Brisbane City captain Frank Pimblett is looming as a popular choice to captain Queensland in the inaugural State of Origin clash against New South Wales at Perry Park on August 19.

State coach Bruce Stowell is keeping his thought close to his chest, but revealed this week that Pimblett was under consideration for inclusion in the 15 or 16-man squad to be named next Tuesday. If the talented midfielder gains a berth, he seems a logical choice to lead the Maroons.

Pimblett, 32, who is in a comeback season after quitting the game four years ago, is a former State captain. He led the Maroons against NSW in the 3-0 triumph in 1983.

In his former NSL days with Brisbane City, Pimblett gained a reputation for always being quick to tell a referee what he thought of a decision. But that seems to be the Pimblett of old.

He has returned a much more mature player, who already this season has gained the admiration of many referees for helping to calm tense on-field situations. One leading referee last weekend even suggested Pimblett could be a runaway winner when, or if, the best and fairest point are tallied.

Pimblett's former City team-mate, Bob Hamilton — who was his marker in the XXXX League clash at Spencer Park last Sunday — has no doubts the ex-Aston Villa player should be back in the Queensland team.

"Frank has lost nothing for being out of the game," Hamilton said. "I always have had a great respect for Frank and nothing has changed.

"He is not going to be included in the Queensland team for his workrate but Bruce Stowell would find it hard to pick a better organiser and midfield director."

For Pimblett, the speculation about a State team recall all seems a little much in his return season. "I came back to enjoy myself and never really thought about making Queensland teams," he said. "I'm certainly enjoying myself again and to be included in the State of Origin squad would be a huge bonus. I wouldn't even dare thinking about being Queensland captain at this stage."

Pimblett revealed his long-term intentions are to get into coaching, but with kids before seniors.

"I've done some work with kids before and really loved it," he said. "I think I need a bit of grounding and experience before I start considering a senior coaching spot. It's something to work towards, but at the moment I'm just enjoying my game.

"I gave it away because the enjoyment had gone, but it's good to be back and feeling right about the game. My only disappointment is I see a lot of other players in the league with so much to offer who at times appear only going through the motions."

YOUR CHANCE TO MAKE THE WORLD CUP!

The A.S.R.F. Queensland division has great difficulty in recruiting and training referees in sufficient quantities to meet the required standards.

Many arguments have been put forward over the last 25 years propounding the reason for this failure. Whatever the merits of the various sides of the argument certain facts are indisputable. They are:

1. Very few players who reach a high standard of playing skills take up refereeing.

 A large number of those people — men and women who take up refereeing resign after just one season. And sometimes before. The percentage varies from country to country, but is very high — 70% or more.

Many theories are advanced as to why senior players do not take up refereeing.

- They are unable to take criticism at a personal level — as players they are inclined to hide behind a team.
- They are unable to cope with the change from participating in top games to one of refereeing junior or less skilled games.
 The lower grades are not competitive enough for them.
- They believe refereeing is unpopular with spectators.

If one thinks about the qualities required to be a top referee it usually transpired that knowledge of the laws is not the number one quality. In fact the following list was agreed upon as being the top traits of a good referee: fitness, firmness, fairness, good communicator, approachable, man management, courage, and believe it or not, knowledgeable.

EDITORIAL

Complaints of over-reaction in relation to two recent disciplinary incidents were as foolish as they were predictable.

Two editorials in the past month highlighted the worrying growth of disciplinary cases and the warnings were loud and clear that something had to be

The QSF disciplinary committee could not be blamed for taking a hardline for the alleged abuse of a referee by Billy Williamson, nor should referee Bill Monteverde be criticised for handing out a rash of cards when players in the southside derby at Underwood Park last Saturday night clearly were not interested in playing football under the rules.

Not surprisingly in both cases, club officials went on the attack and looked to blame everyone else other than those responsible - the players.

To his credit, Williamson admitted his quilt and took his suspension without complaint. On his past record, his outing was probably harsh, but in the current disciplinary climate in Queensland soccer, the time had passed for letting offenders off lightly.

Williamson is a player and coach of enormous stature in the code and examples must come from the top.

But it seems some never learn, Just two days after Williamson's outing, which should have been a warning for all, players were into it again at Rochedale. Apart from an early card. Monteverde did not start booking players until the 60th minute. Surely that is more than enough warning?

Yet afterwards, the main topic of conversation in the clubhouse was Monteverde's ineptitude. Those of that opinion are clearly overlooking the entire problem. A more positive attitude would have been for the clubs involved to fine the booked players, whose actions may have cost their team a win.

Referees don't break rules, players do. And while players continue to go beyond the laws of the game, they cannot expect - nor should get - any sympathy when they are caught and convicted.

The other worrying aspect to emergy in relation to recent matches in a growing practice of trying to get players sent off. There can be no excuse if a player accepts the bait, but the time has come for action from referees and club officials against those troublemakers who niggle, incite and insult players until finally their targets react and are sent-off it is bad sportsmanship at its worst and the code should stamp out these sneaks as much as the blatant troublemakers.


