — and off — the park.

The framing of the selection eligibility rules will allow State coach Bruce Stowell to call on all the southern-based Queenslanders he must have dreamed of having in his sides in recent years. Admittedly, the rules will prevent some very talented locally-based players the opportunity to play for their State. But if we are to go State of Origin, then for the sheer credibility of the exercise, we could not have it both ways and non-Queensland produced players had to be ruled out for Maroons consideration. Indeed, the incentive is there for those players to perform well enough to be considered for their home State in this, or the proposed national State of Origin series.

Because of the novelty factor of this match, and the fact the Queensland will field one of its strongest State soccer sides in many seasons, all eyes are certain to be on Perry Park on August 19.

In real terms, it is a match Queensland soccer cannot afford to lose. Where would we go if NSW outclasses us with our homegrown stars back wearing the maroon?

But that is not an issue worth considering. What is important for this inaugural State of Origin clash is that the match is supported 100 per cent by all sections of the code. That doesn't just include XXXX League

supporters, but fans and players from lower division clubs, women's soccer, juniors and the nearby country affiliates.

Irrespective of the results Bruce Stowell and his team achieve on the park, the exercise will have been wasted unless a huge crowd turns out to show the knocker of soccer that we have something to shout about and are willing to turn out in force to do it.

In the past many have dodged the annual Residents interstate match, saying there was little interest in the match. The selection of farical teams like that chosen by NSW in April contributed to those opinions. But those excuses do not stand up for this exciting and first ever soccer State of Origin game.

This match is certain to be an insight into whether a combined Queensland team could compete in the National League to the same extent as the Broncos in the Sydney rugby league.

In many cases, there has been little to cheer about in XXXX League this summer. The State of Origin match is something new and exciting. Everyone in Queensland soccer owes it to themselves and the possible future direction of the code to support the concept and the match to the best of their ability.

THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE LAWS

How well do you know the laws of the game? Test yourself on the following questions then check your answers below. Questions and answers courtesy of the Queensland Soccer Referees Federation.

1. What is the maximum size of the playing area?
2. Can a player take a throw-in, throw the ball against the referee and immediately play it again?
3. Is it in order for a substitution to be made so that the substitute may immediately come onto the field to take a penalty just awarded?
4. Should the referee award a penalty kick when a defending player is ordered off the field for kicking or striking an opponent within the penalty area?
5. What have a place-kick, goal-kick, and throw-in in common?
6. Can a player remove a flag on the halfway line to take a throw?
7. Is a player offside if one opponent is between him and his opponent's ball and one is level with him when the ball is last played?
8. During the halftime interval, while off the field, one of the players starts abusing his captain in an ungentlemanly way. What should the referee do?

1. Length 100 yards, width 50 yards.
2. No. It would result in the awarding of an indirect freekick for playing the ball twice.
3. Yes, provided he is a named substitute and has the referee's permission to come on.

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TESTING TIMES AS ITALY PREPARES FOR THE WORLD

ROME: Luca di Montezemolo searched for the right analogy.

"It is a little like when we were students. We always hoped we'd get an extra week to prepare for our examinations. But then we almost always managed to pass even without it."

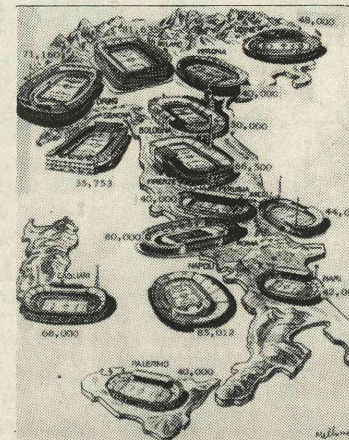
With Italy one year away from hosting the World Cup Soccer Finals, Montezemolo, as general manager of the organising committee Italia '90, likes to repeat that the competition, much as an exam, cannot be put off. But Montezemolo, and the International Football Federation (FIFA) add they are confident sports-loving, image-conscious Italy will pass the test — despite its reputation for procrastination.

"You may hear things are not going along fast enough," Guido Tognoni, FIFA's media chief, said during a visit to the host country last month. "But...the work is being done in good time. It's just that in Italy, in good time sometimes means five minutes before."

Grounds in 12 cities are due to stage 52 matches in the 24-nation tournament from the opening game in Milan with holder Argentina next June 8 to the final in Rome's Olympic Stadium on July 8. Two stadiums, in Turin and Bari, are being newly-build while the others — in Bologna, Cagliari, Florence, Genoa, Milan, Naples, Palermo, Rome, Udine and Verona — are being modernised by varying degrees.

"With one year to go, we are on schedule, and in line with our master plan," Montezemolo said.

The government has committed nearly 500 billion lire (\$A 465.99 million) to work on the World Cup stadiums, an investment Montezemolo said would put Italy "at the avant garde" of soccer facilities for the next 20 to 30 years. The 12 stadiums will be all-seating, sacrificing capacity for safety, and ticket checks during the World Cup

will start 500 metres from entrances to reduce the risk of potential crowd disturbances.

A worldwide television audience of more than 15 billion is expected to watch the tournament over its 31 days, a record according to Montezemolo for an event of any sort. Organisers say it is too soon to discuss potential profits, though estimates for revenue from ticket sales, broadcasting rights, and advertising amount to about \$US150 million (\$A199.71 million).

Of tickets available to the public in Italy, 47 per cent have already been sold, and demand from private companies is more than twice their allocation, Montezemolo said. He said sales were also proceeding well abroad including Japan, where tour packages worth five million dollars have been taken up despite the country's lack of a soccer tradition or a team to play in the finals.

The Italian rush for tickets gives some indication of the extent of the country's soccer fever since fans at many venues still do not know who they will be watching. The draw for the finals is on December 9.

AUGUST 19 is S.O.S. day for Queensland soccer — and that doesn't mean only State of Origin Soccer.

That Saturday evening is looming as one of the most critical in our code's recent history and in many ways it is Save Our Soccer night.

This type of match is the thing Queensland soccer has been looking for for so long now. It is the big match other codes had and soccer always envied.

The whole idea has no bounds if it is promoted properly and I believe there is no way it can fail in being a winner. But the extent of its success will determine how easy things are for the code in the future.

Putting in the work now to make August 19 a huge success will put Queensland soccer on a rollercoaster which it can ride to other heights very easily next year.

Queensland soccer can easily capture the imagination of the media and all sports followers by aligning our State of Origin match with other interstate clashes this season.

The Maroons have already beaten NSW comprehensively in league and union. Our pre-match publicity should be to encourage sports fans to come to Perry Park to complete the hat-trick against the Cockroaches. The QSF also should not just rely on the clubs to sell tickets as they have in past interstate matches. By lumbering clubs with a set number of tickets, for which they are billed irrespective, the QSF creates an instant negative response to the match.

Let the clubs ask for tickets, and if the promotion is done right, the demand will far outweigh the QSF's allocations.

Does the State of Origin selection criteria extend to the coaching staff?

Poor old Bruce Stowell has copped enough flak from me in recent weeks, so I'm not going to suggest that he be excluded from our "real" Queenslanders dressing room considering he is a former New South Welshman.

But I think whoever gets named as team captain should be issued with a can of Mortein, just in case Bruce reverts back to any cockroach-like tendencies.

With Lions far from full strength because of injuries, and getting into bad habits because they can cruise every second week in the XXXX League, they could find the Gamblers a little bit beyond them. 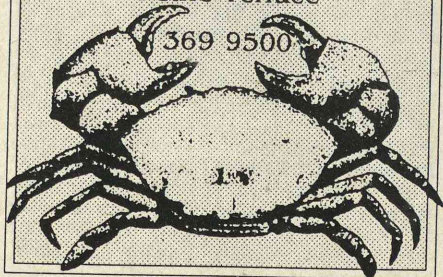
