

In 1972 two gentlemen, Manny Chianeeys and Gordon Gentle, saw the need for a junior soccer club in the Goodna area. Thus began the birth of the Goodna and Districts Soccer and Sports Club Ltd.

With the help of the local police sergeant, a committee was formed and an initial bank account was opened with the aid of a \$5 loan from each of the committee members.

Training for an under-14 team started at St Francis Xavier Catholic School and very shortly further boys turned up enabling a second team to be formed.

With such an influx of boys, further training facilities had to be found.

Fortunately the club obtained permission from the Wacol Migrant Centre to train at their facilities.

It was felt at this time that it would be necessary to provide the facility for the junior players to continue playing after they had advanced from the junior stage. This began a desire to have a senior team comprised of former junior players from the Goodna Soccer Club.

In 1973 some fathers and friends decided to form a senior team and play friendly matches.

Such was their success that they went into the Brisbane Commercial League in 1974 and applied for and were admitted into the 7th Division of the Queensland Soccer Federation in 1975.

Seeking an alternative playing venue, the club approached the Wolston Park Authorities and were given permission to cut a playing field in a small setting adjacent to the Riverside Ballroom.

The club was fortunate in obtaining the services of some experienced players around this time including Terry Madden, Doug How, Kevin Wagstaff, John Toner, Ken O'Flaherey, Matt McGough, Wally Wally Banks, Gary Maclot and Andy Thompson.

The integrity of these players and others forced the club to adopt the nick-name "The Gamecocks".

The club was still looking for a more permanent home when the then president Wally Banks spotted 14.5 acres of virgin land for sale almost in the centre of Goodna.

With \$50 in the bank, the club decided to approach the owners with an offer of \$1000 per acre on a \$1 holding deposit subject to council approval for a sporting complex to be formed there.

The club's offer was accepted and sufficient funds were raised to obtain a bank loan for the purchase of the land.

The grounds were quickly levelled and pitches established followed in rec-

ord time by the building of dressing rooms and a canteen.

The grounds were named Kippen Park in recognition of the generous vendors of the land, Mr and Mrs Kip-

The club had advanced to the then First Division by 1982. This was a remarkable feat made easier by Goodna's favourite son, Jim McCabe, who had joined the club from Southside Eagles two or three years earlier.

Other players of note during this period include Paul Youll, Ron Hartley, Ray Lemon, Terry Madden, Johnny Tower, Gary Maclot and the Spruce brothers.

Through the years 1982-1984 the club played in the First Division and Intermediate League, but were also relegated to the Amateur Division One.

Then in 1988, after a further renaming of the division, the club found themselves in Division Three.

They finished fourth that year and progressed to the grand final where they

were beaten by Kingsridge.

In 1989 the club went one better when they finished second and then went on to win the Grand final 1-0 against St Albans.

1990 has seen promotion to Division Two and the determination to stay there.

The advent of an enthusiastic committee has seen dramatic ground improvements particularly in the area of lighting and external seating and bar facilities.

The future also looks rosy for the club with 30 former juniors playing with the club.

Perhaps the club's greatest on field success belongs to a junior team who as under-13s in 1987 were Brisbane Champions and won the Ron Proud and Frank Clarke Memorial trophies.

In 1988 this team was again Brisbane Champions and won the Len James Trophy and in 1989 were runners-up to Mt Gravatt as Brisbane Champions.

These boys now form the basis of the club's third team and the future.



SELF MANAGEMENT FOR REFEREES PART 2

After a bad match, you tend to dwell on what went wrong. After a good match, off we go for a drink in a good mood – the game is often the furtherest from our thoughts.

Yet we should spend time before games sub-consciously building up the internal success record.

Our sub-conscious mind is a weird thing. It finds it difficult to distinguish between real and imagined feelings.

Therefore, if you tell it something often enough, it believes it to be true.

Documented cases of this exist concerning prisoners of war in Vietnam.

To stop them going mad, American POWs learned to play the guitar or touch-type.

They practised every day using broom handles and string or cut-out boards.

When released, several picked up guitars for the first time in their lives, in front of witnesses and played classical melodies, or touch-typed at 6-WPM on typewriters they had never used before. The simple answer to these bizarre acts lay in the sub-conscious. As the soldiers had practised day after day for hours on end, the sub-conscious built up an expectancy of this ability – and when the occasion came, simply did what it had been told to do!

Smiling

The third way you can help yourself is by regular, honest, self assessment.

Do you complete a form after every game? Assessors watch from time to time and this helps – but you can't be untrue to yourself on a regular basis!

You can pick up the trends of faults to work on by this simple process.

In terms of managing players, I wonder if all referees use the most potent weapon in their armoury on a regular enough basis.

It's a smile! Used at the right time it can defuse tension, even at situations like penalty claims.

The key is to smile with the players, not at them.

So in summing up, it's the attitude which a referee displays which often if not always decides how successful he is on the pitch.

If a positive determined attitude to picture and be successful can work for someone like golf's Nick Faldo who visualised what he wanted through two very poor years to produce one of the most successful swings in the game, how about



PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

BRUCE STOWELL



This week we continue our series on set pieces with another drill for you to try.

SET-PIECE GAME

When it comes to practising actual moves I find this game overcomes the problem of having bored players standing around.

PLAYERS

10 or more.

PREPARATION

Mark out a normal pitch. Divide the players into two teams playing a normal game.

PROCEDURE

Allow sufficient time for the players to become absorbed in the game (five to ten minutes) then stop the game and explain that you are going to blow the whistle at intervals to award free-kicks, corner kicks and throw-ins regardless of the state of the game in order to practice dead ball situations.

NOTES

1) You will have to remind players from time to time why you are blowing the whistle. 2) Do not attempt too much direction at first. Allow players to experiment with their own ideas. If they are successful work on them making whatever improvements or adaptions are necessary. Don't be afraid to call them back to repeat moves that are unsatisfactory.

- 3) Be wary of having too many alternatives. Try one simple idea for each set piece and try and perfect it. Then work on another in the same way and gradually build up a repertoire.
- 4) Watch top teams on television. New ideas are constantly on view and

many of them are quite simple in content and easy to copy.

DEAD BALL SITUATIONS

- A) Attacking free-kicks around the box.
- B) attacking throw-ins around the box.
- C) Throw-ins with the emphasis on retaining possession.
- D) Mid-field free-kicks. Try to build up attacks from short free-kicks.
- E) Corner kicks, inswing and outswing.


CHECKLIST

Do not put off practising set pieces by lack of numbers or space.

* Aim to work on one set piece and one alternative as you build up your repertoire. Don't try too many at once as this only leads to confusion.

* Watch top class games on television or live. New and interesting variations are constantly on view.

* Keep everyone interested in work on set pieces.

DR. BRADLEY AND THE JUNIORS

The Bradley Report should warm the hearts of any junior soccer player or supporter.

The report, commissioned by the Australian Soccer Federation, was a study on the restructuring of the code in Australia and what direction it should take in the future.

Part Four under heading "Recommendations on Specific Issues" has this to say under the sub-heading "Planning for the National Teams".

"For Australia to succeed in international competitions, and overcome the problems of a small player base and limited resources, more forethought and planning needs to be undertaken to ensure that our talented players are identified at an early age and developed to the required skills and standards to compete effectively.

"I recommend that the ASF develop a 12-year plan, linked into three World Cup campaigns, with the first four years being in-depth.

"The longer team plan is aimed at overcoming any deficiencies Australia has in player skills as well as coaching deficiencies.

"For example, it is often claimed that Australian players lack the ball skills to compete successfully, on a regular basis, against the top South American and European countries.

"To overcome this type of deficiency is not possible with the existing senior players who will be competing in Australia's next World Cup campaign.

"This can only be achieved by ensuing Australia's current youth players, the U12's, U13s and U14s are receiving the type of training and coaching which will, in 10 to 15 years time, allow Australia to have available players with the required skills."

Under this particular sub-heading Dr Graham Bradley has made a number of other recommendations, but the one above coupled with other references to junior players shows

the very real concerns he has for juniors.




