

The Queensland Soccer Federation through its support of the Quit the Habit campaign has been without a sponsor for this prestigious event for the last 12 months.

Rochedale Rovers Soccer Club was founded in 1973, however it was back in 1972 that an Irishman named Tom Vance began teaching the gentle art and skills of Soccer to the children at the Rochedale School Sports field.

He had a discussion with the parents of these children regarding the formation of a Soccer Club and subsequently a notice was inserted in the local newspaper on November 23, 1972.

ALBERT NEWS – NOVEMBER 23, 1972 Tom Vance of 17 Delsia Street, Rochedale is anxious to form a junior soccer club in the Rochedale area.

Any persons interested in assisting can do so by contacting him at the above address or by ringing him at Brisbane 99–2122 during office hours.

On February 25, 1973 a public meeting was held and Rochedale Rovers Soccer Club was duly formed.

The club strip was determined as Gold shirt, dark green shorts and dark green socks. In 1977 the socks were changed to gold.

The Glen Hotel donated the use of a cow paddock, complete with cows behind the hotel for Rochedale's use.

The clubs first season commenced with three teams, Under-7's, Under-9's and Under-10's

The 1974 season fielded 10 junior teams, with a tent being pitched each game to use as our canteen.

ROCHEDALE ROVER Soccer Club

By 1975 Rochedale Rovers boasted eighteen junior teams and two Senior teams.

In 1975 our club purchased a parcel of land from the Local Council, at Underwood Park and earth works commenced for the existing four fields

In 1976 we fielded 27 teams and our Seventh Division senior side was promoted to Sixth Division.

The Underwood Park grounds were officially opened on March 5, 1977 with a game between then National League teams Brisbane Lions and Brisbane City. On September 3, 1983 QSF president Ian Bruscasco officially opened Rochedale Rovers Clubhouse.

Rochedale Rovers Soccer Club won promotion into the XXXX League in 1987 and today we field five teams in this league from 1st Division to 8th Division.

In 1989 the XXXX Colts presented the club with their first Grand Final win.

Vic Phillips the first Club Secretary is still serving the club as Club Delegate to the QSF whilst Steve and Gary Elwood, Ian and Paul Grocott and John Hansen, who started on our original Under-7 team, are still playing Seniors today.



Steve Visser, who recently was promoted to the XXXX First Team also began playing in the Under-8 team in 1978.

Since 1974 the Junior teams have really grown with the growth of the area.

In 1990 we fielded 28 Junior Teams from under-6's to Junior Colts.

Up and coming juniors including Wayne Murray, Shannon Scott, Steve Maher (Under 16 Rep players for Qld) will ensure the strength will stay for years to come.

Rochedale Rovers Soccer club are proud to boast one of the best, if not the best, facilities in Queensland Soccer.

The committee along with future committees have the commitment to continue to further the aims of the first committee of Rochedale Rovers "To Foster Soccer in Rochedale and Surrounding Areas".























FRANKLY SPEAKING with Frank Liddell

I read with interest about the inquiry from Melbourne National Soccer League Club Sunshine George Cross to buy young Pine Rivers striker Clayton Koch.

I'm sure the step up to National League is the right one for Clayton as it would certainly improve his soccer.

However having said that, it would not be a wise move for him to go to Sunshine.

They are one of the struggling sides in the National Soccer League and always will be because they are not a settled club and are always changing coaches or committees when things go wrong.

I am told Sunshine George Cross offered \$3000 for Clayton which was an insult not only to the player but to the Pine Rivers club.

Especially when Rivers have nurtured players like Koch through

from junior level.

If I was Clayton and Pine Rivers were willing to let me go to National League I would be making a few enquiries with other clubs before I committed myself to a club like Sunshine George Cross.

There was an article in the Sunday Mail recently when a well-known soccer reporter talked about transfer fees.

He congratulated Pine Rivers for agreeing to sell Clayton Koch to a club like Sunshine Gorge Cross for less than \$10000 and then went onto say the same club would not let him return to Brisbane for less than \$50,000 unless there was a maximum in his contract.

The only thing I agree with is that transfer fees should be at a reasonable level.

But why should we in Brisbane be the first to drop our prices to suit National League Clubs.

Last season in Sydney there were players not as good as Koch who were being sold for anything up to \$50,000.

Is it because we believe we are second class citizens wanting to be sold off cheaply to Sydney and Melbourne clubs?

Nick Meredith is lucky to have a maximum of \$11,000 in his contract, because Marconi are interested in him for this coming season

Marconi would be laughing all the way to the bank to get a player of his calibre for that price.


Maybe it's about time some members of the Brisbane media stopped underestimating the ability of our players and their value.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

with DES MILES

OFF SIDE

Part 1

The purpose of the off-side law is discussed in chapter 2. Its interpretation requires special study because it is the only law which is concerned with the tactical formation of players when the ball is in play.

For easy reference the terms of Law 11 are quoted below in full, together with the sole International Board decision relating to this law:

Law 11 - Offside:

A player is off-side if he is nearer his opponents' goal-line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless-

- (a) he is in his own half of the field of play
- (b) there are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal-line than he is.
- (c) he receives the ball direct from a goal kick, a corner kick, a throw-in, or when it was dropped by the referee.

Punishment:

For an infringement of this law, an indirect free shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred

A player in an off-side position shall not be penalized unless, in the opinion of the referee, he is interfering with the play or with an opponent, or is seeking to gain an advantage by being in an off-side position.

International Board Decision (1956):

1) Off-side shall not be judged at the moment the player in question receives the ball, but at the moment when the ball is passed to him by one of his own side.

A player in an off-side position when one of his colleagues passes the ball to him or takes a free kick does not therefore become off-side if he goes forward during the flight of the ball. The basic questions are simple:

1) Fact Is the player in an off-side position at the moment the ball is played by a colleague? (Only if he is, do the next questions arise.)

2) Opinion Does his position influence the play or an opponent? or Is he intending to gain an advantage?

There are five features of this law which should be studied:

1) Timing:

Question: When does the judgement of fact

Answer: At the moment the ball is played by a colleague.

2) Position:

Question: What is an off-side position?

Answer: The player must be in front of the

ball in his opponents' half with one or no opponent between himself and the goal-line.

3) Interfering:

Question: How can interfering be judged? Answer: The International Board decided in 1924 that if a player who is in an off-side position advances towards an opponent or the ball and, in so doing, causes the play to be affected, he should be penalized.

4) Seeking advantage:

Question: How does the referee judge seeking to gain an advantage?

Answer: By the same reasoning as applies to judgement of intention to commit an infringement.

5) Exceptions:

Question: If a player is in an off-side position, when should he not be penalized, even though he is interfering or seeking an advantage?

Answer: When he receives the ball direct from a goal kick or a corner kick or a throwin or when the ball is dropped by the referee.

When the team took to the park they played skillful and very entertaining football which kept


the spectators enthralled. The only thing that dampened the championships was a deluge of rain on the Sunday night.





PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

This week we look at the "HEAD TENNIS GAME".

PREPARATION

Divide the players (any reasonable number) into two equal teams. Mark out a court of appropriate size with cones and discs. Divide each half of the court into two halves and each team into two halves. Make a narrow "no-go" area in the middle instead of a net.

PROCEDURE


This game is similar to Tennis. Points are scored when the ball bounces twice in an opponents' half or when an opponent returns the ball out of court. The main difference of course is that feet and heads are used instead of racquets.

The ball may be kept in the air any number of times with head or foot by any number of players on their own side of the net (but may

only touch the floor once). It may however only be headed into the opponents' half.

NOTES

1) This game often takes time to warm up



as the skill involved and the amount of movement required take a while to sink in so be patient and encourage.

2) The coach needs to be very mobile as this is one of those games which tend to bring out the worst in players' temperaments. Watch particularly the "net" area as there is no limit on height. The idea of this is to produce a variety of headers including dives. This game gives the coach another good chance to stamp some authority on the squad.

3) The game is enjoyable in itself but the coach should look for opportunities to show the players how to set up scoring situations. The way in which a "spike" is set up in Volleyball is very similar to the cross and header in

4) Each phase of the game is started by a player throwing the ball up and heading it from the half-way line.

VARIATIONS

1) Apart from normal scoring, count an extra point if the ball is headed from the back half of one court directly into the back half of the other. The point counts when the ball crosses the plane of the line but the game continues. This added incentive ensures that all players are involved, not just the front

It also makes front players work hard to intercept the ball in this situation. There is no penalty for playing the ball from one half to the other in one's own court.

2) Number the players and move them one at a time from front court to back court each time a point is scored. This ensures that they all get an equal share of the action all round the court.

3) Condition the game so that there are a limited number of touches before the ball must be played back into the opponents' court.

QUEENSLAND Vs INDIA

By ALAN FOUCHE, former Queensland soccer writer. What is the most remarkable soccer match to have taken place in

No doubt there are many candidates for this honour, but few can match the amazing clash between India and Queensland, played under floodlight at the Exhibition Ground in September 1938.

To start with, only five of the visitors wore boots – the remainder played in bare feet, with their legs covered in cutaway football socks.

The result was that the Queenslanders, accustomed to using studs on their boots, had to make a hasty substitution and switch to leather bars to reduce the

risk of injury to their opponents.

From the kick-off, however, the "barefoot wizards" were quick to show that sympathy was the last thing they wanted or expected from the 5,000 crowd who produced gate receipts of about 250 pounds.

Within 12 minutes, Queensland found themselves floundering with a

four-goal deficit, prompting the Courier Mail to report next morning: "For sheer trickiness and masterly control of the ball, not better display has been seen from international teams than that provided by the barefooted Rahim, Noor Mohammed, Nandi and Sen, whose agility and remarkable speed completely bewildered the Queensland defence."

Although Queensland managed to pull back a goal, and the Indians suffered the loss of their captain Battacharjee through injury, the match seemed as good as over with a half-time score of 5-1.

Queensland were also handicapped by the absence through an ankle injury of international Lex Gibb, one of the most illustrious members of the renowned Gibb family from Ipswich.

Against their bootless opponents, a further problem for the Queenslanders, lamented the Courier reporter, was an inability to use robust tactics to win

possession of the ball.

Nevertheless, a sensational fight-back after half-time conjured up visions of a remarkable victory as Queensland slammed home a series of goals in quick succession to bring the score from 6-1 to 6-5 with 15 minutes left to

In a stirring finish, each side scored once more to end a 13-goal scoring bonanza which finished with the startling scoreline of 7-6 to the Indians. Four goals for Queensland centre-forward C. Brittain showed why he had

been selected a few days previously to represent Australia against the tourists, while R. Kitching, another Australian representative that season, was also on the scoresheet. In those days of what would now be regarded as tactical naivety, goals flowed plentifully throughout the Indians' 16-match tour, producing 119 in all.

Apart from the encounter with Queensland, three other games were played in the State, producing scores of 4-4 against Australia, with an official attendance of 10,412 at the Exhibition Ground, 6-2 against Ipswich, and 6-

2 against a Queensland XI at Toowoomba.

But few matches could ever have combined the drama produced by half a dozen barefoot players, an explosive four-goal start and a spectacular come-back which led in the end to 13 goals and a cliffhanger finish.

Another point of interest was that the match was refereed by long-time

Queensland soccer stalwart Jimmy Perotte, who had himself represented the

INTO THE NET

HOW TO DROP THE DRAWS

Those of you who missed a recent article in THE TIMES newspaper may find very interesting some thought-provoking ideas put forward by readers in Letters to the Editor on how to do away with draws in matches. Most popular idea was the idea of both teams losing one player (or more) in extra time, some stipulating that goal-keepers should go.

And here are some other interesting facts.


XXXX Third Grade club Coalstars could lose all their remaining games and still take out the premiership.
