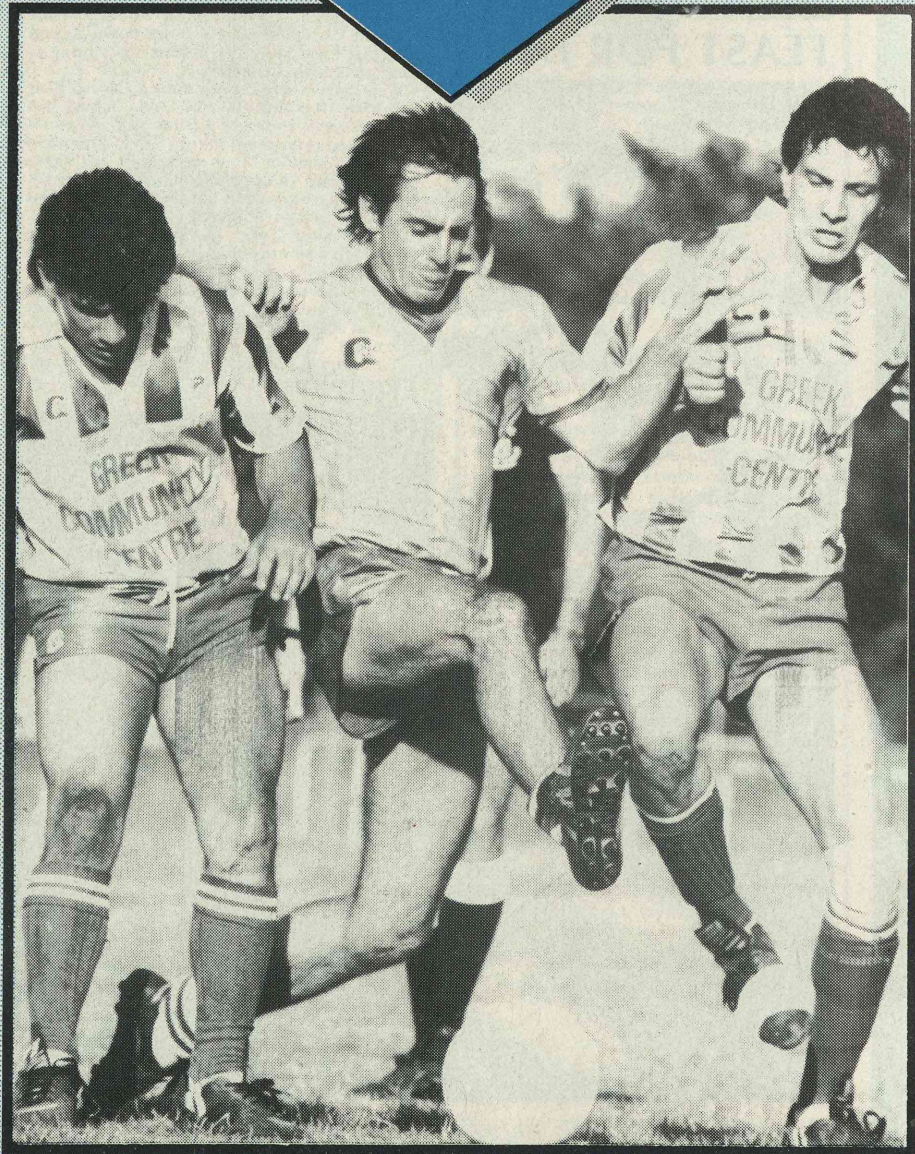

TOP CLASHES TO BE A FOOTBALL FEAST FOR FANS

Top-of-the-table clashes in XXXX League and Division Two are final chances for two teams involved to keep alive their premiership hopes. Brisbane Lions must beat North Star at Richlands on Sunday while Ipswich United similarly must down Acacia Ridge at Proud Field on Saturday evening to keep their title hopes alive.

With seven rounds remaining, North Star will kick 10 points clear of Lions if they win this weekend and only a freak run of results would stop them from taking the premiership flag. But should Lions win, and get three points from their game in hand against Rochedale, they would move to within a point of the runaway leaders.

In Division Two, Ipswich United have slipped five points behind joint leaders Acacia Ridge and Croatia after a shock loss in Toowoomba a week ago. A win to the Ridge would all but end Ipswich's challenge, while Croatia should collect three points at home to Nerang.

The scenario is set in both divisions, and the football is sure to be desperate.

EDITORIAL

The conclusions of the National League last weekend, and the final table placings, highlighted two issues which must be urgently addressed by the Australian Soccer Federation and closely noted by Queensland clubs with NSL aspirations.

Those clubs which finished in the top five were largely those that were there last season. Undoubtedly in Australia's premier competition it seems the strong are getting stronger, and the rest are hanging on. But it is at the other end of the table that the real issues come to light.

For the second consecutive year, the team which won its way into the NSL through the three-state play-off series finished last and were banished back to their State League. Despite spending thousands in a final and desperate bid for survival, Heidelberg followed the same path as did Brisbane Lions the previous year.

The ASF, in its mooted review of the NSL, must take a long and hard look at relegation. Should another ill-equipped State League champion be allowed to climb in with the big boys and become every other team's insurance against relegation? Should a team which has battled hard to regain its NSL status, such as Heidelberg and Lions, be given more the 12 months to regain their footing in the NSL? Should the team winning the promotion play-offs, or advancing directly from the NSW State League for that

matter, have to beat the relegated clubs before being given an NSL place?

There will always be some clubs ambitious enough to mount an NSL bid, North Star seemingly is one of them. But what is there to be gained by these clubs following a successful State League season with an NSL disaster?

The other team relegated from the NSL this season was Melbourne City — formerly Footscray JUST. The club made history this time last year by becoming the first franchised NSL side. The experiment has not worked. It has to be asked, why?

The ASF reportedly is strongly considering introducing a fully-franchised NSL. Are there pitfalls in such a scheme which have been partly unearthed at Melbourne City?

One can only learn from mistakes and obvious grave errors of judgement were made at those relegated clubs this season. What is important now is that those problems are addressed.

The ASF must take appropriate action to ensure two more lambs are not sacrificed at the end of next season while a handful of others become inordinately powerful.

ACROSS MY DESK

Recent comments about the untidy appearance and incorrect attire being worn by players in the XXXX League is very concerning.

Players in the premier division have a responsibility to set an example for those in the lower leagues and in particular in the junior ranks. Nothing looks worse than a player on the park with his socks down and his shirt out.

It is a poor advertisement for himself, his club and the code.

The practice of wearing socks down furthermore is a serious safety concern. Just this week, FIFA issued a directive to referees to begin noting in their reports the standard of dress among players, particularly the

wearing of socks up in line with the policy of compulsory shinguards.

The wearing of shinguards will be mandatory worldwide at all levels of soccer from next season. Recently, in an international game, two players were booked prior to kick-off for ignoring the new rule.

Queensland players would be well advised to start getting into good onfield dress habits, which includes shinguards, socks up and shirts in. And coaches and club officials should begin policing it.

THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE LAWS

How well do you know the laws of the game? Test yourself on the following questions then check your answers below. Questions and answers courtesy of the Queensland Soccer Referees Federation.

- When can an infringement of the Laws go unpunished?

OUR TERRIFIC 12 WIN SELECTION

TWELVE Queensland girls have been named in national squads after the Australian Under 16 and Under 19 championships last week.

Seven girls were named from the Under 16 team which finished third in Adelaide. They are: Kim Revell (Deception Bay), Kylie Franklin (Toowoomba), Melissa Fenech (Ipswich), Bronwyn Hart (South Burnett), Zoe Smith (Pine Hills), Tracey Little (Gold Coast) and Jackie Speechley (Gold Coast). The selections were the first Australian representations for QSF lower division clubs Pine Hills and Deception Bay.

The girls will attend a training camp at the AIS in Canberra in October.

Five girls were named in the national under 19 squad after Queensland won the Australian championship undefeated in Darwin. It was the Maroons' first win in the seven-year history of the tournament.

They are: Kathy O'Neill (Westside), Tanya Corbett (Redlands), Kim Ketter (Redlands), Tammy Sprott (Blackwater) and Claire Nichols (Easts).

The 22-member squad will be trimmed to 16 at a training camp at the AIS in August before leaving for a three-Test tour of New Zealand in September.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To whom it may concern,

And I sincerely hope it concerns anyone that is involved in soccer.

On Sunday July 2, I witnessed the most disgusting display I have ever seen in all my years of watching soccer. The game was between Ipswich and Inala Third grade teams. What happened was an **almost all**, all-in brawl on the field.

What caused it? Lack of discipline on the part of the players and a referee who did not hand out any discipline.

On 4EB the previous Saturday it was mentioned that something should be done about the fact that there were 22 sendoffs in one weekend. I would rather see 22 send-offs in one game than see a repeat of this farcical game of soccer.

The referee chose to take no action when players were pulling one another by the shirts — when players were making dirty tackles — when players were kicking their opponents — and when players were punching their opponents. He did give one yellow card but **NOT** for the punch that had been thrown, for back chatting him about his decision.

The ref may as well not have turned up because his lack of action gave the players the go ahead to do just as they pleased.

The spectators could see what was coming but the ref seemed oblivious to the situation he was creating.

Then it did happen — a solidly built (supposedly mature) Ipswich player and a slightly built 16-year-old (playing his first season with the seniors) Inala player became entangled in a far too physical tackle—the 16-year-old was trying to stand up when the Ipswich player allegedly kicked him in the stomach — the 16-year-old retaliated — this is usually when you hear the refs whistle — I did not hear it. Another Ipswich player decided his mate could not handle the 16-year-old and stepped in—it then became 2 to 1—then an Inala player decided to even up the score and in a matter of seconds there were arms, legs and bodies all over the place — **AND** the ref, who was in no danger from anyone at all, was running for the refs' room.

I have tremendous respect for the few players that kept cool heads and worked to break up the brawl even though they were hit for their trouble — I have respect for the player who stood amidst two hostile teams and told them exactly what he thought of their childish behaviour; told them it was over, finished, let's get back to playing soccer — this is when they realised that the ref had gone and that he had abandoned their game. I also have respect for the large majority of the spectators who maintained their places and did not add to the confusion on the field.

The whole incident probably only lasted less than three minutes but it seemed like eternity.

Who was to blame?

The man in charge (the referee) in my opinion was at fault for letting this particular game get out of hand. **BUT** it goes much deeper than that. **PLAYERS** are at fault for having no self-discipline — **COACHES** are at fault for not disciplining their players — **COMMITTEES** are at fault for not protecting the name of their club by disciplining coaches and players — the **QSF** is at fault for not protecting the good name of soccer by disciplining clubs that have consistent discipline problems — and the **REFEREES FEDERATION** is at fault for sending out a referee who for some reason was not capable of maintaining control.

I sincerely hope that that referee is not allowed to officiate another senior match until he has learned that he is the one in charge and that soccer is not like the other codes of football—anything **DOES NOT** go.

Lets get the thuggery out of soccer before soccer gets the reputation of being organised gang fights.

TALKING

Four chairs for four invisible men — that's what I will have waiting for our QSF friends at Proud Field on Saturday night for the Division Two clash between Acacia Ridge and Ipswich United.

And anyone who wants to come along to meet the Invisible Men is quite welcome.

Admittedly, if it's anything like the season so far, it might be hard to spot our invisible friends because even after I blew their cover several weeks ago, the only result was a brief flash of Shazzam from Bruce Stowell.

But just to be sure no-one accidentally sits on top of the Invisible Men on what they might think is a rare spare chair at Proud Field on Saturday evening, we'll have Sammy Spence on the gate.

No-one gets past Sammy without him knowing — but if the Four Invisible Men appear briefly to give him the nod, we'll even let them in for free.

Doubleheaders — if I keep saying it, someone might do something.

On the corresponding first round weekend that featured fixtures between Lions and North Star and Acacia Ridge and Ipswich United, I called for the two matches to be combined at the same ground.

Admittedly, I received some correspondence from Perry Park on the subject and take many of the points raised. But I still believe we have to overcome those problems and make the effort to schedule doubleheaders on a weekly basis.

Acacia Ridge president Alex Hill has told me he would have gladly agreed to switch our game to a Perry Park doubleheader with Lions and North Star if suitable compensation was offered.

I just find it hard to understand why on Saturday night fans must choose between Proud Field, Underwood Park and soccer headquarters then on Sunday can go to Richlands for the big one, or three other XXXX League matches.

Some clubs wouldn't like their fixtures being scheduled away from the key timeslots, but quite frankly, their football doesn't deserve top billing.

A Queensland soccer academy is a superb idea, but its objective must be vastly different to that of the Institute of Sport in Canberra.

To me, the AIS is a lollipop factory for those with the money to buy the best sweets.

Any Queensland academy has to be a soccer establishment producing talented players for Queensland soccer. The entire structure must be geared towards being the prime nursery for our combined entry into the National League.

That means bonding those on scholarships at the academy to the state for a comparable time after their terms completed.

The world of any state soccer academy must go beyond schoolboys.

The hardest thing top sportsmen and women find is getting a trade or profession

behind them. Queensland soccer should use its sponsors like Bond, Qantas, Ampol and the like to open avenues for apprenticeships and cadetships.

Those chosen for the Academy would be expected to achieve a scholastic standard as well as achieving on the field, and if they reach those ideals, they would be excellent recruits for these large companies.

Admittedly, early on the company may lose a little because of the demands of training and competition, but their returns would come with any success achieved by their employee and of course once his sporting career is finished he returns to the company as a fulltime, qualified and experienced member of their staff.

It has taken a while, but thankfully the coaches from the top two divisions are to meet again.

I have been critical of the results of our initial meeting some months ago, but this time we have been asked to assemble on July 31 armed with the thoughts of our clubs on a number of issues.

Hopefully this time our suggestions will prompt those concerned into swift action to implement the necessary changes and improvements.

I certainly hope George Best doesn't collect souvenir spoons, because the one from Brisbane will be a glaring omission from his recent trip to Australia.

Best, arguably the most gifted footballer ever, has been to just about everywhere in Australia, extending an initial three week visit to six weeks. He did get to Queensland, but Cairns, not Brisbane.

What is wrong with Brisbane soccer that we missed out on this bandwagon.

Say what you like about Best, but he is news and the amount of publicity he generated for soccer in Perth, Adelaide, Sydney and Melbourne could not be bought.

No-one can turn a youngster into a good player in one coaching session, Best or anyone else. But there are few coaches in Australia could motivate as many youngsters so quickly to go home and practice than someone like Best.

And Brisbane's Idol-starved young players missed out on that.

Full marks to Fred Koch for his suggestion last week for a City versus Country Under 21 match as a curtain-raiser to the State of Origin. The idea is simple and brilliant. But as I've learned in being a columnist for three years, few of the many good ideas suggested in Go Soccer are ever followed through.

"OLD PRO" HAD IT RIGHT!

This item was the lead article of Go Soccer's predecessor, **SOCCER RECORD**, on April 19, 1924. The comment piece, written by "Old Pro", highlights that 65 years later, not too much has changed:

"Why are you a referee?" I once asked a well-known official.

"Goodness knows!" he replied. "Certainly not for what I make by it! The pay is not very handsome, as you will admit. But there is a fascination about the work, despite all the criticism one is subject to. Perhaps it is because one likes to be in authority, and to wield power."

Yet we cannot get on without the man with the whistle, the man who shapes the destinies of clubs and whose endeavour is to keep the scales of justice and fairness swinging evenly. Truly he has a most responsible and important part to play, and often he does not receive the recognition that is his due. Whilst the men in the shirts and shorts are only units, the presiding official is supreme, and on him the success or failure of a match may depend. Many a time one has left the ground with the feeling that the man with the whistle has spoilt the game.

What is the highest qualification of the referee? I should say, unhesitatingly, personality. Any man can learn the rules off pat, but it does not follow that he is a good referee. However wide his knowledge, he is bound to make mistakes, and it is

then that trouble arises, unless he has already clearly shown that he will not tolerate interference. Indeed, the impression he creates in this respect is just as important in its effect on the spectators as it is on the players. A man must be strong. He must demonstrate to the players as quickly as the occasion arises that he is not going to put up with any tomfoolery, and if he would win the approval of the crowd he must stick to his decisions at all costs. Very rarely does it pay to change a ruling though to do so when it is obvious that a mistake has been made is not by any means a sign of weakness.

The bad referee is both a nuisance and a danger. He ruffles the players, and, worse still, he unsettles the crowd, whose influence, in such matters is very far reaching. The spectators fling their half bricks of criticism at him, and under these conditions it is scarcely surprising that the players are apt to take matters into their own hands. The stong referee is quick to see tempers rising, and he is just as quick to apply the needed corrective. It is in these circumstances that you get the best matches and the most interesting play.

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KINGSRIDGE

DIVISION TWO THIRDS: Kingsridge 4 v Latrobe Valley 2:

This game was nearly a non-event with only nine Kingsridge and seven Latrobe Valley players initially taking the field. Both sides gradually added extra players for an 11-10 line-up and it took 20 minutes before both teams finally settled down.

The visitors gained the upperhand and in the 24th minute a Latrobe Valley striker found himself in a one-on-one with keeper Tony Oliveira, who he rounded easily to open the scoring. They added a second seven minutes later after a defensive lapse. Kings began to get back into the game and six minutes from the break, the home side pulled a goal back when a cross from Colt Martin Rudge found Barry Rhodes waiting on the penalty spot.

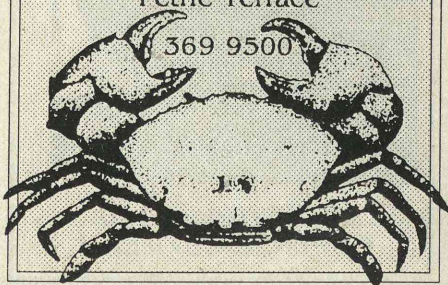
