verware while Easts will be anxious to add something new to its trophy cabinet.

The Wynnum District Soccer Club was formed in 1921 and played its matches at Memorial Park in Wynnum, now the club's junior headquarters.

The club competed successfully in senior competitions winning the Tedman Cup in 1928, 1931 and 1938.

Through the tireless efforts of men such as the late Jock Hannah, soccer was introduced to state schools in the area, where its popularity began to grow, resulting in the formation of the club's juniors.

War Time

The club went into recess during the war and was reformed following its conclusion. Soccer continued to blossom in a league dominated area and by the mid sixties the club boasted 2 senior teams and 24 junior teams.

It was at this time that long serving president Ray Garner sought to acquire a piece of land on which to establish the club's senior headquarters.

With a bank loan of 300 Pounds, Garner was able to buy a piece of land from the Wynnum Pony Club in 1965.

Two years of back breaking work by a dedicated band of players and supporters followed, to carve out and lay what is now one of the best playing surfaces in Brisbane, Maramba Stadium

Two members of the present day committee, Eddie Wilkins and Ray Maltby were part of the work force that saw the opening of Maramba by the Governor of Queensland, Sir Alan Mansfield, in 1967.

Playing success for the seniors followed quickly after the move to Maramba, with the club winning the second division premiership and Grand Final in 1968.

This resulted in promotion to division one

in 1969, but life at the top was all too brief and lasted but a season.

And so began a roller coaster ride for the club throughout the seventies and eighties which has seen the club promoted on numerous occasions, only to fail to establish itself in the top arena of soccer.

The club was promoted to division one football in 1970, 1972, 1976 and 1978 after successful seasons in division two, but also took the plunge back on three occasions in the seventies

1978 will always be remembered as one of the club's most successful seasons.

The club won the second division premiership by ten points and after defeating Brisbane City, Grange Thistle and Ipswich United made their first appearance in an Ampol Cup Final.

Unfortunately they were beaten 3-2 by the all conquering Southside Eagles in a memorable final, after being forced to play in a semi-final and semi-final replay in the same week as the final.

Premiership Win

The club was successful in winning the first division premiership in 1979 but this achievement was robbed of some of its gloss by the absence of Brisbane's top 5 clubs who were participating in the inaugural season of the State League.

Wynnum applied for, and were accepted

into the State League, in 1981. The club held its own on the playing field but the move was a financial disaster and the club was quick to join the exodus of Brisbane clubs from the league in 1982.

Teams make Grand Final

Another successful season followed in 1983 with all four senior teams making the Grand Final, three of them being winners.

Promotion to the Premier League followed. Relegation following just as quickly.

Wynnum made a mockery of the 1985 Intermediate League, winning by an amazing 10 points, but again relegation haunted in 1986

And there the roller coaster ride was stopped. Wynnum failed by a point to win promotion in 1987 although it was successful in defeating Croatia in a Grand Final replay.

First division clubs swooped on its rising young stars including Wayne Corbett, Billy McDermott, Dave Mewburn and Geoff Maltby and the club has been forced to consolidate its financial and playing strength in division two.

With an eye to future, the club is currently investigating a number of options including a possible amalgamation with neighbours Bayside.

A relocation to a nearby venue with 22 acres available for development is also not out of the question as the club strives for a permanent place in division one.



Lions have been knocked over the last few weeks about their inability to convert scoring chances, but I think the playoffs will be a different kettle of fish.


The last thing we want is for this bid for National League status to fail even though Bradley's report says a Queensland team will be inducted into the NSL in the summer of 1991.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's

- with DES MILES

OFF SIDE by Stanley Lover Part 2

For referees the starting point for the judgement of off-side is not the moment when he stops the game.

There are other factors which must be assessed before he makes a final decision.

The referee (and linesman) must freeze in his mind a picture of the disposition of attack-

off-side you have no right to impede an opponent nor to station yourself so near to the goalkeeper as to hamper his movements".

In 1922 this advice was repeated with a few words of additional clarification. After "goalkeeper" came: "or any other opponent as to hamper his movements or obstruct his sight of the ball".

From these early words of guidance and the 1924 definition it is clear that "interfering"

7 is standing in an off-side position on the right wing. Colleague 11 is on-side on the left wing. Consider three possibilities:

A) The ball is kicked slowly towards the near group of players. Attacker 7 in not penalized because he will not be involved in the next zone of play.

B) The ball is kicked quickly towards onside attacker 11. The next zone will not involve 7 and he is not penalized.

U12, U13 age groups. Possibly school work, other interests or not showing out to be as good a player as expected, could be the major comments from this information.

Cairns and District are looking into the problem this year and a number of policies were adapted from earlier meetings.

One major change was the introduction of the run on and run off rule for weekly club games.

This means that each team can run on reserve players and continually swapping their players around throughout the whole of the game and players that had come off could go back on.

The biggest advantage to this run on, run off basis is players of lesser ability get a reasonable run, depending on the state of the game, taking a certain amount of worry off the coach.





The other change this year was an agreement on a number of older players playing down a division after suitable sighting of the individual player by referees and committee members.

Our Grading has also changed in a manner that we have U7, U8, U9, U10 thence U12 A & B divisions, U14 A & B divisions, Colts division.

This enables teams of outstanding ability to play in the A division and vice versa for lesser teams of ability.

We still have further work to do on this problem but I believe flexibility is a key issue when working out the grading. John Spilstead.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

BRUCE STOWELL



THE CROSSING/HEADING GAME

This game simulates match conditions more than the other practices in this section because there are opportunities for heading for goal and for defensive heading.

Although heading is the priority skill, other related skills like chipping and crossing are important and the goalkeepers have the chance of a good

PREPARATION


Mark the playing area out in quarters with discs and cones. The area should be wider than it is long. Use cones to make a goal in each quarter. Pick two teams and split them up so that each team has three attackers in the attacking zones and one in the defending zones plus goalkeepers.

PROCEDURE

As its name implies, the object of this game is to get the ball into a position where a cross can be made for a header at goal. When goalkeepers get possession of the ball, they may throw or kick it (depending on the size of the playing area) for a similar attempt at goal.

NOTES

1) Goals may only be scored by headers from



balls played from other zones. Players are not allowed to score from services within their own zone.

2) The three to one situation in the attacking zones means that attackers are able to attempt headers under less pressure than real match conditions. This means better practice from them but the coach must constantly encourage them to move around into realistic positions in relation to the angle of the cross. Otherwise attackers tend to stand around waiting for the ball to come to them instead of being on the move ready to make runs.

3) Although a very useful game it tends to be "bitty" and lacks fluency. However, with patience it can be made very enjoyable. The old favourite "first to five goals is the winner" rarely fails to produce excitement at least.

VARIATIONS

1) The three to one attacking situation has an

obvious safety factor in it but it can be adjusted if you have awkward numbers. Three to one is how ever the best balance.

2) Goalkeepers gain useful practice from this game but if they are not available simply do without them. There is no reason why the size of the goals should be adjusted.

3) Initially, goals are scored from within the attacking zones but there is no reason why defenders should not score from their own zone even though outnumbered. If they are smart enough to spot a chance to head over the top into their opponents' goal they should be allowed the credit for it. At the same time it is good practice in heading from a distance with accuracy.

CHECKLIST

1) Heading normally demands power - this comes from the whole body, not just waggling the head on its stalk. A) use the legs to jump B) Flex the trunk and C) Brace the neck and use the forehead.

2) Remember the sequence: A) run to get into position B) take off one foot C) Meet the ball at its highest point, move through it and D) Make firm

3) Head downwards for goal, upwards for clear-

4) The player who gets off the ground first is usually favourite to win the ball.

South Queensland Soccer League


The Delegate for Nerang referred to the South Queensland League and expressed concern at the time that had been taken during 1990 to finalise a proposal for the 1991 season.


He therefore requested that a motion be placed before the meeting concerning a review of the scheme.
