As women's Soccer begins to wind down in Brisbane, we look forward to 1991 and to the changes we can bring about to improve our Association.

For the past three or four years we have tried to run a junior competition such as an Under-12 or Under-14 event, but so far we have been unsuccessful.

We have certainly had interested players, but not enough teams to make a competition viable.

At the moment, in some clubs, there are a few little girls playing with the boys up to the age of 11.

However, a lot of these girls are there by accident and not necessarily invitation.

What the S.Q.W.S.A. would like to see happen in 1991 is that junior girls be aware that they

are welcome at clubs where their brothers and friends play.

If a particular club only gets one or two girls interested in signing on, then we are delighted if they are included in the boys' teams.

However, it would only need six girls to form an Under 12 team.

If there were enough teams interested in 1991, the S.Q.W.S.A. Fixture Controller would certainly form a Competition for them.

An even better situation would be enough teams interested so as to have a Northside and Southside competitions.

Women's soccer needs to foster their nursery of players in the same way that boys' soccer does.

Soccer is one of the very few team sports that can be enjoyed by all the family.

There are teams out there for dads, mums, boys and girls but we must all work together to make it our family sport.

I wonder how many little girls go along to watch their brothers train and play and wish they could play too?

The Australian Women's Soccer Association holds an Under-16 National Titles.

In other States the girls who make up the bulk of these teams have been playing in schools feabout six to eight years.

Unfortunately most of our players are only exposed to soccer at ages 12 or 13 in 80 per cent of cases.

The skills that all players develop, whether male or female, are more easily learnt and mastered at an earlier age and thus we would like to see girls playing soccer earlier.

Those female players who have come through the ranks in the past having played with boys teams at a young age have been so much better equipped to play at State levels.

So in 1991 when clubs advertise their signon days, it would be great to see the word "girls" included somewhere in the advertisement, letting them know they are welcome.



LAW AMENDMENTS for next season LAW XI - OFFSIDE (1)


New Text

(1) A player is in an off-side position if he is nearer to his opponents' goal-line than the ball, unless: (a) he is in his own half of the field of play, or (b) he is not nearer to his opponents' goal-line than at least two of his opponents.

(3) A player shall not be declared off-side by the referee (a) merely because of his being in an Off-side position, or (b) if he receives the ball, direct from a goal-kick, a corner-kick or a throw-in.

Law XI Off-side Decisions of the International F.A.Board **NEW DECISION (2)**

(2) A player who is level with the second last opponent or with the last two opponents is not in an off-side position.




NOT OFF-SIDE (Diagram 1)

(See Diagram 1)

Clear pass to one of the same side A is in possession of the ball, and having Y in front passes to B.

B is not off-side because he is not nearer to his opponent's goal-line than at least two opponents when the ball is passed by A



NOT OFF-SIDE (Diagram 2)

Clear pass to one of the same side A is in possession of the ball, and having Y in front passes to B.

B is not off-side because he is level with X and Z when the ball is passed by A and is therefore not nearer his opponents' goal line than at least two of his opponents.

The International F.A. Board furthermore issued the following mandatory instruction, the advantages of which have already been demonstrated at the final competition of the 1990 World Cup in Italy.

If, in the opinion of the referee, a player who is moving towards his opponents' goal with an obvious opportunity to score a goal is intentionally and physically impeded by unlawful means, i.e. an offence punishable by a free kick (or a penalty kick), thus denying the attacking player's team the aforesaid goal-scoring opportunity, the offending player shall be sent off the field of play for serious foul play in accordance with Law XII

You are also requested to note the following two recommendations issued by the Editorial Committee of the International F.A. Board and which have the full support of the FIFA Referees' Committee.

A) Injured players

The referee should prevent a player who is bleeding profusely from taking any further part in a match until he has been adequately treated and the bleeding has stopped.

B) Field Marking

A mark may be made off the field of play, 11 yards from the corner flag and at right angles to the goal-line, to help the referee ensure this distance is observed when a corner kick is being

All Brisbane Southern Districts fixtures are now completed for teams from Under-9 to Under-14 with only Under-15 and Colts undecided.

Results from the Under-9 and 10 competition indicate just how close it went to determine the winners.

Under-9 Div. 1 went Acacia Ridge 28, Coalstars 27, Inala 26 and Centenary 20 from St Helens and Annerley also on 20 but beaten by goal average.

We now almost certainly know who is going to win the home and away

Only an amazing San Francisco 1906 size collapse could rob Edge Hill's first and reserve grades and Leichhardt's youth grade of their respective titles. Edge Hill travelled to Dimbulah, knowing that if they came through this stern test unscathed they would virtually confirm their debut premiership.

Well they were outplayed for much of the game by the home side who, in second place, had an outside chance of the premiership if they had won.


PLAYING THE GAME RIGHT

BRUCE STOWELL



This week we look at the "Circle Ball Opposed Practice".

This is a development of the previous practice but only one ball is used and active opposition is introduced.



PREPARATION

Using the same area as that for "Circle Ball", call two of the players into the centre of the circle. Start with just one ball.

PROCEDURE

The players on the outside have to pass the ball across the circle to each other without either of two players on the inside touching it. The two on the inside chase around trying to make contact with the ball.

Whoever succeeds changes places with the player who last played the ball.

NOTES

1) Players on the outside are not allowed to touch the ball until it has crossed the line marking the perimeter of the circle.

Conversely, the players on the inside are not allowed to touch it after it has passed out over the line.

All passes must cross the line twice to be

This cuts out any tendency to play safe by passing to the next player.

2) This is a good time to re-enforce comments about the timing of the release of a pass.

Encourage players to pass early and life will be very difficult for players on the inside.

3) Normally it does not take long for players on the inside to make contact with the

However, if they are having no success

don't let them stay there for ever. Change them over but make them pay a penalty.

4) Remember that this is a practice for control as well as passing, so keep an eye on the control shown by players on the outside.

Make them be realistic about controlling distances behind the line.

Also if the ball goes past a player on the outside it is up to the coach to judge whether it is the fault of the passer or the receiver.

Make one of them change places with the player who has been the longer on the inside.

VARIATIONS

1) Always start with one ball but later you can bring in another if you think the level of skill will stand it.

2) Increase the number of players on the inside.

By increasing the number of balls and players the practice becomes more exciting but at the same time more difficult to control.

3) Limit players on the outside to two touches - one to control, one to pass.






