

At the risk of starting the great debate all over again, I thought it appropriate I bring the soccer fraternity up to date on the "Brisbane United" proposal.

Last year the QSF Management Committee commissioned an NSL Task Force to determine the feasibility of a combined entry to the National Soccer League and the degree of support for the Brisbane United concept. In essence, the Task Force was to recommend a course of action designed to secure and maintain a successful Queensland presence in the National League.

The Task Force submitted its report in November last year and was subsequently given, "in principle", approval to continue its work on the basis outlined in the report.

The Task Force report strongly supported the establishment of a

United or Not?

Brisbane United. It found that the concept -

- Had widespread, but not universal, support within soccer circles.
- Was promotable on a similar basis to the 'Bullets', 'Broncos' and 'Bears' and should thus attract a high level of media coverage and public support.
- Had far greater prospects of success than any known alternative.

Support

The report also made it clear that, for a Brisbane United to succeed and also serve the interests of Queensland Soccer, it must among other things -

- Have (and be seen to have) the widespread co-operation and support of the soccer fraternity;
- Have a clearly defined corporate structure which -
- (1) provides for ownership by the soccer community as well as private and corporate investors, and
- (2) operates on a basis which strikes a fair balance between the interests of the game and
- Adopt a policy which is supportive of Queensland soccer and places emphasis on the development of local talent.

On that basis, it is intended that Brisbane United will be jointly owned by the Queensland Soccer Federation, its member Clubs and Affiliates and private interests. Each of these three groups will have the right to elect a member of Directors to the Board of the Company which will control Brisbane United.

In addition, Brisbane United will be fully based at Queensland Soccer Headquarters.

The great attraction of the Brisbane United concept is that it seeks to unite the whole soccer fraternity and the public at large, behind one single team. It is unique in that if offers our existing clubs, the corporate sector and even individual soccer supporters the chance to own part of a truly professional soccer operation.

Brisbane United is well on the way to reality - I hope you share my enthusiasm for its future.

EASTERN SUBURBS

In September 1980, with the overall support of a very well-attended meeting, the Merton-East Football Club changed its name to Eastern Surburbs Soccer Club.

Simultaneously, and in line with other major sporting clubs in the area, the club adopted its emblem, the Tiger.

The change of name and emblem was deemed necessary by the club's administration which was conscious of the important role which sponsorship has played, and will continue to play in the promotion of sport.

The change also allowed potential sponsors to identify the club with a particular area of Brisbane.

Finance, not nostalgia, is the key to success. Heath Park, in 1981 witnessed the revival of a club destined to record it's mark in the annals of the Queensland Soccer Federation.

Amalgamation

Merton-East Football Club came into being by the amalgamation of Merton Rovers and East-Aston Villa in 1969.

The amalgamation brought together two clubs which were situated practically in the same district, and resulted in the successful blending of youth and experience.

The Meton Rovers Club was founded in 1922 and the inaugural meeting was held in the open air under a street light in Merton Rd, South Brisbane.

The club reached first division status in 1936, but later in the year was suspended for two years after breaching the rules of the soccer hierarchy of the day.

It was not until 1940 that the club again obtained first division status.

After the war years the club was relegated to second division, a position which it maintained until 1961.

After being promoted to first division again in 1962, the club was successful in winning the grand final in the same year.

In later years the amalgamation of the Eastern Surburbs and Aston Villa became a fait accompli, the newly formed club playing under the name of East-Aston Villa.

In 1968 negotiations commenced

between the powerful Merton Rovers first division club, and one of the biggest junior soccer clubs East-Aston Villa, with a view of joining ranks.

The following year Merton-East was a reality.

Any sadness associated with the merger was quickly offset by players in Division One and Division Five who won their grand finals in 1980.

History will, in fact, record that Merton Rovers, and later Merton Easts played in eight Division 1 grand finals in the past 19 years, being successful on five occasions. Further the club has made the final four in not less than 16 times over those years.


Merton East served a very useful purpose-its heritage will be preserved by Eastern Surburbs Soccer Club, a club prepared and anxious to bear its teeth.

After six years with Eastern Surburbs, coach John Sime lead the Tigers to victory in 1989 with a grand final win against Brisbane Lions.

Eastern surburbs came from fifth position to win, a first for Queensland Soccer.

1990 will see Eastern Surburbs Club continue to provide good opposition in the Brisbane competition.

And no doubt the club will be a around for a long time to come yet.

JUNIOR SOCCER-

Queensland Junior Soccer

The coaches for Queensland's 1990 junior Under-13, Under-14 and Under-15 soccer teams have been announced.

Townsville's Andrew Bettell will coach the Under-13s, Rockhampton's Garry Johnson, the Under-14s and Brisbane's Brian McNicol the Under-15 team.

The announcements were made earlier this month by newly elected Queensland Junior Soccer Council Secretary John Trew.

The Under-13 nationals will be held at Darwin, Northern Territory, from Saturday September 29 to October 5.

Tasmania will host the Under-14 Nationals from September 8 to 16 with the Under-15 nationals to be held at Cambletown, NSW, from July 7 to 15.

Selection of the teams will commence with the State Titles in June.

Brisbane North

The commencement of the 1990 season is almost upon us here at Brisbane North. There appears to be no real changes in the overall sign on numbers this year, with the under 13's to under-15 registration being a little lower, but this is drastically offset by major increases in the under 7 & 8 age groups.

Fixtures will commence for the Junior Colts and Under-15's on the weekend March 31 & April 1 age groups while the under 14's and younger must wait another week to April 7 & 8.

This season will see the under-15 age group join a North-South competition format, similar to the Junior Colts in previous years. The main aim of this move is to improve the standard of football these players are competing in. This will also foster their enjoyment within the code. As in previous seasons players up to under-12 will play on the Saturday while under-13's and up will play on Sundays.

It's important to remember the compulsory wearing of shin

pads introduced this year in Australia, also applies to the junior ranks. Apart from the fact that failure to wear shin pads is now against the rules, with an as yet undertimed penalty, it is just common sense for the player's own safety. It is important that coaches and parents encourage younger players to wear shin pads not only at matches but at all training sessions and trial matches. No one can tell when that knock will come, and I am sure a player would be upset if it occurred during a "friendly" training run.

North Star, will be hosting the Under-15 state titles on behalf of Brisbane North from Sunday April 15 to Saturday April 21. This major operation taken on by North Star, is running smoothly through the planning stages. Cynthia Haslet has been appointed as championship Manager and John Sullivan as her assistant. John Farry has been given the job of referee's coordinator. North Star officials are looking for billeting families for players outside of Brisbane, if you can assist please contact the North Star club.

Brisbane North has also organized a series of pre-season events which up to now, cover a wide range of players and age groups. Brisbane Regional Director of coaching, Mal Bland, organized a series of coaching clinics recently, with players at the North Pine session refusing to leave the field when the rain came, to the dismay of coaches and parents.

The electric elevens programme was again hosted at Virginia and Grange Thistle. This coaching programme for under-11 players was sponsored by Haymens and was again a great success with 98 players participating over 6 weeks.

The quad series between Brisbane North & South, Wide Bay and South East Qld, is proving to be a great pre-season training idea for zone representative teams. In the past rep. teams have lacked this pre-season experience. Brisbane North teams will compete again at Wide Bay on the May 7 and at Labrador on the March 18.

I would like to wish everybody, players parents and officials a very enjoyable, and successful season.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's WITH DES MILES:

AS we enter the 90s, I wonder how football, and indeed refereeing, will change during the next decade.

I certainly hope the game can learn from the past and we do not see quite as many alterations to the laws, particularly those concerning the goalkeeper.

If referees do their utmost to control proceedings on the field of play, and receive back-up from disciplinary authorities, then perhaps a better code of conduct will develop and more enjoyable games result.

Whether all-seater stadiums help, I pray for the eradication of hooligans that seem intent on destroying the sport we love.

Who can rarely forsee the future, but let us hope that at the turn of the century, everything in the world, including football, will be in a more peaceful state of mind.

FIFA are still receiving proposed alterations to the laws of the game.

The most significant suggestions are those regarding "Offside" - "an" attacking player who is standing level with the second last defender of the opposing team and receives the ball direct from a teammate, can no longer be judged offside".

By changing the law, it is hoped to ease the responsibilities of the referee and linesmen and equally bring about a positive turn to the

Also, the clause that a player cannot be offside from a dropball is likely to be deleted.

This is because it contradicts the law as the player technically receives the ball from the referee.

FINALLY here's an interesting story which happened in Spain recently.

Referee Raul Garcia de Loza was banned for one month for allowing a penalty to be taken in a first division match while the goal-keeper was standing by a post, with his back to the ball.

The penalty gave Athletico Madrid the vital goal in a 1-1 draw. The match official said after the game that, in his opinion, the Espanol goalie had been wasting time, hence he ordered the kick to be taken.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT WITH BRUCE STOWELL

PASSING and receiving a ball are two of the most important skills in a soccer player's arsenal.

The two skills are like Siamese twins - one is totally dependent on the other for survival.

Today Soccer 90 begins a special three-part series on the how to use passing and receiving to your advantage.

We'll cover "Passing Drills", "Keep Ball Games" and how to play a "Zone Game".

Today we look at the "Passing Drills".

This is the simplest drill imaginable and at first may seem more like an insult to the players, but there is far more to it than meets the eye.

To prepare for this drill divide the players roughly into two sides each standing behind a cone 20 meters apart.

The procedure involves the first player passing the ball, as shown, before running to the opposite team.

The player in the opposite end receives the ball, controls it and then returns it.

The player then runs onto the back of the other team and so on.

NOTES

- 1) Allow the players time to adjust to the practice. Let them control the ball and return it a few times before making any comments.
- 2) See that the goalkeeper handles the ball and rolls it back to the next player. Players must chip the ball to the goalkeeper. This ensures they look up before passing -


one of the-most important factors in the skill of passing. Also make sure that the player is looking at the ball when they strike it.

- 3) This practice should be used regularly as it provides a basis for the most important skills as well as the development of team understanding which foot a players prefers to use therefore to which side the ball needs to be played.
- 4) Make sure passes are always crisp and firmly struck.
- 5) When receiving move your feet to get in line with the ball. Don't anchor one foot and lunge for it with the other leg.

VARIATIONS

- 1) Make the game two touch one for control and one for passing. Ake sure players come to meet the ball and control it in front of them, not stuck under their feet.
- 2) Make the game one touch for fun. Get players to run the penalty cone and back up for any mistake. They'll soon get warmed up!

THE PRESIDENT TALKS TO SOCCER 90

WALLACE Dann has just finished his first year as President of the Queensland Soccer Federation.

Soccer 90 spoke to Wallace last week on his successes and the new initiatives planned for the future.

Soccer 90 _ Having completed your first year as QSF President, what positives have been achieved by you and your Management Committee?

Wallace Dann: _ "There have been several tangible successes such as the introduction of the State of Origin concept to the annual Queensland versus New South Wales game, substantial new sponsorships and increased radio and suburban newspaper coverage of the XXXX league.

However, the real answer to your question is that we have set out to address the problems facing Queensland soccer and to plan seriously for the future. Our work is far from finished, but we have already taken positive steps to develop sponsorship and promotional strategies for the future development of Soccer Headquarters to secure a place for Queensland in the National Soccer League and to campaign, with other major sporting bodies, for a better deal for sport in this State.

Soccer 90: _ What was your biggest disappointment for 1989?

Wallace Dann: _My main disappointment came with the realisation that it will be a long and painstaking task to implement many of the changes which are needed to bring long term success to our game.

In other words, our decision-making processes for the State as a whole are

decentralised and cumbersome and there is often a wide divergence of opinion as to what is best for the game. Major issues are seldom resolved quickly or easily in that type of situation.

Soccer 90: - Is entry of QSF-backed team into the National Soccer League competition proving to be a bigger task that you imagined?

Wallace Dann: - At no stage did I think it would be easy, but I believe that the Task Force has come up with the right formula for a successful NSL challenge.

That is not to say that the rest will be plain sailing _ the hardest part will certainly fall to the Directors of the Club who, when elected, will have full responsibility for the management of the operation and its success or failure.

Soccer 90: With the State Government looking at redeveloping Lang Park, the Exhibition ground and the Gabba plus examining the need to put a sports stadium in Logan City, what is the future of Perry Park?

Wallace Dann: There is nothing at this stage to suggest that any proposed multi-purpose stadium will replace Perry Park as the headquarters of Queensland Soccer or the home of Brisbane's NSL team.

Our stance is that soccer, as a major sport, should be assisted to develop its own headquarters complex to the extent necessary to meet the foreseeable future needs of the game.

Soccer 90: _ The National Development Fund as levied by the ASF has

had its share of critics. Now that it is a fact of soccer life, how do you see it working?

Wallace Dann: _ It has to be a twoway deal. The States now contribute to the cost of our national teams and therefore have every right to see those teams in action from time to time.

I believe that the ASF is conscious of the need for national teams to be seen throughout Australia and that the game in Queensland will benefit accordingly. I also believe that the development fund strengthens our case for entry to the NSL, on the basis that players from this State should have a reasonable opportunity to gain national team selection.

Soccer 90: What are the most important things you want to achieve for our code this year?

Wallace Dann: _ Obviously one of the main objectives is to have a "Brisbane United" team playing in the 1990-91 NSL competition.

It is also important that we continue to promote our Queensland side during the winter season, to help lift the profile of the sport.

Thirdly, it is my aim to have an overall development plan debated and adopted before the end of the year. Amongst other things, the plan should ensure that we provide the best possible competitions for Clubs within the State. If we can get all three things right, we

If we can get all three things right, we will have achieved a great deal for Queensland soccer.

UP TO THE MINUTES:

I.E.A. Inter City Series:

Members of the sub committee reported back on their discusions concerning the appointment of the coaches for the Brisbane and Ipswich teams for the forth-coming 1990 Inter City Series.

Resolved Mal Bland be appointed to coach the Brisbane team. Further resolved that Gordon Arrowsmith assisted by Mark Walker be appointed to coach the Ipswich team.

Divisional Placings:

The secretary advised that due to the late withdrawl of Logan City from Div 5, it necessitated a re-scheduling of teams in the lower divisions to obviate the bye in Div 5.

USA Tour:

The chairman gave a verbal report to the delegates concerning the experiences gained by officials and players on the Queensland Soccer Federation's recent tour to the USA. He outlined a number of aspects specifically relating to promotions, ticketing and the playing of the indoor super six style of game in the USA. He further commented on how enjoyable it had been for the participants, particularly as many new friendships and contacts had been gained on the trip.

Visiting Teams:

The chairman gave a report on action which was currently being taken with a view to hosting a proposed tour by Charlton Athletic during the course of the season. He advised he was await-

ing a financial conformation from the participating centres before finally resolving the matter.

Regional Director of Coaching:

A report was given that a number of interviews have been arranged for the vacant position of regional director of coaching in Rockhampton, with a more detailed report being available at the next Management Committee meeting.





The contracts assure the players that half of their expenses for any Australian Tours undertaken by them while under contract will be met. Thus being relieved of some of the financial burden of the next two years, these players can concentrate more on their training, promotion of the game, and have that goal in mind - World Cup 1991.

Michelle feels the current squad of players from which most of the Australian team will be selected have an excellent chance of defeating New Zealand, who will be our main opponent in gaining a spot in the Cup. She says they want to work, are more professional than ever before, know what to expect of each other and most of all play well as a team.
