A lot of people within the soccer community often wonder why representative football has to be played.

Why their club players have to be conscripted to play for a Brisbane team against a lesser known Ipswich or Toowoomba side.

First Queensland soccer needs to improve its standard, that means "Queen Street" soccer players have to become missionaries of the sport throughout the State. Pulling on Brisbane's white and red strip and playing lesser known opposition to assist in lifting the sport's total performance for the future is of paramount importance.

Incidentally the score in the Toowoomba versus Brisbane match was 6-1 to Brisbane.

However, several Toowoomba players came to the notice of Queensland coach and sole selector Bruce Stowell.

In other words these Toowoomba players were finally discovered.

Publicity wise Toowoomba as you may know is a strong rugby league town.

In fact it has been the corner-stone of that code in Queensland for a great number of years.

Therefore everything that is printed in the local paper, The Toowoomba Chroncile's sport section is of course rugby league.

But the day after the Brisbane/ Toowoomba match, soccer took the back page thanks mostly to the Chronicle sports editor Mark Bousan.

So you can see what can happen when a big soccer match is played in Toowoomba.

My son has recently started playing with Souths United Under-9s Second Division team.


Someone once said to me "watch the Under-9s and see Brisbane", and now I know exactly what they mean.

Over the last few days I have been to Acacia Ridge, Manly and Slacks Creek.

The standard I have seen has been quite pleasing, but the most heartening thing is the dedication of parents and club officials.

These are the people who spend their weekends ferrying the kids around to far-flung locations and organising fields and strips to make the whole thing possible.

It must all be worth it to them when they see how much enjoyment these youngsters have playing these games.



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The history of the Coalstars Soccer club goes back to before the turn of the century when soccer was first played in Queensland.

Bundamba Rangers and Blackstone Rovers were two famous Ipswich clubs formed by new settlers from the home country working in the coalmines around Ipswich.

They carved playing fields out of the bushland on the banks of Bundamba Creek and between them, produced many fine players and teams for well over half a century.

Ipswich is known for its internationals from that era and most would have played for one of these clubs.

Some of the better known family names include Gibb, Sander, Nunn, Kitching and Rule.

With the restructuring of the Queensland Soccer Federation in the 1960's, many wealthy ethnic clubs like Hellenic, Hollandia and Azzuri became strong and were able to lure the best players from Ipswich to Brisbane.

It soon became apparent that both clubs could not survive and after much soul searching by both committees, Coalstars was formed through an amalgamation of the Bundamba Rangers and Blackstone Rovers in 1964.

In the 26 years that have passed since its formation, the club has met with success winning the Ampol Cup on three occasions, a grand final and a President's Cup, and the latest being this year's pre-season competition.

Success

Except for one Ampol Cup in the mid 60s, these successes have all been in the last five years.

The club has produced many fine players since its formation and two of these, Ross Kelly and Ian Johnston, have gone on to full international honours.

After maintaining a First Division team for 13 years, the club dropped to Second Division in 1977 and played there for two seasons before joining with St Helens to form Ipswich United in 1979/ 80.

During this period, the Coalstars name remained in the South-east Queensland league, and was the reserve grade team to Ipswich United in the State League.

Coalstars withdrew from the Ipswich United concept, and played again in Second Division until 1983, when it finished fourth.

At the beginning on the 1984 season, the Queensland Soccer Federation accepted Coalstars nomination into the Premier League under a restructuring of the competition, a decision which caused considerable controversy in many circles.

Coalstars had spent their time wisely in the lower divisions and the club had developed their facilities to qualify ahead of the others, some of whom were stunned at the Federation's decision.



The results achieved by the club since have vindicated the decision.

The facilities of the club were further upgraded with the opening of a new \$175,000 clubhouse at their grounds at Bundamba in March 1988.

As a tribute to the just retired secretary of the club for more than 20 years, the grounds were officially named the "Eric Evans Soccer Reserve" last year.

Two of the club's players Kevin "Butch" Caldwell and Andrew "Andy" Ogden were



inaugural winners of the Rothman's Medal and Q.S.F. Gold Medal respectively.

Mark Brusasco, who has been with the club for a number of years and who is in his second year as player/coach of the First Division team, is also a previous Rothman's winner.

The strength of the club does not only lie with the senior teams.


Coalstars is very much a family club, and this years has 276 juniors in 20 teams from under-7 to 15.

These junior teams have also brought considerable success to the club and some of the famous names of Ipswich soccer are still represented.

Additionally, the club has three teams in the Women's Competition, with Australian representative Michelle Sawyers being player/coach and supported by several Queensland representatives.

A numbers of young players have moved from the juniors ranks in the past few years to give the senior teams a balance of youth and experience.

This, together with the up and coming talent in the junior ranks at all ages should ensure the future of the club.





CROSSING

Strictly speaking, a cross is a pass, but due to the remarkably high percentage of goals resulting from crosses at professional level, and the appalling standard of crossing at other levels, it is worth looking at.

At a recent game between two top local teams, I ran a check on crosses for a period.

I counted that, of the last 10 crosses in the game, 9 were put behind the goal!

At any level this would be a disgrace. Make your own check. Watch a televised game. See how rare it is for a cross to be put astray at top level.

See for yourself how many strikes come from crosses. See how much variety there is in the crosses.

It is no longer a case of "get to the line and hang it up on the far post".

Crossing Drill:

These are usually fun. When players go out with a few balls for a 'kick-round', crossing for someone to head to goal ranks almost on a par with the simple joy of blasting the ball into the net.

Players: 8 or more.

Preparation:

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT


Form the players into three groups as shown:

BRUCE STOWELL

A) A group of left-footed crosses.

B) A group of right-footed crosses.C) A central group of strikers to con-

vert the crosses.



Procedure:

- 1. Crosses work from alternated sides.
- 2. Strikers attack the crosses in pairs, one near post, one far post. If the near post player misses, the far post player covers.

- 3. Allow the Crossers to strike balls in from any angle. Some will hit them early, others will get right to the goal-line.
- 4. Change the groups over frequently to allow plenty of variety.

Notes:

1. Encourage the crossers to keep their heads up during the run-in to making the cross, so that they can see the situation open to them.

The eyes must go down and remain on the ball throughout the action of striking the ball. Too many players jerk their heads up as they strike the ball, to see where it is going, with the result that crosses are so frequently off-target.

2. Ensure that crosses "get ahead of" the ball in order to strike it successfully. A common reason for unsuccessful crosses is that players allow the ball to get too far away from them and finish up having to stretch for it, or "sit" as they are striking it.

As a result, the ball is struck with the front part of the foot flexed and control is virtually impossible.

IT's regarded as one of the biggest single sporting events in the world.

It's held every four years and manages to capture the undivided attention of the sporting public.

It's not the Olympics, nor the Commonwealth Games, Wimbledon or Australia's own AFL grand final.

We are after all talking about the World Cup.

Preparations for the 1990 World Cup are building to a crescendo with only two months before the action begins.

So perhaps it's timely to look at the history of the big event in the biggest game this world has ever known.

The first World Cup was held in Uruguay in 1930.

This was possible after ten years of discussion and planning by Jules Rimet the President of the French Football Association and of FIFA.

Out of respect for all the work Jules Rimet had done, FIFA decided to name the trophy the JULES RIMET CUP.

It was solid gold, 30cm high and it weighed just over 4 kilos.

In 1934 and 1938 the whole competition was run on a knock-out basis and in 1934 the USA, Argentina and Brazil travelled all the way to Italy for just one match.

Since 1950 different ways have been tried to give teams more games.

The 1982 finals involved twenty-four teams for the first time.

Again in 1986 twenty-four teams were involved, but the later stages had been amended to include a quarter final competition.

The Jules Rimet Cup was played for until 1970 when Brazil, having won it three times, was allowed to keep it forever. The new FIFA trophy is solid gold, 36cm high and is simply called the WORLD CUP.

It was designed by an Italian and was selected from fifty-three entries.

The World Cup was used for the first time in 1974.

Q.S.S.S. FEDERATION

The Boys' and Girls'National Schools Championships will be held in Melbourne from September 8 to 14.

For those girls involved in the Under-19's who are still at school, and who are keen to be considered for selection in the State Schoolgirls' side to go to Melbourne, there may be a possibility that you can still be involved in both.

It has been brought to my attention that in the same week we are running our State Championship for girls, the 19's are going to Melbourne.

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In 1989 we put forward our girls' Championship to allow for this clash but this year, having heard nothing, we went ahead and booked the venue.

The Queensland State Secondary Schools Sports Association, our parent body, has a clause in its constitution which covers this situation and allows us to select such players as are representing Queensland at a higher level at the time of the State Championship.

Be aware, though, that this means a second trip to Melbourne and a financial demand on parents.

Like the Australian Women's Association, we are concerned about the financial strain on parental purse strings and will not pressure any of these players.

The decision must be made at home and stuck by. A case in point in 1989 was Claire Nichols, who elected not to be available for Schoolgirl selection, and despite the fact that she was undoubtedly the best Keeper at our State Championship, we respected that decision and gave another girl the chance to represent her State.

I recently spent time praising five young men who were selected in the Australian Schoolboys Side.

Afterwards, I was told that one of these lads was asked to sign a Blue Form by his club and I thought that meant that his services were considered valuable.

Later I was told that he was dropped to the Reserves and replaced by players of the same vintage who did not make it into the State side (though one was a little unlucky not to). I do hope I did not jinx the lad by praising him, or that the Blue form is not just a means of ensnaring young players and preventing them from offering their services to other clubs. That "he's one of our players and we want to keep him", attitude is the one obstacle to the formation of the Queensland - based NSL team which can only be overcome if this team is a new and independent body.

Let's make this year one of total support for all teams in clubs including


your women's squad.

We all like to follow the boys and we all support our top men's teams, but sometimes, in some clubs, the women's teams tend to be forgotten.


All teams need supporters otherwise we will all be playing to empty grandstands and there will be no interest in soccer.



that the player determines. APPLICANTS: Players should only apply if they have a desire to improve their overall soccer skills and are prepared to listen and participate in home activities and show an interested attitude.

ACADEMY STRUCTURE: Number of players per group, 14; Number of sessions - one session per week (pre-season), 1 session every two weeks (in season); Venue - Gold Coast north and south; Session time - one and a half to two hours; Cost per session - \$2.50.

Each "team" will run for six weeks. Parents of players attending the Academy of Soccer Excellence will have access to the player's coach and records will be kept of players' attendance and progress.

Parents will be asked to show an interest and encourage their son/ daughter during their home activities

But the overall practice time and effort will be determined by the player.

Coaches that will be employed to work with the players at the Academy of Soccer Excellence will be Australian Soccer Federation qualified coaches or elite senior players under the direction of the


Federation Regional Director of Coaching. Players will be required to register for a six week term and pay in advance. * * *

tation of ideas from well qualified staff.




REFEREEING INTO THE 90'S _____ with DES MILES

Teaching the Laws of the Game with Photographs "Dangerous Play"




The player behind is clearly trying to play the ball. His foot is also trying to get the ball. This picture shows a border-line case. If the foot playing the ball is drawn up even further, then danger to the opponent cannot be excluded and the referee must intervene. The referee must also keep an eye on the arm of the player in front.





This photo shows a border-line case between dangerous play and forbidden play. The player on the right is kicking at the ball at the height of his opponent's head. Through this, the opponent is not only obstructed in play but could also be hit by the foot. If only the ball is hit, then the sanction should be: indirect free-kick. However, if the opponent is touched by the foot, then the decision should be a direct free-kick.

Creek keeping them in the game. But with five minutes to go Creek's midfield put through a perfect ball which was put past the keeper to give them the winning score




A well prepared and disciplined Hills side took on a confident Albany Creek and matched them in every department.

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
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
