

OLYMPIC UNITED SOCCER CLUB

Olympic United Soccer Club started in 1966 as Pan Rhodian Soccer Club at Raymond Park at Kangaroo Point.

Pan Rhodian played Association for 2 years until 1968 before moving to Dutton Park.

After the move they were admitted to the Federation under the name of Olympic Soccer Club and started off with a team in the 5th Division.

Olympic stayed at Dutton Park until 1979 winning Premierships to take them up to 2nd Division.

In 1980 the revamped State League invited Olympic, and they accepted, to join into the new State League competition.

Also in 1980 Olympic amalgamated with St. George Juniors and became Olym-

pic United Soccer Club and then proceeded with the move to Goodwin Park.

Olympic United's highlight in 1983 was to win the Grand Final at Perry Park beating Lions 3-2.

Since 1983 Olympic United have placed a great deal of emphasis on improving their facilities and fostering Junior Divisions.

Today they have Seven (7) junior teams from Under-7's to Colts, 4 teams in the Fourex League plus 1 women's team in 3rd Division.

After Olympics heavy expenditure on ground improvements, including a new additional grandstand, Goodwin Park is shaping up as one of Brisbanes best surfaces.

Plans are underway for ground light-

ing for night matches, plus clubhouse improvements and extensions.

Part of Olympics plans are to promote Junior coaching, the breeding ground for their future seniors.

They are fortunate in securing several sponsorships, their major sponsor being The Greek Community Centre.

It is also pleasing to see a number of founding members still actively involved in the clubs administration.

These include John and George Polichronis, Michael Tsangaris presently overseas, Mick Savvakis and Terry Stamation and Leo Tsimbikas.






One of the early squads of Olympic Soccer Club 1967 –68 Five of this squad are still serving on Soccer Committees.

This is just one idea and I am sure if the right people get together, we will come up with a few more ideas.



REFEREEING INTO THE 90's -

ADVANTAGE CLAUSE of Law 5 Part 1

The advantage clause of Law 5 has been described as setting aside the letter of the law to apply the spirit of the game.

In addition to the examples quoted in chapter 2 there are others which relate to the taking of penalty kicks.

Law 14, Decisions 3 (a), (b) and (c), allows the referee to ignore infringements by the goalkeeper (not being on the goal-line or moving his feet), or by another defender (encroachment), to avoid delaying the penalty kick and/or distracting the kicker. Similarly, an infringement by an attacker (encroachment) may be ignored (decision 4 (b)). The result of the kick determines the action which will be taken. The principle that offenders will not be allowed to profit by their offenses is clear. The spirit overrides the written word.

Law 5 (c) permits the referee to add 'time lost through accident or other cause'. One recognised cause is an attempt to waste time. The spirit of the law allows discretion in the calculation of time played so that time-wasting tactics are unsuccessful.

A defender may attempt to save a goal by handling the ball before it enters the goal. The handling offence occurred before the ball crossed the goal-line. Technically, Law 12 requires the award of a penalty kick but penalty kicks do not always result in goals. If the referee awards a penalty kick and it fails the offending team will have gained an unfair advantage. Therefore the correct award, applying the advantage clause, is a goal.




Fig. 1 Applying the advantage rule in a situation when a goal might be scored.

The foregoing examples illustrate clearly the practical application of the spirit of the game. During the run of play the task is more difficult. The classic example of the attacker regaining his balance after being tripped by a defender and having an excellent chance of scoring a goal is illustrated in figure 1. To stop play for the free kick or penalty kick would almost certainly be to the disadvantage of the offended team.

There are other situations which can cause much discussion among officials as to the right course of action. Basic questions on the use of advantage include the following:

- 1. Is advantage influenced by the timing of play?
- 2. Is advantage influenced by the position of the incident?

- 3. Does retention of the ball necessarily just ify advantage?
- 4. When should advantage always be
- applied?5. When should advantage never be applied?

Part 2 of Advantage continues next week with more questions and answers to serve as a summary of opinion of the Advantage Clause.





PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT



THROW-HEAD GAME

This week we look at the "Throw -Head Game".

This game is not "Throw-Head, Catch". It resembles netball except that the end product is a goal from a header.



PREPARATION:

Mark off a large area with cones and divide it into quarters with discs and one or two additional cones to help players keep their bearings.

Divide players into two equal teams. The goal is the whole width of the opponent's end of the pitch to a height to be decided by the

PROCEDURE:

The ball is thrown from player to player until an opening arises for a header at goal.

The reason for the playing area being quartered is that no player may score a goal from a pass received in that same quarter.

However, players may move freely from area to area.

NOTES:

1) The rule about not being allowed to score from a pass received from the same quarter means that headers come from a realistic angle - as from a cross or a corner or from a diagonally behind as from an early cross. Passes may also come from directly behind to flick on and occasionally from in front as in the case of a half clearance.

2) The coach must be awake to the fact that the game can become pure netball with a header coming only every five minutes. This game is all about heading goals, so constantly remind the players of the fact. Play short games to the best of five goals rather than imposing a time limit where players tend to forget the main object of the game.

3) The fact that interceptions are made with the hands minimises the danger of clashing heads as often happens in "throw, head,

4) Do not allow challengers to touch the player with the ball but encourage interceptions.

VARIATIONS:

1) If the game become frenzied with 20 passes to every one header, players stop thinking about finding gaps. Restrict them to three passes before a header is attempted.

2) Crowding may occur, ruining the object of the game. Try a zone-game, restricting players to one half or even a quarter of the playing area.

3) If a zone system is being used change attackers and defenders now and again.

"The Russians are coming" is a cry which should send Queenslanders running, not for their beds, but to their local Soccer club to see a true coaching maestro in action.

Noted Russian Coach YURI GURI is due to arrive in Queensland for a series of coaching

Having spent the past five years coaching the very successful Siberia Dynamos (motto—"we never let a player go"), Yuri has expressed his pleasure at being invited to the Sunshine State under the QSF's "International Visitors" program which has already seen Charlton Athletic and New South Wales being invited here.

Watchers of International soccer believe Yuri's coaching methods will revolutionise Soccer in this State.

Interpreters at Perry Park are busy translating The Guri Handbook of Coaching which can be found on every frozen players' bench from Siberia to Outer Mongolia.

Some of the innovative coaching methods detailed in the book are set out below.


Yuri has asked for a session with the Queensland team as he says the colour of their playing shirts will make him feel at home.


His coaching camps will be conducted behind barbed wire fences.
