EDITORIAL:

The acceptance of the Bradley Report by the Australian Soccer Federation Executive last Saturday was a landmark decision for the sport in this country.

The ASF is back in charge of its own destiny, a destiny which should see soccer re-emerge as a sport to be reckoned with.

At last it is no longer a case of the National Soccer League attempting to control soccer in this country.

They are now just part of the development plans for the future of soccer in Australia.

Kickoff

Under the changes recommended in the Bradley Report, the "new-look" National Soccer League, due to kickoff in 1991, is shaping up to be a great concept and one which will surely benefit the sport.

The competition will retain its popular summer timeslot, its extremely competitive nature and growing public appeal.

But it will also become a "truly" national competition with the inclusion of permanent teams from Queensland, Western Australia and possibly Tasmania.

Up to now the tail has been wagging the dog, but at last the ASF has some teeth to control national soccer development.

This is what the head body of any sport should be in a position to do when the need arises. Now all we need is an interstate competition for the winter season to provide a tougher competition for our players.

Any such moves would also give the Australian Coach and team selector the opportunity to view players under pressure conditions year round.

The result would mean that Eddie Thompson could in fact pick an A and B Australian teams.

The A team would be the full time Socceroos competing in overseas and World Cup campaigns while also playing visiting international teams on home soil.

Australia's B team could be utilised to compete against visiting teams in the absence of the Socceroos.

This would give Australia a far greater depth of players with international experience, thereby ensuing the future of the code in this country.

This will also provide the Australian soccer public with the opportunity to watch international football in all capital cities.

The introduction of an interstate series, plus yearly international visits, will give the ASF the opportunity of cashing in on the big sponsorship dollars which are badly needed for the sport's national survival.

A donation comprising two sets of shirts and three balls were the humble beginnings of one of the surprise clubs of the 1990 Division Two season – St. Albans.

Currently in 4th place, the Saints have proven

they are a force to be reckoned with.

The strength of the club is epitomised by its strong representation in the Toowoomba side which played recently in the IEA Inter-city series.

A total of nine players made the side which unfortunately met their Waterloo against the Brisbane and Ipswich sides.

The Saints have one of the strongest junior bases in the seven-team Toowoomba competition with 17 sides ranging from Under-7's to the combined Under-15/16.

When juniors in Toowoomba wish to play the senior game St. Albans provides an environment

of high standards.

As well as their QSF sides, they also have a senior side in the local XXXX League and a Ladies' side which is the most successful side the club has placed on the paddock.

The depth within the club extends to the local competitions where Greg Inwood and Jenny Green were voted 1989 Best and Fairest players

in their respective divisions.

Several Saints Ladies have donned the Maroon jersey including Sue Bubeck and Jenny Green while Anne-Louise Edwards has gone one step further by representing an Australian Under-16 side.

Ann-Louise gained more representative honours recently with her selection in the Queensland Under 19.

As one of the few clubs in Queensland who actually own their ground, the Saints are in a strong position to enter the SEQ League, as the representative club from the Garden City, should it eventuate.

An amalgamation in September, 1963 between the Church of England Boys Soccer Club (also called St. Albans) and the Newtown Na-

tional Fitness Club enabled the formation of what is now St. Albans Sports Club.

The club entered three junior sides in the Toowoomba league in the following year.

The major step of entering the senior ranks occurred in 1967 when the Saints played in TDSF Division Two.

Their first season of senior soccer was not filled with champagne corks flying around the dressing room.

Their maiden game with its 16-0 scoreline was a tough initiation to the top level, however the scores were reduced by the conclusion of the season to 3-0 deficits.

The 68/69 season saw the Saints taste their first success with promotion to the first division and also runners—up in the Consolation Cup.

Nearing the end of 1969 a proposal to join the Queensland Soccer Federation was met with great interest and culminated in the club fielding a 6th Division B side.

After winning this competition, they continued scaling divisions with consecutive premiership wins in 1971, 1972, and 1973.

Because of a major reshuffle in 1974, St. Albans were placed in 3rd Division Amateur where they remained until relegation in 1981.

An immediate return kept them in 3rd Division until the club's historic trek to Perry Park as 3rd Division Minor Premiers last year.

They may have lost the final to Goodna 1-0, but their first trip to soccer headquarters was a memorable moment for many of the participants.

As well as soccer St. Albans also dabbled in baseball during the 1983 summer.

Comprised of soccer players, the Saints team took out the 4AK Shield as winners in their first and only year of competition.

Most of the club's success can be attributed to the behind-the-scenes work by many dedicated people, however special mention must go to Club Secretary Stan Maker who has served the Saints since their inception.

Before moving to the present complex on Rutheven St. South in 1974, St. Albans played at a variety of grounds including Queens Park, Bridge Street and Newtown Park.

While the club may not be a household name yet, the potential present at the club may threaten the best in the state.

With the recent acquisition of Peter Kelly as the Downs Regional Director of Coaching, Saints have an even stronger chance of developing a better skilled breed of juniors.

The club also has several players who have served the club more than twenty years.

Greg Inwood and recently-departed John Robinson have stayed loyal since their junior days while Jenny Green has been with the ladies side since it was formed.

Amazingly, the average age of the top side is around 21 with only two players over the age of 25.

Up and coming players including former Australian Schoolboys goalkeeper Jeff Philp, Anthony Brown, Ken Duncan, Warren Allen, Brendan Coonan, Anthony Cotton, and Steve Willmot ensure the strength will stay for years to come.

So when the Saints Go Marching In, beware.



Keeper, Jackie Wortley had a great game saving an Easts penalty and a series of other shots.

This week sees women's soccer holding it's Player of the Year awards night.

These awards have been running for about six years and are the occasion for personal rewards for players rather than team awards which occur on Presentation Night.

First Division Coaches are asked to nominate 12 persons, excluding their own players, to form their ideal team.

Secondly each team has a ballot to select their player's player from their team.

A panel from the Executive awards points from one to three for contribution to the game and finally club coaches are contacted for points for attitude, again from one to three.

Following these procedures, 12 nominees are named and from these, the 1990 Player of the Year will be announced.

Second through to Fifth Divisions are also involved with coaches being asked throughout the fixtures to name the most consistent player in the opposing team during each match.

Two nominees from each division are named and one of these is chosen as most consistent player of that division.

There will be many contenders for the Player of the Year award, including some past and present members of the Queensland and Australian Teams as well as newcomers to Brisbane's First Division ranks.


In my view everyone is looking to point the finger and nobody

While this method obviously suits the indoor game, I don't think it could or should ever be looked at for the outdoor game, although some people around would probably like to see those sorts of rules introduced.





90's REFEREEING

ADVANTAGE CLAUSE of Law 5 by Stanley Lover

These questions have been put before groups of referees of various grades and in several coun-

A summary of opinion, which can serve as a policy outline, is given below:

Question 1:

Is advantage influenced by the timing of play?

Opinion:

Yes. A general policy adopted in practice is to resist applying advantage in the early stages of a match in order to establish authority and control.

Question 2:

Is advantage influenced by the position of the

Opinion:

Yes. The nearer to goal the more effective advantage becomes. It is generally accepted that advantage is inadvisable when the ball is in the half of the offended team or ln mid-field.

Question 3: Does retention of the ball necessarily justify advantage?

Opinion:

No. An example quoted is where the ball is handled in the penalty area and falls to an at-tacker. Unless there is a ninety-nine per cent chance of a goal retention does not justify a playon call.

Question 4:

When should advantage always be applied? Opinion:

When a goal is almost certain to result. **Ouestion 5:**

When should advantage never be applied?

Opinion:

In cases of serious injury, serious foul play or violent conduct. Advantage is frequently applied at dead-ball situations, for example, to allow free kicks, corner kicks and goal kicks to be taken quickly before the whistle has been blown and before defending players have retired at least ten yards from the ball. The opinion expressed in response to Question 1 reveals that observance of the spirit of the law is not the only consideration. Its application in the early stages or, as some referees reason, at any time during a tough game, can undermine authority and control.

Advantage situations vary from the obvious examples already quoted to others of a minor nature, which occur when it is in the interests of the game to keep the play flowing; here we revert to the appeal of Law 5, Decision 8, not to interfere by stopping play for trifling and doubtful of-

Applying advantage in minor situations must be related to the degree of co-operation and general sportsmanship of the players. It should always be applied where control has been established and the referee has good co-operation.

If he senses that his control is suffering his advantage calls can be limited to the more obvious situations.

Time and space are important factors. If play is open there is more time to assess the impact of stopping the game.

When several opposing players are close to the ball it is generally better to stop the game

The merits of this policy are that friction between the players is likely to be less and the possible advantage situation will not be so appar-

Communication of advantage is also important. Players and spectators should be left in no doubt that an offence has been seen but that play is being allowed to continue.

Once given an advantage decision cannot be revoked, as spelt out in Law 5, Decision 7.

Every referee experiences situations where an offence occurs and advantage is called but the player with the ball kicks it past the goal or falls a few paces later.

The temptation to return to the scene of the offence and award a free kick or penalty kick is sometimes difficult to resist because justice has not been achieved.

The referee is not allowed this option.

Two final points. The first is that the application of advantage does not exempt the offending player from disciplinary action.

The second is that "the letter and spirit of Law 12 do not oblige the referee to stop the game to administer a caution. He may, if he chooses, apply the advantage.

If he does apply the advantage, he shall caution the player when play stops." (Law 12, Deci-

sion 6).

The why, when, where and how of advantage can only be described here in terms of guidance. Every situation will need to be read as it

How the individual referee arrives at his decision will depend on his fundamental appreciation of the spirit of the game and his knowledge of other factors of the game.







PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT



Heading is one of the two major skills which has not appeared before. This is not because it is not important, but because a large percentage of being a good header of the ball is psychological.

Many players, particularly the young, are put off by a collision of heads which can be very painful.

Much of this can be put down to lack of care during training. Free-for-all games throw in the brave, powerful headers with the timid types with the result that the latter end up never competing for the ball in the air.

Bad training habits lead to bad playing habits, therefore when practising heading it is advisable to bear all this in mind. Use games which give the less able the chance to perform under minimal pressure.

This will not harm the aerial stars as they will continue to produce the goods on the day.


HEADING DRILL

This drill is set up in exactly the same way as basic passing drill which has already been covered.

In fact to economise on organisation it can immediately follow the passing drill.

PREPARATION

Divide the players into two teams facing each other about 20 meters apart. One ball only is needed, but have more nearby.



PROCEDURE

The first player in Team A throws the ball high in the air for the first player in Team B to run and head back towards Team A. The drill continues in this sequence, Team A serving, Team B heading.

We are looking for two types of header. 1) Attacking - the header is aimed down towards the floor as if to head for goal and 2) Defensive - the header is aimed upwards, back over the head of the server as they move forward.

1) The quality of serving is vital or the practice is ruined. Make sure that the "bucket" type of service is used - both hands on the ball about knee height and tossed high in the air so that the receiver can move forward to contact it. Ensure that the ball is

served as high as possible to give the receiver time to make a run and jump high to make contact.

2) Make sure the players attack the ball as they head it. To do this means carrying out a movement similar to a high jump. Run towards the ball, jump off one foot and move through the ball to head it. Too many players wait for the ball to come to them and jump upright off both feet with the result that there is little power or control in the header.

3) Eyes must be firmly on the ball and contact made with the forehead. In addition to the run, power comes from the waist not from the neck or simply flicking your head at the ball. At the point of contact, the neck should be braced not used to waggle the head.

4) Keep a careful check that a full distance is kept between the teams or the practice will be spoilt.

VARIATIONS

1) When the practice is working smoothly call out attack or defend as the ball is served with the receiving player adjusting accordingly.

2) Occasionally it may help to start this drill with everyone catching the ball instead of just heading for a short while. It helps players to get their timing correct from the start.

The Chairman was empowered to take all necessary steps to assist with such registration and/or contract to keep these players in Queens-land


Ampol State Cup


Resolved to proceed with the Secondary School State Final in the National Common-
