To conclude the season is the XXXX League grand final and who would like to pick a winner right now.


Brisbane Lions look the team to beat but like the Melbourne Cup, 500 meters from home and it's anyone's race.

ST. HELENS UNITED

The St Helens United Soccer Club has a background it is extremely proud of and the club and the club can boast to being the "Home of Queensland soccer".

The club was formed in approximately 1912 by a group of breakaway players from the team then known as Rosebells.

In 1921, St Helens dissolved with the majority of its players going to fellow Ipswich club Dinmore Bush Rats. It was reformed as a junior club in 1924.

Two years later the club entered a services team in the Second Division and upon winning the division gained promotion to the First Division.

However the inexperience of the young players resulted in the team returning to Second Division by the following year.

After gaining promotion to First Division in the mid 1940s, St Helens celebrated a purple patch of success.

They were premiers in 1947 and 48, and from 1953 to 57. Also in 1947, 48 and 56 the club won the prestigious Tristram Shield with 56 being our golden year by virtue of being premiers and winning the shield.

Throughout these glorious years many

of our talented players went on to represent Queensland and Australia.

Names that come to mind quickly include Lex Gibb, Col Kitching, Bunny Nunn and Cliff Sander.

In the late 50s and early 60s many of St Helen's players were lured to the Brisbane ethnic clubs who had money to spend.

This drain of players eventually forced the Dinmore and Redbank clubs to merge with St Helens in 1966 to form St Helens United.

Throughout the ensuing years the club encountered both the disappointment of relegation and the ecstasy of promotion.

Change once again blew in 1979 with St Helen's name being changed to Ipswich United for participation in the newly formed State League.

Ipswich United met with only moderate success in this competition but the tide turned in 1982 with the arrival of new coach Matt Carson and the return to First Division soccer.

Carson brought to the club several experienced players in Ron Millman, Kevin Coleman and Gerry Lindsey.

These players blended in nicely with our crop of young enthusiastic players to bring a new wave of success to the club.

Ipswich United won grand finals in 1982, 84,85 and the First Division premiership in 1985, the first Ipwish team since the Bundamba Rangers.

The new decade of the 1990s has brought a fresh look to the club with a change of name back to St Helens United, a new youthful committee and a new coach in Nigel Lownds.


St Helens can also boast a strong juniors base with 154 junior players.

Therefore, with this depth available to the club, the possibilities for the future of St Helens are tremendous.

This year each senior player is putting something back into their club by undertaking a program designed to share their experience and knowledge while encouraging the younger players by adopting a junior team for the season.

With this type of player participation and with the enthusiastic committees, the overall future of St Helens United Soccer Club in the 1990s is very exciting.

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REFEREEING INTO THE 90's _

SO YOU WANT TO BE A REFEREE PART 2

According to your own ability and depending on whether you have attended lectures and meetings regularly, the next step is to apply for a re-grading.

This might include another field test and progression to 2nd Division games.

The moment eventually arrives when you think that you are better or just as good as the man on the top, and, with the blessing to the Examination Board, you put in another dollar fee and apply for a re-grading.

Only this time there's a bit of a snag - you have to sit for another oral examination, and if, by this time, you are not too sure of your Laws brushing up on them now will not help you.

Three or four qualified persons from the Examination Board sit around you, with a diagram of the soccer field in front.

Thirty-three questions are asked for a total of 99 points. For each question answered promptly and correctly three points are awarded.

Any hesitation in replying can throw one point to the winds, and any further explanation by the examiners reduces your score to either one or zero.

Furthermore, other queries appertaining to the same question must be answered correctly. Say, for instance, the question is: "a right-winger is in an offside position and as the ball is passed to him by one of his team mates, the opposing back stretches out his hand to intercept the ball but only succeeds in deflecting it to a more favourable position for the right-winger". Decision please?

Other queries arising from this may be "Is it offside?" What about the ball being last touched by an opponent? Is it hands? Do you apply the advantage?

So, from the above it may be seen that you must be far from a novice in the Laws of the Game for their correct application and interpretation.

After two to three hours of this gruelling test you have accumulated a score of the minimum of 88.

You have scraped through. Now comes the other hurdle - the First Division Field Test.

This time you make sure that you are extra fit, because other than that, the remainder can only be gained from experience. You are appointed to a top-class match, and the examiners are distributed at vantage points around the field.

There's no doubt about it, you are nervous, but you have to control yourself in order to cultivate that big-match temperament. You give your instructions to your linesmen, who are usually first class ticket colleagues. The crowds are there in the thousands, the teams are announced over the loudspeakers and the players are on the playing field.

The preliminaries of introduction and coin-tossing are over, but not before the two captains have noticed that you are a new one, remark on it, and wish you the best of luck.

You wonder if they mean it. With a shrill of the whistle the game is on.

You are fit this time and handling the game well. You only wish that one of the senior linesmen is not trying to control the game by waving the flag madly. Now one player tackles another and you stop the game for dangerous play.

The partisan crowd boos you _ Where did you get your ticket? In a raffle!"

Another woman spectator yells, "if you were my husband I'd feed you poison." You feel like hollering right back at her "Madam, if I was your husband I'd take it", but you contain yourself, stick to your decision, and the game goes on. **Continued Next Week**





BRADLEY'S REPORT, WHAT IS IT?

There has been a lot of talk lately about the recent release of the Bradley Report, the study into the re-structuring of Australian soccer.

Soccer 90, in a bid to keep the Queensland Soccer Public informed, has decided to print excepts from the report.

INTRODUCTION:

In late 1989 the ASF decided to obtain independent advice on the management structure and organisation arrangements required to make the administration of Australian soccer more effective in the 1990s.

More specifically, this independent advice was required on:

The roles, responsibilities and relationships between the ASF, the National Soccer League, the State Federations and their affiliates.

The structure and functioning of the NSL, the questions of promotion and relegation, the development of the NSL clubs and the relationship of the NSL with the State League competition.

The planning for the administration of the national team.

* The planning, policy and decision making processes relating to the development of juniors, coaches, referees and women

players and. * The internal adminstration functions of the ASF.



It is generally believed the standard of soccer now being played at all levels, from juniors through to the national teams, has improved significantly over the past decade with the national team achieving success against world class opposition.

Despite the success of the national team, and the continual improvement in playing standards, soccer in Australia has failed to achieve acceptance by Australians as a major football code.

Australian soccer is perceived to have a number of major problems: * A lack of co-ordinated direction at

national level with the code appearing to be fragmented into many conflicting and competing bodies.

A so called "national" competition with half its teams drawn from one city with only three other cities also being represented.

* It is seen as a game for ethnics with most clubs in the NSL relying full support from a specific ethnic group. Unfortunately for these clubs, these ethnic communities are no longer providing the support to their clubs that they once did. These clubs will have to develop district support bases if they are survive into the next century.

Many of the NSL and State League clubs are experiencing financial difficulties and.

The number of children playing the game appears to have fallen over the past five to 10 years.

Obviously we cannot print all of Dr Bradley's 90-page report, so we will concentrate on certain aspects we believe the public want to know about.

THE STRUCTURE OF THE NATIONAL SOCCER LEAGUE: **INTRODUCTION:**

It was identified that one of the key factors in the long term successful development of soccer in Australia was a prestigious National Soccer League.

This factor would lead to:

Improved media coverage, including commercial television.

The ability to attract top quality national sponsorships for soccer as a whole, and specifically for the NSL and individual clubs within the competition.

More spectators at NSL games.

The development of clubs and play-* ers which juniors can look up to and try to emulate and.

Improved playing standards which, in turn, improves Australia's chances for success in international competition.

To achieve the level of prestige required the competition needs to:

Be truly national and includes teams from all states and.

Have clubs that are well-developed, financially stable with a strong spectator base.

THE GEOGRAPHICAL COVERAGE OF THE NATIONAL SOCCER LEAGUE:

Ideally for the development of the sport, every State and major population centre in Australia should be represented in the NSL. There would appear to be 9 major centres are this stage which should be considered -Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, Brisbane/Gold Coast, Canberra, Wollongong, Newcastle, Perth and Hobart.

Additional centres may be needed to be added to this list as Australia's population grows and demographic change.

In the existing competition only four of these centres are represented.

It is recommended that the NSL be structured to allow each of these centres to be represented providing new clubs can satisfy the criteria relating to financial stability, access to facilities, development and promotional ability and competitiveness.

THE NUMBER OF TEAMS:

At the present stage their are 14 teams playing in the NSL.

Seven teams from Sydney, four from Melbourne, two from Adelaide and one from Wollongong.

From discussion with the clubs and other officials there is a general agreement that there are too many teams from Sydney. Most believe that the maximum teams that the cities of Sydney and Melbourne can support is four in each city.



Having two teams from Adelaide appears to be working well with both teams attracting spectators, and it allows Adelaiade to have a game there each weekend. Local derbies are well-supported.

It is proposed that the maximum number of teams from each centre should be -Sydney (4), Melbourne (4), Adelaide (2), Brisbane (2), Canberra (1), Wollongong (1), Newcastle (1), Perth (1), Hobart (1), a total of 17 teams.

Two teams have been listed for Bris-

bane. One of these teams, if there are to be two teams, should probably be drawn from another centre within the State of Queensland such as the Gold Coast.

A maximum of one team only has been nominated from Perth because of the travel costs involved.

One team has also been nominated from Hobart, although it man be based at Launceston.

At this stage it is unlike that a team could be financially supported from Tasmania.



It is important for the long term development of the clubs that no more than the maximum number of clubs from each area be allowed into the competition.

This provides protection for the clubs competing in the NSL from these centres.

It makes it easier for these clubs to attract sponsorships, media coverage and develop a spectator base.

Therefore it would appear that a 16team competition would provide the geographical coverage necessary for the longterm development of soccer in Australia.

THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NEW NSL STRUCTURE:

It is recommended that a new NSL competition be established based on the recommendations outlined, as soon as possible. However by the time this report is discussed by the various states, league federations and the NSL council of clubs it may be too late to introduce the new arrangements for the 1990/91 season.

In which case the earliest possible date for implementation is the 1991/92 season.

Existing NSL, State League clubs and consortiums should be invited to apply for the 14-positions in the new NSL competition. The final selection of these 14 clubs is to be based on:

The need for a team in the NSL from centres identified above.

The financial capabilities of the club.

Access to appropriate facilities.

Ability to promote and develop its * district or centre.

Ability to attract crowds.

Competitive strength and.

Geographical location within a city if

two or more clubs apply from that one city. It is recommended that, at all times, ASF retains the right to invite or not invite clubs to compete in the NSL. Once the new NSL structure is in place clubs in the competition will receive, each year, an invita-tion to play in the following season unless they have been excluded under the membership requirements as outlined, on the recommendation of the board, 75 per cent of the members at an annual general meeting or an extraordinary general meeting, vote to exclude a club from the NSL competition.

The ability of the stakeholders to exclude clubs from the NSL competition must always be retained so that clubs, which satisfy the membership rules outlined, may still be excluded from the league, if neces-

sary. These invitation to the clubs should be made by the end of June to allow the new clubs three months to prepare before the start of the next season in October.

I am almost afraid to introduce such a sordid topic as defence at a time when the game is being carried along on a wave of exciting attacking play, but we must be realistic.

It is no good being capable of scoring five goals every game if we are going to let six in. However, I do feel that, if certain basic

disciplines are obeyed, defending is easy. Perhaps I ought to qualify that by adding -"by comparison with attacking"

To clarify this apparently extravagant claim, attackers, to be ultimately success-ful, have to carefully work the ball into a small opening.

On the other hand, defenders, to be successful, have often to do little more than throw a boot at the ball and kick it onto the next field

TEAM DEFENCE:

It is important to remember that as soon as the other team has the ball, every player in your team is a defender with a duty to win back the ball as quickly as possible

The nearer to the opponents' goal the ball is won the sooner a strike can be made. The more the ball is won early, the less tiring the game becomes.

This is particularly true at our level where players are less fit than pros.

Pressure must be put on the players nearest the ball. This means opponents are denied the chance to play themselves easily out of trouble. They are instead forced to attempt hopeful, more risky, long passes. In all defensive situations try to have

one player more than your opponents. This provides cover if one defender is beaten. **INDIVIDUAL DEFENCE:**

Work hard to win the ball back when the other side has it.

In a one against one situation, try to reach the ball first if you can.

If not stay close to your opponent and force a move or a pass any way but forward. Above all stop your opponent from turning the ball.

Try to stay close enough to keep your opponent's head down and eyes on the ball to restrict the field of vision.

Talk to each other. Giving advice in defensive situations, especially when something is happening on a team-mate's blind side, is every bit as important as calling when you want the ball.

For goodness sake stay on your feet. A sliding tackle is an emergency measure, a last resort, yet it's amazing how many players use it as their only form of challenge.

Week after week, I see players dive in and finish up flat on their backs without the ball. A players is of no use to a team flat on the floor.


Watch your own and other teams and see how often players are left helpless after "going to ground"

Watch a televised game and it will sur-prise you how frequently top teams are put in trouble by the very same thing. WINNING THE BALL CONTEST

PREPARATION:

Have plenty of balls ready. Line up play-

ers in pairs behind a starting line roughly 20 meters away.



PROCEDURE:

Play a ball gently towards the first pair. When the ball has travelled a few yards shout "GO"!


The players come forward off the line, compete to win the ball, and give a controlled pass back to the coach. VARIATIONS:

1) Vary the starting position of the players. Have them facing away from you, lying down, ect.

2) Change partners frequently so that players who are regularly beaten don't lose interest.

3) Count one point each time a player successfully returns the ball and add up points at the end of a set period. Everyone

but the winners pays the penalty. Next week we look at the TACKLING PRACTICE and PLAYER FOR PLAYER MARKING GAME.

MATCH REPORT

A Queensland team boosted by NSL players Steve Jackson and Danny Wright held NSW to a nil-all draw at Perry Park last weekend.

Jackson, from Melbourne club Preston, never looked troubled in defence while South Melbourne's Wright help set up many of Queensland's scoring chances.

The two were well supported by former New Zealand international and Gold Coast midfielder Paul Halford, who won the manof-the-match award.

The scoreline was a good indication of the match with both teams playing attacking open football.

Neither side was able to find the back of the net despite numerous chances up forward.

However the Maroons had much of the play and looked the better side for most of the game delighting the 4500 strong parochial Queensland crowd.
