EDITORIAL: =

EVERYBODY with soccer in their blood agrees Queensland must have a team in the National Soccer League next season.

There can be no prisoners taken in the attempt to make this reality.

It has been the dream of all Queensland soccer fans, since the demise of Brisbane Lions and Brisbane City, to again be a part of Australia's top soccer competition.

Too many years have elapsed! It's time we made the dream true.

The success of many sports in Queensland has hinged on a local team, backed by the supporters, being involved in a national competition.

Make no bones about, it will be an expensive task!

We will pay either way - enormous amounts of money are needed to fund such a team.

But what's at stake is the credibility of Queensland Soccer if we fail.

Not only is it paramount we have a team in the NSL, but also more competition games for Queensland's representative side during the winter season.

Our young soccer players need incentive to maintain interest in the sport, much the same as spectators need to see quality football.

In last week's editorial, it was mentioned about soccer's greatest asset,

The numbers playing junior soccer far outweigh any other football code in Queensland.

To maintain this interest in the game through to senior levels, we must have a State team competing regularly.

And what should a Queensland NSL team be called?

Certainly not just a club name.

Any new team competing in a national competition on behalf of the Queensland people needs an identity, a name which all soccer fans can be proud

Q United could be that name, a name which will mean as much to Brisbane fans as it does to people in Wepia or Cooktown.

This is the step and the attitude we must take if we are to be successful and have our own national soccer league team.

IT'S an old cliche to say juniors hold the key to the future of soccer.

But reality is they do and the success of the game we all love largely depends on how many juniors we can attract.

So it's pleasing to see that over the past four weeks, more than 500 young players have been involved with coaching clinics at various clubs around Brisbane.

The clinics have been hosted by Regional Coaching Di-

rector Mal Bland with help from XXXX league players.
This just goes to show that there is still a lot of interest

in the game at junior level.

Gordon Arrowsmith will also be conducting a clinic on the Gold Coast over the Easter break and I understand the response has been tremendous.

I only hope we can harness this junior interest in the game and provide an endless stream of senior players for many years to come.

After all, the sport of soccer has, in recent times, had to compete with the other major football codes and a new list of popular sports.

The Brisbane Bears, Bullets and Broncos have all had a positive effect on recruiting juniors for their respective sports.

WITH Frank Arok's resignation as coach of the Australian Senior Team, the race is now on to see who his replacement will be.

It will be interesting to see whether the Australian Soccer Federation (ASF) goes for an experienced overseas coach or a local person who knows Australian soccer.

One of the front runners on the local scene would have

to be former Sydney Olympic coach and ASF Coaching Director Eddie Thompson.

Eddie has a proven track record and, should he apply for the job, would make a suitable replacement for Arok.

Incidentally Arok is believed to have applied for the Australian Soccer Team manager's job.

IT'S hard to believe two 14year-old junior players were responsible for the formation of the Taringa Rovers Soccer Club.

Yet it was chiefly through the efforts of John Speare Jnr and his mate Trevor Dixon, two teenagers at the time, that the club was formed in 1949.

The idea of forming a soccer club was first mooted two years before and was the brainchild of Jack Speare and Ernie Dixon.

And when the club was eventually formed, it encompassed just one junior team.

But from those primitive beginnings, the club has evolved and grown to provide a major sporting outlet for the youth of Indooroopilly.

In the course of 40 years the club now has some six senior and 15 junior teams.

But it wasn't always plain sailing for the club which took its name, Rovers, from the amount of travel it used to endure to attend games in those early days.

Setbacks

The club's name has remained unchanged, unlike the ground and proud facilities now available to players and supporters.

Even after the club had been formed for nine years, facilities at their home ground, then Moore Park, were primitive to say the least.

The change rooms consisted of a tiny tin shed with a dirt floor and no washing or toilet facilities.

And the ladies had no canteen and used to sell their drinks and lollies from a tent on the hill where the modern licensed clubhouse, built in 1974, now stands.

Despite these setbacks, Taringa Rovers won their first premiership in 1951 when their juvenile team defeated Coorparoo 2-0.

The club's first senior title was in 1958 when they caused a major upset by winning 5th Division of the Brisbane and Ipswich Soccer Football Association in their first year.

While reluctant to do so, Taringa Rovers eventually affiliated with the Queensland Soccer Federation in 1961, at which time the club had two senior teams and five junior sides.

The club purchased its first player, Bernie Brennan, in 1966 for the sum of \$100 from Latrobe.

1967 proved to be the most successful year for the club since its formation.

Three senior teams were entered in 3rd, 4th and 5th Divisions. The 3rd Division reached the preliminary final and the 4th and 5th Division reached the Semi Finals.


Perhaps one of the club's proudest moments was on June 4, 1980, the day Moore Park was changed to Jack Speare Park, one of the founding members.


Taringa was inducted into the QSF's premier league in 1983 and has held the position since.

With the team building done during the off-season, Taringa could be one of the surprise forces in this year's competition.

For a club which has struggled from meagre beginnings, one of the only things which has eluded it is a XXXX League premiership.

Perhaps that's not too far away!







IT was no surprise the Queensland Soccer Team were outclassed by superior opposition on their recent invitational tour to America earlier this year.

SOCCER 90

The Queensland team, nicknamed the Sunshine Shooters, played a series of games against five top American indoor soccer teams on the two week tour.

But they were unable to win a game against the more experienced American clubs.

The American teams, who play the indoor game for a living, trounced the Sunshine Shooters and scored 50 goals against them in the five matches.

The Sunshine Shooters played the Tacoma Stars, Wichita Wings, Dallas Sidekicks, Kansas City Comets and the St Louis Storm.

But the trip was hailed a success by organisers who are now hoping an American team can tour Australia later this year.

The Queensland side was never expected to win, especially with the team being outdoor specialists and not great exponents of the indoor game which the Americans play.

But they were surprised by the reception given to them by the American supporters of the game.

Upon their arrival in Seattle, the Sunshine Shooters, were met by supporters of their Booster clubs complete with banners and Australian flags.

There were also some other interesting occurrences on the trip, including changing planes some 16 times.

While the Sunshine Shooters had a fairly tight schedule, they were still able to see some of the sights.

That doesn't make our scorelines look quite so bad.



QLD JUNIOR COUNCIL

Queensland Junior Soccer Council general secretary John Trew has announced the championship venues and managers for the 1990 season.

Trew said the Under-12s would have two seperate competitions as the age group did not have their own State titles.

In the northern part of Queensland it will be called the Under-12 Gino Paris Competition, to be played in Proserpine from June 17 to 21. The championship manager will be Mr Garry Chauntler.

In the southern part of the State, the competition is called the Under-12 Harry Linning Competition, which will be played in Maryborough from June 17 to 21. The championship manager will be Mrs Kerry King.

The Under-13 State Championships are to be held at Buderim Wanderers Club, in the Sunshine Coast hinterland, from June 17 to 23. The championship manager is Mr Chris Dunk.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT



WITH BRUCE STOWELL





THIS week we continue our series on passing and receiving by looking at the "Keep Ball Game".

PREPARATION

Using four cones mark out a sufficiently large pitch allowing players ample room for passing. The bigger the area the better.

Depending on the space, and the players available, make two teams one roughly twice as big as the other.

PROCEDURE

The team with the larger number of players starts with the ball and attempts to retain possession.

When the opposition wins the ball they attempt to retain it and so on.

NOTES

1) This practice is improved by keeping the pressure on the larger group of players fairly low.

Balance your teams accordingly. The poorer your players, the less opposition they should have.

Change players around from time to time so that everyone gets some benefit from the practice.

2) Discipline yourself to make no comments for at least five minutes, during which time play will almost certainly have ground to a halt with all the players crowded round the ball in

3) Get them to pass early. The traditional instruction "draw an opponent before you pass", is a fallacy.

Watch a televised game and see how early top class players release the ball. They don't allow opponents to get close enough to make an interception.

> Tell players to look up, too many players play with their heads down and restrict their effectiveness.

> Teach them the skill of looking around to assess all options available to them.

VARIATIONS


1) After you begin to see some improvement, move towards equal teams and set a target of five consecutive passes.

The team which concedes has to run around the playing area in a fixed time. If they fail they do

it again.

2) If crowding round the ball recurs, place a disc in each corner of the pitch and award a "goal" if a player manages to get to one with a foot on the ball.

E



one corner of the pitch. Stop the players and point out the situation to them.

The team with the extra players must increase the distance between them.

Encourage them to make passes of not less than ten yards.

Here's an interesting article which appeared in the papers recently.

"Take up the whistle" is the order from the Cheshire and Manchester Sunday League to any of their players who have been sent off twice in their competitions.

Proud of their excellent disciplinary record the League have devised a novel plan to encourage offenders to mend their ways.

And as an added bonus, the brainwave should also help cure an acute shortage of match officials.

Quite simply, the league is prepared to tear up the contract of any player found guilty of two sending-off offenses.

And the only way the sinner can escape the ban is by attending a six week refereeing course and then taking charge of at least three matches.

"We feel that a lot of trouble in the game is caused by players simply not knowing the rules," said the Cheshire and Manchester League's Bury-based chairman Jack Freeman.

"The best way for an offender to redeem himself is to learn the Laws of the Game at a referees' course. After that, we will have him back with pleasure."

The scheme came into operation at the start of the season but has yet to be put to the test.

When it does there is no doubt that every other league in the area will be monitoring its progress.

Not that the Cheshire and

Manchester League is particularly beset with disciplinary headaches.

In fact, so well behaved are the league's 33 teams that not one player has been forced to take the refereeing "medicine".

But as chairman Jack points out, he and his fellow officials intend to make their outstanding good conduct record even better.

"We have relatively few problems with discipline in our league, but we always want to improve wherever we can," added Jack.

"We encourage players generally to attend refereeing courses and that way hope to benefit both ourselves and the game as a whole."

Now that's food for thought!




