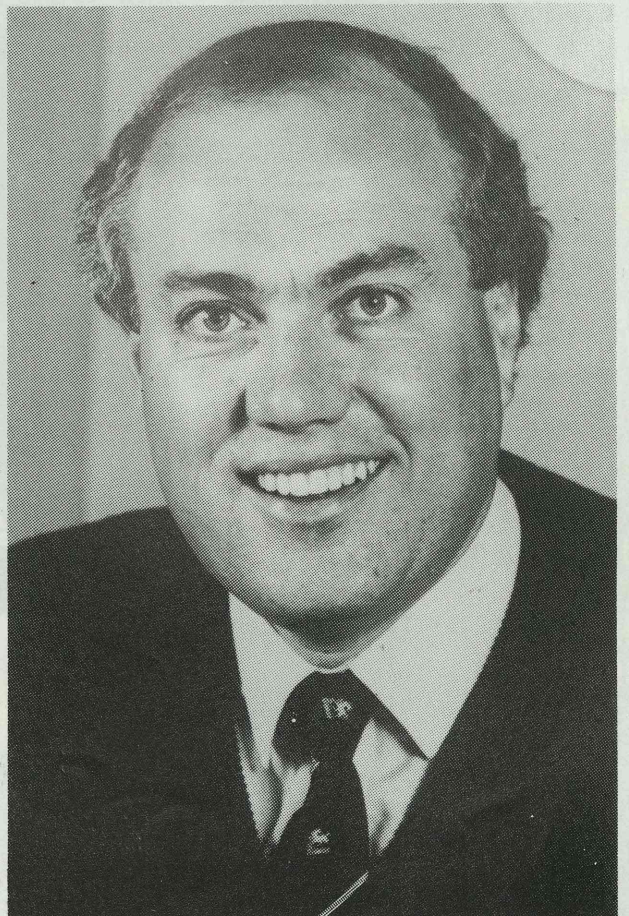

CLUB PROFILE

CLUB PROFILE

The idea of commencing what is now known as the Brisbane City soccer club originated in the hearts and minds of a small band of Italian migrants.

After much deliberation the "Azzurri" Club was founded in 1952 and set up headquarters at Kedron Park.

When we say headquarters of course, it should be understood that our club room was a small wooden shack which served as change rooms, storage rooms and for whatever purpose deemed necessary.

Brisbane City's original band of stalwarts was headed by the then President G Torrini, who set about the task of gaining promotion earnestly.

In 1959, with little money, great hope and tremendous spirit the club won promotion into the Brisbane First Division.

Due to this promotion the club had to restructure its administration and in line with this moved its headquarters to Pineapple Park, Woolloongabba.

Azzurri approached the sixties with much optimism, but other than finishing in the top four in 1959 and 1965 the club failed to gain success.

Whilst our trophy room remained empty during this period, the display of courage and determination by the players was always evident.

The sense of grit, determination, fair play and hatred of defeat without a fight has flowed through the club like a tide of encompassing players, administrators and supporters alike even to present day.

The club changed grounds again in 1962 moving to Heath Park and again in 1963 to their present home of Spencer Park, which was an old Council dump.

Azzurri moved to the seventies with

confidence on and off the playing field.

On the field the team collected the following honours - Premiers (1970, 71, 76), Grand Final Winners (1971, 73, 75, 76), Queensland Cup Winners (1971, 76).

These honours were won prior to the advent of the Phillips National Soccer League in 1977.

During the time the club spent in the National Soccer League the club were Cup winners in 1977 and 78 and Grand Final runners-up in 1979.

The administrators in the mid seventies had to cope with the demands of professionalism, such as improving the grounds, securing junior grounds, the construction of a club house in 1974 and raising the funds to keep the club financial.

Brisbane City have been blessed with some fine administrators, especially past presidents Vince Calice and Sam Pappalaroo along with hard working past secretaries Guido Canale and John Ponturo.

On Sunday May 17, 1981 our grand-

stand the "Gino Merlo Stand" was officially opened by the Governor of Queensland, Sir James Ramsey.

The year 1988 was a great season for Brisbane City, they became Club Champions in the XXXX Soccer League, Reserve grade and Colts and were runners up in the XXXX Soccer League grand final. They were also asked to play-off in the National Soccer League against Heidelberg were they narrowly lost in the two match decider.

From our humble beginnings the terminology may have been changed from "forza Azzurri" to "go Brisbane City", but the undying spirit has never changed.

Brisbane City will host a special promotional day this Sunday at Spencer Park when Azzurri and Hellenic reform to once again do battle on the field.

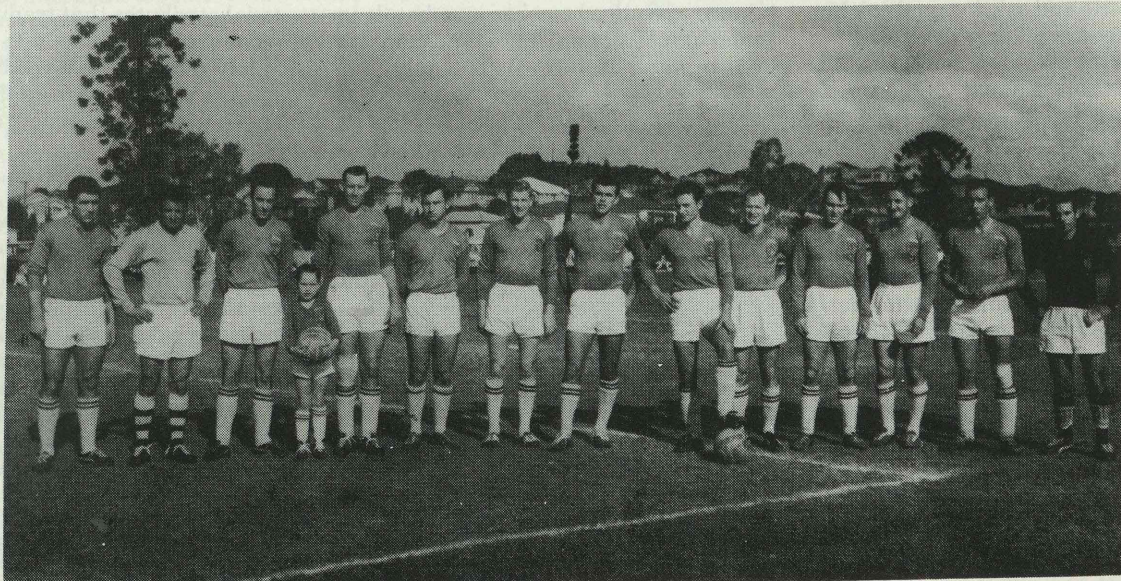
The Azzurri team will be coached by Nereo Saftich and managed by Otto Schiavon.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's ——— with DES MILES

THE CAPTAIN'S ROLE

One of my least favourite characters in football is the Sunday morning captain, who, having tossed the coin thinks that his duties as captain are satisfactorily concluded.

Having made this point, you may think me guilty of double standards if I draw your attention to the newspaper article opposite and ask do you think Mr Riekerink has been fairly dealt with?

It may be the way the article is worded, but it seems to me that part of the Dutch player's punishment was imposed because he was captain, or am I splitting hairs?

In any team the captain is traditionally chosen for his qualities of leadership.

He is expected to set standards of behaviour and sportsmanship that conform to the spirit of the game. That is the tradition.

Yet the Laws, to the best of my knowledge, mention the captain only once.

That is in the regulations introduced to settle drawn games by kicks from the penalty mark.

Even then, if he wins the toss, the captain cannot elect to say who will take the first kick.

Apart from this one instance, a non-footballer reading through the Chart, might well conclude that a team captain

is not necessary. Clearly the captain is given no special privilege within the context of normal or extra time.

Nor do the Laws impose any duty other than the requirements imposed on all players.

Since he is to be treated only as a player under the Law, I have always been at a loss to understand why captains are required to wear arm-bands in some competitions. (There is no mention of arm-bands in Law 4). The only purpose they serve is identification. But why should the referee need to identify the captain? A blast from the whistle is sufficient to bring both captains to the middle for the toss-up, assuming that either or both wish to partake in the ceremony.

Neither is obliged to do so under the Law.

Can you think of any reason why the referee needs to identify the captains?

The only one that comes to my mind is when a game is getting out of hand and the referee seeks the assistance of the captains in restoring order.

Have you ever found this necessary? I tried it just once and was put firmly in my place.

I called both captains together and asked for their support in calming things down.

One captain made one of the most

telling comments I have ever heard on a football pitch.

He said "Referee, it is your job to control the game." And unpalatable as I found it, he was, of course, dead right.

Despite anything that I have written here, the tradition of the captain as a special player remains, and with it, the expectation that he will exhibit all the special attributes that traditionally mark him out as a leader.

Any game is enhanced by having two captains who conform to the high standards that time-honoured tradition demands.

Long live tradition!

SKIPPER BANNED

UEFA have upheld a three match ban imposed on Edwin Olde Riekerink, captain of Dutch club Groningen, for "gross verbal abuse" of a referee.

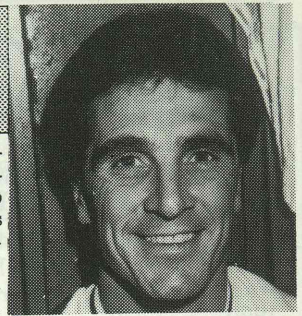
UEFA's appeals board dismissed today an appeal by Groningen for a reduction in the ban and ordered the club to pay the costs of the appeal.

A UEFA statement said Riekerink had apologised to referee Martin Donnelly of Ireland after the Cup Winner's Cup first round tie against Denmark's Ikast FS on September 13.

But it said Riekerink's behaviour, which should have been exemplary as captain, could not be condoned.

With the present form of the National League now finished for the season, teams are going to be looking to strengthen their squads and coaches will be making plans for the new season.

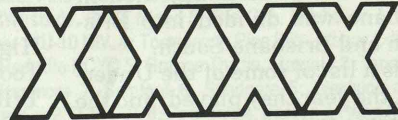
If Brisbane are serious about National League now is the time to uncover their plans and get things started in what is going to be a very big venture, and maybe the future of Queensland Soccer.

FROM PERRY PARK TO WORLD CUP

In 1978 at Perry Park, two women's teams, Southside Eagles and Annerley, were playing a curtain raiser to a men's match. Southside Eagles had a guest player in their team that day.

And Sharon Lee Wass, aged 11, won every heart at Perry Park when she ran on to play.

This little tot, with a mass of blonde curls, showed some exceptional skills in one so young and female.

But Sharon had wanted to play soccer for as long as she could remember.

The boy next door used to kick the ball around with her and so her love of the game grew.

She began playing for Acacia Ridge Soccer Club at the age of eleven and since then has played with most of the top clubs in Brisbane.

She first represented Queensland in 1980 at the age of thirteen as a member of the team in Adelaide for the National Titles.

She was a Queensland Representative in 1981, '82, '83, '87 and '89. Sharon first played for Australia in 1981 when at age 14, she toured with the Australian Team to New Zealand.

Last year she was a member of the successful Australian team who toured Japan.

At present Sharon is in training with the Australian Team who are preparing to qualify for the first Women's World Cup to be held in China in 1991.

CHARLTON ATHLETIC MATCH REPORT

A last ditch header by State debutante Andrew Stowell allowed Queensland to steal a 2-2 draw against touring English side Charlton Athletic at Perry Park last weekend.

Stowell, playing his first match in a Maroon jersey, latched onto a Nick Meredith cross to put the ball over Charlton keeper Bob Bolder near the death.

There was however some conjecture as to whether the ball came off a Charlton player before going into the net for the equaliser.

Until the surprise goal in the 85th minute Charlton looked to have the match in their safe keeping.

The tourists opened the scoring in the 25th minute after a tentative start, especially by Queensland, who were content to play defensive football.

Charlton's Andy Jones was fouled just outside the box and was able to thread a shot around the Queensland wall to beat the keeper, Rob Farrow from the free kick.

Queensland began to play more urgent

football after the goal, but were unable to equalise before the break.

Down 1-0 at half time, Queensland came back onto the field and immediately started to press forward probing for holes in the Charlton defense.

The Maroons were rewarded in the 60th minute after some excellent lead up work from Nick Meredith who made a barging run down the grandstand touchline before crossing the ball.

Waiting in the box was Pine River's striker Noel Carroll, who finished off the move by putting the ball past the diving Bob Bolder.

18-year-old Carroll was also playing his first game for Queensland. Queensland's elation was short lived however as the equaliser stung Charlton into action.

Charlton took the lead three minutes later when midfielder Paul Mortimer headed home an Andy Jones' "precision" cross.

The last 20 minutes of the match was an end to end affair with Stowell's late goal a fitting end to a torrid encounter.

Charlton coach Lennie Lawrence blasted his players following the 2-2 draw and grounded them to their hotel.

More than 5500 soccer fans turned out for the match, the first time an English team has visited Queensland in 11 years.

Among those in the crowd were State Justice Minister Glen Milliner and National Coaching Director and acting Australian coach Eddie Thompson who elected to attend the Charlton-Queensland match rather than the NSL Grand Final in Sydney.

Queensland Soccer Federation President Wallace Dann said it was a tremendous day.



"The game was a draw, but Queensland soccer was the big winner," he said.



"The success of this match will enable us to plan for more games of this nature in the future.

"We should also congratulate coach Bruce Stowell and the Queensland players on a great effort against a full-time professional side. That type of performance will certainly reinforce our claims for a place in the National Soccer League."

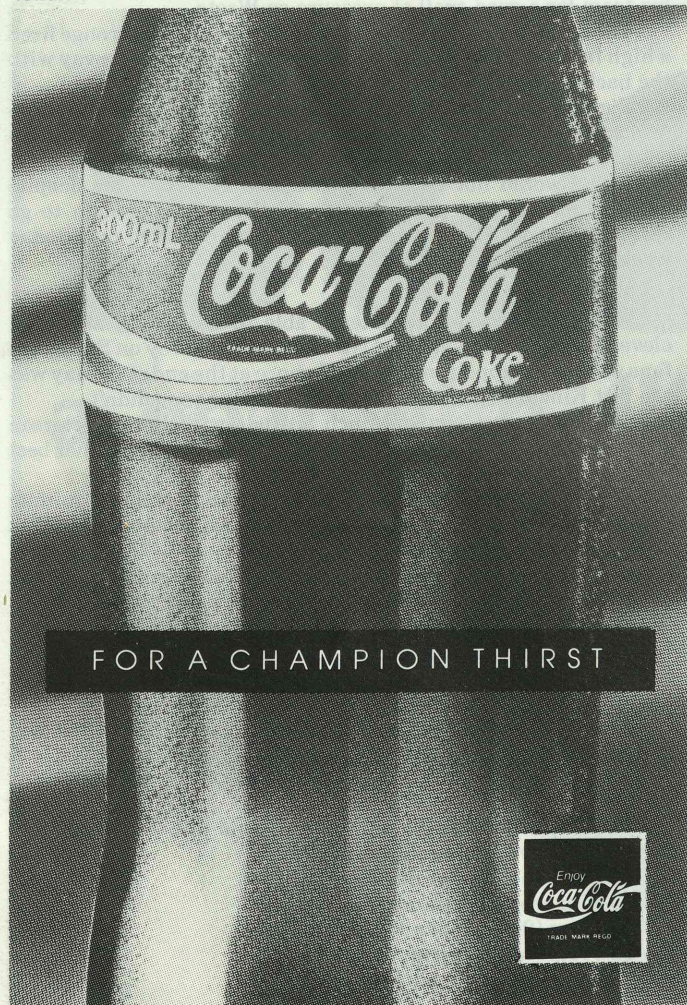
Noosa captain Wolfgang Schneider beat keeper Mark Alchard from the penalty spot after just five minutes following a foul in a goal-mouth scramble.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

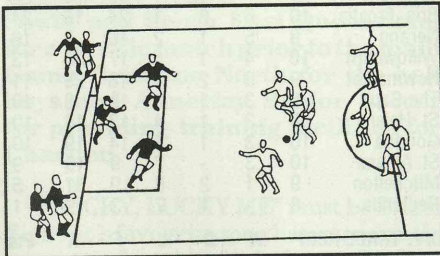


This week we continue our series on "CREATING SCORING CHANCES" with two more shooting drills. **THE OPPOSED SHOOTING PRACTICE:**

PREPARATION:

Divide players into attackers and defenders. Position the attackers (mid-fielders and forwards) in the centre circle. Position the defenders (back four) on either side of the goal.

Have the goalkeeper in goal or a small cone goal.



PROCEDURE:

On the coach's whistle the three attackers run forward with the ball and attack the goal. Simultaneously the two defenders run forward from either side of the goal to defend it.

When an attack ends with A) a goal, B) a save, C) a tackle, D) an interception, E) ball going out of play, the coach blows the whistle and the next attack begins.

The first five get off the pitch and run smartly back to their starting positions ready to go again.

NOTES:

1) Defenders have a tendency to loiter in the box. Get them to defend outside the box. This will get both groups of players moving more quickly into position. Encourage non-stop aggressive action.

2) Watch out for offside positions.

3) Get attackers to interchange positions as they approach defenders. This is difficult to cope with.

SHOOTING GAME:

PREPARATION:

Mark out a two zone pitch with goals in which each zone is roughly 18 metres deep.

Have three attackers against two defenders (and a goal keeper if you have one) in each zone.

PROCEDURE:

The players play a normal attacking game except that they can only play in their own zone. This gives the rise to the following options.

1) In the attacking zone strikers have the choice of: A) turning to shoot, B) developing one-touch play with each other, leading to a shot, C) playing the ball back to the other zone for the possibility of a through ball, finishing with a shot for goal.

2) In the defending zone, the defenders/midfield players have the choice of: A) shooting any time they have the space to do so instead of always passing forward to the strikers, B) making space for themselves to have a first-time shot from a ball played back to them by the strikers.

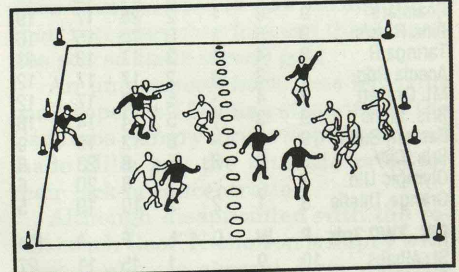
VARIATIONS:

Adjust the numbers in the zones to achieve different effects. The illustration shows a three against two situation in favour of the attackers.

This simply allows attackers more room in which to set up their shots.

The loading can be reversed if you are looking for more shots from the defensive zone.

In fact, as with most of these practices, there is no limit to the number of permutations you can make to produce changes of emphasis.



CHECKLIST

- * Hit the target. Power is no good if the shot is wide of the goal.
- * Keep your eye on the ball as you strike it or you may end up hooking or slicing it.
- * Be prepared to hit the ball with any surface. Deflections, stabs, toe-enders are equally effective if the ball ends up in the net.
- * Build-up quickly to early strikes at goal.

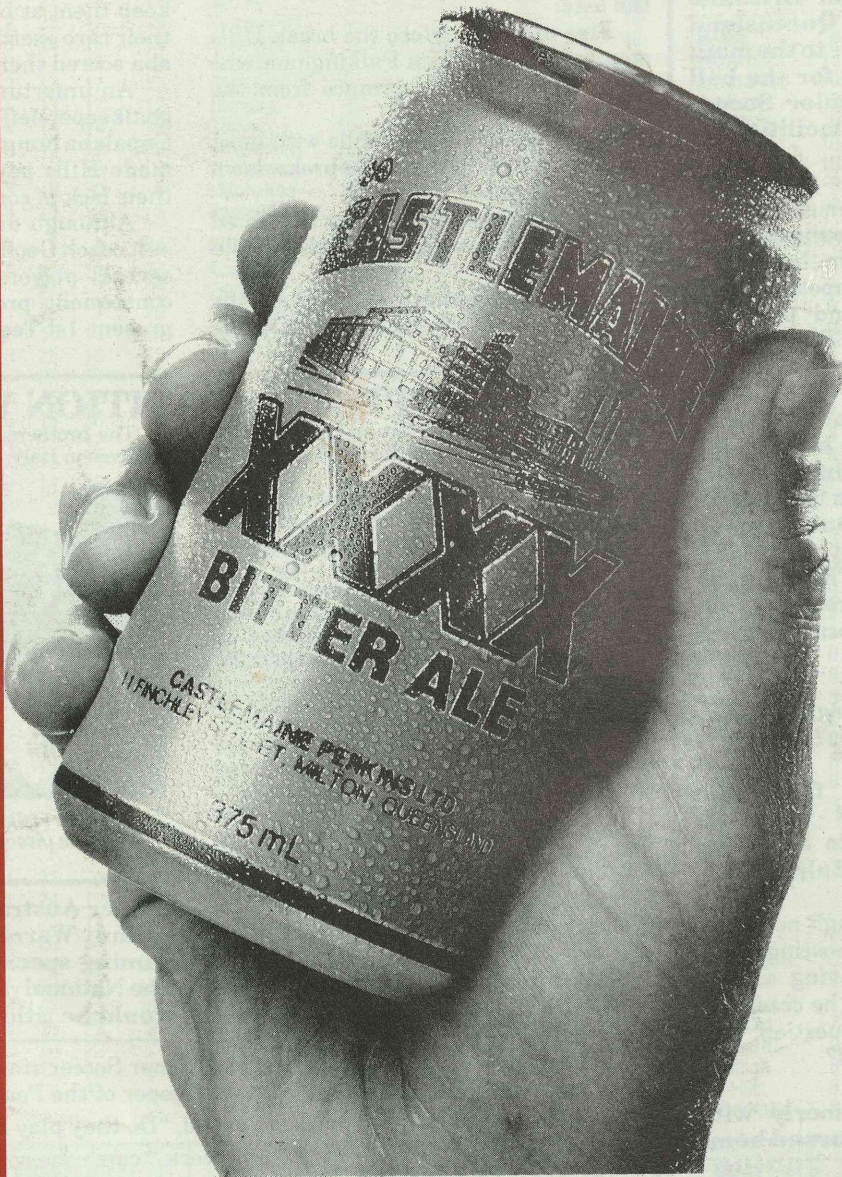
