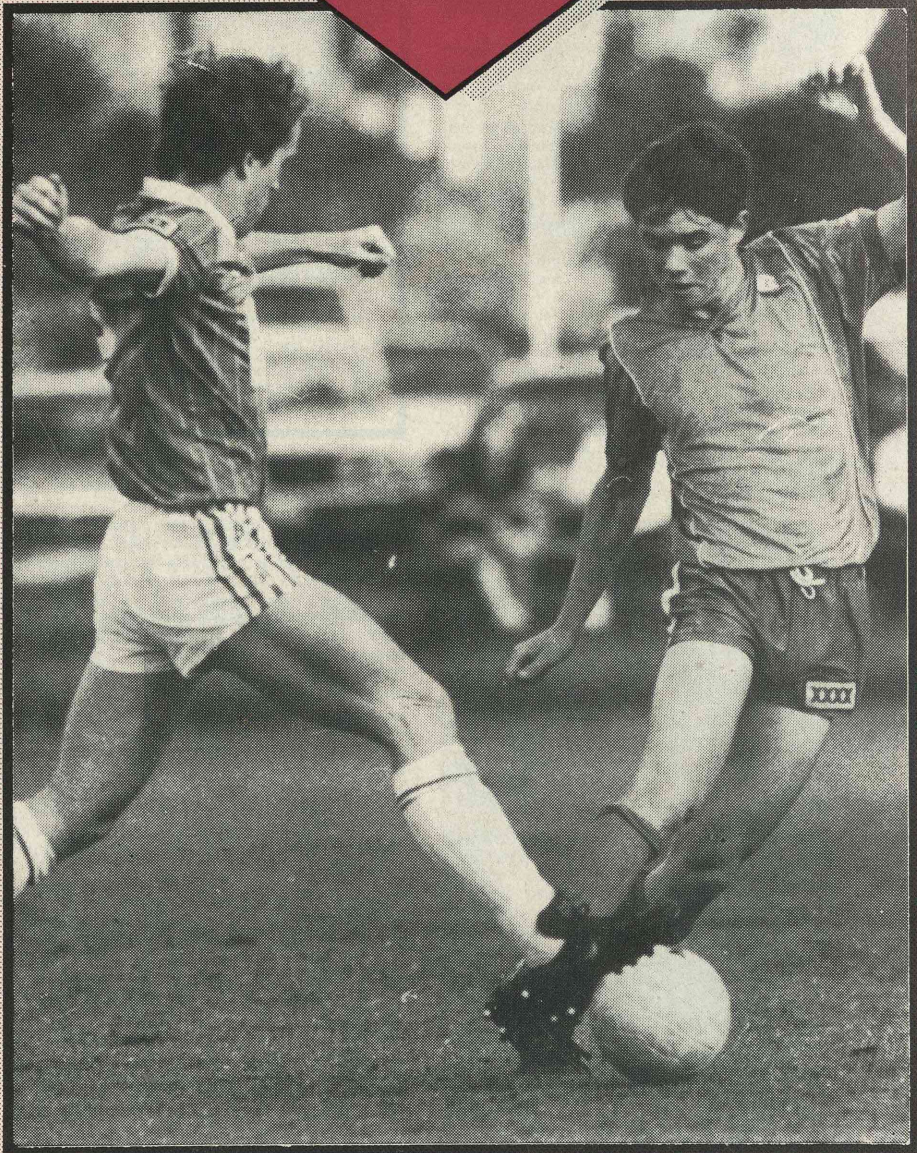

FIVE locals and six expatriates — that's the starting team choice of Go Soccer readers who entered our State of Origin tickets contest.

A summary of the many entries has produced a team which certainly will provoke discussion, irrespective of its likeness to that to be chosen by Queensland coach Bruce Stowell for the big clash with NSW at Perry Park on August 19.

Those players picked in the Go Soccer starting XI, and the three reserves, were those who received the most among the entries, in their respective positions.

The locals who gained the nod included only three current XXXX League players — Lions' David Hunter and Nick Meredith and Mount Gravatt's Alan Niven. The other locals were Ipswich United's Peter Vogler and Southport's Gold Coast Gambler, Paul Halford.

The keenest competition came for the No. 1 jersey. Former Lions keeper Jason Kearton, now with Everton and yet to confirm his availability, gained first up selection — but only narrowly from Mount Gravatt's Stu Woodruffe. Lions keeper Rob Farrow polled strongly despite his recent wrist injury.

Expatriates Steve Jackson (Preston) and Alan Hunter (Sydney Croatia) were near unanimous choices for the central defence, while David Hunter was a popular rightback. Leftback seemed to be the position most found difficult to fill with Niven the most fancied from many suggestions.

Sydney Olympic's Jason Polak was named in every entry. His midfield partners in a hotly contested section of the team were Heidelberg's John Stewart and Meredith, who were both one vote ahead of a host of others.

The three frontrunners all received strong support, although many other names were put forward.

The three reserves places went to those players who polled next best in the categories of goalkeeper, defender-midfielder; midfielder-striker. John Koch (Sydney Olympic) was named as a defender, midfielder and striker which underlined his versatility which makes him an ideal substitute.

The surprise omission was former Cairns and Marconi striker Frank Farina, now playing in Belgium. He was named in only a handful of entries, possibly because most considered he would not be available for the match.

Other players who featured prominently in the polling included Russell Stewart (Lions), Frank Pimblett (Brisbane City), Stein Grodum (Easts) and Manis Lamond (Sydney Croatia).

North Star player-coach Billy Williamson will not concede his team are XXXX League premiers until it is mathematically impossible for them to be overtaken.

North Star skipped seven points clear of second-placed Lions and moved 13 ahead of third-placed Brisbane City after their 3-3 draw with Lions at Richlands on Sunday. There are only five rounds remaining, although Lions have a game in hand against Mount Gravatt.

Williamson conceded his team are hot favorites to win the title, but he is wary of making a pre-mature prediction.

"There is still a bit of work to do yet, and it would be nice to finish the season undefeated," he said.

Lions coach Frank Liddell believes his team still has a chance, but their hopes rest in the hands of others. But he believes last weekend's match showed the best team are not the league leaders.

"We proved to the critics, including their coach, that we're the better team," Liddell said. "We only needed a bit of luck and they had it all."

EDITORIAL

The time has come for the Queensland Soccer Federation to ask some serious question of the Australian Soccer Federation about the QUIT smoking sponsorship.

The multi-million dollar deal struck at the beginning of this year hinged on the respective non-smoking lobbies in each state contributing funds towards the code. This has happened elsewhere, like South Australia where government policy dictates similar financial backing for any sport which severs ties with tobacco companies.

That law does not exist in Queensland, and it must be with great concern that the QSF learned recently that the Queensland Cancer Fund cannot support the sponsorship proposal as nitted out at national level.

Where that leaves Queensland soccer is uncertain. But what is fact is that there will be no Queensland soccer Rothman's medal this year and the likelihood of any similar replacement eventuating is fast diminishing as the end of the season approaches.

Also lost to Queensland soccer is any revenue earned from signage at Perry Park and numerous club grounds as well as any benefits from what was the Rothmans-sponsored national coaching foundation.

It might be that the funding problems in Queensland are only a minor hiccup and ASF chairman Ian Brusasco, who negotiated the deal, has matter in hand. Queensland soccer can only hope that is the case.

But whatever the situation, those within the code here must be told where we stand. Queensland soccer cannot afford to be left without the backing of Rothmans unless replacement sponsorships are forthcoming.

It's time for the ASF to cough up with the answers or the QSF could not be blamed for being lured back to what was a happy habit of being linked with a cigarette company.

ACROSS MY DESK

As clubs find their player depth stretched at this time of the year through injuries and suspensions, they should be reminded of the rules relating to stacking before enlisting the aid of players from other teams.

The QSF constitution is quite clear in relation to the offence. A team will be deemed to have been "stacked" if — "on the team-sheet there are THREE OR MORE players who have participated (meaning having taken the field) in the TWO immediately prior consecutive matches in a higher division."

The Go Soccer tables are a good guide as to which division are deemed higher than others, with the exception of Combination League, which is ranked after Division Eight. Clubs keen to clinch premierships, promotion or

semi-final places should not be tempted to "stack" their sides. The gain can only be short-term, particularly in the finals situation. Eligibility for finals will be outlined next week.

A club caught staking would risk having its result changed to a 0-3 loss and may lose its good behaviour bond.

Clubs that find themselves short of players can fill the gaps without stacking by using commonsense in the selection of those players asked to double up.

THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE LAWS

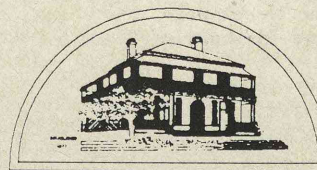
How well do you know the laws of the game? Test yourself on the following questions then check your answers below. Questions and answers courtesy of the Queensland Soccer Referees Federation.

1. How and where must a ball be taken when a freekick is taken?
2. May the referee ask a neutral linesman to give an opinion of whether the ball crossed the goal-line between the posts?
3. What ought a referee record during a match?
4. In the second half of a match, five minutes, are lost to injuries and time-wasting action. How much, if any, must the referee add on to make up for these?
5. Both teams come onto the field in identically coloured socks and shorts. What does the referee do?
6. If in doubt about a goal being scored, what should a referee do?
7. When should a game be stopped for an injury?
8. May a team change at halftime from wet red shirts to dry blue ones?

1. Stationary and at the point where the offence occurred.
2. Yes.
3. Time of play, goals scored, cautions and any misconduct.
4. Normally five minutes, but at the referee's discretion.
5. Nothing. This is in order if the shirts are different, unless the competition rules expressly forbid it.
6. Do not allow a goal unless a neutral linesman signals for it.
7. When in the referee's opinion, a player has been seriously injured.
8. Yes, if no colour clash with the opponents is involved.

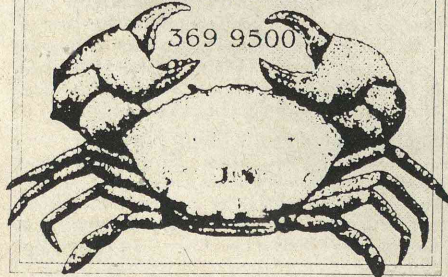
