

Dr Bradley was commissioned by the Australian Soccer Federation to review soccer in Australia and the results are to be released soon.

This same gentleman reviewed Rugby League within Queensland and NSW before handing a report onto the Australian Rugby League.

League.
The ARL has adopted this report as the
"master blueprint" for the code's development.

Whether soccer in Australia endorses and fully adopts the "Bradley Report" remains to be seen.

However, whatever the outcome of the report, Australian soccer must establish some concrete plans to ensure the code flourishes well into the next century.

It is imperative these plans include short term measures to turn the flagging sport around, but more importantly long term objectives to cement a future for the code.

Soccer around the world is arguably the greatest sport played, it is certainly one of the few "World Games".

Soccer in Australia must make its mind up NOW whether it wants to be the sport with the greatest number of participants, which incidentally it is, or to be recognised as the truly great sport it should be.

A lot has been spoken about the NSL competition recently. Yes we must have a combined side in that competition from October to

But what about the winter season? The Australian Soccer Federation must take control to establish a full interstate competition for the winter months.

This competition would impove the standard of Australian Soccer, both on the field and more importantly in the public's eyes, out of

After all NSL football is the pinnacle of the

code in Australia at club level.

However, club players need to be exposed to a higher standard to really prove their ability and an interstate series involving all States from Tasmania to the Northern Territory, could prove to be the answer and the catalyst to take Australian soccer into the 90s.

This type of series could be used to pick the Australian team with every soccer player and supporter comforted by the fact only the best would be wearing the green and gold.

Dittmer Park the proud home of Mt. Gravatt Soccer Club

THE history of the Mt Gravatt Soccer Club's dates back to 1960, when the then Mt Gravatt Youth and Recreation Club decided to promote the sport of soccer in the district.

Mr Charlie Grant, one of the Youth Club's founders, was given the responsibility of trying to organise a soccer section within the club.

So in February, 1960, advertisements were placed in local newspapers calling for interested boys to turn up at the local show grounds.

Three boys, Bristo Salo, Bob McKenzie and Jim Johnson, arrived at the show grounds.

Three adults arrived at the show grounds along with the boys. They were Roy Johnson, Jack Cranney and Noel

It was agreed to pursue the matter further and contact was made with the various schools in the area in a bid to attract more players interested in participating in the code.

On the next recruitment day, 14 boys turned up and the first team was formed.

Although some heavy defeats were inflicted on the pioneers, they lived to fight another day.

At this stage, the club was known as the "Mountain Rangers" and was not changed to the Mt Gravatt Junior Soccer Club until 1962.

This was the season the club recorded its first trophy win when the Mt Gravatt Under-15 team won the Redlands Ambulance Day Trophy.

The club continued to grow and was managed by a handful of willing workers including Grant who was chairman until

he retired from the position because of ill health.

Mr Grant was then appointed president for a life term and Alan Petersen became chairman in 1964.

In 1965 it was decided to try and enter a senior team and the Queensland Soccer Federation allowed Mt Gravatt to enter a team in the 6th Division.

Around this time the Excelsior Club at Stones Corner was struggling to survive, so it merged with the Mt Gravatt Club.

In 1966 the club changed its name to the Mt Gravatt Soccer Club and in the same year the club entered a team in the ladies' competition.

The following year Clairvaux College, a local school in the area, entered a team in the local soccer competition with the help of the Mt Gravatt Soccer Club.

During 1967, the club lost its founder,



Grant, who collapsed and died after watching the club's 3rd Division side

Grant died just before the 3rd Division team was promoted to the 2nd Division.

Because of the club's increasing growth, a publicity committee was formed in 1969, the same year junior and senior clubs amalgamated to form the Mt Gravatt Soccer Club.

After making the 2nd Division, Mt Gravatt was relegated to the 3rd Division in 1970.

In 1972 Mt Gravatt fielded three senior sides and 33 junior teams with their headquarters at Dittmer Park, Mt Gra-

Also in that year Mt Gravatt won promotion into 1st Division for the first

They took until 1978 to reach their first Grand Final, but were beaten by the Southside Eagles.

In 1980 they won the State League title, but failed to beat their arch rivals Grange Thistle in the final.

Throughout the years many junior have come through the ranks to make senior teams as well as representative teams.

In 1990 there are four senior teams and 17 junior sides with coaching staff consisting mainly of past and present Mt Gravatt players.

These include past players Jim Johnson, Martin Kirsop and Gordon Peterson from the early days through to Stewart Woodruffe, Roy Smyth and new signing Andy Armitage.



WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The International Football Federation has announced plans for a World Cup competition for women.

The inaugural event will be played in China from November 17 to 30, 1991.

This is great news for nations that have been waiting since 1978 for F.I.F.A. to commit itself to staging a women's world tournament.

The finals will consist of 12 nations, three from Asia including host China, five from Europe and one each from Oceania, North and Central America, South America and Africa.

Decisions on the format for the Oceania qualification competition have yet to be finalised.

Clearly, however, Australia will have to beat its old rival, New Zealand before any tickets for China are delivered.

It is felt that Taiwan and Japan will line up with China to represent Asia given the outcome of last year's Asia Cup.

And the battle between USA and Canada should prove to be as tight as Australia's with New Zealand.

Australia's preparation for the qualification competition will involve training camps at the Australian Institute of Sport as well as games against male teams.

Participation in the 5th World Invitational Tournament in Taiwan later this year will also be important.



JUNIORS IN THE LIMELIGHT

QLD JUNIOR SOCCER COUNCIL

The Queensland Junior Soccer Council was formed in November 1975, after several years of "limbo" in which Queensland youth players were unable to compete in National Championships.

A steering committee was formed by the Queensland Soccer Federation in 1975 to look into the possibility of bringing together all areas of the State.

In November of that year all interested parties gathered at Perry Park for two days to discuss and resolve all aspects of the proposal.

Cliff McClurg, from the QSF, acted as Chairman for the meeting, and Pam Gilbert, from the Brisbane Junior Soccer Association, was minute secretary for the two days, as well as numerous tape recorders placed around the tables. North West Qld were represented by barrister Jim Webb of Townsville to ensure their area was recognised and Jim gave invaluable assistance to the Council during that long meeting with the formation of the QJSC Constitution.

At the end of the two day meeting, a Management Committee was elected for 1976 and the inaugural committee of the

QJSC was:

President - Cliff McClurg - Brisbane Senior Vice President - Keith Handley Townsville

Junior Vice President - Jim Webb Townsville

Secretary - John Williams - Brisbane Treasurer - Pam Gilbert - Brisbane Committee - Stan Dye - Brisbane Wally Ahearn - Gold Coast Euan Sutherland - Dimbulah Gordon McLatchey - Rockhampton Sir Bruce Small, MLA, was Patron.

Zone boundaries were agreed during that meeting and seven Zones were formed, with the majority still remaining the same as they were in 1975.

The seven zones were:

Zone 1 Far North Qld: Cairns, Cape York, Tinaroo, Johnston River, Herbert River, Ingham

Zone 2 North Qld: Townsville, Mackay, Ayr, Hughenden, Collinsville

Zone 3 Central Qld: Rockhampton, Mt Morgan, Biloela, Gladstone, Moranbah, Emerald, Blackwater

Zone 4 Wide Bay: Sunshine Coast, Bundaberg, Maryborough, Gympie, Kingaroy, Murgon

Zone 5 South Qld: Toowoomba, Gold Coast, Roma/Charleville, Warwick, Stanthorpe, Dalby, Lockyer

Zone 6 Brisbane: Brisbane North and South.

Zone 7 North West Qld: Mount Isa All participants of that long weekend

went home with a new enthusiasm for junior soccer in the State and contact was made with every corner of the State to encourage them to become members.

1976 was a hard year for the Council members - not the least of which was raising money to enable us to compete at National level.

Aconservative budget of \$20,000 was required and the Council had a nil bank balance.

A raffle was organised, but we were restricted to a \$5,000 gross by the Justice Department, so other ideas were required.

It was finally decided to have a Junior Soccer Day combined with a Dribble-a-thon, with incentive prizes for amounts raised.

Each player who raised a minimum of \$20.00 received a training ball and other prizes, such as tracksuit tops, were given for larger amounts.

It is thanks to those junior players of 1976 for getting junior soccer off the ground financially, as \$68,000 was grossed that first year with the net amount shared between the QJSC and the Zones.

The dribble-a-thon was again conducted by the QJSC in 1977 and after that it was handed back to Zones for their own fund raising purposes.

The QJSC also took on the hosting of a National Championship in 1976 which was held on the Gold Coast which was a bit ambitious for the new committee.

However, we quickly learnt from our mistakes and promptly applied again for 1978 and Queensland now have the reputation for hosting the best run National Championships.

The Brisbane Junior Soccer Association was already in the process of splitting into two Associations at the time of the formation of the QSJC as North and South were being run by sub-committees under the auspices of the Brisbane Juniors.

In 1976 Brisbane entered a combined team in each State Championship and became Associations/Zones in their own right at the end of that year.

From 1977 the Brisbane Southern Districts Association and the Brisbane North & Districts Association became autonomous.

During 1976, the QJSC were approached by the State Primary Schools Soccer Association to take over the running of their Under-12 competitions, the Harry Linning Competition and the Gino Paris Competition.



The Council had already made the decision not to hold State Championships in this age group or to participate in National Championships for Under-12's because the Council did not wish to compete with the schoolboys in that age group.

In the initial discussions with the schoolboys, it had been their intention that the Council take over the running of the Competitions on their behalf and that from these Competitions they would select a team to compete in the Australian Schoolboys Championships, however this failed to eventuate and the Schoolboys now run their own Under-12 Championship in competition with our two Carnivals.

The Council is greatly honoured to run these Carnivals which honour Mr Linning and Mr Paris and they are a very prestigious part of the QJSC Championship calendar each year.

In 1976 an Under-11 State Championship was held for the first and only time and North West Qld were the hosts for this unique event.

Coaching clinics were also conducted by the QJSC in conjunction with the Coaches Federation in those first few years, with the Council paying for 18 coaches to attend the camp at Tallebudgera from all Affiliated Zones in the first year.

South Queensland Zone divided into two Zones at the end of 1981, with the Toowoomba Junior Association and all South Western Associations forming the South West Queensland Zone, and the Gold Coast Association becoming the South East Qld.

At the end of 1984, North Queensland also applied to become two Zones. A new Zone, Southern North Queensland, was centred on Mackay and took in the mining areas of Dysart and Moranbah, which were formally part of Central Queensland.

A result of this streamlining of Zones was the extra players throughout the State were given the opportunity to represent their area at State Championships

It is a source of great satisfaction to all members of the Queensland Junior Soccer Council that every player in the State has an opportunity to represent his Zone and, from there, his State, regardless of where he lives.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

USE OF THE FIELD One of the major problems for players is the inability to get out of tight situations as easily as the professionals appear to. So often we see the ball stuck on one touchline with more and more players involved until the game becomes a traffic jam. Watch a televised game and see how smoothly the ball is switched away from the tight areas and into the open spaces. Acquiring this ability can change a team's fortunes overnight.

Today Soccer 90 begins a 2 part series on how best to use the whole field.

Length and Width Drill

Preparation

Mark out a large area with eight discs as shown.

Players need to distribute themselves evenly, just outside the area. Start with

Procedure

The players with a ball pass to other players across or at the ends of the area.

As they pass, they call the name of the intended receiver and run to take their places. Receivers wait till the ball has crossed the line in front of them then control it and continue the sequence of passing/calling and changing places.

1. This practice makes players aware of the size of the area in which they are

playing by forcing them to keep to its limits. It also develops their ability to look around, make quick decisions and select the best from a number of alterna-

2. Passes must be played hard. Otherwise they will not reach their target or they will fade so that the passer arrives before the ball.

3. The length of passes will obviously vary because of the shape of the area.


4. After allowing the

players time to settle, punish slack and inaccurate play. This is a practice which demands a lot from the coach to keep up the momentum.

Variations

1. Introduce more balls.

2. Limit the number of touches. Next week Part 2 -- Opposed Practice.

The Atlanta Cup Semi-finals and Finals have been re-scheduled following last week's washout.

SUCCESSFUL EUROPEAN CUP

Twenty-two thousand supporters in a stadium which was so packed some fans had to be turned away!

Never in its brief history had women's football aroused such a keen interest as it did in the Federal Republic of Germany at the final tournament of the 3rd U.E.F.A. Competition for women's national teams in July 1989.

Television and the other media gave full coverage to the final phase of this event.

Of the 18 national teams which originally entered the competition, Germany, Italy, Sweden and Norway finally came through to qualify for the final stage. In one semi-final, Germany defeated Italy on penalties (4-3) while Norway overcame Sweden who had been the first ever winners of the U.E.F.A. Women's Competition. (Norway also defeated Sweden, 2-1 in the Pilot World Cup in 1988.)







NORTH QUEENSLAND

Results were fairly predictable, and once again, even at this early stage, it can be anticipated that the Metway Bank First Division Premiership will be fought out between five of the ten First Division Clubs.

Olympic, Estates, Aitkenvale P.Y.C., Brothers, and Ayr Parkside look to be the only serious contenders for honours for the second year in succession, although not necessarily in that order.

A recent surprise to the local soccer community was the shock resignation of top North Queensland coach, Alex Anderson, from the helm of Aitkenvale P.Y.C. Alex is unquestionably one of the North Queensland's premier coaches and is going to be sorely missed by his club. He commenced his playing career in Ireland and later came to Brisbane where he became a contract player with Grange Thistle in 1970.

During his sojourn in Brisbane, Alex represented Brisbane and Queensland, also playing in a selected team against the Australian team during their preparation for their World Cup series. On arriving in Townsville in 1977 he commenced playing for and coaching the Stuart United (Prison) team, where he was employed as a Prison Officer.

Unknown at the time of arrival to the local soccer clubs, his ability as a player and coach were soon recognised.

The Aitkenvale club, who at the time had a number of promising young players, were anxious to sign an experienced coach and persuaded Alex to take over.

Other than two years with Warriors and a similar period with W.S.C. in the N.Q. First Division as coach, Alex has spent the remaining six years as player/coach with the Aitkenvale club.

during that time the club, under his guidance, won three First Division Grand Finals, two First Division Premierships, one Club Championship, the Crad Evans Shield (played between N.Q. Premiers and Far North First Div. Premiers) plus numerous carnivals and just about every trophy on offer in N.Q. soccer.

But the strain of coaching year after year has affected his health and is the reason Alex has been forced into retirement as coach. It is however known that a recent disappointment and other reasons have also been contributing factors.

His relationship with his club and the players is excellent and he has offered to advise his proteges, Chris James and Ken Mitchell, who are taking over the coaching duties.

Alex also intends to continue playing with the club and not hanging up his boots for a few years yet.

An extract from the "Brisbane Soccer News" dated July 1, 1966 brought to light a piece of N.Q. soccer history.

"When a player scores four goals in eleven minutes, you would expect him to ease up as having done his share towards victory. But not Harry Stevenson, the Olympic Captain who continued to score goals and finished up with a total of eleven in a thirteen to two win for his club against Crosskeys".

English born Harry Stevenson played for and coached a number of local clubs, as well as representing North Queensland, before finally giving it away just a few years ago.

Harry could probably claim another record as being the oldest player still playing First Division soccer in N.Q. prior to his

NORTH QUEENSLAND

Fixtures finally got under way last weekend after rain had caused disruptions to the commencement of the season.

He commenced his playing career in Ireland and later came to Brisbane where he became a contract player with Grange Thistle in 1970.

During his sojourn in Brisbane, Alex represented Brisbane and Queensland, also playing in a selected team against the Australian team during their preparation for their World Cup series. On arriving in Townsville in 1977 he commenced playing for and coaching the Stuart United (Prison) team, where he was employed as a Prison Officer.

Unknown at the time of arrival to the local soccer clubs, his ability as a player and coach were soon recognised.

The Aitkenvale club, who at the time had a number of promising young players, were anxious to sign an experienced coach and persuaded Alex to take over.

Other than two years with Warriors and a similar period with W.S.C. in the N.Q. First Division as coach, Alex has spent the remaining six years as player/coach with the Aitkenvale club.

during that time the club, under his guidance, won three First Division Grand Finals, two First Division Premierships, one Club Championship, the Crad Evans Shield (played between N.Q. Premiers and Far North First Div. Premiers) plus numerous carnivals and just about every trophy on offer in N.Q. soccer.

But the strain of coaching year after year has affected his health and is the reason Alex has been forced into retirement as coach. It is however known that a recent disappointment and other reasons have also been contributing factors.

His relationship with his club and the players is excellent and he has offered to advise his proteges, Chris James and Ken Mitchell, who are taking over the coaching duties.

Alex also intends to continue playing with the club and not hanging up his boots for a few years yet.

An extract from the "Brisbane Soccer News" dated July 1, 1966

brought to light a piece of N.Q. soccer history.

"When a player scores four goals in eleven minutes, you would expect him to ease up as having done his share towards victory. But not Harry Stevenson, the Olympic Captain who continued to score goals and finished up with a total of eleven in a thirteen to two win for his club against Crosskeys".

English born Harry Stevenson played for and coached a number of local clubs, as well as representing North Queensland,

before finally giving it away just a few years ago.

Harry could probably claim another record as being the oldest player still playing First Division soccer in N.Q. prior to his retirement.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

with DES MILES

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Every Saturday in every match, a player will shout something along the lines, "OK, it's mine!, Red's ball!, Leave it Fred!, or Jim's ball!".

In the first two instances, an opponent will often turn around to the referee and shout, "What about a name, Ref?" - (have you noticed how many players try to get opponents cautioned?).

But is it an offence? Is a name required?

In the last two examples the players often assume because a name has been used, everything is **OK**, that **NO OFFENCE** has been committed and that the referee will not (and should not) take any action.

But in some cases an offence may well have been committed and the referee must take action. Or MUST

In my refereeing career I have found that this one area, more than any other, is the one that players universally misunderstand.

Moreover, many referees themselves are not clear.

Some assume that a name must always be used, and if it is not, they penalise - often with the award of a **DIRECT** free kick!! This is yet another example of potential inconsistency between referees.

Well, what is the true situation? What do the "Laws" require?

The first point is that the use of a name is **NOT** mandatory; the Laws do not require names to be used.

Nor should they, since names may be known to opponents and both sides could contain a couple of Johns or Toms, and other names or nicknames can sound very similar when shouted - Geoff, Jeff, Trev, Seth or Raf...or even Ref!

What the Law does require is that **NO UNFAIR ADVANTAGE** is gained by the use of the words.

If the referee is satisfied that a player has not gained an unfair advantage from the use of the words (whatever they may have been), then **NO OFFENCE** has been committed. There are many occasions dur-

ing a match when players will innocently shout, especially as an aid to their colleagues, without thinking of the precise words they use, or whether they use names or not.

After all, they are all coached to "talk to each other". If they have not gained an unfair advantage, no offence has been committed and the referee should take no action.

Such is the case when a goalkeeper rushes off his line shouting "keeper's ball".

For such words he should not be penalised since nobody is in any doubt about the situation.

However, there are also some occasions when players deliberately try to distract or put-off opponent by shouting or calling (e.g., "leave it") again it is **IRRELEVANT** whether he uses a name or not.

After all, he may know the opponent, but the referee as well. **HE IS A CHEAT** and should be treated as such by being cautioned for Ungentlemanly Conduct.

But beware - you MUST BE CERTAIN OF THE INTENT - it's your opinion which matters and you must make the correct decision, not the convenient one.


The quotation from Law 12 is "....its correct application depends on the referee's ability to make up his mind whether or not a player's action is **INTENTIONAL**."

To summarise, if the referee considers that the opponent was "put-off" by the shout (whatever the wording my have been) - i.e., an unfair advantage has been gained - he must issue a caution for Ungentlemanly Conduct.

The game must then be restarted by an **INDIRECT** free-kick from the place where the offence occurred.

The fact a player may prefix his shout by calling a colleague by name (e.g. "OK, Bob, it's mine") does not alter the interpretation.

There may be an opponent close by with the same name. It the referee decides that the shout gained an unfair advantage then an offence has been committed.






