EDITORIAL:



The Australian Soccer Federation (ASF) needs to look very closely at the establishment of a complete interstate series for the 1991 winter season.

Sunday is a very big day for Queensland and NSW rivalry, which celebrates 100 years in 1990.

All together 76 matches have been played between the two team. Queensland have won 23 and NSW have won 37 with 16 matches drawn.

Looking back over all the matches played by Queensland during the past 100 years it also quite interesting.

In that time Queensland have played Victoria 14 times, South Australia on nine occasions, the ACT three times and Western Australia and Tasmania twice each.

This represents the perfect base for an annual interstate competition to be established.

Rugby League is trying desperately hard to establish a national competition at club level, with only limited success so far.

They would find it hard to establish a true interstate competition with league only really being a stronghold in Queensland and NSW.

Rugby Union development has been slow in all States except Queensland and NSW.

Australian Rules is the only code at the moment that has a full Interstate Competition.

The bottom line is that soccer is played

from coast to coast and has the talent at its disposal to establish a strong interstate competition.

The ASF must develop interstate rivalry which cricket has now; this will give the players a higher standard of competition to aim for and promote the code accross Australia.

The ASF must also formulate a plan in which our Socceroos can be used to develop the sport in Australia.

With 166 nations affiliated to FIFA, the world controlling body, surely Australia could host one visiting overseas side every winter.

The tour side, whether it be Italy, Germany or South America, should play six test matches against the Socceroos, one in each of the major capital cities.

This concept would not only provide the Socceroos with excellent competition, but also create entertainment which the soccer public badly needs.

But there is another reason we need to have a full interstate competition, and internationals, up and running as soon as possible.

With this high level of competition sponsors will start to take more notice of our sport and at the moment that is what we desperately need.

Also the public will finally get what they want, top class football.



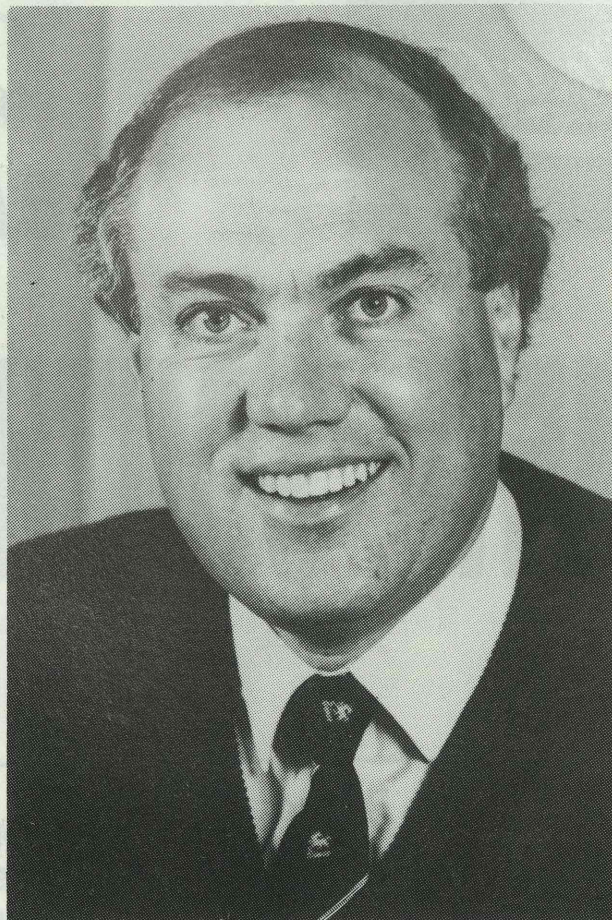

ACACIA RIDGE

In 1962 a gentleman by the name of Charlie Sorrell decided that the young boys of Acacia Ridge needed something to do in their spare time.

So off he went to the local State School on Beaudesert Road and started coaching a couple of soccer teams at the school.

Being a large immigrant area, Sorrell could foresee a great potential for success of the game of soccer in the area.

He went to the City Council and by the end of the year had secured 13 acres of land on Mortimer Road which had been a Council dump.

In 1963, the Acacia Ridge Soccer Club came into being, fielding two teams with the Brisbane Junior Association.

By 1965 the club had formed two senior teams, Acacia Red, who played Association, and the Sky Blues, who played Federation.

Well-known scribe Bob Butchard played for the Sky Blues in those days.

By 1969, both senior teams were playing with the Queensland Soccer Federation in 5th and 6th Divisions.

At the same time the club had nine junior teams playing in the sky blue and white jumper.

These colours were changed in 1971 to the present colour of Royal Blue.

Throughout it's years, the Ridge management has consisted of junior orientated people such as Charlie Sorrell, the late Bill Reeves, Bill Wright, Cyril Neville and Ron Proud to whom the main fields are named after.

Ronnie was one of soccer's great ambassadors and is still sadly missed at Acacia Ridge even after nine years.

He knew the name of every junior and senior player in the club, it was a club he loved and he was loved by the club.

In 1975, the club appointed its first professional coach - Geoff Green, and in four years the senior team had risen to Division Two.

The junior ranks had also risen to 18 teams and many players represented Brisbane and Queensland in that time.

Some who went on to greater heights were Alan and David Hunter, Robert Farrow and John Burgess.

The seniors by now had established themselves as a power in Queensland Soccer, winning the First Division in 1981 during the State League.

With the demise of the State League in 1982, the Ridge were elected to the Premier League.

They did well for the first two years, finishing fourth in 1984, but were unable to sustain the standard of football.

They were relegated to Division Two in 1985 where they were runners-up for four seasons until 1989 when they won promotion back into the XXXX Soccer League.

Now the club is under the guidance of one of the best coaches in the game, Eric Thompson.

With some hard work from the committee, supporters and some dedicated players who have stood by the club, Acacia Ridge will remain a force to be reckoned with - The Phoenix has Risen.

The return of John Brown could be one fac-

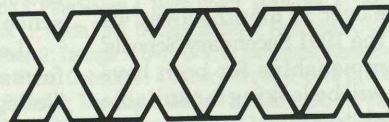
tor in this change of fortunes, but I suspect that Alan's omission from the State squad has given him more time to concentrate on his team's performance and to get a few things put right.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

South Burnett will host this year's South Queensland Women's State Titles at Kingaroy.

The Association hosted the Junior Boys State Titles in Kingaroy and by now should be old hands at it.

The long weekend in June has traditionally been the time when the women have their State Titles and this year is no different.

The titles will run from June 9 to June 11.

This year there are ten teams in the Open titles and four teams in the junior titles.

To diversify the strength of Brisbane players and to provide a more even competition for the country areas, an area of origin was introduced some years ago.

Brisbane has for the past few years fielded three teams in the Open State Titles and one junior team.

This year to avoid a bye situation in the competition and with the host association not being able to field another open team, Brisbane has nominated four teams.

Brisbane Bayside, Brisbane West Moreton, Brisbane Youth, the current Under-19 squad and Brisbane Peninsula are the four Brisbane Teams.

The other competition comes from South Burnett, Gold Coast, Mackay, Rockhampton, Toowoomba and the Sunshine Coast.

The four teams competing in the junior titles are Brisbane Juniors, the current Under-16 squad, South Burnett, Gold Coast and Sunshine Coast.

At the conclusion of these titles, the Queensland junior team to compete in the National Titles at Geebung from June 24 will be announced.

Also announced will be the Queensland Youth team who will compete in the National Titles in Melbourne from July 8 and the Queensland Open team who will be competing in the National Titles in Sydney in September.

These State Titles are one of the most significant events on the women's soccer calendar.

They give country affiliates a chance to produce their best players to engage in competition with teams from all other areas of the State.

But most importantly it gives the State Coaches a chance to select talent that lies in country areas to be harnessed into the current Queensland squads in the city.

SOUTH BURNETT

Next weekend Kingaroy's Lyle Vidler Oval will be the central venue for the 1990 State Women's Championship Titles.

South Burnett President Mick North said "To have been chosen to host a State Title two years in a row is a measure of the regard in which South Burnett is held in soccer circles."

"The cream of Queensland women's soccer players will be participating in the largest State Final yet to be held in this State.

"Spectators will see women's soccer at its best with a number of previous State and Australian Under-16, Under-19 and senior players vying for State selection."

North said Federal Member for Wide Bay Warren Truss and President of the SQWSA Lyn Ketter would open the Championships on Saturday morning.

South Burnett players who will be looking to regain selection are Wondai's Naomi Hockey and Kingaroy's Bronwen Hart in the Under-19s.

The reigning school champions, Caboolture will defend their title against teams from Coastal, Glasshouse, Nambour, Noosa and Small School's District sides.

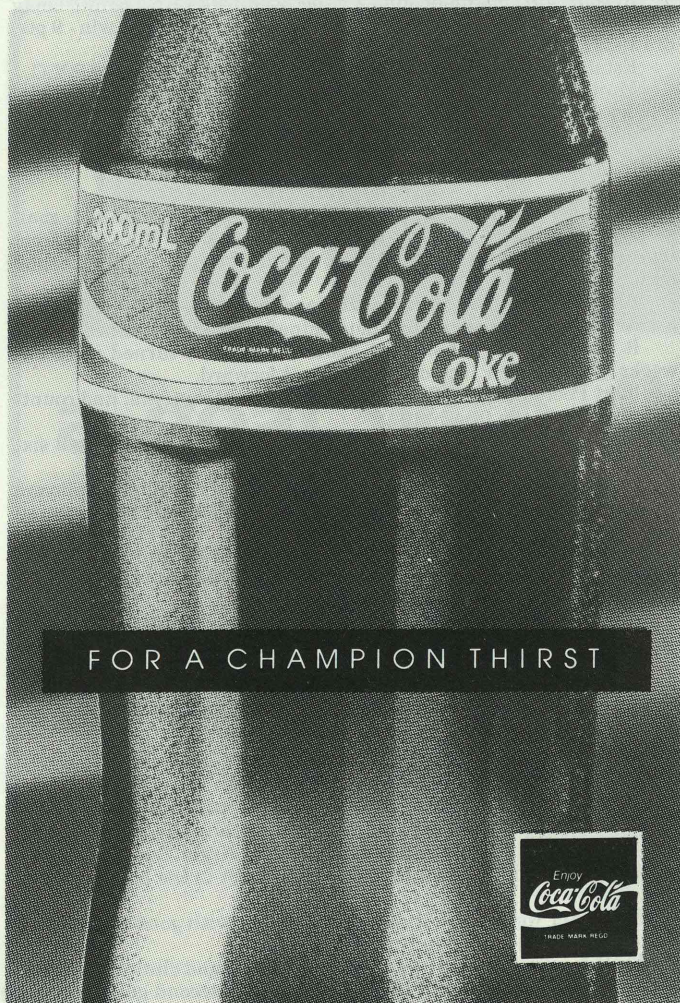

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

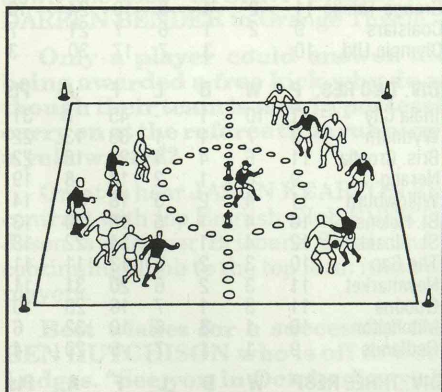

This week in Playing the Game Right we continue our series with another drill for goalkeepers.

THE SHOT SAVING GAME:



PLAYERS:

Five or more.

PREPARATION:

Mark out the pitch in two zones with a central circular zone 12 meters in diameter containing a goal.

Divide the players into two teams with half in each team. Put the goalkeeper in goal.

PROCEDURE:

All players are attackers. There are no defenders but possession is the key to the game.

Once a team has the ball it can shoot it at goal from either side.

Players may pass to each other from one zone to the other, pick up shots from the other zone and score from them, even score from the goals.

Make the initial target five goals to win.

Ideally this should provide the goalkeeper with a barrage of shots. To give the goalkeeper some breathing space, no player is allowed in the zone surrounding the goals.

If the goalkeeper saves and holds the ball it must be thrown out on the other side.

The constant turning round to face a different point of attack is an added test of reflexes.

However, due to this constant pressure, the goalkeeper may start to cheat by staying on his goal line to cut down on effort.

This is a useful point at which to work on angles. Insist that the goalkeeper always moves to the edge of the zone, towards the shooter.

In this way the size of the target offered to the shooter is greatly reduced.

Goalkeepers have four main tasks within their overall duties of stopping the opposition from scoring.

- 1) dealing with crosses and high balls.
- 2) stopping shots.
- 3) distributing the ball to re-start attacks.

- 4) giving information. Remember they are the only ones who are always facing the play therefore they are in the best possible position to give advice, encouragement, warning.

This is why many think they should make the best captains.

CHECKLIST:

- * Develop strength in the fingers and arms by simply catching and throwing over a short distance with a partner.
- * When the ball is in the air, try to catch it at its highest point and move through the ball.
- * When saving shots A) Move towards the shooter to narrow the angle and B) Spread yourself to present the largest obstacle to the ball.
- * Stay alert and concentrate on the play.

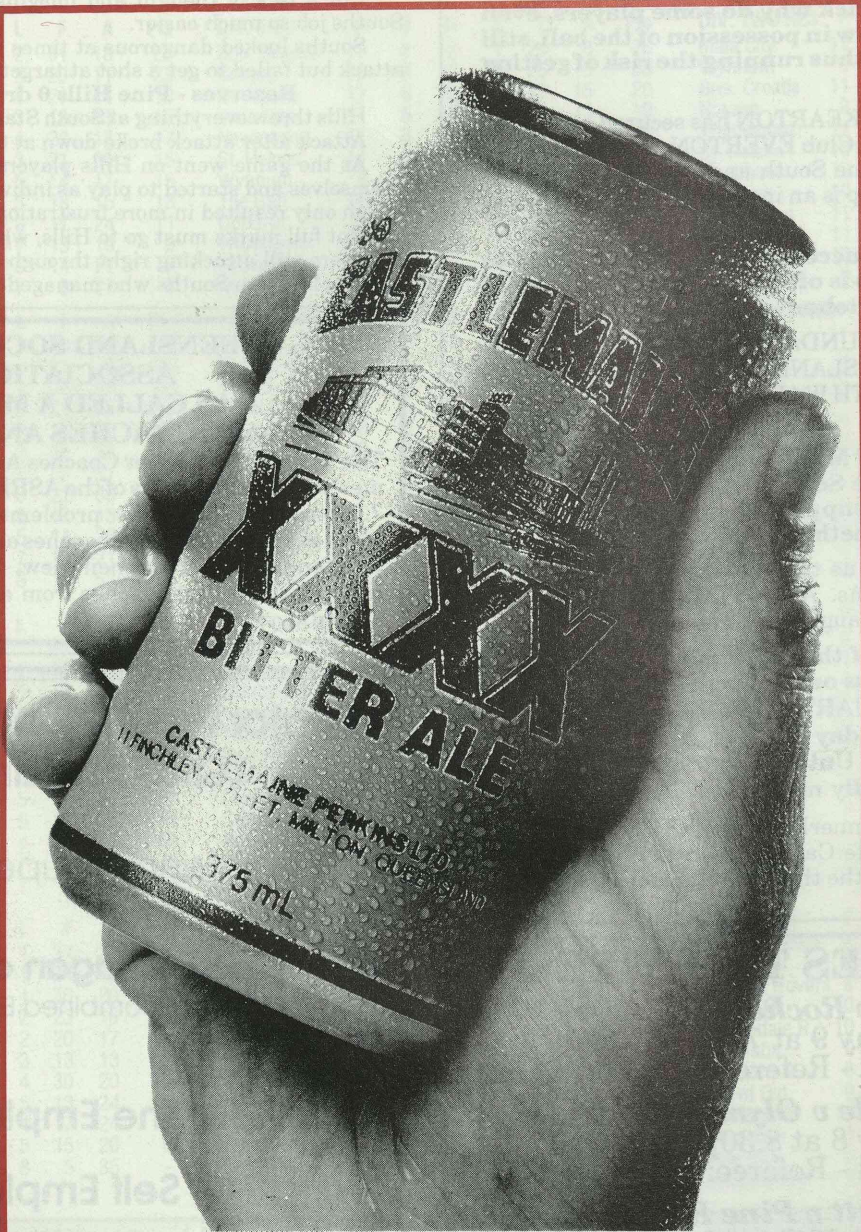
