

COLUE PROFILE CLUE PROF

The Nerang Soccer club was founded in 1972 by players of the then Coolloongatta club who were dissatisfied with a shared ground arrangement and long travel from their residence at Nerang.

Club stalwart and Life member Fred Stone approached the Albert Shire Council for ground space and sought approval from the Queensland Soccer Federation for a change of name and permission to relocate.

Approval was given and the Velodrome became Nerangs' home ground for fifteen years.

The tenacity of the club started from the word go when the clubs original players turned a quagmire into a playing surface for the first home game against Fairfield United.

Junior intake commenced in 1973, followed by girls and ladies teams, the ladies team performance has been exceptional and has produced many Gold Coast and State Representatives and also an Australian Representative. They have proved too strong for the Gold Coast competition and now participate in the Brisbane ladies First Division.

Junior numbers grew rapidly in the '70's, the club fielded teams from Under-6 through to Under-17's, with fifteen Junior teams, a ladies team and two senior teams, the velodrome was hopelessly over capacity.

In 1980 the Albert Shire Council offered Nerang a very rough piece of ground with enormous potential called Glennon Park.

New Facility

Relocation to the new facility commenced in 1982, first the Juniors and in 1987, after a massive rebuilding programme by the council, Nerang celebrated the clubs' promotion to 2nd Division by relocating all teams to Glennon Park.

The ensuing period has seen the building of the club house, completed in 1987, installation of lighting and ground improvements which rate Glennon Park as the best playing surface on the Coast, a long way from the Quagmire of 1972.

Despite its short history Nerang is proud of the clubs playing achievements. In the 19 years of Federation competition, Nerang has never been relegated, has been denied two promotions and survived proposed exclusion from the Brisbane competition by various restructures.

Nerang has been blessed by strong and consistent management, determined to carry on the club's policies of youth development and promotion, constant improvement of club facilities and on field achievements.

Adherence to the Youth policy can be seen in the number of past juniors playing in our three senior sides. Our Div. 2 side boasts no fewer than seven past Nerang juniors, several with over fifteen years unbroken service to the club and many more with ten years plus to their credit.

The Nerang Soccer club is very proud of its Senior womens and Junior players, and the entire club's achievements over the past nineteen years, and also has its signs firmly set on its goal to gain promotion to the XXXX League this season and believes it has the right package to achieve further success in the 1990's.



REFEREEING INTO THE 90's -

OBSTRUCTION Part 2 by Stanley Lover

A continued analysis of the obstruction clause of law 12 which has remained un-

changed since 1951.

3) The ball is running out of play either over the touchline or the goal-line. Defender A follows it for some yards, keeping the ball within his playing distance. Opponent X, chasing the ball, finds A between himself and the ball with A's back towards him. X may charge A from behind (Law 12 (e) but A is not offending against the new clause because, theoretically, the ball is under his control, even though he allows it to run out of play.

But if A, seeing the ball running out of play, deliberately obstructs X when the ball is out of playing distance then he has committed an offence penalized by an indirect free kick. Similarly, if A turns his back on the ball to face an obstruct X, even though the ball is within playing distance, he cannot be making an attempt to play it, therefore he is committing an infringement of the law.

4) A traps the ball and turns on it with it still under control. His body is now interposed between the ball and an opponent. His body is now interposed between the ball and an opponent. Here A does not commit any offence because he is in possession and is within his rights in denying it to an opponent.

5) A is receiving a pass and runs into a position so that, when the ball reaches him, he is between an opponent and the ball. This is a fair movement and there is no offence.

Decision 8 specifies that movements of the obstructing player with outstretched arms which force the challenger to change course and are intentional become an act of ungentlemanly conduct. A caution shall be awarded to the offender. The qualification, 'but does not make bodily contact', implies that if contact is made the offence then becomes one of holding

or pushing, for which a direct free kick is the award. If the offence occurs in the offender's penalty area a penalty kick must be awarded. 'Interposing the body so as to form an obstacle to an opponent' does not always relate to the body being between opponent and ball.

body being between opponent and ball.

Decision 9 spells out the offence of obstructing the goalkeeper, 'in an attempt to prevent him from putting the ball into play...'. The ball is now between the two players. It is clearly intended that the goalkeeper shall be given the opportunity of releasing the ball without obstruction but within the restriction placed on him by Law 12.5 (a), the 'fourstep rule'.

There is considerable divergence of opinion and action in situations where an attacker confronts a goalkeeper who is holding the ball. Let us assume that the goalkeeper has just caught the ball (figure 1)

Figure 1

Question 1
What legal options are open to the goal-keeper?

Answer
(a) He can throw the ball.
(b) He can move to gain momentum to kick the ball out of hand (within four steps).

Question 2
What legal options are open to the attacker?
Answer (a) He may stay where

he is (the goalkeeper may drop the ball).
(b) If the goalkeeper stands still, he may fairly charge the goalkeeper (hoping that the

charge will take the goalkeeper and ball into the goal).

with DES MILES

(c) If the goalkeeper moves, he may fairly charge the goalkeeper (again hoping for a goal or, alternatively, to force the goalkeeper to release the ball).

to release the ball).

Question 3 What action by the attacker constitutes obstruction?

Answer Any action which blocks the path of the goalkeeper in an attempt to prevent him from releasing the ball within the allotted four steps.

Question 4 Does this mean that the attacker must remain stationary if the goal-keeper moves?

Answer No. He may move parallel to the goalkeeper but may not step in front of him.

Question 5 If the goalkeeper stands still and the attacker moves from side to side, is this allowed?

Answer No. The attacker is clearly intentionally blacking the path of the goal-keeper.

Question 6 If the goalkeeper moves from side to side and the attacker follows him, is this allowed?

Answer Yes, provided that the attacker does not intentionally step in front of the goalkeeper.

goalkeeper.

Question 7 If the goalkeeper gains possession and the attacker then runs to stand in front, of the goalkeeper, is this allowed?

front of the goalkeeper, is this allowed?

Answer Yes, because the attacker is permitted to charge the goalkeeper when the latter is holding the ball. We then revert to the original situation.

Comment - Goalkeepers have no right to expect attackers to withdraw to allow them to release the ball. A goalkeeper always has the option, and the advantage, of throwing the ball. Attackers have as much right to the ball as goalkeepers and should be allowed fair opportunities to obtain possession.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

h BRUCE STOWELL

This week we look at the "Ball Tag Game".


Ball tag, soccer style, is a popular and entertaining game with a higher skill content than at first meets the eye. **PREPARATION:**

Use the centre circle as the playing area or mark out an area of similar size with cones.

Divide the players into two teams, one of the outside of the circle, the other on the inside.

Only one ball is needed at first. **PROCEDURE:**

The players on the outside shoot the



ball at their opponents, attempting to hit them below the knees.

Players on the inside must of course try to avoid being hit by dodging the ball.

Outside players may attempt direct hits or pass between themselves for a better position.

NOTES:

1) set a time for as many hits to be made as possible. After that time the team changes over. The team with the most hits in the time is the winner. Make the losers do a penalty run or exercise.

2) There will be no need to make the outside team hurry to get in its shots or passes – the time factor will force this. However in their haste, the outside team may get a little wild with their efforts. So knock off a point every time the ball strikes an inside player above the knee.

3) There is not much chance of players on the outside slacking or losing concentration, but add a further incen-

tive by also knocking off a point every time the ball is allowed behind them. Punish them further by insisting that they bring the ball back to re-start the game.

4) Keep a close eye on encroachment. Make sure that outside players stay behind the cones or circle. Be really popular if this persists by knocking off more points.

VARIATIONS:

1) Instead of a time limit for each phase, set a target of ten hits (allowing for deductions) for each team. Check the time taken by each team to reach this and punish the losers in the usual way.

2) Introduce another ball. This will

sharpen up both teams.

3) Change the shape of the practice. Alter the playing area into a square and let the players of both teams move freely in the area. Otherwise the rules are the same.


After discussion it was agreed the final for the 1990 Ampol State Cup would be held Sunday August 19, to maximise support and for the day's activities.


The Chairman advised that the final series of matches were scheduled for Wednesday July 18, 1990 at Perry Park where all four participating centres would be playing.
