The final outcome of the Bradley Report will not be known until September

In the Bradley Report it has been recommended that Queensland be allocated two teams for the 1991/92 season.

However for teams to gain entry into the 1991/92 competition, stringent guidelines will be enforced.

Items such as ground lighting for television are high on the priority list.

This will mean teams nominating won't get much change out of a half a million dollars for the conversion of current lights to lights suitable for the silver screen.

The whole Queensland assault on the NSL Championship will be around the cool million dollar mark for one season, per team.

In the past the press have had a field day criticising the lack of a Queensland team in the NSL competition.

It is very obvious not many of the press members have done their mathematics and homework on what it all rosts

The same press have criticised the admission charge to major matches at Perry Park this year.

It takes a lot of \$10 to make a million dollars. Think about that?

And the illustrious members of the press would be wise to take the calculator in hand to find out the real facts of NSI

If you want soccer to succeed then you must think positively about it. In spite of the big dollars needed for


the NSL campaign, Queensland will have a team in the competition.


Sure it may be 1991/92, but we will achieve that ambition.

Champions 1986,1987; Grand Finalists 1986 and Preliminary Finalists 1987.



REFEREEING INTO THE 90's -

SELF MANAGEMENT FOR THE REFEREE

PART 1.

In my full-time job, running training courses, I'm coming into contact with more and more ideas for self and people management which seem to have uses on the football pitch.

I'd like to share some of these in the hope they will be of use to you.

The first area is in self-management – getting yourself right. As well as the preparation in terms of getting gear packed etc., there's much you can do inside your own head to approach any match in the best possible frame of mind.

Firstly, do you truly know where you are going? The old phrase "those going nowhere tend to get there" can be applied to the football pitch. Before you start a match, have you set your own standards? Have you decided the attitude you are going to display, how you are going to attempt to control the players?

Have you thought about positioning for the situations which always arise?

A successful general always has a battle plan to work to. The confidence you can obtain from simply having this worked out in your mind beforehand is considerable.

Secondly, and a field which produces amazing results, is in the field of selfvisualisation.

Before a match, take time to imagine the game going without a hitch.

Let's assume every player accepts every decision as being correct. Penalty awards are applauded by the defending team, and not a word of dissent is spoken throughout this 90 minute encounter. At the conclusion, both teams, including the one who lost the game from a last minute penalty which hit a post before flying into the net off your leg, award you 10 out of 10.

Okay, you're laughing by now – and that's exactly the point!

If you blew a whistle to start a match at this moment you'd be feeling relaxed, calm and ready.

The idea of self visualisation is to putyou into a positive and calm frame of mind.

Of course, it won't be like that in the match, but simply by your positive attitude you're giving yourself a better chance of controlling what does arise in a praiseworthy manner.

Perhaps the Queensland Soccer Federation should give him an offer he can't refuse.


Finally we now know there will be no Brisbane team in the National League next year.


S. MacMahon (Bris. Bayside) No. 9 scoring the winning goal at the State Titles in Kingaroy

Q.S.S.S.S. FEDERATION

Things will be a little quiet for the next two weeks due to the School Holidays.

Last week I was presented with a chaotic situation by the coach of the South Coast Regional Schoolboys Soccer team.

He discovered that apart from losing five of his squad to the State Under 15's, he is now threatened with the loss of a further six players to the State Under 16's.

As a result, he tells me that the team he could now select would be uncompetitive.

Several phone calls around the town later and I have provided him with six Brisbane-based players willing to go in a combined President's side.

The major problem at the coast seems to be the Australian Rules invasion.

Ron Barassi may have slated the Bears as the worst team in the competition but the code is pumping money into the game at the coast and luring boys away with all sorts of goodies. Rugby has done the same thing for years too and lured boys away from Soccer at school and club level.

Free jerseys, goal posts, match balls and coaching by players in the top sides are all on offer for the schoolboy Australian Rules player.

Rules and Rugby combined do not have the same numbers we do in Soccer and yet they have greater appeal and better media coverage.

This year the Commonwealth Bank has withdrawn its sponsorship from the National Championships for Secondary School Soccer. This has meant that each player is going to be hit for an extra \$40.00 for the



team levy which has been set at \$640.00 team.

On the subject of State team costs I must apologise for any misunderstanding I may have caused in an earlier article, the actual costs at this stage come to just under \$700.00 and I am trying to whittle this down through sponsorship and other means.

The \$1300.00 I quoted was the total amount many of the boys travelling to Cairns and the girls travelling from country Regions to Brisbane will be up for just to represent Queensland in the Nationals.

Anyone selected to represent Australia will need to find a further \$3000.00 for the South-East Asia trip in December. (I am going on the 1989 costing here).

The Commonwealth Bank Bill Turner Cup is still moving along slowly with the following results now to hand.

Redeemer Lutheran 3 d Wavell 0, so they now go on to play Nambour after the Holidays.







THROUGHOUT THE STATE

I asked him if he had gone beyond his wildest dreams and he said that he still had ambition.

If his dreams were realized then it would be time to pack up his boots and give the game away.

Although I haven't seen him play recently, I am told that he has tempered much of the lightning speed to become a ball player and not chaser.

I interviewed Farina once before on the back of a truck at Endeavour Park, our local soccer centre about six years ago when he was playing in Sydney and the major difference I notice now is his extreme care in answering any question. No doubt a legacy of living in a country where publicity officers don't battle to get the merest snippet of information in the media as we do here.

Farina went along to watch some senior soccer games but unfortunately none of the week-end's fixtures rose to their best standard.

The top three teams all dropped points. Joint second placed Edge Hill and Leichhardt shared a nil-all draw and Dimbulah were surprisingly defeated at home by local rivals Mareeba, the only goal coming from their captain/coach Colin Junna.

But the chasers, Stratford and Marlin Coast Rangers made up ground at the heavy expense of the bottom of the table teams Mossman and Innisfail.

Both teams capitulated and were easily beaten with four second half goals.

Stratford destroyed Innisfail 5-0 and Marlin Coast annihilated Mossman 6-1. Red McLellan.

NORTH QUEENSLAND

If Racing Stewards controlled soccer in North Queensland, they would want to introduce swabbing after some of the recent results in the Premiership competition.

Bookmakers would be laughing and the spectators demanding an enquiry.

Last weekend, Aitkenvale P.Y.C., the premiership leaders in the First Division, lost their first game of the Premiership. This can happen to any team, but they lost 4–0 to Estates who the week before went down 2–3 to Heatley Warriors (seventh on the table.)

Most teams are very poorly organised for set pieces, free-kicks, corner-kicks, throw-in and the like.

This is understandable because set pieces need a fairly large area and many clubs train in small places.

Traditionally set pieces involve a small number of players, leaving many others standing around uninvolved.

Often the absence from training of key players is an excuse for the practice of a set piece to be postponed or abandoned.

Coaches generally consider set pieces to be the least important part of a team's preparations.

However, you only have to watch a number of televised games to see that a remarkably high percentage of goals come from set pieces at top level.

The point has frequently been made that these teams have all week to practice them.

But then the other teams have all week to learn how to stop them. None the less they still get results.

There is no doubt that the spadework for set pieces is best done in pre-season training when they is daylight and more space available.

After that, the moves can be touched up from time to time even in the smallest training area.

Psychologically, a team which has a few

well-planned set pieces is at an advantage. Whether goals result from them or not,

they still cause a feeling of respect, even fear in the opposition.

Players need not be the usual band of stars. Let everyone have the chance to practice the skills needed.

Surprising talent is often unearthed in this way, and it is fun for everyone to be included.

You can even make it competitive and award points for quality.

Get into the habit of doing a little on set pieces every sessions, it is sure to pay dividends.

SET PIECE DRILL:

PREPARATION:

Mark out the end of a pitch as shown. Divide the players into four groups.

PROCEDURE:


Group 1 practices corner kicks both inswing and outswing from the right hand corner.

Group 2 practices corner kicks both inswing and outswing from the left hand corner.

Group 3 practices free-kicks from outside the box, chipping onto the cross bar.

Group 4 practices long throw-ins for the goalkeeper to catch or for players in Group 3 to volley back to the corner.

NOTES:



1) This creates chaos in the penalty area. The goalkeeper doesn't stand a chance but gets some practice and also redistributes some balls to the four groups. Get interested parties, injured players to retrieve the balls from behind the goal. This makes an excellent pre-season warm-up.

2) Rotate the groups (apart from the goal keeper) to allow everyone the chance to practice and the coach to observe all the skills.


