

IT was great to see one of the game's stalwarts, Gerry Lindsay, receive a fitting tribute for his contributions to Queensland Soccer on the weekend.

Gerry, who played for Brisbane Lions and North Star for about 10 years, played in a special testimonial game before last weekend's North Star versus Rochedale

And I believe he even scored a couple of goals as he played with some of his former team mates and friends.

Gerry, whose soccer career ended tragically last year following a severe knee injury, can take a bow. He deserves all the accolades.

However, the former Queensland player, still has a lot to offer by sharing some of his experience with younger players.

Perhaps Gerry might like to take up coaching a senior team or even look at helping out in the junior

I'm sure wherever he ends up, Gerry will be an asset to the game.





Nobody really knows when the Mitchelton Soccer Club was first founded.

However there are indications that the club begun as early as 1916, largely through the efforts of some pioneering families in the district.

But it wasn't until the war years in 1920 that the club became officially registered.

Nethertheless Mitchelton is one of the oldest clubs in Brisbane, and this year celebrates its 70th birthday.

Descendants of those early families have ensured, by their standard of sport that very few of those years has not had some representative player, Junior or Senior, emanate from the Club.

Some of the names recalled from those early days are Ernie Barlow, Bill Bowers, Dave Campbell, Eric Cresswell, Jack Edgar, Bill Gibson, Albert Green, George Green, Percy Green, Willie Laird, Tom Laird, Jack Pollard, Jack Silver, Ernie Westance and Bill Warrell.

Like many other pioneers, they enjoyed their recreation and only needed a big enough, reasonably flat area minus trees and gullies to play.

Bells Paddock, an Army campsite during World War I, sufficed as a field in those days.

On occasions when there was insufficient moonlight, the solitary 75 watt security light at the back of Mitchelton Picture Theatre provided the illumination for night training. The very late '20s, through the efforts and enthusiasm of Ernie Green, saw the emergence of the Black Diamonds who at one time played in Bowman's Paddock.

This is presently part of Brookside Shopping Centre, but in those days was a cow paddock during the week.

A considerable back bending exercise each weekend transformed it into a football field.

In 1930 this team broke the hold which Virginia had on the Y.M.C.A. Inter-Suburban Soccer Association Cup.

It had been won by Virginia in 1928 and 1929, but the Black Diamond won it in 1930 1931 and 1932 and that Cup is still held by this Club.

The 1930 team (who had to make their own shirts) were Eric and Owen (Mucker) Gordon, Col Meade, Bill and Andy Laird, Eric Birtwell, Frank Nugent, Bill Jones, Cec and Roy Reid, Bill Lincoln and Dave Fairweather - George Green was Coach; Andy Dixon, Manager and Alf Green was Mascot.

On another occasion a meeting called by Fred Gray, his father and George Green, held on the footpath under a convenient street light produced a team of youngsters who played Junior Minor, graduated to Junior, were interrupted by World War II, reassembled (in their late 20's and early 30's) in 1947 as Juniors and graduated to Senior (Third Division) in 1948. They won the Premiership, John Fern Cup and McGregor Cup and only lost one game, scored 90 goals in the Premiership and conceded 14 for a total

of 39 points.

The combined goal total of the First and Second Division Premiers that year was 94.

Three of the members of the 1930 team, Tom Kenward, Col Meade and Cec Reid combined to form the 1948 team with Harry Gray, Billy Sharman, Vince Smart, Eddie, Bob and Carson Laird (Vice-Capt.), Dick Martin, Arthur Crane, Eric Birtwell, Bill Bain, Tom Wood (Capt.), Malcolm Campbell, Charlie Hensler, Bill Warrell (Treas.), George Green (Life Member), Fred Gray (Sec.), Fred Green (Patron), Clarrie Drake (Coach-Trainer) and John Laird as Mascot.

Their record within the club stood for 11 years until the 1959 team won the Third Division Premiership, the Second Round Cup and the Knockout Cup undefeated.

Other names recalled from the 1930's are Gordon Morey, Syd Layton, Roy Charrington, Harry Collins, Frank and Jack Bowman and Wally Kenward.

Some of the names which have been

synonymous with Mitchelton Club are Jim Docherty, John Free, Vic Marshall, Stockdales, McJannetts and Fred Gray and Tom Jones, while the Lairds (Willie, Bob, Tom, Carson, Andy, Bill, Bob, Eddie, Matthew, John, Grahame and Shane); and the Greens (Albert, George, Percy, Fred, Brian, Doug, Merv, Ernie, Keith, Gary, Robert and Ken) - twelve of each family - have ensured there has always been some of their members active in the Club. Individual records are those of George Lincoln and Carson Laird who are both Life Members and have been members for 66 years and 61 years respectively while two brothers, Grahame and Peter Morey, have, apart from short breaks away from Brisbane, each played for over 20 years.

In its first year as a First Division Club Mitchelton won the First Division Grand Final, the Sixth Division Premiership and Grand Final and the Eighth Division team reached the semifinals of the Championship rounds.


In more recent times Mitchelton has remained in second division, consistently finishing in the top half of the competition.

One of the club's proudest moments came in 1979 when they won the second division Grand Final against Easts at Perry Park.

There was also a time when one of the world's best soccer players, George Best, made a cameo appearance at the club in 1983.

Best thrilled a packed club house when he turned up as a special guest, not to mention more than 150 juniors who showed up to see the star and hound him for autographs.

Other memories for the proud club members include the 1978 relocation of the club from its Samford Rd headquarters to its present home at Teralba Park.



JUNIORS IN THE LIMELIGHT

QLD JUNIOR COUNCIL

IN last week's issue of Soccer 90, I announced there were to be "NO" under-12 State Titles, but a competition to be played at two venues.

In the Northern part of Queensland the event will be called the Gino

Paris Competition.

Here's a history of the "Gino Paris Cup" and the important role it has played in the promotion of junior

soccer over the years.

Prior to 1953 there were no intercity games, except between Brisbane and Ipwich, within the Queensland State Primary Schools Soccer Association.

As early as 1926 Ipswich and Brisbane met at least two or three times a year with one special game played for the McGregor Cup.

But as a result of a conversation between Mr Hall and Mr Linning travelling to Sydney by train in 1953, the idea of Intra-State tour was born.

The result was that during the August vacation, a South Queensland team consisting of Brisbane and Ipswich representatives played a series of games against other Queensland cities.



This proved to be a very successful tour. Following this the first Intra-State Carnival in Queensland was held in Brisbane and Ipswich during May 1954.

Competing cities were Cairns, Mackay, Brisbane and Ipswich.

In 1956 the idea of intra-state tours was taken a step further, with the introduction of the "Gino Paris Cup".

Mr Gino Paris, a very interested soccer follower, who lived in North Queensland, donated to the Q.S.P.S.F.A. a trophy which was to be competed for annually between southern and northern cities.

This trophy has come to mean much to our Intra-State Carnivals and no carnival could be complete without it.

It was donated with a view to promoting healthy competition between the North and the South and, in this respect, has more than fulfilled its aim.

In those early years of the "Gino Paris Cup", Brisbane teams showed a great record for winning the event.

In a bid to try and make the carnivals more interesting, and to give the other cities a better chance of winning, a set of rules was drawn up for conducting this valuable Carnival.

By restricting the selection in Brisbane and Ipswich to Primary School players, and excluding those boys who gained Queensland representation, the standard of competition became much more balanced.

By 1964 the "Gino Paris Cup" competition had grown to eight teams and a very prestigious event.

This was continued through to 1976 when the last "Gino Paris Cup" competition, in its old format, was played.

This Carnival was won by Bundaberg. In 1976 it was decided by the Q.S.P.S.S.F.A. that they would restrict their activities to within the schools.

The Queensland Junior Soccer Council was asked to takeover this competition which it allocated to the four northern zones.

The first competition was played in 1977 with each zone entering two teams.

This was continued until its present form which is conducted between five northern zones with two teams coming from the Far North, North Queensland and Central Queensland Zones and one team from Southern North Queensland and North-west Queensland Zones.

JUNIOR SOUTH

Most clubs are now in final preparation for the start of the 1990 season.

With the grading of teams complete, many clubs are enjoying pre-season games, giving the teams valuable match practice.

Special mention must be made at this time for all clubs to ensure their teams stop using that dreadful bucket and sponge.

For obvious health reasons, this practice should be completely eliminated and replaced with spray bottles.

Open wounds should be sprayed,

dried and antiseptic cream applied followed by a bandage.



Congratulations goes to Alexandra High School student Danny Stowers, who made his debut with Mt Gravatt XXXX League team against Rochedale a few weeks ago.

Danny played in our under-15 representative team last season and to move straight into the top league in Queensland is a tremendous achievement.

Danny, best wishes for a top season.

ZONE GAME

The emphasis in this game is on passing but it will also make midfield players aware of just how much running is involved in their positions and shows attackers how near to an opponent's goal they need to be to be quickly effective.

Preparation

Mark out a pitch using cones and discs as shown in the diagram. The discs want to be about ten feet apart so you will need fifteen to cross a full pitch.

To keep the discs in a straight line walk backwards and line through as you go. A full pitch is ideal but obviously you will have to adapt to the size of the area and the number of players available to you.

Procedure

Divide the players into two equal teams of 4 defenders, 3 midfield players, and 3 attackers. Each group can only play in its own zone. To move play into the adjacent zone the ball must be passed to a player belonging to that zone. If you have goalkeepers use them. If you have only one goalkeepers don't put a player in the other goal, reduce the size of the goal. If you have no goalkeepers have two smaller 'cone goals' and tell players they can only score in the penalty area with a header.

This encourages the creation of heading chances and longer shots at goal. If you have an uneven number of players put the extra player in midfield. Don't be afraid of odd numbers and always try and involve all your players.

Notes

1. Because both teams have an extra player in defence encourage defenders to pass directly to their strikers for them either to screen the ball or to pass back to supporting midfield players.

2. This practice stresses the need for balls to be played forward with quality. Midfield players should look for opportunities to make passes behind the opposition's defenders for strikers to run on to.

Watch a televised game and see how telling the final pass often is. This is one of the major differences between top class players and beginners whose final passes so often lack imagination and control.

Variations


1. Condition the game at times to bring out the passing element. Try 3-touch, 2-touch, and even 1-touch for short periods.

2. Let one team play freely while the other plays 2-touch then change over.

3. Make one section of the team (the defending zone for example) play 2-touch.

4 Make all the players in one zone on both sides play 2-touch.





Checklist

Passing

* Timing: pass early to avoid being closed

* Weighting: firm and crisp so the ball reaches the target before it can be intercepted.

* Accuracy: decide whether the pass needs to be to feet or into space. Very the length of pass, but not less than ten yards.

Receiving

* Move quickly to the ball if it is coming straight to you.

* Use your feet to get in line if the pass is not

* Control the ball to give yourself time.

* Make as few passes as possible before shooting. Slow build-ups are less likely to create scoring chances.

FAR NORTH QUEENSLAND SOCCER

THE status quo of Far Northern Soccer looks like remaining intact for yet another year with the trophy winners of 1989, Leichhardt and Edge Hill, facing each other in the first major showdown of the year, the XXXX Cup.

Under the generous sponsorship of XXXX, the pre-season cup is worth \$700 to the winner and nothing for the runners-

Again in form, Eszes and fellow midfielder Mario De Vecchi, provided the ballwork for the Lions to get forward despite the winning goal coming midway through extra time.

So much rain has resulted from Cyclone Ivor that parts of the city have became islands and the venue for the final, Leichhardt's home ground at White Rock, has been slowly submerging.

Provided the sun begins to shine or the players wear

Ballandean, who will be quite competitive throughout 1990, bring the amount of XXXX league sides to seven.


Regional Director

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's WITH DES MILES

SURPRISE surprise!!! My first match of the 1990's and it was 26 minutes into the game before the first foul.

There were two people sent off, five booked, some crowd abuse, a cold shower and finally the cold shoulder!

ADVANTAGE

One of the most consistent critical comments faced by referees is the one headed "advantage".

This has occurred to me following a detailed analysis of assessments, at all levels of the game, compiled over a period of 15 years.

It appears to be clear that there is a widespread tendency towards misinterpretation of the "Advantage Clause".

Officials tend to hide behind its permission to "refrain from penalising" in certain clearly prescribed circumstances and, as a result, sacrificing control under the pretext of "keeping the game moving"!

The Law clearly states that the test to be applied is "would the action of penalising give an advantage to the OFFENDING TEAM".

On far too many occasions it appears that the test being applied is - "has the fouled player, or a colleague, retained or regained POSSESSION"?

As a result, it is often observed that when a player is fouled, and retains possession, there is an immediate reaction of frantic arm-waving and cries of "play-on". Before playing advantage, consideration should be given not only to possession, but also to territorial position, the proximity and positioning of both colleagues and opponents and, in some cases, the temperature of the game.

One cannot really blame players feeling aggrieved when they are told to "play-on" when in a most disadvantageous territorial position, or faced with other opponents moving in to tackle.

This aggravation is quickly translated into behaviourial problems which place additional pressure on the referee.

My advice would be to guard against the reflex action and take a split second to assess the probabilities before implementation.

GROUNDS REPORT

The Secretary advised that owing to difficulties encountered by electrical contractors at both Mount Gravatt and Redlands United grounds concerning the installation of new lighting to enable their first home fixture to be played on the forthcoming week-end, a number of difficulties had arisen concerning the re-scheduling of these matches to the Sunday.

After consultation with representatives of the clubs, A.S.R.F. and the Grounds Committee, he advised that there was no option but to postpone the XXXX League match Mount Gravatt v Pine Rovers and Reserves, and the Division 2 match Redlands United v The Gap and Reserves, to a date to be determined. Disappointing result for one XXXX club who organised two buses to take supporters to an away game, and could only fill one of them.


