

### EDITORIAL:

I suppose by now, the shock of Ian Brusasco's demise as Australian Soccer Federation president has reached all corners of the soccer fraternity.

I only hope the decision taken at the annual general meeting was for the benefit of Australian soccer and not a knee jerk reaction to suit a couple of power-hungry States.

A statement which should always be remembered is "the sport is bigger than the individual".

Just as Australian Soccer was on a stable path to total re-development, Brusasco's axing has once again sent the sport into a stall pattern until the new executive gets the hands on the controls.

I trust the new President's comments, that he represents all Australian soccer, bear fruit with a Queensland side joining the National Soccer League.

That decision, when taken, will convince us that he is serious about lifting the profile of the sport across the country.

The efforts of Pine Rivers and North Star to promote their XXXX Soccer League match through visits to the Westfield Shopping Centre at Strathpine must be commended.

We acknowledge this initiative as a positive way for soccer to be taken to the masses. If they won't come to us, take the game to them.

Soccer in Queensland must become more visible, and exposure in shopping centres, where large parts of the population gather, will help the game no end.

All first grade XXXX soccer league teams have an obligation to themselves and the code to get soccer's message across.

Most of us realise Brisbane's junior team competition totals 700 teams.

At the moment there would be many young girls and boys playing the game who would be unaware of first grade teams in their locality.

Let's do something about that.

We must utilise the sport's great numbers in the junior ranks.

And for the sake of the game let's also ensure club facilities are spruced up to look a million dollars.

First impressions are certainly lasting

Soccer is competing in a highly competitive arena and all facilities for spectators, referees and players must be of the highest possible standard.

Let's take soccer forward, not backwards, into the 90s.

## FRANKLY SPEAKING

I regret to see Ian Brusasco axed as president of the ASF, especially as it was under unfortunate circumstances that he lost the position.

I would even go so far as to say his being replaced as president could have some political motives behind it.

But on a brighter note the ASF's loss should be Queensland Soccer's gain.

But in the three league matches so far he has lost only one


Andrew Stowell was one of the players Billy Williamson singled out and objected to.

IN many people's eyes Pine Rivers Soccer Club is one of a new breed on the rise in Queensland.

Their induction into the XXXX Soccer League last year and their remarkable fourth place finish has been seen as a plus for the game's longevity in Queensland.

For a club so young - it celebrates it 23rd birthday this year - Pine Rivers has quickly climbed the ladder of success.

Their rise through the ranks of Queensland Soccer is the stuff which dreams are made of.

However, the road leading to the State's toughest competition has been far from straight and narrow.

Like most clubs looking to make it to the top, Pine Rivers has had to first absorb the bumps and negotiate the windy roads along the way.

It has only been through a lot of hard work by Pine Rivers' enthusiastic band of supporters that the club has been able to forge ahead.

The major force behind the club was Jack Gurteen, who formed the establishment back in 1967.

And like so many other clubs, it was the juniors wanting to play the game that were catalyst for the club forma-

It's not surprising then, the club's enjoys a strong junior base.

This has been fostered throughout the years and provided Pine Rivers with the foundation for their senior teams.

#### **Junior Patriotism**

An example of the patriotism shown by the club's juniors is still evident today

The average age of their XXXX League side is a meagre 22 years-old.

And 20 members of last year's first division and reserves players have come up through the club's junior ranks.

Some of these players who went on to play senior football include Clayton and John Koch, Jason Polak and John Cartwright.

Two of those players, John Koch and Jason Polak, also went on to represent Australia.

Another well-known junior was Mantis Lamond, who is currently playing for Sydney Croatia.

Well-known soccer personality Ian Steele had this to say about the club's junior strength when he began coaching there in 1978.

"The talent in this club, and I say this without any reservation, is comparable to any in Brisbane."

Pine Rivers entered their first senior team in 1969 and went on to take out the premiership

Since 1970 when the club was in a modern-day 6th division equivalent, Pine Rivers have continued to move up through the divisions.

In fact the club holds a proud record



Incidentally two of these fields were garbage dumps previous to them becoming soccer fields.


This has prompted some local supporters to comment that the field's good coat of grass is mainly due to this reason.



## QUEENSLAND SOCCER TO LIFT WITH GOVERNMENT JET



## JUNIORS IN THE LIMELIGHT

#### THE HARRY LINNING CUP

PRIOR to 1953, soccer in Primary Schools was confined to Brisbane, Ipswich, Wynnum and Manly schools.

In Brisbane and Ipswich it was under the direct control of the Queensland State Primary Schools Soccer Football Association.

But in Wynnum and Manly it was played on Saturday mornings under the control of a very dedicated group of non-teachers.

In 1953, the Schools Association set out on a very ambitious program to extend soccer throughout the north.

With the assistance of the Queensland Soccer Football Association, contact was made with Mackay, Townsville, Ayr and Rockhampton, and with personal contact with Cairns our association was able to make an extensive and successful tour of North Queensland.

It is very important to note that contact with each of these centres was through the Senior Association - no members of the teaching serviced were involved.

In 1956, Mr Gino Paris, a prominent business man from North Queensland presented to the Schools Association a trophy, called, "The Gino Paris Cup" for competition between cities of the North and the South of Queensland.

By 1964 this competition had settled into a permanent competition of eight cities, and was largely responsible for the meteoric rise in both the numbers and quality of players. It had become so prestigious in the Junior and Schools Association, that repeated applications were received from other cities to compete in the Cup Competition.



However, it was considered that eight teams was the maximum which could be catered for and as none of the competing associations wished to leave the competition, all applications were refused.

Early in February, 1972, an application was again received from the Maryborough Junior Soccer Association to compete in the "Gino Paris Cup" competition.

Realising that this was impossible, they were advised accordingly and a suggestion was made that they, with the help and advice of the Queensland State Primary Schools Soccer Football Association, form a second competition. Maryborough immediately took up this recommendation and with help from Vic Leggatt, a Wynnum Manly teacher, a second competition was arranged to be played in Maryborough during August, 1972.

Harry Linning, who was secretary from 1952 to end of February, 1972, offered to present atrophy which eventually was named after

him for Annual Competition.

Using the experience and knowledge gained in the "Gino Paris Cup" Competition, the new competition was assured of a good start.

Emphasis was placed on friendship, leadership and sportsmanship and coaching during the course of the game was not allowed.

With this in mind the Maryborough Association designed a badge, The Harry Linning

Badge, which incorporated the spirit of the carnival.

Because of cost, metal badges were given to managers and coaches and cloth badges to the players.

As in the "Gino Paris Carnival", no badges were available for sale, each badge had to be

In the initial carnival (1972), Maryborough 1 and 2, Hervey Bay, Gladstone, Sunshine Coast, Redcliffe and Wynnum-Manly competed.

By 1976 eight teams, Blackwater, Mount Morgan, Gladstone, Maryborough, Gympie, Sunshine Coast, Wynnum Manly and Gold Coast were entered in the competition.

Here again all of the Associations, except Wynnum-Manly were Junior Associations.

It was Vic Leggatt's dedication and advice which enabled the competing associations to organise and conduct the carnivals at a high standard.

We are all deeply indebted to him for his skills.

And without Mr Linning's dealings with non teacher associations progress with the competition would have been delayed for many years.

In 1976 the Queensland State Primary Schools Soccer Football Association decided they would restrict their activities to within the schools.

As most of the associations competing in the "Gino Paris" and "Harry Linning" carnivals were Junior Associations, an approach was made to the Queensland Junior Soccer Council to take them over.

This they did, accepting both cups, and it was decided that:- A) Queensland be divided into two sections - North and South. B) North would compete for the "Gino Paris Cup". C) South would compete for the "Harry Linning Cup".

The first competitions under the control of the Queensland Junior Soccer Association were held in 1977.

The present form under which it is conducted is between 5 southern zones with 2 teams coming from Brisbane South, Brisbane North and Wide Bay zones and 1 team from the South West and South East zones.

Mr Linning has attended most carnivals and is very proud to know that his trophy is in very safe hands.

He can also rest assured knowing the ideas he stands for, continue to dominate each carnival.

#### **BRISBANE NORTH**

BRISBANE North club delegates were informed on Tuesday night of the "ATTACHED PENALTY" regarding the wearing of shin-guards by junior players in matches.

For failure to do so:

Under-9 to junior colts - Four penalty points for players. Club fined \$50.

Under-7 and Under-8 - No penalty points. Club fined \$50.

The sheer weight of these penalties indicates the importance our management have placed on wearing shin-guards.

Parents, coaches, managers and club officials now have the responsibility to ensure all players are equipped before taking the field.

Who will be the first???

Also passed at the Delegates meeting was a new ruling for Under-9 players in relation to substitutions.



The old rules have been updated with a "interchange system". This will allow substituted or injured players to return to the field.

The main aim is to allow a more flexible system which gives all Under-9 players equal playing time.

A complete set of guidelines should be available from club officials in the coming weeks.

The basic details are that a player may interchange into a match after informing the referee, or during a stoppage of play.

This player must enter at the half way line. An Under-9 team may only comprise of a maximum of 12 players, of which only nine are allowed on the field at one time.

There is no limit to the number of interchanges teams make.

With the recent rain, it may be time to remind parents that should a field become unplayable, information will be broadcast on 4KQ from 7.45am.

#### **BRISBANE SOUTH**

DESPITE the rain, only a few clubs were not able to continue when junior fixtures kicked off last weekend.

A reminder to parents planning your social calendar - the last Sunday in every month is set aside for wet weather fixtures.

It was good to see clubs, parents and players adhering to the compulsory wearing of shin pads.

I am sure all clubs will continue to ensure their players do the right thing in this regard.

Applications are still being taken for the Camp Bornhoffen Soccer Clinic which will be run during the Easter School holidays from April 15-20.

Camp Bornhoffen, a fully residential camp, is available to all junior players from under-10 upwards.

Participating players receive individual evaluation, a t-shirt and soccer ball, as well as experienced coaching.

Total cost ex-Brisbane is \$140.00.

Further information can be obtained from Ben Hutchins on 355 0780 and brochures should be available from all clubs.

Northern New South Wales Soccer Association has approached Brisbane North and Brisbane South regarding the possibility of bringing some of their representative teams to Brisbane. Dates suggested are from September 23 to 28 with the age groups Under-13, Under-14, Under-15 and Under-16 competing.

A minimum of four games for each group is required and in 1991 our teams would be invited south to play at a venue in their area.

Any clubs interested in being a venue for such games are requested to contact their association.

It is planned that Brisbane North and Brisbane South will organize this visit together.

## PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

BRUCE STOWELL



SUPPORTING the player with the ball is one of the major differences between top class players and the rest.

It's simple they (top players) do it, the rest don't!


Watch a televised game and see how many options the passing player with the ball has - both in front and behind.

Most people are under the assumption "support" is backing up only from behind. However forward support is important too.

If you look at an open play situation in a top class game, the player in possession is usually the centre dot on a number five domino with the other dots making up the four passing options.

At lower levels we usually only see one player moving into a receiving posi-

Today we start explaining some simple drills for supporting a player.



#### DRILL 1:

Preparation - Divide a large area (the full pitch if possible) into two halves.

Divide the players into two exactly equal groups, one in each half of the pitch.

Each group has a ball and performs the drill separately from the other in its own half of the pitch.

Procedure - In both groups the players are numbered consecutively and the ball is passed from player 1 to player 2 to player 3, etc.

When the last player receives the ball it is passed to the first and so on. Notes:

1) Supporting distance is vital. This therefore is a good chance to reinforce the points made earlier about the length of passes. No pass should be less than ten metres and so the supporting distance has to be at least fifteen metres to allow the player to move forward to meet the ball.



2) Encourage players to think ahead. Instead of player 2 being the only player on the move when player 1 has possession get players 3 and 4 to try and read the situation. Get them to try and anticipate where they should be and which way the passer is likely to be

facing, etc. 3) Do not allow more than one player at a time to call for the ball, but encourage them to call early, thus speeding up the drill.

4) Progress may be slow so be prepared to drive them along vocally.

#### Variations:

1) Introduce a limited number of touches. As usual be prepared to penalise slack play, slow thinking, and cheating.


Players pretend not to like it, but it does allow you to add incentives and deterrents in the right places.

DRILL 2:

Preparation - As above.

Procedure - As above, but allow players to move freely into both

halves of the pitch. "Accidental" opposition is thereby introduced. This time teams perform the sequence competitively. The first team to complete the sequence properly three times (or the first to complete twenty acceptable passes) is the winner.

I would go as far as to say that he would rank in the top five imports we brought to Brisbane.

But the fact of the matter is that this Brisbane United side should not consist of imports, but of Brisbane players who have consistently proved themselves in the XXXX league.

Persons involved in the organisation of teams like this proposed Brisbane side should look closely at the mistakes by the directors of the Brisbane Bears.

The reasons as to why they failed and still fail to be accepted by the Brisbane Public.

I believe it all comes down to the paying public knowing the players on the pitch.

In the case of the Bears, their playing staff was over-represented expatriate "southerners", while the local players remained in the local league, overshadowed by these imports.

Having been a Brisbane City junior during the height of the Phillips and national Leagues, I was witness to the club's policy of using imports to obtain success.

Success was not achieved and juniors in the club, that I considered compatible to any juniors in Australia, were neglected.

This is not aimed as a criticism of the imports that played for the club, but rather to highlight the fact that the quality is there if we want to look.

It is imperative that if a United Brisbane side is to be successful, then its players must come from Brisbane and Queensland.

If there are weaknesses with a squad of players from the local leagues, then players used to strengthen the squad should be lured from interstate as opposed to overseas. Adopting such an attitude may not reap benefits immedi-

## REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

with DES MILES

#### THE FIRST YEAR REFEREE

ANYONE thinking of taking up refereeing today must have a real love for the game.

Without this, he cannot hope to succeed, not with the difficulties he is likely to encounter in his early years. Last season we had ten new referees. Four were lost because of the abuse levelled at them by spectators, coaches, players and club members.

A person who takes up refereeing would have a better chance of succeeding if he had played the game.

All six referees who remained from the 89' intake have played and all should reach a high standard with the whistle.

Let us look at one of these first year

Edward Lyall Kearney:

I began playing at age 7 with Latrobe Juniors where I played most of my Junior Football until their amalgamation with Bardon to become Bardon Latrobe.

I then moved to Annerley for three seasons, including one with their senior side.

The remainder and bulk of my senior playing days were made up of four years with Hellenic, two with Hollandia, two with Grange, two with Oxley and three at North Star.

Following on from this were two years spent as player-coach for Kingsridge and

a year as player/coach at Slacks Creek prematurely terminated due to a break down of communication between myself and management.

1988 was the only year where I had no involvement in the game in any capacity and I believe this was the catalyst to my being interested in an article early in 1989 regarding the shortage of refe-

Subsequent conversations and encouragement from Des Miles, Roger Marshall and my wife and a course and "Bingo", I'm a referee.

Although initially, I had some apprehension about my decision, I'm now satisfied it is the best I have ever made.

My only regret is I didn't make it

There is no doubt many with the responsibility of having soccer reach its full potential, have failed, and their procrastination jeopardises the code's future.


JOHN Stewart (Rochedale) is a class player and the quicker some of his team mates lift their game, the sooner the team will start rattling up a string of wins.


WHERE did he go? Most recent news on Lee Scriggins, formerly with North Star, is that he's in England trying out with a few clubs including Leicester.
