EDITORIAL: =

The last exclusive Rugby Union stronghold, the GPS school system, has succumbed to the international game played with skill.

Last Friday afternoon at Perry Park Brisbane Grammar School clashed with their old foes St Josephs College Gregory Terrace in a game of soccer.

What a delight it was to watch these two GPS schools, playing the game so many of us

But you have to dig below the surface to realise the true significance of such a match between these two elite private schools.

Apart from offering arguably the best education for young Queenslanders, RUGBY UNION, RUGBY UNION and RUGBY UNION is what schools such as Brisbane Grammar, Gregory Terrace and Nudgee, Ipswich Grammar, Churchie, Brisbane Boys College, Toowoomba Grammar, The Southport School and Brisbane State High are known for.

These private schools which make up the GPS (greater public schools) system have a reputation for producing rugby union players.

It's not surprising then that the bulk of rugby union players who have represented Queensland and worn the Green and Gold with pride have come from this system of schooling.

So what a triumph it is for soccer to rear its head in these most sacred of rugby union places

Not content with that, soccer is now beginning to firmly entrench itself in this last bastion of schools' rugby. Now all that needs to happen is that soccer follows the same path rugby union has in these hallowed educational halls of Queensland's private schools.

And wouldn't it be fantastic if ultimately there was as many soccer intenationals on these schools' honour boards as there are rugby union greats.

The young schoolboy players who took to Perry Park displayed excellent skills.

And what's even more important is they were well supported by family and friends.

The XXXX Soccer League competition certainly turned a full circle last weekend.

All clubs who appeared to be finding their own level within the 12 team competition all of a sudden had a complete form reversal.

This will once again create enthusiasm in the hearts of teams' dedicated supporters and it's all good for the competition.

Speaking about something good for soccer, the F.A. Cup final on Saturday night was a geat exhibition match for the code.

All of Australia is still talking about that match even if some of the vast audience who watched the game through the medium of television did not know anything about soccer.

Even they would have to be impressed about the basic skills of the players and the temperament of the competitors.

A lot of sports people could learn from that sporting fixture on how to conduct themselves as a sporting professional.





At the end of the 1971 season a group of disgruntled parents decided their boys deserved to gain more out of soccer, and thus the Inala City Soccer Club was formed.

The 1972 season was played on Darra's field and a bond of friendship was formed with that club.

The following year the club was offered the top oval in Freeman Road and this was greatly accepted.

Inala City decided to play in the colours of English club Crystal Palace and as these strips were not available in Australia, had to send to England for them.

They duly arrived in time for the 1973 season.

Memories

Inala City has many fond memories as the club continued to come along in leaps and bounds in its formulative years.

They include the club's first canteen, an old caravan which had to be towed to and from the ground each weekend. How it got there without mishap remains a mystery to this day.

There was also the story about

the club's lighting.

The club had to have lights for training, so one of the parents offered to make a pole at his Moorooka workshop.

But the problem was how to get a 15m pole from Moorooka to Inala?

On the back of a five tonne ute with an escort of a parent's car in the dead of the night to avoid the boys in blue.

Those days were hard work but lots of fun and thus many life-long friendships were formed.

To keep things going in the offseason, the club entered cricket with some success.


Inala City was also one of the first sporting clubs to enter a float in the Warana Parade, again hard work but great fun for the boys and parents alike.

Our junior teams grew in numbers over the years with varying degrees of success.

Some of the boys began to make

representative sides including Brisbane South.

One of those boys, Damien Butler, went on to represent Australia in the Under-16 squad.

As our boys grew older it became time to go into senior soccer and our first taste of success came in 1979 when young Matt Jackson took us to runners-up in the League, Grand Final winners and Qantas Cup Winners.

The team of that time will no doubt bring back memories for some people still with the club and also for some who have gone their different

They include P Bailey (goalkeeper), J Blair, I Seeley, C Manning, D Mawson, T Murtagh, M Jackson, R McCormack, R Furminger, J Hansbury, D Haggart and J Bridge.

After this heady time Inala City slackened off for a few years, but the club continued to grow and in 1983 new coach, Bob May, started a resurgence.

Highlights



REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

with DES MILES

QUESTION: Why when acting as linesman are we asked to watch the goalkeeper to check that he doesn't handle the ball outside the area when taking drop kicks?

ANSWER: Because the inspector will slaughter us if we don't!

The above is a question which I have asked a few referees, and I have been given the same answer each time.

Whilst I would agree that in an ideal world we would want to stop all violations of the Laws, I feel that by so pedantically checking the keeper there is a danger of missing our primary objective - that of judging offside.

During each match this season, I have stood level with the edge of the penalty area, not moving until the keeper has released that ball from his hands.

Unfortunately, on two occasions, the goalkeeper has fluffed his kick directly to an opponent.

Out of the blocks I go in a vain attempt to make the second last defender before the ball is headed back towards goal. Had I been Ben Johnson with drugs in my system, I might have made it, but in effect I had little hope.

Once I was lucky, as the forward had only strolled back from the previous attack and was obviously offside.

However, on the second occasion, the intercepted ball was played straight to a forward, who may or may not have been offside - I hadn't a clue!

Remembering the old adage of better a

dodgy offside than a dodgy goal, I put my flag up.

I know some of you will be thinking that I should have left the decision to the referee, but he had enough to do without having to judge offsides, when he was in no position to

By now an inspector reading this article will be heading for the gin bottle.

However, I'd like to ask you a question.
Does a goalkeeper handling the ball
outside the area necessarily infringe Law
12, i.e. does he handle the ball intentionally?

When you think about it, he will only be adding a couple of feet to a kick which may be going 50 metres.

If we want to make things complicated for ourselves, we could always impose random checks, with the referee then positioning himself for any possible offsides and the other linesman checking on the 9/5 situation - I don't think so!

Some referees will say that by being there, the linesman acts as a deterrent to stop the goalkeeper taking the mickey.

After all, how many times have you seen this offence indicated by linesmen?

I say that we as linesmen are no deterrent these days, especially when we often have to remind the goalkeeper to place the ball within the goal area before taking a goal kick.

If we must watch the keeper's handling of the ball, why can't we come out running with him to enable us to have a better chance of making that elusive second last defender?

ALWAYS be polite to players and team officials, even when they are rude.

If there are any cautions of sendings off, note them and write them or when you get home in case of a personal hearing.

Always run behind the line, not on it and never on the pitch. Concentrate on your job and don't allow anything to distract you remember you are not a ballboy!

Be in position whether with the 2nd last defender, the halfway line or as per the referees instructions at a set piece and chase all back passes, no matter how futile the chase might appear.

If substitutes wish to warm up, keep them behind you so that they do not distract your colleague on the other touchline.

During the game, are you calm and confident in your ability to control the players?

At top level football, it is the referee's personality which separates them from those who do not quite make it.

You need to impress the positive aspects of your personality on every game plus such facets as tact, humour, firmness, politeness, courage and speed of decision and these need to be used at the correct time and in the correct circumstances.

I have previously mentioned the Commonwealth Bank Bill Turner Cup which is an Under-15 Soccer competition sponsored by the Commonwealth Bank.

Perhaps a little background will help people understand what an enormous

competition this has become.

The competition came into being as the Bill Turner Cup in Northern NSW in 1979 when a small organisation of Secondary School teachers chaired by Bill Turner put together the first draw consisting 34 Schools.

It has since grown to well over 400 entries in 1990 with the inclusion of NSW (1981), ACT (1982), QLD (1987)

and Victoria (1988).

In 1980 the Commonwealth Bank became the Cup's sponsor and the name

was changed to its present one.

Prior to 1988 Fay Budd, a Newcastle business woman donated the trophy and the competition was variously sponsored by Radio station 2SM, Margin's Cordials-Gosford, The Newcastle Permanent Building Society and the OAK Dairy Company - Hexham.

Generous support with both finance and facilities has been given since the beginning by the Northern NSW Soccer

Federation.

Prizes Offered - Winner: \$350 prize money, Gold Medallions, Long-sleeve sloppy joes and a certificate of merit for the school.

Finalist: \$200 prize money, Silver Medallions, short-sleeve sloppy joes and certificate of merit for school.

Losing Semi Finalist: \$150 prize money, Individual certificates of Semifinalists and individual certificates of merit.

Area Winners: Individual Banners & Certificates of Merit.

Area Finalists: Individual Certificates of merit & Certificate for school.

Star Player: \$200 Commonwealth Bank Club Australia Account.

RIGHT THE GAME **PLAYING**

BRUCE STOWELL



This week we begin a three part series on "CREATING SCOR-ING CHANCES".

Shooting practice is always popular, not only with strikers, but also with defenders.

Almost every defender would swop roles for that of a goal scorer.

It is also popular with goalkeepers because it gives them practice.

From the coach's point of view it is probably the easiest skill for which to think up practices

Scoring is the all important factor in shooting, so make sure that a player's number one priority is to hit the target, to bring the goalkeeper into action.

Power and technique are secondary. In a recent televised FA CUP tie, three blistering shots from central positions finished in the crowd.

Minutes later a missed shot trickled into the corner of the net with defenders vainly scrambling after it.

The moral is clear! "Shooting Drill"

On the face of it this a very simple activity, but it will produce many coaching points.

PREPARATION

You will need several balls, as many as possible.

Assemble the players around the centre circle of the pitch or mark out-

side the circle, goal, and penalty area with discs and cones.

Position yourself just outside the penalty area with the goal keeper ready in goal.

PROCEDURE

One player at a time from the group around the circle passes the ball forward to the coach's feet and runs forward to take a return pass.

As soon as the player enters the penalty area they can shoot at goal. Allow each player two or three

attempts without making any comments.

NOTES

1) The first pass from the player to the coach is usually sloppy and inaccurate to the extent that the player arrives before the ball.

Insist that players strike the initial pass firmly to the coach's feet

2) A player will rarely indicate to which side the coach should play the ball from the direction of the run

Get players to move immediately in the direction in which they want the ball to be laid off.

3) Players often run wide of the goal making difficult shooting angles for themselves and finish up dragging their shot wide of the far post.

Make sure players move directly towards the centre of the goal as soon as they receive the pass.


This way they give themselves the largest possible target.

Point out also that the ball should be rolling towards the goal at the moment of striking not across it.

4) The natural reaction of the players is to lift their heads as they are shooting to see where the ball is going.

As a result the ball is hooked or sliced wide of the goal. Players must look up as they move into position, down as they strike the ball.

5) Penalise bad shots. Players who miss the goal have to fetch the ball.

Taking a long swig on his drinking beaker, loving filled with medicinal brandy, Alf's eyes grew misty as he slowly

recalled the past.

"I was a young 'un of 10 at the time. My dear old dad was Secretary of the Welsh Soccer Football and Choral Society, and between organising soccer practice, rehearsing the choir and being mine foreman, he was kept pretty busy.

"Dad managed the soccer team - a great bunch of lads; he would let me carry the water bucket. It was an old tin one, and had taken many a kick of frustration when the team lost

"Although our team was known as the Leek Wanderers, for this match we proudly called ourselves IPSWICH!

"Even though it had ben raining cats and dogs all the

previous day, the pitch looked great.

"On the day of the match they came from near and far. It was a tremendous crowd. A couple of bookies had even set up shop and did some brisk business on the result.

Although it was a game of great football, neither team

had scored with only a couple of minutes to go.

"The water bucket was a crumpled heap having felt the toe of Dad's boot after Ipswich had missed with several shots.

"Suddenly one of the Brisbane lads pounced on a bad Ipswich pass and took off towards our goalie.

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"Dad could not control himself. He rushed onto the field yelling "God, don't let him score, don't let him score!

Then it happened.

"With a dull roar that I can still hear, the earth opened up and the entire field from one sideline to the other slid into the mine workings below.




