Isn't it time we stood up and were counted? Let's put the history of Queensland soccer on show for everyone to see.


Gather together all the old programs, year books, players' strips, medals, cups and trophies and let's hear from you.

THE GAP PASTIME

The Gap Pastime Club was officially formed on February 17 1955 at a meeting of Gap residents held under the house of the founding President, the late Mr Oliver Twist.

Mr Twist envisaged it as a Club embracing as many sports as possible in order to make The Gap Pastime Club a fitting place for the youth of The Gap.

Since then, while the main sporting activities have been junior and senior soccer, junior and senior cricket, the club has been represented at various times, in men's tennis, basketball, women's softball, soccer and netball.

Affiliation

The Gap Pastime Soccer Club affiliated with the Brisbane and Ipswich S.F.A. in 1956 with one team in the Fourth Division.

The Club initially played at Jubilee Park, Bardon, where they shared the lease with the now defunct Caledonian Soccer Club. Having obtained the lease of the Walton Bridge Reserve in 1959, the club moved to its home ground in 1960.

Currently, there is the main floodlit oval (The O.S. Twist Oval), a minimum sized senior field, and Under-7 and under-8 fields. The club colours were derived from the name of the suburb, Gold and Purple and the first club coach was Mr Frank Cansick, brother of the former State player Wally Cansick. Under his guidance the club held its own in Fourth Division for a number of years, being promoted to Second Division when a lot of clubs joined the newly formed Q.S.F.

The clubs first junior side (under-14) was registered in 1958.

With the residential explosion in The Gap during the 60's and 70's, junior soccer expanded rapidly to our maximum in 1974 of 34 teams.

To supply all these teams with jerseys, balls, coaches, managers and transport was a major undertaking but it is a credit to loyal supporters that the job was accomplished.

With such a large junior "tail" the money to pay senior players was rather scarce and, up till now, the Gap Soccer has been mostly amateur.

It was because we were an amateur club that we were reluctant to join the Q.S.F., but finally joined in 1961.

The Gap's first great season was in 1966 when the first team under coach Joe Menadue won the Third Division premiership Cup, thus gaining promotion to Second Division.



The goalkeeper in that team was Martin Coe. Martin had progressed through the junior ranks and went on to play with First Division clubs, the State team, N.S.W. and Australia.

The Club's red letter day came in the 1987 season when all three grades Third Division, Third Division Reserves and the Sixth Division won their respective Premierships and grand finals.

Because of our amateur status many good junior players have left for the lure of First Division clubs. They include Ross and Ken Swann, Mark Brusasco, Mark Aponas, Mark Gilbert and Jeff Keating.

Other notable people from our club have been Mr Jim Gilbert, now Q.S.F. Secretary, and coaches George Pagan, Jim Bell and Maurio Saftich.

The Gap Pastime Club has always planned for the future with its excellent licensed clubhouse and good ground facilities, and it won't be to long before we make that push for First Division status.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

Refereeing at youth level

MY entire four year refereeing career has been spent in youth soccer, a level at which many referees will not consider officiating.

Some say youth matches are more difficult to control than senior football, mainly because of the attitude and behaviour of club officials and spectators.

Fortunately, I have had very little trouble to date and like to think that this is due to my positive attitude to each match irrespective of its relative importance.

I remember Ray Hearn saying every match should be treated as though it were a cup final and I have tried to adhere to this basic principle in terms of appearance and attitude.

Most junior games are officiated by team managers or other non-qualified volunteers and teams are always grateful to have a qualified and impartial referee.

Like any other match you are there to be shot at but you can help yourself in various ways.

One is the way you treat your linesmen, who are usually club officials, team managers, unwilling parents or spectators who have been pressed into service.

I always make a point of trying to find out their Christian names prior to kick off and in my pre-match briefing inform them politely that if I detect any bias then I will ignore them.

This is always done in a firm but friendly manner and I never forget to thank them for their help and hope that they enjoy the game.

Always take your own flags - a fair proportion of clubs do not possess any or those that are supplied are invariably unsuitable or grubby. It is sometimes difficult to pick up a linesman's signal when he is using a dirty handkerchief, a track suit top of, as in one game that I observed, a black dustbin liner!

Of course, spectators are always a potential source of trouble. Females can usually be ignored as their knowledge of the Laws of the Game is normally non-existent - their main concern being (not unnaturally) the welfare of their offspring.

The male element can be a nuisance and it may be necessary from time to time to intervene if touchline arguments or comments are interfering with your control of the match.

A few words with the offending spectators telling them that they are making fools of themselves in front of the young players is generally sufficient but in most cases, such incidents are as a result of their own team's performance and flare-ups are quickly forgotten.

A different attitude to the Laws needs to be applied to youth football, particularly at the very young age levels.

Of course, the Laws still apply but I will bend them if necessary using a common sense approach.

Obviously, the higher the age group, the more experience the players have and consequently you need to apply the Laws more rigidly.

The levels of skill increase as the players get older but bad habits are picked up and need to be dealt with accordingly.

Like the senior game, offsides are probably the most troublesome decisions that you have to make and it is, of course, essential that in your pre-match briefing to your linesmen, you inform them that you have the final decision and the authority to overrule them if in your opinion, the player(s) being flagged offside are neither seeking to gain an advantage nor interfering with play.

It is much more likely that they will accept your decision if they can see that you are looking for their flag in attacking situations and acknowledge clearly that you have seen it.

When penalising offenses, I always tell the players the reasons for so doing and this helps them to understand the Laws, particularly in basics such as throw-ins.

There are, of course, occasions when cautionable offenses are committed, but generally a strong word will suffice, or in more serious cases a suggestion to the manager that the offending player be taken off or substituted.

Having said this, I would not hesitate to send a player off and report it if I felt the offence was serious enough to warrant it fortunately this has yet to happen to me.

A word of warning - except in cases of dire emergency, do not referee matches in which you have an interest, such as a son or relative playing for one of the teams.

You will inevitably (if unconsciously) be biased, usually towards the other team in an effort to show your impartiality, and such matches are thus best avoided.

For those of you who have not officiated in youth matches, or if you are reaching the end of your active careers, I urge you to consider it.

The attitude of the players is usually goodnatured and you can help them to enjoy their football with words of encouragement and a smile.

If just one muddy little urchin comes up at the end of the game and says "Thank you, ref," it makes it all so worthwhile. Alan Hook

manding second half of the season.

There is 13 weeks between now and the start of the Grand Final play-offs. Most teams have at least 13 games to play with some having as many as 15 games left.

Thirteen games in 13 weeks should not really pose a problem, but then there is the State of Origin games, Ampol Cup fixtures and the South Pacific tournament to get through as well.

The reason we shortened this season was to allow for a Brisbane entry into the National League. That now seems unlikely to happen in 1990, although the candle still flickers.

What the QSF might have to look at doing if our bid for the National League does indeed fail, is to extend the current fixture season.

This would allow teams to get through their fixtures without putting too much stress on players. * * * *

The latest recommendation of a new South-East Queensland league with the teams being structured in a zonal system sounds like a reasonable idea on the surface.

I suppose it could be like our own little National League, but within Queensland, with players being used from teams in a zone to make one strong side.

The idea appears to have had strong support from the management committee, but the biggest stumbling block is still to come.

Committee, but the biggest stumping block is still to come. Any such proposal will need the backing of the Council of Clubs. And anytime there is moves or attempts to change league format or try new ideas, the clubs cannot agree because it may effect them individually. The suggested new league would be asking some clubs to give up players

to the zonal side which would create a situation similar to three seasons ago Back then Brisbane Lions required entry into the National League and wanted a reserve team in the Fourex League.

The rest of the clubs saw this as a threat to their sides. They therefore knocked it back and we had a National League side with a reserve team in Second Division. This new move to change the league could very well cause the same unrest among clubs.

What a great sight to see Frank "mad-dog" Arok with his young band of hopefuls on television last weekend.


Frank may not be as mad as some people Frank may not be as mad as some people would like to think as this is a fantastic opportunity for these young kids to be virtu-ally full-time professional soccer players, in a country that has only semi-professionals. If this idea of Arok's works, and I sincerely hope it does, then we may eventually see more full-time professional teams in Australia. It may have the opposite effect being just a breeding ground for overseas teams to continue poaching our top players.

There was an interesting situation in Italy two weeks ago when Fiorintina sold their star player to Juventas for 17 Million Dollars and caused a riot outside their headquarters. We may wonder why there is so much value put on players around the world

But in the Italian league it has been proven if you want to be competitive it costs money. Just last week A.C. Milan won the European Cup and completed a clean

sweep for Italian clubs in Europe. Sampdoria and Juventas won the Cup, Winners Cup and the E.U.F.A. Cups respectively.

But the underlining factor in the strength of the Italian League is that the league title was won this year by Diego Maradonna's Napoli, and not any of the teams who cleaned up in Europe.



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Winning the World Cup in Italy will fr

mean more than just pride - it will mean money, big money.

Bonuses from National Soccer Federations and shares of sponsorship contracts could total as much as \$300,000 for each player from countries like Italy if they win the coveted cup.

Each of Italy's 22 players in the 1982 World Cup reportedly earned \$220,000 for winning in Spain, while Argentina's players earned about \$80,000 each for winning in Mexico in 1986.

The Italians, whose Federation is one of the richest in the world, could receive up to \$270,000 each if they win this year.

The British players are expected to receive \$100,000 each if they win the trophy and half of that if they can make the semifinals.

In West Germany, each player is guaranteed \$73,500 from their soccer federation for a victory in the final.

Players also get a share of sponsorship deals and are assured another \$23,500 even before they arrive in Italy.

West German players will also get money

from a record they made with local pop star Udo Juergens and will share in 60 per cent of all World Cup related contracts signed by the federation.

CUP

Players from the Spanish team will have almost as good a deal.

Each player has been guaranteed \$29,000 for qualifying and that amount increases for each successive round reached up to \$97,000 for the championship.

For some nations, where qualifying is as major an accomplishment as winning the cup is other nations, players have already been rewarded.

In the United Arabs Emirates, the smallest nation to qualify, players received nearly \$368,000 each for reaching the 24team World Cup final field.

Half the money was contributed by President Sheik Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan, with the other half from various rulers of the seven emirates in the UAE.

The UAE Football Federation has made an official offer of \$13,000 a player for every match they can win in Italy, and half of that for a draw.

The players are also expected to be

showered by money, villas, limousines from the rulers, sheiks and rich, avid fans.

For Australian soccer players, money of this magnitude is still quite a few years away.







Former English First Division side Charlton Athletic used its superior fitness to cruise to a 5-1 win over Rockhampton at Ryan Park last week.

But the visitors had a battle on their hands early in the second half when Rockhampton scored from a brilliant piece of play to claw its way back to within a goal.

Guest player John Kosmina, played only 39 minutes because of a virus, was full of praise for the local side and said it was a great night for Rockhampton soccer.

"If the Queensland Soccer Federation got State League back in order, the standard of Rockhampton soccer would pick up a lot, and we could see a few Rockhampton players playing National League," Kosmina said.

He rated the goal scored by Rockhampton's Grant Beevers early in the second half as the best of the night.

Charlton dominated in the first half, catching out Kosmina and fellow striker Brad Smith with an off-side trap and pushing forward repeatedly to have the Rockhampton defenders and keeper David Fox working overtime.

Captain Steve Lines, Guy Rigby and Fox kept Charlton at bay for the first 20 minutes, but they were finally caught out when the visitors switched defence into attack. Stephen Gritt took the ball deep into attack then crossed to


Darren Pitcher on the far post, who looped a header past Fox. Charlton moved the ball forward with greater authority than Rockhampton, and it was not until the 32nd minute that Rockhampton had its first real chance of scoring.

Wilson was on target, forcing keeper Robert Bolder to concede the corner.

Michael Flanagan made it 4-1 in the 44th minute when he rocketed a shot into the net from 20m and Minto sealed the game in injury time with a clever chip over Fox.

Kosmina praised the efforts of the Rockhampton players for lifting themselves for the night.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT **BRUCE STOWELL** with

If this was simply an exercise in identifying faults and suggesting solutions, then a section on goalkeepers could probably be omitted.

If you're scratching your head, I should explain that from what I have seen of goalkeepers at this level over the past few seasons, I would class only about 5% of them as "poor'. This is possibly because:

a) Good teams have good goalkeepers oth-erwise they would not be successful.

b) Poor teams almost always have good goalkeepers due to the enormous amount of pressure they endure.

c) Potentially poor goalkeepers decide they have more future playing upfield, or a different game.

However I feel that goalkeepers tend to be forgotten at training sessions.

Many clubs think that the goalkeeper is amply catered for while playing in goal during the "5-a-side' at the end of the session, but is treated as an ordinary player otherwise. Observing a local club training recently I counted the number of times the goalkeeper actually handled the ball during the session. The number was five!

Goalkeepers are specialists and should be treated as such. With a little thought they can be incorporated into most practices as goalkeepers

For example in Passing and Receiving, goalkeepers should always handle the ball in the drill and other players should be asked to test them with drives or chips.

In the keep-ball practice, goalkeepers can go down at opponents' feet to win the ball.

Goalkeepers need power in the upper and lower body and flexibility in the middle.


So in activities like weight-training or cir-cuit-training they should be included as normal players.

However, when it comes to running, I see no point in goalkeepers being involved.

At such times they should be doing specialised work. If you are lucky enough to have two or more goalkeepers at your sessions, they can work together.

If not, anyone from an injured player to an interested bystander can be co-opted.

WARM-UP DRILL



PROCEDURE:

The goalkeepers stand about five yards apart and initially push the ball firmly at each other from the chest.

Encourage them to reach for the ball and absorb its force. Develop the drill to maximum speed. It is surprising how demanding it becomes


VARIATIONS:

Have the goalkeepers in kneeling position. The ball is still pushed from the chest to the side of the partner so that it is essential to stretch for it as far as possible without falling over

That is only a starter, the variations are endless. Get goalkeepers to develop their own repertoire.

KICKING, THROWING AND CATCHING PRACTICE **PREPARATION:**

Mark out an area as shown. The length of the shaded portion will be determined by the ability of your goalkeepers.



PROCEDURE:

The goalkeepers practice a) throwing, b) kicking from the hands and c) kicking from the ground over the shaded area to their partner without the ball touching the ground. NOTES:

Aim for as much height as possible so that the receiver gets the maximum opportunity to deal with balls coming through the air. VARIATIONS:

Make a game of it. Each goalkeeper has to catch the ball from the other's throw or kick before it can touch the floor in the end zone.


