

Queensland Director of Coaching Bruce Stowell has called for a State Soccer Academy to be established as a matter of priority to a bid to retain and properly develop our vast depths of youth talent.

Stowell' recommendation is the focus of his report submitted this week to the QSF Management Committee following the National youth championships, at which the Stowell-coached Young Maroons finished an admirable fifth.

Queensland was one of only three State sides at the Championships that had not been training and working together for months at State Federation-run Academies. The others on the outer were Northern New South Wales and Tasmania.

"It was very obvious from the outset that we were under-prepared at the Nationals compared to those sides which had been together for months," Stowell said. "Considering the progress our boys made in the few weeks we had together, it really left me wondering just how good we could be at this level with the backing of an academy."

Stowell has recommended that the State Soccer Academy be set-up along similar lines as the Australian Institute of Sport, but working in conjunction with the Canberra facility rather than in opposition.

His plan is to bring in promising young players from all parts of Queensland into a soccer school-type

arrangement. The players would still continue their formal education, but at the same time as they receive intensive coaching and sport instruction.

"While the ideal situation is to have a complex of our own such as the A.I.S. or NSW's Parklea, that is not necessary initially," Stowell said. "There are any number of soccer training facilities we could use within Brisbane and those attending the academy could be placed in specially chosen local schools.

"I envisage we could also use existing sporting and medical facilities at places like the Queensland University, QEII and the A.I.S. clinic at Mount Gravatt."

Stowell said the introduction of a soccer academy was vital if Queensland hoped to maintain pace with southern states in the development of youngsters.

"I have no doubts that already some players in Queensland have been unable to fully develop their potential, or have gone interstate to do it because we do not have a fulltime coaching facility," he said.

"Our players are naturally and technically as good as anything else interstate, but they are not developing in their education of the game because many of them are going back to club or country situations where they are not tested or made to fight for their places."

Stowell envisages that players eligible for the next national youth team intake would be targetted for the academy and would be recruited on 12month scholarships. "But really, the academy would be open to any quality players," he said.

Once the Academy was formed, Stowell would like to see a team from the facility playing in the local competition. "The way this year's youth team were playing at the end of the national titles, I have no doubts they could handle Division Two standard very easily," he said.

And unlike the A.I.S. where players are poached by Sydney and Melbourne National League Clubs, Stowell said players coming to a State Academy would remain tied to their club.

"The registration of every player would be maintained by his club and at the end of his time at the academy he would be bound to return to that club and his future decided from there," Stowell said.

EDITORIAL

The development of a soccer academy in Queensland is a project which should gain the support of all sections of the code as the benefits of such an institution will undoubtedly flow through the entire sport.

In a number of areas, Queensland soccer is struggling to keep pace with other states. To be grouped with Tasmania and Northern NSW at the recent youth nationals as the only federations without an academy underlined that the creation of our own fulltime training facility must be initiated as

recommending the establishment of a soccer academy in Brisbane as the main point of his post-nationals report to the QSF Management Committee. The ball now is very much in their court.

While the ideal set-up would be facilities akin to those offered to players in the soccer section of the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra, obviously that cannot be achieved in the short term. But Brisbane is a sporting City and the legacy of international events like the 1982 Commonwealth Games, the 1987 Pan Pacific swim meet and the recent Konica Gymnastics Grand Prix has been a host of sporting facilities and expertise. They include indoor and outdoor stadiums at Chandler, QEII and Boondall and world class medical back-ups at the Queensland University and the A.I.S. clinic at Mount Gravatt.

A soccer academy could make full use of these facilities along with those which our code has developed itself, such as fine stadiums at Perry Park, Spencer Park and Richlands.

Obviously, the level to which the academy can operate in its fledgling years will hinge on the finances available. But perhaps some of the quit sponsorship funds allocated to Queensland could be channelled in this direction.

The creation of a youth development facility would have appeal to many companies and moves to gain sponsorship also should be initiated.

The drain of talent from Queensland soccer to the south has been constant in recent seasons and there appears no sign it will stop, particularly while we have no NSL representation. If we hope to retain at least a few of our latest crop of youngsters, we must give them some kind of incentive to stay.

A Queensland soccer academy will at least show them that Queensland soccer is interested in their development.

The recent publicity surrounding the abnormally high number of cases before the QSF Disciplinary Committee should have prompted a serious look at the problem by those in all section of our code.

But after having watched a number of matches at the weekend, it seems there are still some who are continuing to act irresponsibily. Unfortunately, some of the offenders include those who should be setting an example.

A team's disciplinary record is a reflection of the coach and his attitude towards the game and the rules. Players on the park can be easily incited to break the rules if they are being encouraged to do so from the bench.

ACROSS MY DESK

Coaches must realise their role in helping to stamp out unruly behaviour and set the example from the sidelines, and take action where necessary against persistently offending players.

The Disciplinary Committee recently dealt with 41 cases. The minutes of their last meeting will show the situation has not improved. It cannot continue, action must be taken now and coaches must lead the way. Two well-meaning adults got into quite a tangle attempting to put up some nets to enable a schoolboy game to go ahead the other day at Marist Brothers Rosalie. In the end, the pair's unsuccessful and at times for the schoolboys, amusing efforts prompted the attention of the school groundsman who whipped up the nets in no time. One wonders if the groundsman knew he was coming to the aid of Easts XXXX League coach John Sime and State soccer coach, Bruce Stowell?

The commitment to the code of one referee at The Gap last Sunday has to be questioned. Assigned to the Reserves game, the uniformed official was quite content to watch the entire Third grade game, less the opening five minutes, which was being controlled by a wellmeaning but unqualified spectator who volunteered when no ref fronted and it looked like the game might not go ahead. Despite pleas from the spectator for the ref to take the whistle, he sat perched in a chair watching. Perhaps the spectator showed the referee what a real love of the game is all about

a real love of the game is all about. Thankfully, another referee restored some faith in the whistlers last Sunday. He caught a train from Cleveland to the city, then a bus along Samford Road before walking the last few kilometres to referee a Third Grade game at Mitchelton.

Kearton, currently holidaying in Australia, has told Queensland coach Bruce Stowell he would assess the possibility of getting a release for the match once he returned to Goodison Park for pre-season training.

"Jason has indicated that if he returns to Everton and, Neville Southall and Mike Stowell are still there and, he is playing in the A team (third side), he would think about approaching the club to come back to Australia for the origin match," Stowell said. "But I have stressed to him not to place his future at the club in any jeopardy."

Goodna could have finished with their best scoreline of the season had it not been for some desperate keeping, bad luck and poor finishing.

The first 10 minutes of the game saw Goodna crowding themselves in the middle of a very uneven pitch. 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
The second team had an excellent game which resulted in a 1-1 draw. The Third team were able to secure a 3-0 win.

Soccer's strength is its number of participants, yet when anything occurs in relation to players they are left to be a lone voice.

Episodes involving two players at Brisbane City recently, highlighted this problem yet again. John Figliano managed to beat the system and get the council of clubs to overturn a decision and moved onto Easts.

Kieran Cooper found that getting away can be difficult, if not impossible. I am happy that Kieran has decided to stay at City and once again is playing. To have him on the sidelines for whatever reason would have been a tragic waste.

But the incidents highlighted that the time is right for players to be represented by their own combined voice.

I am not advocating a hard-line union or any situation where players hold clubs and federations to ransom as has occurred in soccer and other codes overseas. But a player who has been dealt unfairly by his club should be advised of his rights and have some kind of organisation, with clout, go in to bat for him.

An individual will rarely be heard. A reputable organisation putting forward the player's point of view will at least ensure a fair hearing.

A players' organisation could extend its involvement far in excess of being involved in transfer disputes.

The injury to Redlands player Paul Hull last Sunday highlighted one of the sadder sides of our code and I am sure all players wish him a speedy recovery.

A players' organisation could ensure that their members who were seriously injured received the best possible medical treatment and were not left out of pocket.

Doubling up among players is not uncommon at this stage of the season where suspensions and injuries deplete the depth at many club.

Why then can't referees do the same? I fully understand that referees are stretched to the limit, but it was distressing to watch a situation last Sunday where a qualified official stood on the sideline and watched a wellmeaning father trying his best to control a match. If players are doubling up in Third Grade and Reserves, then referees should do their part, and do the same. Obviously there should be a fresh referee for the main matches, but there is no reason why those assigned to the lines cannot turn up earlier and do a match in the middle.

Whatever anyone thinks, having someone in black and white on the field adds a whole new complexion to a game.

When something has failed, those with the future in mind, step in and make changes.

Queensland soccer has had a restructuring that hasn't worked. While some clubs given the opportunity to play in the top division have done their part, there are just as many who haven't.

The Division Two clubs have shown repeatedly in the Ampol Cup that they can compete with XXXX League sides and in playing standards alone there is little between the Two Divisions.

Somebody has not got to step in and introduce two-up, two-down promotion and relegation between the two top leagues. To sidestep the issue is only to pro-

To sidestep the issue is only to prolong the agony which will be the final rounds of this year's XXXX League.

The rivalry in Division Two reminds me of the old Brisbane First Division.

Club supporters not only follow their team, but turn out in droves to see other matches which affect their side's position. I am sure that will happen in coming weeks with games like Acacia Ridge against Croatia at Proud Field on Saturday week.

I have no doubts the crowd will include Croatia, Inala and Wynnum supporters and probably a lot of envious XXXX League people who wish their competition was as interesting.



The course will be held over two weekends and three mid-week night sessions from Saturday, October 7. The cost is \$75, which includes the comprehensive BHP Manual.


