These representatives would help formulate positive thoughts in a bid to gain maximum exposure for the sport in Queensland.



Although there was a Thistle Club operating as far back as 1888, no record has been found to link it to the present Grange Thistle Soccer Football and Youth Club.

However, the forerunner of our club is believed to have come into existence in 1912 with a team called Merthyr Thistle.

In 1920 all but one player and a group of supporters broke away and formed the now Grange Thistle Club, known then as the Thistle Football Club.

One of the pioneers and proclaimed founders of the club was the late RL (Bob) Waddell, father of the late Bill Waddell, former Presi dent of the Queensland Soccer Federation

and past President of Grange Thistle. Other prominent pioneers of the club were Jack Cumberford and Joe Scott.

Our first year in the Queensland Football Soccer Association resulted in a close premiership tussle with Corinthians, who eventually took the honours.

Thistle were also finalists in the Charity Cup. They went on to win the cup in 1921.

Nine members of the original 1920 team went on to gain State or national honours – B McBryde, J Cumberford, D Cumberford, J Peebles, A Thompson, W Nicholls, R Craig, S Ross and A McMillan.

Within the space of two years Thistle had established itself as one of the most powerful teams in the country.

Thistle senior's colours were originally sky blue and white with a yellow emblem on the jersey while the juniors were wearing a dark blue and white butcher stripes.

It is believed all our games were played at the Brisbane Cricket Ground until the club obtained the ground at Lanham park around 1926

The park was situated at the corner of Lanham Avenue and Sellheim Street, but was later moved to where the bowling green is now and finally to our present location in the early 40s

In 1923 Thistle won their first premiership beating Bundamba 5-2 in the final. But it was not until 1926 that the club came close to winning another premiership, when it finished second.

The club had its problems in the late 20s and 30s, but began a new era when it reformed in 1942. The word soccer was added to our name when the club was reformed.

An influx of migrants from Scotland and England after the War improved playing strength of the club and by the early 50s it was again a force in soccer

During this period the club set a record by appearing in four successive Tristram Shield finals from 1949 to 52, winning the last three.

Some of the players in those teams included G Haggert, B Jardine, C Stewart, Morgan, D Wilson, E Trotter, N Clark, W Nicol, H Bool, W Cansick, N DeSilva, J Mousedale, B Gold, P Corcoran and J Corcoran

In 1949 the junior side of the club started again and the name Youth Club was added to the club's name.

The club experienced a slow decline in the 50s with deliverance coming with the formation of the present QSF.

By joining the fledgling federation, the club was able to keep its First Division status.

It was at this time the club's colours changed from blue and white to tangerine and white.

....

The club also entered the import business the first player being East Fife forward Norm Tran.

Others included Matt Jackson, Bob Buchanan, George Shearer, Gordon Mackie, John Parker, George Pagan, John Shepherd and Dave Melia.

In 1966 Thistle won the Ampol Cup for the first time defeating Brisbane City 6-1.

At this time one family emerged to have as much influence on the direction of our club as did the founders.

That was the Dann family and in particular Wallace Dann, present QSF President.

He served a record 13 years as President of Thistle, 10 as Treasurer and two as Secretary

It was the time of changes, the rampant lion appeared on the Thistle emblem, Lanham Park was revamped, top class lighting was installed and the clubhouse was built and opened in 1979.

In 1976, for the first time in history, Thistle was relegated to Second Division after finishing last.

Thistle went straight back into First Division the following year with the help of two fine players in Jim Hermiston and Steve Dolan.

1977 was also the year the club enjoyed

its biggest numbers of juniors with 31 teams. In 1979, the State League was formed and

Thistle became the inaugural winners of the premiership and championship.

The following year Thistle finished second to Mt Gravatt in the premiership, but triumphed in the championship.

Thistle was again victorious in 1982, after the State League was disbanded and a 15team First Division competition was formed, winning the premiership and championship.

From 1977 to 83 was the club's most successful period winning three premierships, four championships and an Ampol Cup.

In the years since, Thistle has been forced to use strict budgetary restraints. However, the accent has always been placed on our juniors to proceed through the ranks to play at the highest level at the club.

Also from our ranks have come two QSF Presidents (Bill Waddell and Wallace Dann), three Rothmans Gold Medallists (Steve Dolan, 1979, Ken Swan, 1982/83, and Keith Marsh, 1986).

The history of Thistle has been chequered, more often down than up in recent years.

However, through the loyalty and dedication of supporters and players alike, they have survived and with Thistle's facilities almost complete and paid for, the future is assured.

Eulogy

ITALIA 90 has finished, and although many good things have come out of it, the World Cup final on Monday morning was an anticlimax. During the month-long tournament, there were teams who excelled when they were not expected to and teams who were disappointing after they had promised so much.

For my money the player of the tournament was Italy's Salvatore Schillaci.

Everytime he touched the ball it turned to "gold" and he excited the crowd from start to finish, deserving the Golden Boot Award for the top scorer of the 1990 Cup.

The final, in which Argentina were lucky to be, was a disappointing end to the football feast served up to Australian viewers.

West Germany emerged winners after a controversial penalty, even though I think they were deserving Champions.

Germany took the game to Argentina and although there were not many clear cut chances, they created all the highlights of the match. Germany's goalkeeper did not have to make one save during the 90 minute encounter, which showed how defensive Argentina were

I actually think Argentina were just holding out for a penalty shootout. The two promised stars in the final, Diego Maradonna and Loathar Matheaus, were both marked out of the game and contributed little. And the referee over-reacted most of the time with some strange decisions and harsh treatment of two players with red cards. Overall it was a great tournament which deserved a better show

piece for the final.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

OBSTRUCTION by Stanley Lover

The obstruction clause of Law 12 has remained unchanged since it was first introduced in 1951.

It became necessary because of the practice, fairly common in some countries, of a player stepping in front of an opponent to block his path to the ball without making any attempt to play the ball. There was no punishment for this action until the International Board decided that it offended the spirit of the game.

The offence is described as: "when not playing the ball, intentionally obstruction an opponent, i.e., running between an opponent and the ball, or interposing the body so as to form an obstacle to an opponent." (Law 12.3)

It will be seen that obstruction of opponents can be used as a means to impede vital tactical play.

It is important, therefore, to differentiate between what is fair and what is unfair when a player appears between opponent and ball. To put the new law into its proper perspective, the FA issued carefully worded explanations of various situations which arise in match play in its Memorandum on Refereeing No. 5 of August 1951. Because the observations are still very relevant to modern football they will be reproduced here in weekly parts with illustrations. What constitutes the offence of obstruction?

During any match, in the ordinary course of play, there are many occasions when a player will come between an opponent and the ball, but in the majority of such instances this is quite natural and fair.

He is intent upon playing the ball and is

entitled to make every legitimate move to obtain or retain possession of it.

Provided that the ball is within playing distance the player may interpose his body between opponent and the ball in a feint to play at it and yet allow it to go to a colleague.

This is again legitimate.

It is when the ball is not within playing distance of a player (say two or three meters) and when he is not making any attempt to play the ball that this new offence may occur.

But it is strongly emphasized, the offence must be intentionally obstructing.

Common sense of officials in interpreting the spirit of the game will help to differentiate between incidents of obstruction which are fair and those which are intentionally unfair.


A study of the following incidents may assist in distinguishing between "offence" and "no offence" in the matter of obstruction

1) Player A makes a pass to B (one of his

colleagues) and tries to run forward to collect the return pass at A1; an opponent X, ignoring the ball, deliberately steps in front of A to bar his path to the ball at A1; X makes no attempt to charge, but deliberately positions himself to obstruct. (see figure 1) X is contravening Law 12 (2)

2) A, having beaten X by pushing the ball forward, attempts to run around him. X moves to block his path; he makes no attempt to charge A but, facing him, deliberately positions himself to obstruct A's progress. (see figure 2.)

In this case again, X is making no attempt to play the ball.

The result is that he is merely preventing A from taking part in the game or from making a reasonable attempt to play the ball.

He should therefore be punished by an indirect free kick from the place where he committed the offence.

It is again emphasized that this new clause dealing with intentional obstruction in no way empowers the referee to ignore the more serious offenses in section 1 of Law 12.

It is still a foul for a player to elbow an opponent out of the way or off the ball, just as it is and always has been a foul to hold an opponent or push him with the hands.

Furthermore, these fouls are punished by direct free kicks or by penalty kicks where applicable, and if the fouls are persisted in, the referee has power under Law 5 (d) and (g) to deal with the offender drastically by suspending him from taking part in the game.


The clash between Annerley and Loganholme saw Annerley emerge as winner by 3-1 scoreline.

It was the consensus at our final meeting before the State Championships that this situation be avoided in the future through better communication between our associations. We will attempt to resolve this situation for the 1991 season.

As I will be in Cairns for this event there is unlikely to be a report next week, but the week after there will be a full round up of both the boys' and girls' competitions as well as a list of the State teams.

We have been unable to provide the scholarship to Germany this year which is a shame with German poised for a win in the World Cup.



There will still be a tour, however, and we may be able to provide one for both boys and girls.

We have been approached to consider this option with the probability of the return of the scholarship in the near future. I think that it was a great success last year and gave many players a little personal incentive to perform for their team as well as themselves.

A recent issue of SOCCER 90 had a history of North Star Soccer Club, which was disappointing because in the list of representative players no mention was made of the many schoolboy players from the club.

The most recent of those being Chris Tribbeck, who played for the Australian schoolboys in 1989 and was voted "player of the tour" by team officials.

Other North Star players like Danny English, Justin Kilshaw, Wayne McGauly, Ross Swan, Ken Swan, Paul Fegan and Andrew Hauck have all represented Brisbane North at schoolboy level, and in some cases Queensland. Representing your State is a big achievement at school or club level.

The sooner it is realised that there is a place for both within our soccer community, the closer we will come to achieving the same status as those other minority football codes.





PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

One of the most difficult times in practice sessions at our level is the start. There can be a great gap between the arrival of the first player and the last.

If the players come to associate the start of a session with enjoyment rather than pain they will make more effort to arrive on time.

I am convinced that one of the main reasons why so many players are late for practice is the traditional format of sessions - a long stint of pain followed by a brief game at the end.

It is amazing how many players are never able to arrive in time to start practice at 7pm for all manner of reasons.

But tell them there is a game next Tuesday, kick-off 6.30 and you can guarantee there will be 15 players at the ground no later than 6.15.

Even so the problem will persist and how to cope is probably more relevant than cure.

First of all, a thorough warm-up - loosening up and stretching all the joints and muscle groups is vital.

Insist that all players do this before they take part in any other activity.


If possible start a tradition of doing this individually before leaving the dressing room where they can be seen rather than relying on promises.

This is far preferable to having players hanging about until they are all ready.

Be prepared beforehand for players coming out warm and ready for action by having ready a game which can cater for numbers which increase from a handful to a full complement. Three such games are useful.

THE NUMBERS GAME

This game can cope with any number of players, but it is assumed as the diagram shows, that at least eight players have arrived.



PREPARATION

Mark out a large area with four cones. Split the players into two teams as they arrive, giving each a number to correspond with a number of a player in the other team.

All players start as goalkeepers and the goal is the whole width of the pitch between the cones.

One ball only is needed. A line of discs marks the goalkeeper's zone.

PROCEDURE

The coach calls out a number or numbers. The player or players in each teams whose numbers have been called come out of the goalkeeper's zone, compete for the ball, and if they win shoot for goal.

NOTES

1) As more players arrive you will obviously want to involve larger numbers out of goal.

2) To change players over be firm. Blow the whistle. As soon as that happens no player is allowed to touch the ball further. If anyone does, give a free-kick to the opposition and give the offender a penalty run or exercise.

Give the players chance to get back to the goal line then call the next numbers.

3) Keep the goalkeepers alert. Some players regard this phase as a rest so punish a team each time a goal is scored.

4) Keep a strict check on time. Allow about one minute for each group in action. It is very demanding for small numbers but even so players will complain is they feel they are not having as much playing time as others.


A stop watch at the ready will keep the peace.

VARIATIONS

1) When the numbers of the players in action reaches six or more condition the game to two-touch.

2) This game can become a little fast and furious. Try adding some quality and composure by making a head-high limit for the ball. Next week we look at the BALL TAG GAME.

He advised that the Queensland Soccer Federation would be supporting the adoption of the Bradley Report at the forthcoming A.S.F. Executive Meeting.

A Management Committee member, G Canale, spoke on the Miss Queensland Soccer Quest, giving a reminder to Clubs to enter their Quest Entrants as early as possible to enable promotional activities to take place within the SOCCER 90 magazine, and also to allow for their photographs to be utilised in the SOCCER 90 magazine.

Delegates were then asked if their Clubs intended to participate in the Quest, with a tabulation being taken which augured well for the 1990 Quest.


SOUTH QUEENSLAND LEAGUE
