EDITORIAL:

Congratulations to North Star on their convincing win over Eastern Suburbs at Perry Park last Sunday in the Ampol Cup Final.

North Star's President Dennis Stephenson, when dropping the Ampol Cup back to the QSF prior to the 1990 final, stated "it's only back on loan".

Dennis certainly knew what he was talking about and I suppose when a club has taken out the silverware on four different occasions, they deserve to be confident.

Commiserations must go to the Tigers of East Brisbane. Obviously they are saving up their finest moment in 1990 for September 30.

However a few other teams will have different ideas about that one day in September.

Battle

With two more rounds left to be played the battle for top places on the premiership ladder is still raging.

Brisbane Lions have the number one position tied up with Brisbane City, North Star, Pine Rivers, Easts and Taringa jostling for the next four finals places.

At the other end of the table, Olympic United will play Brisbane Lions and Brisbane City in their final two rounds of the season.

Miracles are still not out of the question for Olympic, but it could be too late for the Yeronga based club.

Current second bottom side Grange Thistle have to face up to North Star at Perry Park on Saturday and then take on Lions in their last match of the season.

Thistle are in a must win situation of desperate proportions if they are to avoid relegation.

Acacia Ridge are also still in danger of being relegated.

They have a tough match this weekend against Coalstars, who have only lost one match in the last eight games.

If Acacia Ridge can succeed against the coalminers they will then face a desperate Mt Gravatt for another do-or-die clash in their final game of the season.

Mt Gravatt, too, will have their honour on the line against Eastern Suburbs this weekend and then Ridge the following week.

Certainly the pressure is on the teams at the top and the bottom of the competition to perform.

This should provide a fireworks end to a great year of soccer and ensure a very competitive finals series.

Lions, who will be backed by the Queensland Soccer Federation, will hand the position over to the proposed Brisbane United initiative if they are successful in the play-off round robin.

The play-offs at the moment looks to be between West Adelaide Hellas and possibly Melbourne Heidelberg.

Meanwhile there has been a lot of speculation about guest players being used in Lion's bid.

However, I cannot see the Australian Soccer Federation changing the rules to accommodate such a move.

But having said that, there seems to have been a bit of rule bending in South Australia.

It seems West Adelaide, who were relegated from the NSL following the completion of the 1989/90 season are being allowed the opportunity to re-enter without missing a season out the league.

The reason for this is the South Australian Federation allowed West Adelaide to catch up on its first four games of the 1990 local competition which began while the NSL was still running.

West Adelaide are now in the same boat as Brisbane Lions having won their respective local competition premierships.

But I don't think West Adelaide should be allowed to compete in the NSL play-offs for a place in the 1990/91 competition.

That's not sour grapes either. They were relegated from the NSL and because of that should miss a season.

No matter what happens hopefully Queensland supporters will get behind Lions with this venture by giving their full support to the bid.

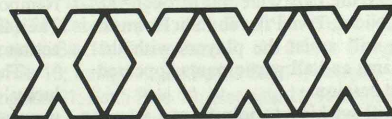
Cup final last weekend at Perry Park.

REFEREEING INTO THE 90's ————— with DES MILES

Just recently there was a meeting between coaches and referees. Foul language was one of the problems that was discussed and all agree that every effort should be made to have it removed from soccer football at all costs.

A player cannot be cautioned for this offence so therefore referees, do your duty and send them off.

Clubs and the players will not like this idea, but the problem must be stamped out and this is the best way to do it.

Also at the same meeting we talked about teaching players the laws of the game.

Perhaps coaches should also take courses in the laws of the game because some of them seem to know little about them.

The following are two examples of laws which have been misunderstood in recent games.

Once the goal keeper has caught the ball in his hands and then puts it on the ground, he cannot again play it with his hands.

This means he cannot pick it up again or pat it along the ground. This is clearly outlined in the law book under Law 12 Par. 5 section A.

Secondly at a recent Ampol Cup game one club refused to take part in a game because there was only one official linesmen.

Let me make this point. The referee's power comes under Law 5 and he makes all the decisions on when and how the game should be conducted once he arrives at the ground.

If he wishes to start the game with neutral or club linesman or none at all, then that is his prerogative.

If one team refuses to take part in the game then he should abandon the game and report it to the competent authority.

LAW AMENDMENTS for Next Season

The International F.A. Board made a number of amendments to the Laws of the Game and the relevant decisions at its meeting in Rome on June 28, 1990.

The board also issued several instructions. In accordance with the Board's Regulations, these will be outlined in the next few issues.

Law IV: Players' Equipment New Text -

(1) (a) The basic compulsory equipment of a player shall consist of a jersey or shirt,

shorts, stockings, shinguards and footwear.

(b) A player shall not wear anything which is dangerous to another player.

(2) Shinguards, which must be covered entirely by the stockings, shall be made of a suitable material (rubber, plastic, polyurethane or similar substance) and shall afford a reasonable degree of protection.

(3) Unaltered
Punishment: Unaltered

Law IV Player's Equipment Decisions of the International F.A. Board.

(1) In international matches, international competitions, international club competitions and friendly matches between clubs of different National Associations, the referee, prior to the start of the game, shall inspect the players' equipment and prevent any player whose equipment does not conform to the requirements of this Law from playing until such time as it does comply.

The rules of any competition may include a similar provision.

As Queensland coordinator I organised the ground and time for the match and a neutral referee ('Bookem' Ben Hutchins) but forgot the linesmen. I persuaded Brad Kelk from the Albany Creek Club to run one line for me and I finished up on the other in my black Commonwealth Bank T-Shirt. It turns out that Brad works for the Commonwealth Bank at Caboolture so his "appointment" was most appropriate.

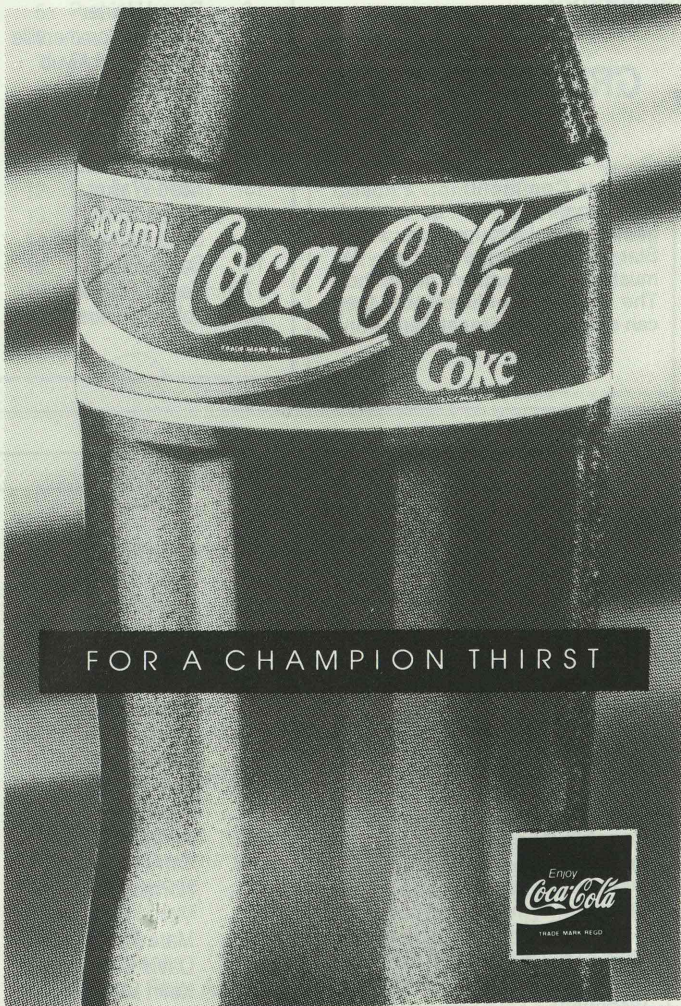

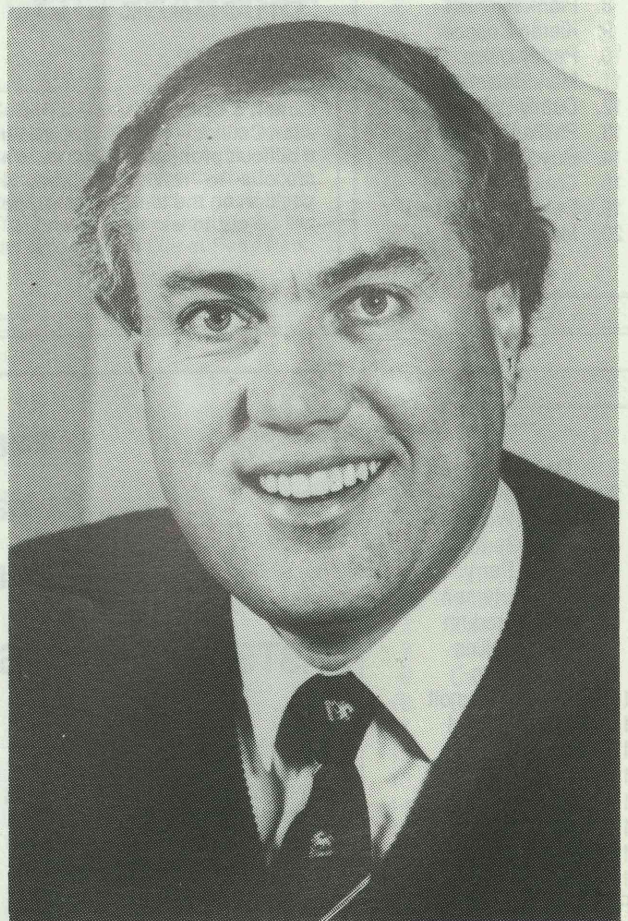

FAR NORTH QUEENSLAND – SENIORS

There has been a flutter of excitement in the Far North with a trip to PNG being offered to the senior representative team.

But like everything concerning the senior representative squad, opinions were polarized.

Many of those I spoke to were vehement in their criticism of, or showed enthusiasm for the proposal.

The trip would have involved the FNQ team travelling to Port Moresby as part of the Independence Day celebrations and playing against the PNG national team, the Indonesian national team and another Port Moresby Select XI.

A problem arose because the proposed dates clashed with the Far Northern finals series, on the same weekend as our preliminary final.

The support for the trip surrounded the FNQ team being opened up to quality opposition.

Most proponents state that any high level contact spirals down and in turn promotes the code at all levels.

Those who were against the PNG fling sounded the same cautious concern as they had against the Ampol Cup involvement.

They didn't believe spending big money (in this case \$5000 and up) on something that is quickly organised and has little return.

Several also question the true obligation of the representative team, saying they believe players treat these as junkets.

There is an obvious payback in this occasion with the PNG team playing a game in the Far North in October on their way to the Melanesian Cup in New Caledonia.

SOCCER

Two teams each made up of eleven players oppose each other on the field, The game demands high levels of skill, players must practise, an excellent game to yield.

The World Cup, the biggest and most important of competitions, every four years is played,

In 1978, representatives of sixteen countries joined in, playing hard to make the grade.

Some players have never made it to the top because of their attitude to the game,

Though they had ability, and keen for themselves to make a name.

The easy part of this International sport, they could accept and enjoy, But not condition themselves to the hard work that provides a background for a young boy.

It is advisable to practise in moderation, gradually increase development of exercises and skill,

Practise one skill before you develop the next, and master it you will.

Feet are important, they are the centre of balance, not just for standing on, Be on your toes in matches, eager to meet the ball, or your chance of success will be gone.

When you are heading, are you striking the ball, or allowing it to hit you, Are you in line with the flight of the ball, so it will follow through.

Take a break when you are reluctant to work, and feel you cannot cope, Think about it, start from the beginning again, never give up hope.

A pass should be struck preferably along the ground, accuracy is easier to attain,

It should be hit ahead of your team mate, from telegraphing your pass, refrain.

Run to the right, pass to the left, passing is only a means to an end,

You should never move your responsibility on to someone else, especially a friend.

The ability to master a pass instantly, in all conditions is called "control of the ball",

This is an important part of the game which should be practised by all.

Great control is a progression of the balance theory, you also need "Touch",

A player must be able to take the ball from any angle, this will help so much.

What type of player are you? Are you strong or do you possess a skill, Think about your opponent, what can he do, can you fool him at will.

How good are you at heading? this skill requires a high degree of concentration,

How good is your right foot, how good is your left foot, can you improve by participation?

What is your favourite position, what difficulties do you encounter there, Would you be suited to another position, do you enjoy the game and play fair.

It is necessary to understand yourself to play soccer to the best of your ability,

Soccer is about character, determination, practise, skill and agility.

Don't think you know it all, listen and heed what your Coach has to say, He is passing his skills on to you, because he listened when he learned to play.

Later in life you will remember the soccer skills he has taught you, As you grow older you will be thankful for the joys, sportsmanship has brought you.

Bill is an excellent coach, he learnt to play fifty years ago and will be seventy this year,

Take an interest in what he is trying to teach you, when the season ends, give him a mighty cheer.

PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

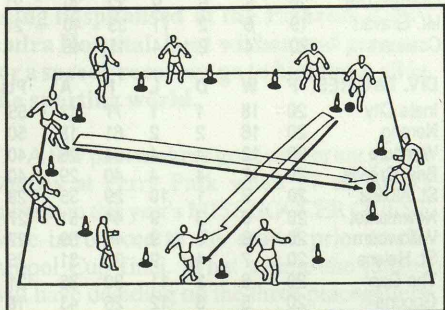

This week we look at PASSING AND RECEIVING.

The circle Drill is another simple passing, moving and receiving practice.



PREPARATION

The drill takes place around the centre-circle or a similar sized circle made with cones.

The players are spaced equally in a ring outside the circle. A number of balls are needed; up to four to start with.

PROCEDURE

A player with a ball looks around to find a player without one, calls the player's name, passes the ball, and runs across the circle to take the place of the receiver.

The receiver in each case controls the ball and continues the sequence.

NOTES

1) One ball to each five players may seem inadequate on the face of it, but after a few minutes of this practice the reason for the ratio will be obvious.

Not until the coach is satisfied that things are running really smoothly should more balls be introduced.

2) This is a good time to re-enforce points about control - control the ball tight but a little in front, not stuck under the feet.

3) Keep a close watch on the size of the circle. Make sure that players keep it as large as possible or the practice will be ruined.

4) This is also a good time to have a look at the strength of a pass - how hard should it be?

The answer is: firm enough to reach the target without being intercepted but not so hard that it can't be controlled or laid off first-time by the receiver.

5) This practice needs a lot of vocal support from the coach. Players tend to relax on the outside of the circle.

Drive them hard and keep them on the move and alert.

VARIATIONS

1) Increase the number of balls.

2) Reduce the number of touches allowed to control. This will put a premium on control and will emphasise the importance of the first touch in terms of setting-up the return pass, not simply stopping the ball.

3) Many errors are likely. This provides an ideal opportunity to punish slack play and lack of thought with penalty runs or exercises.

The coach needs to be wide awake to spot them. In effect this is a very physical practice in which there is little chance to rest.

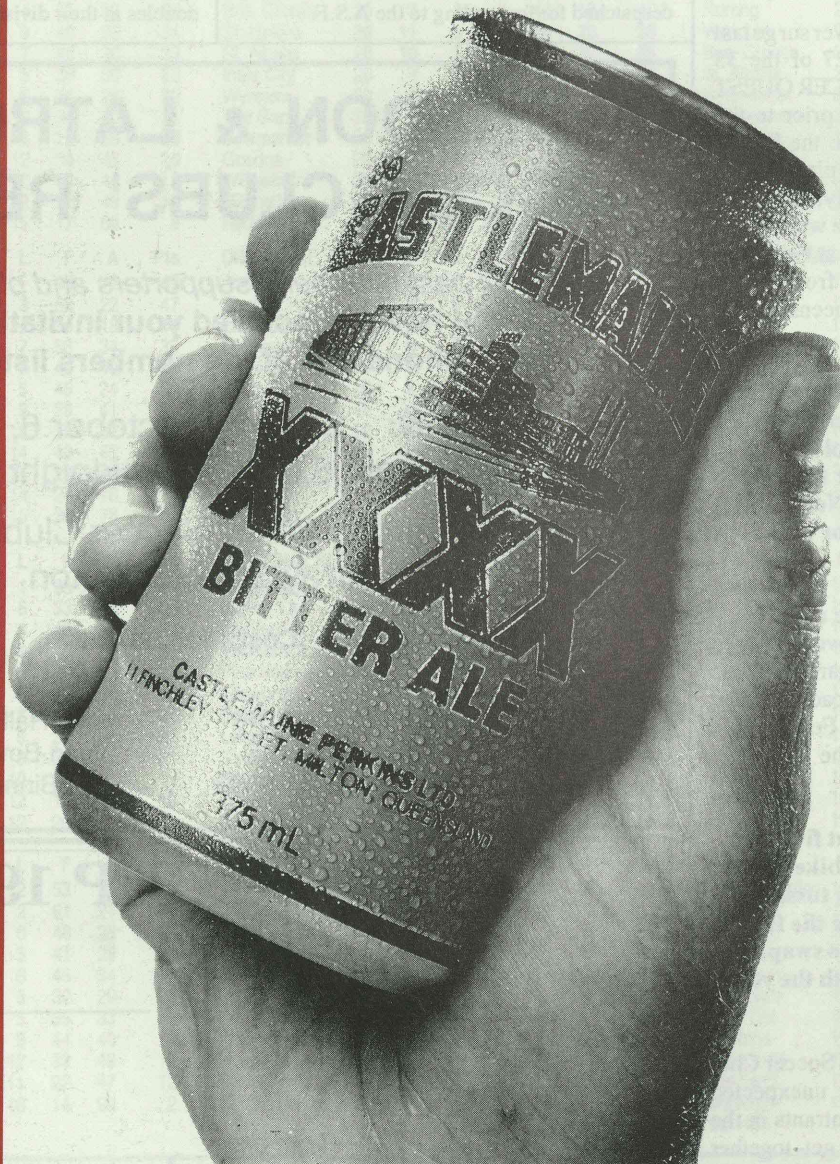
