The Gamblers fought back in the second half after being put under pressure with some early Brisbane goals.


It's terrific to leave a match and say you have seen eight or nine goals land in the back of the net.


It almost develops the same excitement of one day cricket and we all know what a success that little initiative has been.

Brisbane Lions may be one of Queensland Soccer's younger clubs, but it is certainly a club with a proud history.

Its origins date back to 1957 when a band of Dutch immigrants, keen to play soccer amongst friends, formed the then Hollandia Soccer Club.

The talents and ambitions of these people grew quickly and in 1958 the club joined the Brisbane and Ipswich League competition, playing from the hallowed turf on the corner of Archerfield and Ipswich Roads, Inala (now the home of Darra United).

One can still remember the ball scooting across the Ipswich road traffic from any wayward shots on the southern end of the ground.

Hollandia fought hard to become a very competitive outfit, thus eventually taking the Grand Final in 1963.

Hollandia joined the newly formed Queensland Soccer Federation in 1964 in Division Two, however winning promotion to Division One in 1965 and subsequently being relegated back to Division Two at the end of the year.

The club was promoted again for the 1967 season and have never looked back since, figuring in many Premierships and Championships during the years which have followed.

The face of Queensland soccer was to change in the early 70's as did the club name from Hollandia to Brisbane Lions to conform with QSF ruling.

The club had also relocated in 1971 to it's current complex at Pine Rd, Richlands.

Lions maintained its high profile in Queensland's premier competition until 1977 when it and Brisbane City joined top ranking southern clubs in forming a national competition known as the Phillips Soccer League.

For ten consecutive years Brisbane Lions held it's own against the might of New South Wales, Victoria, A.C.T., and South Australia with the club's proudest moment being in 1981 when it took out the Phillips Cup.

1987 had Lions back in the Queensland XXXX League after being cut from the short



list of clubs in the National Soccer League. After winning the Premiership and Championship that year, Lions outplayed West Adelaide for Promotion back into the NSL

1988 proved too tough for Lions as we were relegated back into the local competition.

During it's time in the NSL, Brisbane Lions did it's best to promote the sport, featuring \$1 days and bringing out guest players in the calibre of Bob Latchford 1981, Alan Sunderland 1982 and George Best in 1983, to the Queensland soccer public

Junior clinics were organised with these sporting stars and for a while, soccer was brought to the fore of Queensland sporting news. These were strenuous years for Lions, both financially and in player resources because we were also fielding teams in the QSF higher divisions.

Back in the XXXX League, Lions still remains one of the leading contenders for season honours and will always strive to be Queensland's number one as the following list of major honours will indicate:

Golden Circle Trophy: '67, '68, '73, '83. Queensland Cup: '68, '70, '73. President's Cup: '69, '73, '74, '75, '85. Ampol Cup: '68, '70, '73.

Peter Mitaros Shield: '68, '74, '75, '76. XXXX Pre-Season Cup: '84, '85, '87, '89. Phillips Cup: '81.

All the above mentioned performances were accomplished by our Top grade teams, but the Lions can also boast some fine performances from it's reserves, colts, amateur divisions and of course, the juniors.

The foundation for any soccer club is juniors, and Brisbane Lions is no exception.

It is heartening to see players come through the junior ranks and go on to play as high as National League for the club, players such as Danny Wright, Steve Jackson, Steve Fulton, Paul Burns, Jason Kearton to name but a few.

Lions have also had it's share of National Representatives with the likes of Ray Richards, Gary Wilkins, Col Bennett, Stephen Hogg, Alan Niven, Ian Lawrie - Under-23 and Clark Anderson - Youth.

You cannot measure a club's success on the field alone, for there are many tireless workers behind the scenes who have put in so much time and effort. From our first President J. van Engelen, John Morcus who occupied the chair for 23 consecutive years ('66-'88), to our current President, Gary Wilkins.

These men and their committees and members have worked hard to build Brisbane Lions to what it is today - a modern complex containing three playing fields (the main pitch being regarded as one of the best playing surfaces in Australia for many years), comfortable clubhouse and grandstand.

For now we will be happy to win the major trophies for the 1990 season.









In future games we should see a bit more understanding between referees and players to avoid some of the unnecessary cautions.


With the forth-coming visit of Charlton Athletic, everyone is having a shot at selecting their own Queensland team.

Another spin-off would be that the players might get to see more than just the road to and from the grounds and soccer fields.

A little sight-seeing might make it a little more worth the expense.

We are looking at over \$400.00 for Brisbane-based players this year, with the bulk of that being Airfares.

The Brisbane South Schools Region will be selecting their team on May 18 at Mt Gravatt Soccer Club, so any players who have not been informed by their schools should keep that date in mind if interested in a trip to Cairns and a chance to earn a birth to Melbourne in September to defend the National Title.

It was pleasing to read of the appointment of Peter Kelly to Toowoomba and of John Reid to Rockhampton as Regional Coaching Directors.

This means school players in these regions will get some benefit. Schools have become a priority area for Regional directors over recent years as has been witnessed by Mal Bland's visits to schools in Brisbane and last year's invasion of the Wide Bay area by Bruce Stowell, Bland and Tony Buesnel at the time of our State Championships.

Wayne Warren, is working at Taringa with the Reserves.

And looking at the Taringa line-up in the "Soccer 90" I read a lot of names of former Queensland Schoolboy players.

My informant on the Sunshine Coast tells me that this area might be the place for Fourex scouts to look for players of the future as the Brisbane and Gold Coast areas are pretty well locked up. Some of the Sunshine Coast Schoolboy players are already playing in clubs like Pine Rivers.

One such player is Noel Carroll.

Another is Carl Harrison from Noosa, a young man who travelled to Adelaide with us in 1989 and may be worth investigating.

It is worth bearing in mind that this area is still an undeveloped one in terms of player spotting.

On the Private School side, the TAS schools run a divided competition which they call the Red and the Blue.

As it has been described to me the Red competition has 10 schools playing in Open A, Open B, Under-15, Under-14 and Under-13 divisions and the Blue competition has 6 schools playing in Open A, Under-15, Under-14 and Under-13 divisions.

The Open sides compete in the ISSA Cup which involves both GPS and TAS schools.

In 1989 Iona defeated Brisbane Grammar at Perry Park in the Cup Final.

St Pauls, at Bald Hills are considered to be a strong contender in this competition.

Last time I mentioned Tibor Hagymas who coordinates the sport at Iona. In his spare time he is playing for Coomera, coaching the ladies at that club and acting as Junior Director of coaching.

I mention these things when I hear of them because it is not always realised that teachers involved with school soccer are often putting in a lot of time with clubs as well and do understand the problems we cause with our competition.

First, let me make a correction to the dates I quoted last week as those of the National Schools Championships.

In 1989 at the National Championships in Adelaide, we were told the dates were September 8-14, but the official invitation to compete has arrived with September 1-7 as the dates for this competition.

Unfortunately this will still run us into Fourex fixtures.

There will be an attempt to run a competition for Senior teams along similar lines to the Commonwealth Bank/Bill Turner Cup for Under-15's, but for this year we will concentrate on S.E. Qld.

It is proposed that a competition centred on Toowoomba will provide a winning team to compete in a draw with the Brisbane Metropolitan Champion team, and champion teams from the Sunshine Coast, Gold Coast, Ipswich and Logan areas.

As the Metropolitans are in August, we envisage the Semis and Finals to run some time after this. Results in so far from the Commonwealth Bank/Bill Turner Cup are as follows: Shailer Park 3 d Camp Hill 0, Iona College 1 d Wynnum High 0, Redeemer Lutheran College 3 d Springwood High 0.

Some games are still to be played as this report goes to press - Dakabin play St James at North Pine, Nambour plays Maleny and Keebra Park plays Miami.

Round Two is to be completed by May 18. As match reports come to hand they will be included in this report. Last year's Qld Winner, Alexander Hills, has yet to send in a report on its fixture against Woodridge.

A win to Woodridge would certainly give them a confidence boost for Round Two.



PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

This week we continue our series on "Crossing" with a look at the "Conditioned Crossing Game".

PREPARATION:


Mark out a pitch with goals and make touchline zones as shown with the marker discs.

Don't make the pitch too long. The object of the game is to work the ball quickly into a crossing position and set up strikes.

PROCEDURE:

The wingers play with whichever side has possession. This means that although they stay in the same zone they will be playing to different ends depending on which side has the ball.

This gives players practice in both left and right foot crosses. No other player is allowed in the touchline zones which may be as wide or narrow as you wish.



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
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Immediately the wingers receive the ball they can cross it whenever they like.

When an attack is completed down one flank the ball must be worked to the other flank for the next attack. VARIATION:

Remove the discs and allow the game to continue freely with the condition that teams can only score from crosses. **NOTES:**

1) The system of changing flanks at the beginning of each attack helps teams to develop the skill of switch-play.

2) Make sure that the winger without the ball doesn't fall asleep but adjusts position according to where the ball is.


3) The zoning of the pitch means that the wingers will play wide, but at the same time, do emphasise the need for width in attack. By and large players have little idea of the value of width, but if you watch a televised game, you will see how much space players make for themselves by moving right out to the touchlines to receive passes.

4) Much has been said about the quality of crosses but the variety is also important.

The early cross - The ball should be driven towards goal, this creates three possibilities: a) A flick-on by player 1, b) A far-post header by players 2 or 3 or c) A knock-back by player 3 for either of the other two.


The goal line cross creates four possibilities: a) A low drive to the near post for player 1 to turn into goal, b) A drive to the near post for player 1 to feint and the ball to run on for player 2, c) A chip to the far post for player 3 or d) A cut back to player 4.

5) To have any chance of being effective, a cross must: a) Stay in play and b) Pass at least the defender putting pressure on the crosser.



CHECKLIST:

- * Practise the run-in and technique of crossing frequently, making sure the ball stays in play.
- * Vary the height, speed, and angle of the cross to keep the defence guessing.
- * Work hard on getting other players into the right places in the danger area in relation to the cross.



Mark Brusasco - The win over Grange Thistle has given us a lot of incentive to keep the positive ap-proach firmly in our minds. To win two matches on the trot is important, but one thing we must improve on is our consistency and this match is a chance to prove that point.





The Boars defense was sadly lacking in both games with an attack which couldn't convert chances to goals with any consistency. The team suffered from a lack of cohesion between players of


undoubted talent who had not been able to play sufficient trials together.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90'S _____ with DES MILES

GOALKEEPERS - ARE WE BEING FAIR?

Having been an editor of a Society Magazine which has now gone under due to lack of copy I felt more than a little guilt when I read Neary's Piece in the March '89 issue and decided to submit a few lines on one of my favourite moans.

I do this on the strict understanding that this piece of literary genius will be restricted to the pages of Soccer 90 and will not be submitted for nomination for The Nobel Prize for Literature, or any other similar award.

The deal having been struck fellow whistlers read on, what you are about to read may result in some of you calling for my execution, whereas others will, hopefully, agree with my sentiment.

The theme of my prose is that we treat Goalkeepers unfairly during a game of football.

UNFAIRLY? Is this man demented I hear you ask, but allow me to elucidate.

When I say unfairly I mean from the point of view of giving ALL the players a fair and just deal.

Do we not allow keepers to get away with things we would not tolerate from others?

Do we really treat all players alike regardless of the position they play?

If we examine some of the things that happen in a game you may get my drift.

Consider our approach to the player's equipment prior to the start of play.

How often do we hear Referees insist that players remove, or at least make safe, items of Jewellery?

Does that same diligent official ever bother to check the keeper's gloves?

As an ex-custodian I can go back to playing with a "bladder and case" which had the uncanny knack of al-ways being lace first whenever it hit you in the face, many of my younger colleagues will need to refer to their elders here as they have probably never seen a laced up ball.

No doubt my peers will remember how heavy and slimy the ball got on a bad day, yet keepers were rarely seen to don a pair of gloves, and when they did they were nothing more than knitted wool.

Those same young colleagues will find it difficult to remember seeing a gloveless keeper today, and what are these modern "Stiction" aids like?

I can go along with the argument that says gloves enhance a keepers handling, but should we allow them to be worn with knuckle patches reminiscent of a cricket batsman's gloves?

Surely such attributes are just as dangerous to the soft surface of an on-coming Centre Forward's face as a jewelled signet ring? Is that fair?

Moving onto the game itself. Yes the Laws of the Game offer the keeper some protection and privilege but haven't we gone too far? Going without the hint of a free-kick, or complaint for the matter. Today we might as well wrap the keepers in cotton wool because very few of us allow an opponent to make the same manner of physical contact we readily allow with other players. Is that fair?

We go even farther than protecting Goalies, we have got to the stage where we allow them far more licence than out-field players. Consider aerial contact outside the goal-area, we see what is coming and keep our eye on what the attacker is up to, doing our best to judge his intent, but I will suggest to you that we never consider that the keeper is coming for the cross with the intent of knocking the opponent out of the way.

Many keepers illegally use their elbows and knees in contact situations and are coached on how to do so, but we tend to see such acts as attempts to collect the ball with some degree of self-protection.

If the attacker launched himself in the same way we would soon spot it. Is that fair?

What about time wasting/consumption? Goalkeepers are "extracting the Michael" in every game we officiate.

We have had the introduction of what the pundits refer to as "the four step Rule", forced onto the game because WE were not controlling keepers when putting the ball back into play.

Still keepers are keeping possession of the ball for far longer than the Law change intended.

Surely, the idea is to get the ball into the game as quickly as possible, but what we see now is the keeper dribbling the ball around his domain, and will continue to do so, until an opponent comes within a few yards of him when he then picks the ball up and only plays it to a colleague when he is entirely satisfied that every one of his team-mates is stood in precisely the right position about the pitch.

Yes, yes I understand the view that says the keeper is only doing what other players may do, and anyway the ball is in play so he cannot be time wasting, but is the ball really in play, is it playable by another player?

I think not, the fact it is incumbent upon the keeper to release the ball quickly is being ignored by us on many occasions.

Many of us will have cautioned players for time wasting at throw-ins but we don't set the same criteria on goalkeepers. Is that fair?

Whether you think you are being fair or not you must agree that we need to rethink our strategy at least, because I am saying when it comes to dealing with goalkeepers we are doing a poor job. Is that fair?
